RE: Presidents' Potpourri

Two months have passed since I last sat down to communicate with you. I purposely did not write to you on October 1 since, I felt you had more than enough to read in the Post-Board mailings that went out about that time. But much has been going on around here in this two months that has been exciting, interesting and worth sharing with you.

The first meeting of the planning committee for the Texas Land and Water Use Seminar was held in Dallas on September 13-14 with Mrs. Arthur E. Whittemore and Mrs. Lester G. Hawkins of the LWVUS Education Fund outlining what must be done. The first formal meeting of the full committee was held in Austin on October 25-26. We have a truly "blue-ribbon" planning committee and much was accomplished that lead us to believe that we will have a very successful Seminar next April in Austin. You will receive letters soon asking for nominations for the participants in the Seminar. Attendance is limited to 40 so you will be asked to give careful consideration to your nominee - he or she should be a true opinion-maker in your community who will agree to follow-through in the community after the Seminar. For your information, the planning committee is as follows: Chairman - Mrs. L. K. Richards, Waco; Program Chairman - Mrs. W. E. Joor II, Houston; Recruitment Chairman - Mrs. Maurice Brown, Waco; Secretary - Mrs. Gerald Ashford, San Antonio; Treasurer - Mrs. W. D. Baden, Waco; Arrangements - Mrs. Robert E. Connelly, Austin; Kits and Visual Aids - Mrs. Wilson Nolle, Austin; Follow-up - Mrs. Spencer Nitchie, Houston; serving also are the following who have no specific assignment but will help on all phases: Mr. Jack Kultgen, Waco; Mr. John Vandertulip, Austin; Mr. Herbert Hilburn, Plainview; Mr. Stuart Long, Austin; Mr. E. Jack Turner, Lake Jackson; Mr. Arthur Alpert, Galveston; Prof. Gloyna, UT Department of Architecture; Mrs. Jean Williams, Austin (Texas Water Development Board); Mrs. Whittemore and Mrs. Hawkins.

A letter was received recently from the Sears Foundation offering their assistance in furthering the work of the League in some way. We have responded with a copy of Texas Constitutional Review which is in the process of being updated and revised and suggested that this might be something they might like to help on. The Foundation has expressed interest in underwriting the cost and I will make a trip to Dallas the latter part of this week to discuss it further with them.

The National League of Cities (formerly the American Municipal Association) has written to ask if we would be interested in passing on to you the information that they are willing to make reduced subscription rates to their official monthly magazine, NATION'S CITIES, available to you. If you would be interested in subscribing to this magazine (and I think it could prove quite helpful to you in local Program areas), the rates and the address are as follows: Regular rates are \$6.00 for one year and \$10.00 for two years - for League members, special rates are \$4.50 for one year and \$7.50 for two years. A sample copy for your examination will be sent to you by writing to Mr. Patrick Healy, Executive Director, National League of Cities, City Building, 1612 K. Street, N.W., Washington, D. C. 20006. Please specify that you are a member of the LWV.

We haven't yet had time to tabulate all the orders for the November 2 Voter's Guide but it seems that we may have set some kind of record for distribution in an off-year amendments only election. Last-minute orders were handled last week that we have not yet added to the totals here in the office.

Four state Board delegates will attend the 71st Annual Conference on Government of the National Municipal League in St. Louis this month at their own expense. The state budget could not be stretched to include more than nominal expenses for them - the \$3.00 registration fee and the luncheon tickets - but because the meeting is within driving distance this time and we feel that what we gain at these meetings is so worthwhile, they are paying their own hotel bills and transportation costs.

The National Municipal League has issued an up-to-date (September 1965) replacement for its pamphlet on "Patterns of Apportionment". It is a 47-page summary that covers the important aspects of the questions with some emphasis on the possible techniques. It would be quite useful to those Leagues which have not finished the Apportionment study and would help a resource committee answer some questions. It can be obtained for 75¢ a copy from the National Municipal League, 47 East 68th Street, New York, N.Y. 10021. The exact title is "Changing Patterns of Apportionment" by William J. D. Boyd.

Our application for a second class mailing permit will be filed when the November Texas VOTER goes to the post office in a week or so. As of this writing (November 1), only 17 Leagues have sent new membership lists to the state office. We must have them, even if you have sent them earlier, complete as of October, so that we can file completely accurate lists of those to whom the VOTER will be mailed under this rate. Please check with your treasurer or whoever handles this job in your League, to be certain that your lists have been sent - we must have 2 copies!

