## THE BOSSES

Head Coach Dell Morgan, aided by a staff again at pre-war strength, is seeking to maintain a team this season built around returned veterans, lettermen and recent stars of high schools. He is in his sixth year as head Coach and is specializing in the T formation, a system in which he is recognized over the nation as a leading exponent. Coach Morgan is a graduate of and former star football player for Austin College. He saw service at Quanah and Lubbock high schools and Texas Tech, Auburn and Rice as a coach prior to becoming head man in the Tech setup in 1941. Much of his time in the off-season is taken up with counseling high school coaches, and some college coaches, on best methods of perfecting effective team play.

Direction of physical education and athletic business matters at Texas Tech is in the hands of Morley Jennings, Director of Athletics. Mr. Jennings, adept as a coach and businessman, is in his sixth year at Tech. He was graduated in 1912 from Mississippi A&M, for 13 years was Athletic Director and Head Coach of Quanchita College in Arkansas, and for 17 years Head Coach at Baylor University. He spent seven summers playing professional baseball as property of the Washington Athletics. He is a veteran of World War I.

Heading the Texas Tech Athletic Council since establishment of the school has been W. L. Stangel, now Dean of Agriculture. Dean Stangel is past president of the Border Conference, of which Tech is a member, and has been instrumental in molding many policies of the conference, as well as keeping Tech athletic matters on an even keel. He is a recognized authority in all matters relative of livestock and other phases of agriculture.

Coaching aides with high reputations for ability and fair dealing are helping Coach Morgan mold the Red Raiders.

The backfield is in the hands of Berl Huffman, head coach of the Keebler Field athletes in 1944 and first Assistant Coach of the Fort Worth Skymasters last fall. Coach Huffman is a graduate of Trinity College and coached at White Deer and Lubbock High schools prior to joining the Tech staff in 1935. He also served as Head Basketball Coach. He was released from Army service as a captain.

Walker Nichols, Line Coach of the Red Raiders, lettered three years as a Tech guard, captaining the 1936 team. He joined the staff in 1941, after five years as a coach of Lubbock High school, where he aided in developing the 1939 state champion grid team. During the late war, he was recreational officer in the Navy.

Polk Robison, coach of Red Raider ends, also is serving as head scout. He is rated as a keen analyst and defense against strong opponents of the past few years has resulted from his study. Coach Robison was coach at Burkburnett high school seven years, following athletic activity at Tech. He was sole assistant to Coach Morgan during the war.

## TECH STILL IN HIGH

Texas Tech is in its 22nd year of football competition. During the previous years it played 205 games, winning 119, losing 71 and tying 15. The Red Raiders piled up 2,850 points to opponents' 1,750. The greatest point victory was the second game of Tech history, when Wayland College was overcome, 120-0. The greatest number of points for a Red Raider season was 382 in 1932.

Tech was one of two Border Conference schools to carry on football during World War II. The strongest possible opponents were met in these years, even though it meant not too many victories. Officials feel a major contribution was made to the war effort by providing football activity, even though the wins-and-losses record is not one to be cited with pride.

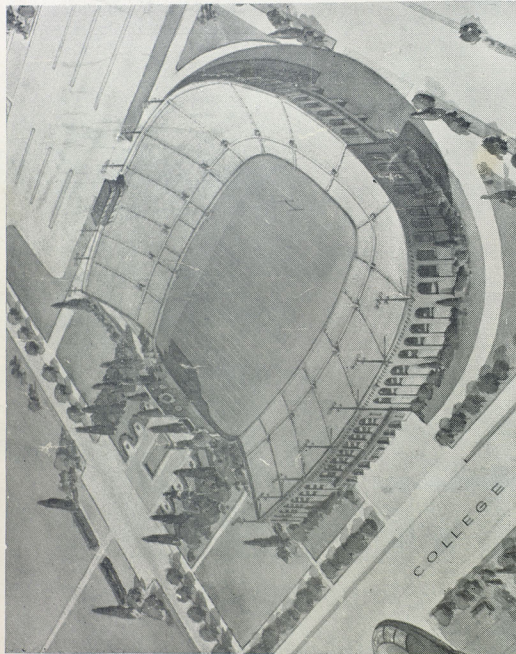

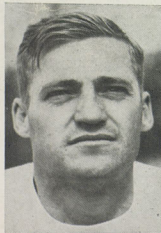

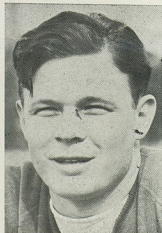

## PENALTIES

### LOSS OF FIVE YARDS

1. Taking more than three times out during either half.
2. Illegal delay of game.
3. Failure of substitute to report to umpire.
4. Violation of kick-off formation.
5. Failure to maintain proper alignment of offensive team before ball is snapped. Also, backfield man illegally in motion.
6. Offside by either team, or encroachment on neutral zone.
7. Attempt to draw opponents offside.
8. Taking more than two steps with ball after signaling for fair catch.
9. Illegal use of hands and arms by defensive players.
10. Flying block or flying tackle.
11. Running into kicker.
12. Crawling by the runner.

