## Election Laws

Support of uniformly enforced election procedures, clearly stated election laws, and the right to a secret ballot.

Stressing the need for improving election procedures, our position emphasizes these points:

- .... Revision of the election laws to ensure enforcement
- ....Recodification of the election laws to eliminate obsolete matter and clarify ambiguous provisions
- ....Supervision of local elections held by all governmental units by a single county election authority responsible to a central state authority
- .... Requirement of uniform training for all election personnel
- ....Automatic restoration of voting rights to felons upon completing their sentence and/or probationary period
- .... Provision for unitary primaries.

FROM: Ruth Joor July 7, 1967

I know you have not heard from me since Board meeting, but I have been on a dizzy round of this and that. The Oklahoma meetings were really great. The two men speakers for the China Conference were outstanding. Ruth's and my reports will be sent out at the end of July unless Ruth's comes in this week. Mine is only half done. There were 35 Texas delegates including Ruth and me. This was only a little over half of those invited. This fact bothers me, and it also bothered Julia Stuart who sent a last-minute letter to Texas League presidents urging attendance. After all, the Leagues in this area do not get an opportunity to meet with national Board members more than once in a blue moon. Many of the delegates were Leaguers I had never seen before. They admitted they had not attended state meetings, and when I asked — at a brief get together following a session — if they knew who I was, a considerable number of them shook their heads. So these sessions were a great experience for the Texas Leagues and I wish more had attended. I had sent out a special memo about the meetings, and Julia's letter on top of all the previous material about them should have been enough prodding.

Well, the water hearing is over, and I don't want to go through that again. I spent the better part of a week compiling the report, and Joyce came in with her son last Wednesday night to run off the final speech and put all the material together so I could take it with me. I took 35 sets, and when I go through with the Board and the press, there weren't many left.

Mrs. Haskell Rosenblum, former water chairman on the national Board, was the only woman on a distinguished ten-member Board -- called the President's Advisory Water Pollution Board. The chairman is Mr. Quigley, a commissioner of the Department of the Interior, who spoke very kindly of the League when I had finished. I was the only woman of thirteen speakers, including Mr. Moore, head of the Texas Pollution Board; Mr. Horton, head of the Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Industry; Mr. Simmons, president of the Conservation Society; Mr. Roy Payne, a member of the Railroad Commission, etc. So Mrs. Rosenblum and I as the only "coeds", and as representatives of the LWV, sort of publicized the League. I asked permission for Mrs. Hersehy, Houston LWV water chairman, to follow me with testimony about Houston problems, which was granted. Her testimony is not included with the material sent out, but if we can get a copy from her, we will run it off.

As you may remember from my report on national Council, there is to be a special emphasis on Finance during the League's Fiftieth Anniversary. I received a letter from Mrs. Stuart requesting that I with local members of the League hold a brainstorming meeting about a different kind of financing for the League and send them our findings before the 11th of July. Therefore, Joan, as PR chairman, has set up a meeting for the 5th, inviting all state Board members from the area plus selected local members.

To those of you who were not at the June Board meeting, please note: We have an off-Board PUBLISHING EDITOR from the Houston League. Mrs. John H. Sieber. She is a professional and will help with all published material only, such as the VOTER, the F & I's for the Legislature study, etc. But she is not to be contacted personally. All requests for her help must come through this office so that order may be maintained. Otherwise, I am afraid we will lose our new editor.

Re editing of mimeographed material to go out of this office: this is the responsibility of the chairman, her committee and vice president.

In this respect, I would like to request that each of you make a resolve for this coming year - in timing; in use of your committee; in reporting to your vicepresident. It was apparent to me last year that committees were not being used enough in between Board meetings, and often when they were sent material, there was not enough time for either the vice president or the committee to make suggestions before the material had to go out. After all, you cannot expect a VP or committee member to drop everything in order to study material that you have waited until the last minute to write. In other cases, committee members, although they had sufficient time, ignored the chairman's request for help. Also, chairmen who expect to have a great deal of work this year should make use of an off-Board committee as was suggested again and again by June Morgan and Margaret Law. At present Helen Duckworth's committee organization is a prime example of how well this committee system can work. She is using both off-Board and Board committees to the greatest advantage.

The carbon routine may be shuddered at by most Board members, but in the SO at times it becomes more than something to be shuddered at; it becomes smothering. I cannot possibly read carefully everything that comes into this office. And although the rule of a copy to SO still holds, I would like to ask, wistfully, that notes to your VP's and vice versa, which really don't need noting here not be sent to SO

Your vice president is ready and willing - when she herself is not swamped - to be of help. Rely on her; ask her for any help you need. I don't mean to sound aloof, because if you want to talk your problems over with me, I am ready to listen. But there is a limit to what I can do. This was quite apparent this last week when everything was at a standstill except water pollution. This ordinarily would have been Peggy's chore, but a last minute emergency request like this is my responsibility.

The publisher, slowed by the holiday, will not have the VOTER ready to go until next week, hopefully by Tuesday. We had hoped to close the office the 7th because Joyce is leaving for California on Saturday. But Margaret - who is back at work, by the way, and looks fine - with the help of our substitute, Mrs. Olson, will get out the VOTER. Then we will close the office until the 24th. I don't know about the rest of you but I need a breathing spell - with no responsibility for League work.

Re: Recommendation for 1968-69 budget.

I recommend that the 1968-69 budget of the state League contain an amount to be accumulated for publishing the history of the League of Women Voters of Texas. My thought would be, also, that the 1969-70 budget should contain the amount necessary to complete the financing of the publication. I suggest that the history be published soon before the 1970 state Convention, with a big promotion of the history at that convention.

In trying to arrive at an amount to suggest for inclusion in the 1968-69 budget I've had these thoughts: (1) that the history should sell for no more than 50¢ or, preferably, 40¢; (2) that it could be a 30-35 page booklet similar to BLUEPRINT FOR PLANNING or, alternatively, an 8-page Facts & Issues type format to sell for, say, 20¢; and (3) that 2000, possibly 3000, copies should be printed.

One can only guess now at what printing prices will be in late 1969 or early 1970, but, using a per unit cost of 30¢ for a 30-35 page booklet, 2000 copies would cost \$600. This estimate may well be a bit on the high side, for the per unit cost of BLUEPRINT'S 44 pages was 25½¢ when 3000 were printed in the fall of 1965.

For an 8-page Facts & Issues format 2000 copies would probably cost about \$350. (Three thousand 4-page Facts & Issues cost \$215 in August 1964.)

I recommend that \$275 be included in the 1968-69 budget to go toward the printing, 32 in 1969-70, of a history of the LWV of Texas.

Pursuant to the wishes of the Board expressed in the September 1966 Board meeting, Ruth Martin consulted about the preparation of a history and Dorothy Brown said she would write one. She has now finished preparing a history of the League in Texas. This is a 42-page manuscript, double spaced, and I think it would be the mainstay-the foundation and most of the superstructure-of any history that the Board may decide to publish. Dorothy is very interested in the project, and I feel sure that she will be willing to continue work on it if there is the expectation of publishing it.

It seems to me that a history of the League of Women Voters of Texas published to coincide with National's Golden Jubilee would be very appropriate, for we are one of "the state...Leagues /who/ will achieve the age of distinction during 1969", to quote the recent Fiftieth Anniversary Newsletter from National. The Texas Equal XXXX Suffrage Association resolved itself into the Texas League of Women Voters in San Antonio in October 1919.