My first official visit to the Provisional LWV of El Paso was made on October 22-23. It was pure pleasure to meet with this excellent new League. Their membership now totals 147 - there were about 90 present for the Saturday morning membership coffee, perhaps a third of whom were prospects. 19 paid dues that morning and 5 others indicated that their checks will be forthcoming very soon. One of the most rewarding aspects of my service as your state president comes when I can visit with you in your own communities. I wish my record for visits for the 3-1/2 years was better than it is for I have only been to see 19 of you. It seems highly unlikely that I'll be able to see the other 18 in the six months before the end of this League year but I certainly wish it were possible. This is something that ought some day to be included in the state budget - only by actual on-the-scene visits can the state president get the real feel of the entire League in Texas. I hope that some day we can include money in the budget for a swing tour each biennium by the president - expenses could be kept down by careful planning by regions of the state.

Today's mail brought a packet of bluebonnet seeds from Governor Connally for the third straight year and a letter from him in regard to our new publication Blueprint for Planning - see enclosed memo. Most of the rest of the mail has been fairly routine but it continues to fascinate me because of the variety of subjects that are covered by it. There is no satisfactory method of sharing all of it with you but I hope this has given you a little of the flavor.

We are sending you copies of suggestions for National Program that are being circularized to us by other state and local Leagues. The Texas State Board makes no recommendation to you on these proposals but merely passes them on to you for informational purposes.

The state Board's recommendation for National Program for 1966-68 decided upon at the September 29 - October 1 Board meeting includes the following subjects:

- 1. Land and Water Use: A study of man's environment.
- United Nations: Continued support of the United Nations System with consideration of special agencies acting in assistance programs in population control.
- 3. Development of Human Resources
- 4. Foreign Economic Policy
- 5. Apportionment of State Legislatures
- 6. Loyalty-Security
- 7. District of Columbia Home Rule.

NOTE: Wording of #3 and #5 must await consensus since we propose no broadening of either item. #4, #6 and #7 would be retained in present wordings.

The state Board is proposing the adoption of a "single list" Program and will make the necessary bylaw change recommendation to accomplish this.

RE: A proposal for National Program

The following letter was received from the League of Women Voters of Ann Arbor, Michigan. A similar letter was received from a member of the LWV of Oak Ridge, Tennessee. This is being sent to you FYI in order that you may know what other Leagues are thinking about as they consider recommendations on national program.

"We would like to propose for our national item a study of the population crisis in its relation to our world, national and local problems with emphasis on present U. S. policy and possible government action.

"With agronomists predicting the most widespread famine the world has ever known, what more effective and humane aid could we give than requested aid in controlling population growth? This is certainly in keeping with our present national item supporting policies which promote world economic growth. It goes to the root of the matter and requires that countries help themselves.

"This ties in with our current national item on Human Resources as it relates to preventive programs. The basic reason for neglected and delinquent children is that they are unwanted children. Large families are an important factor contributing to indigency and housing problems. The population crisis is the problem underlying unemployment and the school dilemma. Over population is not confined to low income groups.

"At our present rate of growth, within 35 years there will be two Americans for every one here now. If we believe life should mean more than mere subsistence, we must face the population problem. We have accepted death control with open arms. Now we must accept the responsibility which it brings -- birth control. Today governments realize that the use or non-use of nuclear warfare may be closely correlated to overpopulation. We may still have a choice.

"This country has no widespread recognition of the urgency of the situation. Indeed, we refuse to identify the problem although the success of many public programs, foreign aid and even peace itself are jeopardized. Government cannot meet the problem until the public recognizes the problem and favors action."

FROM: State Board of the League of Women Voters of Massachusetts RE: VOTERS SERVICE LIVELY ISSUE FOR NATIONAL PROGRAM 1966-1968:

#### ELECTION LAWS AND PROCEDURES

Since the beginning of the civil rights crisis in 1963, league members have expressed concern about the league's actual commitment to its guiding principles. The overwhelming response to Mrs. Phillip's memo, July 1963, which spelled out how much local leagues could do without having a civil rights item on the national program was definite indication of the great interest and frustration in this area. Now that civil rights legislation has become a reality, and especially with the most recent enactment of the federal voting law, the attention of the country is focused on voting rights.

What will the role of the league be now? If it is truly committed to the principle that every citizen should be protected in his right to vote, the league must either adjust to a more flexible policy in regard to acting upon its basic principles or add a new in-depth dimension to voters service by adopting a national current agenda on election laws.