### LOSS OF FIFTEEN YARDS

13. Team not ready to play at scheduled time.
14. Illegal return of suspended or disqualified player.
15. Failure to stop at least one second on shift play.
16. Forward pass by member of team which did not put ball in play.
17. Forward pass touched by ineligible player.
18. Intentional grounding of forward pass.
19. Interference by member of passing team with defensive player eligible for pass.
20. Interference with fair-catch or tackling player before ball is caught.
21. Illegal use of hands and arms by offensive players.
22. Defensive player striking opponent above shoulders.
23. Roughing the kicker.
24. Piling up, hurdling, clipping.
25. Tackling player out of bounds.
26. Coaching from the sidelines.
27. Illegal interference with defense by passing team.

### OTHER PENALTIES

28. Striking, kneeling, or kicking opponent—half the distance to the goal and disqualification of offending player.
29. Foul within one yard line—half the distance to the goal.
30. Interference by defensive team on forward pass—first down for passing team at spot of foul.
31. Flagrant roughing of kicker—disqualification, plus fifteen yards.
32. Flagrant unsportsmanlike conduct—disqualification, plus fifteen yards.
33. Forward pass touched by ineligible player on or behind line of scrimmage—loss of down.
34. Illegal touching of kicked ball inside opponent's 10 yard line—touchback.
35. Refusal of either team to play within two minutes after having been ordered to do so by referee— forfeiture of game.

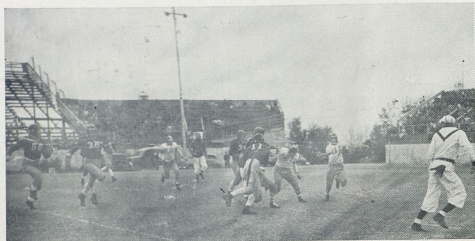

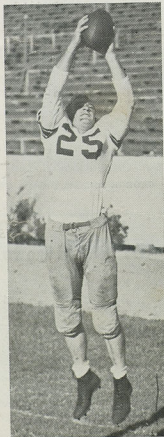


## THE STARS

## TRACK MAJOR SPORT

Track returned as a major sport to Texas Tech last spring and the season was marked a success, despite the fact no dual or triangular meet was won. Success came at the Border Conference meet, where Tech scored the most points in its history and staged a few upsets.



CRUSER

Coach Walker Nichols took eleven men to the Conference meet in Tucson, and eight of them scored. Tech recorded 29 points, beating its previous high of 19. Charles Reynolds' record the 100-yard dash in 10 seconds flat to win that sprint and the mile relay team won that event to make history, displacing Arizona for the first time since the meet was started.

Big Willie Florence placed second in the discus and fourth in the shot put. Other points came from Bennie Tidwell, George Brewer and James Cruser. It was Cruser who shared high praise with the relay team. The lad came out for track because his room-mate was a track man. Cruser never had raced before. His regular event during the season was the 880-yard run. Two days before the Conference meet he ran the mile—the first of his life. He entered the mile at Tucson, took the lead to start the second lap and held it to within ten yards of the finish, when he was overtaken by a veteran, a former Big Ten champion.

Cruser finished second. Then he ran the half mile and ended up third. Then he wanted to run the two-mile, a race he never had run. But Coach Nichols thought it was too much for one night and ruled against it.

Next spring Tech hopes to be even a greater threat in Conference competition. Walter Schlinkman, shot putter, is the only man lost by graduation.

## BASKETBALL MAJOR SPORT

Basketball, since the founding of Texas Tech, has been a major sport of the college and success has marked most campaigns. The Red Raiders always have been feared aggregations in the Border Conference and at all points they have appeared, including leading tournaments of the nation.

The 1946-47 campaign will find Tech playing a strong Conference schedule and taking on other major opponents. Southwest Conference teams will be met at home and on the road.

A highlight of the season will be the December 5 visit Tech to Oklahoma A&M, where the Red Raiders will meet the national champions at the request of Coach Henry Iba of the Aggies.

Texas Tech in former years has not matched many opponents in presenting teams built around extremely tall men. Instead, the Red Raiders have sought to present a balanced club. Last year Tilley Sneed, 6 foot, 10 inch center, was the most lengthy man in the Border Conference and one of the tallest in Texas cage play. The approaching season probably will find Tech using several lads of 6 foot, 4 inches and taller. Some fast, smaller lads also will play. In fact, Tech's outlook for the winter campaign looks promising, with returned veterans mingling with newcomers on the squad to offer stiff competition to all-comers.

Coach Berl Huffman is looking for strong opposition all along the line, but promises a fighting Red Raider team. Throughout the fall many candidates are working out regularly in order to be in shape for the schedule ahead.

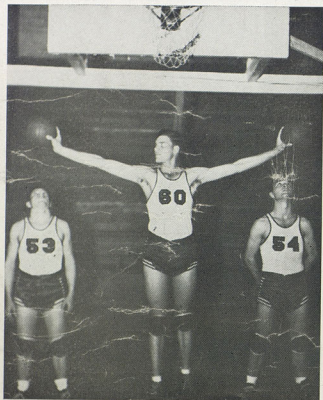
