




STADIUM SERVICES: CLIFFORD B. AND AUDREY JONES STADIUM TEXAS TECHNOLOGICAL COLLEGE

Stadium Capacity, 41,500; opened in September, 1947; Press Box and Special Option Seat Air Conditioned Booth opened in 1959.


PUBLIC TELEPHONES: Several booths are located on the ground level concourse in both east and west stands.

Your cooperation in following their directions will be beneficial to all. Aisles and concourses in the stadium are to be kept clear at all times. A carefully studied parking and traffic flow plan allows easy entry and exit from parking areas.

Everything from finance to personnel and schedules to Tech's participation in SWC decisions falls under the jurisdiction of the Texas Tech Athletic Council. The eight-man council is composed of six faculty members appointed by the President, a representative from the Ex-Students As-

sociation, and a representative from the Student Council.

In addition to their many duties, council members report to the President and the Board of Directors on subjects concerning lettermen and NCAA matters. Dr. J. William Davis heads the council.

The Athletic Director

Less than four months after he was named athletic director, Robison coached Texas Tech to its first Southwest Conference basketball championship and third place in the NCAA Midwest Regional tournament, earning "Coach of the Year" honors for the Southwest from Coach and Athlete Magazine.

Assistant athletic director for five years, Robison was named athletic director

in 1960. He has been associated with Texas Tech for 24 of the school's 34 years of athletics.

In the fall of 1961, in order to devote adequate attention to his new duties as athletic business manager as well as the athletic directorship, Robison turned the basketball coaching over to his assistant, Gene Gibson.

Olympic Preview

This is the year of the Olympics, when the American athletic way of life is displayed for all the world to see.

It is a proud time for the United States, long the leading and most dominant nation in this worldwide athletic competition, held every four years.

Uncle Sam is always at his best for these games. He goes to the Olympic Games each time as the most respected nation in the world. Win or lose on the field, the other countries look up to the U. S. officials and athletes more than they do to any others.

Even though Russia did better than the United States in the last two Olympics, the Soviets still have not come close to matching Uncle Sam's prestige in the hearts of the athletic world.

The Russians themselves lead in tributes to the United States. They spend more time socializing with U. S. athletes, more time watching them in practice and more time studying their techniques. It has paid off handsomely for the Russians. At the Melbourne games in 1956 and at Rome in 1960 her athletes won more medals than any other nation. The United States was second both times.

But Russia has a long way to go before she can approach the glittering Olympic record of the United States. Since the Games as we know them were started in Athens in 1896, the United States has won a total of 1,078 medals—469 gold, 328 silver and 281 bronze—No other nation is close. Sweden ranks second with a total of 445 medals. Russia is sixth with 277, but has competed in only five of

the previous 16 encounters.

The 1964 Games in Tokyo will be bigger and better than ever. And the United States will present its best team ever.

"Our prospects have never been brighter," Kenneth L. (Tug) Wilson, president of the U.S. Olympic Committee, believes. "For four years we have worked on a development program giving the athletes with Olympic potential opportunities for competition and coaching. The program has paid off. Our team at Tokyo will be well-rounded with a lot of bench that can do the job."

One of the major factors in the encouraging U. S. picture, according to Wilson, is that "a large number of athletes of high school and early college competition have shown unusual ability." Before this year, our Olympic burden usually was carried by veterans. The age range of our 1960 team at Rome was from 13 to 46 years old.

At Tokyo, U. S. athletes will be operating under one big handicap—the date of the games.

U. S. athletes had to reach their peak form in June and July, when most of the final tryouts which decided the team were held. That meant a long break before the games open October 10. Because of educational and business commitments, many of our athletes did not have time to stay in top shape. Most of them will be going to Tokyo early, hoping to reach top form for the second time in the space of five months.

As usual, the United States is expected to make its strongest showing in men's track and field, men's and women's swimming, and men's basketball. These are the major sports which it has dominated in the international scene for years. Better things are expected of our rowers, weight lifters, free style wrestlers and gymnasts. These are classified as minor sports in this country, but the four year Olympic program concentrated on developing sports of this type.


U. S. officials also feel that the United States could surprise in the two new sports on the 1964 Olympic program—judo and volley ball.

In the overall picture, Russia will be favored because of her strength in women's track and field, gymnastics, shooting and fencing.