Many leagues all over the country have already discussed the question and have sent their conclusions to the national board. We believe that the Massachusetts board should have its voice heard now and not wait until first round program is due. This unrest is not regional since these proposals have originated from such geographically separated areas as Pasadena, Madison, Wisconsin, and in the past, Massachusetts. To date only the Maryland state league has sent a memo to all state leagues presidents urging action in this field. This was done in a formal proposal. Suggestions from other leagues were reported informally at National Council, in the National Board Report of May 1965, and the July 1965 National Voter.

We find that suggestions for more meaningful voters service activity fall into two categories: (1) either as a permanent NATIONAL responsibility or as a permanent STATE league responsibility; and (2) election laws and procedures (or some form of general voting rights) as a national current agenda item.

The national current agenda item we are proposing for your consideration is:

ELECTION LAWS AND PROCEDURES -- A study of election laws and procedures, including the protection of the citizen's right to vote as guaranteed by the 15th Amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

Following is some of our reasoning:

#### APPORTIONMENT AND VOTERS SERVICE -- Two Sides of the Same Coin

The explanation for the decision made at National Council to adopt apportionment as a national item applies equally to an election laws item. Instead of representative government in apportionment (i.e. one man -- one vote), we are concerned with a matter of equal importance -- voting rights for all citizens. The case for apportionment as stated in the National Board Report of May 1965 reads in part, "Whether or not the league reaches a position and takes league action, a program item will provide the opportunity for league members everywhere to be informed and to inform the public". What subject is more basic for league information and action than voting rights? The report goes on to say, "In the past one of the strengths of the league has always been the single voice....But perhaps even more important, we have understood the political effectiveness of the single voice and the united front." Where, in this mobile society, could the league contribute more effectively than by informing and supporting legislation that insures that every citizen should be protected in his right to vote?

In her speech to National Council, Mrs. Stuart discussed two crisis situations -two sides to the same coin, apportionment and voting rights -- by saying, "The matter
of voting rights reached crisis proportions during this last spring. Let me say at
the outset that there was not much question in the mind of the public as to where the
league stands on this issue. ....Our founders marched for it. We didn't march this
time but we seized every opportunity to express the league's belief in the right of
every citizen to vote".

We question whether the public was aware of the league's position in the voting rights crisis because it was unable to speak with a single voice. Or was the league conspicuous by its absence. When the federal Voting Rights Bill was signed into law the fact that our national league president was not present at this historic event was most disturbing, particularly when her predecessor, as a member of the President's Commission on Registration and Voting Participation (to which leagues contributed so much background material) in a minority report urged a national law. She-- Mrs. Phillips -- was a member of the minority group who insisted on inserting the following: "The commission now believes that the only effective method of guaranteeing the vote for all Americans is an enactment by Congress of some form of uniform qualification standards ....The right to vote must be safeguarded and insured by the federal government. Adequate legislation must include both standards and implementation." Implementation of voting rights must now become a national league item and responsibility.

ELECTION LAWS AND PROCEDURES -- A study of election laws and procedures, including the protection of the citizen's right to vote as guaranteed by the 15th Amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

The federal Voting Rights Act of 1965 makes it imperative that the league seize this opportunity to make this act the living law of the land. As Martin Luther King says, the legislation has written the law but assistance is vitally needed in its implementation. The most effective way for the league is to adhere to its basic principles by following its customary procedure of study and action. This can be accomplished by the adoption of the national CA item stated above.

Explanation

This item should be limited to the examination of that part of the U. S. Constitution and federal legislation that guarantees the citizen's voting rights. Evaluation of the following should be included:

- 1. 15th Amendment to the U. S. Constitution
- 2. Federal Voting Rights Act
- Report of President's Commission on Registration and Voting Participation
- 4. The Federal Voting Assistance Program and other related federal programs.

Thirty-four state leagues have, or have had, some form of an election laws item as a CA or CR. All state leagues update their election laws as part of their Voters Service work. All state leagues provided Mrs. Phillips with updated material for the President's Commission. Could not each state Voter Service Committee continue doing this in order to keep up a permanent inventory of state election laws?

The study of election laws and procedures as a national item might result in a set of criteria that could be applied by leagues seeking consensus or effective action on proposed election laws, as is handled with the national CA on Water Resources, a limited item that keeps the study constantly updated. Many leagues that have studied election laws find their CR limited, inflexible or outdated. Some states dropped their election law CR. The experience in Massachusetts in applying for the first time the new Resident's Law (in the 1962 presidential election) which permits voting for President and Vice President only after a limited residence in the state, pointed up very clearly the inequities existing between states in registration and voting requirements. This item may result in setting up the following permanent national standards:

- 1. Permanent registration
- 2. Residence requirements
- 3. Absentee voting
- 4. Uniform residence requirements for national elections
- 5. Protection against election frauds

Statistics clearly indicate that there has been a demand among the leagues for a national CA item on election laws. In 1962, this item was in the first group of non-recommended items: 100 to 300 leagues chose this on 1st round program suggestions. The fact that 34 states leagues have this as a CA or CR item indicates the great interest throughout the country.

If Voters Service is to become a permanent responsibility, it must first be adopted as a national CA to enable us to set up a system that would fulfill the recommendation of the President's Commission on Registration and Voting which states, "Each state should keep informed on other state's practices and innovations in election administration."

The goal of this study may well be the support of such measures as would allow the League of Women Voters of the United States to speak with "one voice" to protect, extend and encourage the use of the franchise.

RE: Proposed Permanent League Responsibility for Registration, Election Laws and Apportionment

For the reasons and by the means detailed below the League of Women Voters of Madison is working for the adoption of a national Current Agenda item on Registration and Election Laws, and we are also working for a Bylaw change that would make our positions in these areas and in apportionment when study is complete and consensus has been reached a Permanent Responsibility of the League. Because this Bylaw change is a major one, the Madison League hopes that your state and local league boards will (1) discuss these proposals in your board meetings as soon as possible, (2) plan to discuss them with your membership early in the fall, and (3) appoint some interested person to write us the extent of your interest, your suggestions, etc.

The history of the League of Women Voters, and the Women's Suffrage Movement before it, has shown a consistent and special concern for the vote as the first and most basic form of participation of citizens in government. We strive to foster an informed voting public, but we have not required that our Leagues gain a working understanding and be in a position to act on issues affecting the vote -- specifically the local, state and national laws and procedures governing registration, elections and apportionment.

Many of our Leagues have chosen to work in these areas. In August of 1962, 27 state Leagues had CA's or CR's on registration and election laws. (It is interesting that 12 of these 27 were southern states.) Recently we were told that 30 state Leagues had positions on apportionment. But the rest of the state Leagues are not prepared in these areas relating to the vote, and the National League has worked in recent years only on Home Rule for the District of Columbia.

We are the League of Women Voters. The vote is important to us, and we believe that the League can and should be important to the vote. Therefore, it is the recommendation of the League of Women Voters of Madison that the League recognize the primacy of the vote by:

- 1. Adopting a Current Agenda item for 1966-68 on Registration and Elections (Apportionment already being on the Agenda) on the national level and as soon as practicable Current Agenda items on Registration, Elections and Apportionment on the state level where adequate CRs do not already exist.
- 2. Through a Bylaw change, rewording of the Preamble, or other means, establish a Permanent Respons ility (PR for short) for Registration, Elections and Apportionment as soon as consensus has been reached. (We assume that any actions in these subject areas on the local level will come out of local study under state or national support positions).

Since as a first step we must adopt a national Current Agenda item, we are proposing the following possible wording and have outlined its scope.

Registration and Election Laws: A study of suffrage and elections as related to national elective offices.

#### Scope

constitutional and new federal statutory provisions and court decisions on registration

procedures of the Justice Dept. and other federal agencies relating to registration

disenfranchisement by race, age, literacy, length of residence, etc. -- a comparative study by states to obtain an overall national picture

electoral college as constituted by federal constitution, state laws and party decisions and suggested changes in the electoral college

#### presidential succession

desirability and effectiveness of limits on campaign expenditures and contributions

Although there may be other means of accomplishing our end, we are suggesting initially for purposes of discussion the following additions to Article XIII of the Bylaws. (Additions are underlined.)

Section 1. The Program of the League of Women Voters shall consist of Current Agenda, (delete and ) Continuing Responsibilities and Permanent Responsibility as hereinafter defined.

- (a) The Current Agenda shall consist of such current governmental issues as the Convention shall choose for concerted action.
- (b) The Continuing Responsibilities shall consist of positions on national issues to which the League has given sustained attention and on which it may continue to act.
- (c) The Permanent Responsibility shall consist of positions on national issues concerning elections, registration and apportionment on which the League may continue to act.