But victory or defeat is not the Olympic goal. It is, rather, the promotion of international good will. And at that the U. S. boys and girls are champions.

"The importance of the Olympic Games throughout the world as a factor in promoting world peace can hardly be estimated," is the way Wilson puts it. "Our athletes traveling to all parts of the world have proven themselves to be marvelous ambassadors of good will."

There is no greater image or impact in sports than the United States makes in the Olympic Games. The athletes are proud to represent the United States, and the United States is proud of them—just as you are proud of your football team out there on the gridiron today.



Texas Tech Enters Fourth Decade



Texas Tech enters its fourth decade as one of the major State universities in Texas.

This fall semester includes the enrollment of more than 13,000 students and the inauguration of four new doctoral programs. Master's degrees are now offered in 44 areas.

On the 1967 fall horizon are a new School of Law and doctorate in business administration. Scheduled for development in the next eight years are new Schools of Medicine, Nursing, Pharmacy and Library Service.

Comparisons of Tech's first year and its current status can be startling. Considering original construction cost, the value of the physical plant now is more than 40 times what it was in 1925 when the institution opened. The original plant was valued at \$1,452,000, while the current value is more than \$58,700,000.

The operating budget is more than 46 times what it was in 1925. The figure then was \$383,813. In the coming 1964-65 academic year it will be \$17,646,058.

In this academic year Texas Tech will pour an estimated \$30 to \$35 million into the Lubbock community, and there's much more on the horizon.


More than 15,000 students are expected by 1965, more than 20,000 by 1970, with all the faculty, facilities and resources that will be needed to educate them. On top of this will be increasing funds and consequent benefits from the research of an improving faculty.

Add to this the many cultural and intangible benefits of a university that make a community attractive, and you can begin to estimate the growing value of Texas Tech to Lubbock and the South Plains area.



Question Marks Mark Texas' Bid for Fourth Straight SWC Title

Texas' defending Southwest Conference and national football champions begin their bid for an unprecedented fourth straight SWC title tonight — but they're not expecting things to be easy this fall.

The Longhorns go into the current campaign with more question-marks than they've had since 1960—the last time UT didn't figure in the conference championship.

"It all comes back to the middle," Coach Darrell Royal told the touring SWC sports writers during two-aday practice.

By that, the successful Longhorn head man means that the Longhorns' chief problems will hinge around severe manpower losses in the tackle-to-tackle line. Departed since last year are 12 letterman linemen — five tackles (including all-America Scott Appleton), four guards and three centers.

As a result, Royal and his staff have had to do a considerable amount of juggling in the line, moving guards to tackle and center, centers to tackles and sophomore linemen to anywhere they will fit the best.

Aside from the line problem, and UT's perennial quarterback inexperience difficulties, the Longhorns appear strong in several areas.

End play should be tops. The ranks include Pete Lammons and Knox Nunnally, the 1963 alternates; big Sandy Sands, who lettered in '62 but missed the national championship season with an injury; pass-catching George Sauer, Dan Mauldin and some promising sophs.

Longhorn deep backs (including Ernie Koy, the stellar punter who missed 7½ games of the 1963 season with a

shoulder injury; Phil Harris, pass-catching sensation in the New Year's Day Cotton Bowl game, and strong fullback Harold Philipp) take a back seat to nobody.

Kicking is in sturdy hands (and feet) — Koy as the punter, and he's one of the best in the business, and sophomore David Conway as the place-kicking specialist.

Red-haired Tommy Nobis, UT's 1964 all-America candidate, and co-captain Tim Doerr give the Longhorns one of the best linebacking tandems in the country.

And the defensive secondary comes well-equipped, with reliable veterans Joe Dixon and Anthony King being joined by sophomore safetyman Jim Helms.

Although the Longhorns have some good inside linemen (notably Nobis; Frank Bedrick, his running-mate at guard, and Clayton Lacy at one tackle), the experience level is far below what a good football team needs. For instance, five of the first six tackles are sophomores — not a desirable situation, but a necessity in view of graduation losses.


And one of the biggest single jobs Royal and his staff will face this fall is the development of a quarterback successor to Duke Carlisle. Co-captain Jim Hudson and junior Marvin Kristynik were running neck-in-neck in preseason workouts until Hudson fell victim to one of the many injuries that hit the Longhorn training camp during two-a-day workouts.