TO: ALL STATE LEAGUE PRESIDENTS

RE: ELECTION LAWS AS A PERMANENT STATE LEAGUE RESPONSIBILITY

Are you one of the state Leagues currently studying your election laws and therefore able to determine the emphasis and scope of such a study? How do you plan to continue this study so that it remains current once you drop your present consensus down to a CR?

Or, are you one of the state Leagues like Maryland whose study was made some years ago, and whose position is now embodied in a limited, inflexible CR?

Perhaps, as a state League, you have never made a study of your election laws.

If your League falls into any one of the above three categories, then, in view of the current national focus on voting rights, you may share with us a concern about the League's actual commitment to its Guiding Principles.

Many Leagues have already expressed this concern, both on the local and state level, with proposals that Voting and Registration be made a National Current Agenda item, and/or that state election laws be a Permanent Program Responsibility. This unrest is not regional since these proposals have originated from such geographically separated areas as Pasadena in California; Massachusetts; and most recently, Madison, Wisconsin.

Our State Board in Maryland had reached the same conclusion as the Madison League: that election laws should be a permanent state League responsibility. This conclusion was based on two factors:

### 1. League principles which state

- A. The League of Women Voters believes in representative government and in the individual liberties established in the Constitution of the United States.
- B. The League of Women Voters believes that democratic government depends upon the informed and active participation of its citizens.
- C. The League of Women Voters believes that every citizen should be protected in his right to vote;....and that no person or group should suffer legal, economic, or administrative discrimination.
- D. The League of Women Voters believes that responsible government should be responsive to the will of the people;.....
- 2. In many states, the League is the only nonpartisan citizens' group whose sole puspose is to act in the public interest, and whose background and experience in pressuring for governmental reform make it the unique vehicle to insure that each citizen of voting age has the opportunity to "assume political responsibility through informed and active participation of citizens in government."

Having reached this conclusion, the next problem was how to achieve the desired result within the present framework of League bylaws and program.

After much discussion by our Board, we would like to set forth the following suggested procedure for your comments and criticism:

1. Study of a state's election laws as a permenent responsibility should be a mandatory provision for State League recognition.

Recognition standards for state and territorial Leagues are, according to Article V, Section 2 of the National Bylaws, "formulated by the Board of Directors and adopted by the convention."

The Maryland League would be prepared to make a formal presentation to the National Board and ask that the proposal be placed on the Convention agenda for discussion and vote.

2. If such a mandatory provision for State League recognition met the approval of the convention body, discretion should be vested in the National Board on the date the provision would apply to each individual state.

Flexibility would seem to be indicated since some states merely have to update previous studies, while others might have to start from the beginning. In addition, considerayion would have to be given to the program workload faced by each State League, and the amount of womanpower available.

3. Such a continuing review should be the responsibility of Voters' Service, but such responsibility should be confined solely to the area of resource.

Findings should be submitted to the State League Board who would then decide whether to proceed as with any other state program item.

The initial responsibility for the continuing review would rest with Voters' Service since this is the one committee with direct contact with the election process. However, 'Voters' Service should continue in its function as a service to the voter - objective, impartial, and unbiased - and therefore should not be drawn into the action phase.

4. It would be the responsibility of the National Voters' Service Chairman to prepare a basic outline for the study of election laws.

Contemplated would be an outline similar to the one prepared for Know Your City (County). This would assure uniformity of study from state to state.

5. It would be the responsibility of the National Voters' Service Chairman to serve as a clearing-house for League accomplishments and items that would be of interest to all state Leagues.

While the Inventory of Work on Election Laws (National League, 1962) is help-ful, description by state is limiting when trying to ascertain what has been done in specific areas. Arrangement by topic would have been more helpful: i.e. Corrupt Practices and then an alphabetical listing of the states working on this subject and what had been done; Registration followed by the alphabetical list of states working on the subject, etc.

Items of interest would include the experiences of state and local Leagues, for example, with the new automatic voting machines; an outline of the provisions of the new Federal voting rights law; a short bibliography of material on specific topics such as Corrupt Practices, Registration Procedures, Governing Bodies of the Parties, etc.


Please let us emphasize that nothing in this proposal should be construed as the first step toward a National item on election laws; each State League would reach its own consensus on its own State Voting and registration procedures and take action within its own State accordingly.

We hope you will agree with us - even though you may not agree with the procedure proposed - that the provisions, administration, and enforcement of election laws are basic to the purpose and policy of the League of Women Voters.
