



# ALONG THE WAY


Nearly two years before its 1979 incorporation as an educational non-profit organization, this ICCA in California began its annual participation in Pasadena's Festival of the Arts.

Combined Council on Ministries and Evangelism meeting was held 5-14-80.

Meeting opened with reading by Eleanor Morgan; discussed 30 day prayer commitment.

Helen Homan reported on preliminary meeting held to prepare for long range planning conference. The date will be June 7 from 9 to 5 here at the church. Millie Hilts will be with us to give major guidance. Will have: Opening devotions; orientation; film entitled "One in the Lord"; break! small groups; reporting and discussion session; lunch; either film or reporting b ack; priority setting! calendar for 1981; then 1982, 1983 and 1984; break; wrapping up; and appropriate celebration or communion.

People will be asked to handle certain things. Lance will be photographer and projectionist. Barbara Irwin and Gertrude Suppe will lead the song period. Council on Ministries will be in charge of refreshments. Will have lay speakers on 25th and 1st. Celeste, Ken Emory, and Don will do posters and flyers. Eleanor will write second article for the Builder.

When we talked, one thing was to redefine our large goal. Also set numerical goals. Hant to be sure we know who is responsible for it. Want to have calendar and period of evaluation. Had letter from Millie Hilts with several questions to be answered before the conference.

Start with "What is the purpose of this church?" Ben read from the discipline as to what the church is. We then started brainstorming to define or describe our church: Serving, caring, inclusive, loving, fellowship, people, relationships, listening, creative, sharing, friendly, committed, prayer/worshp, beautiful, flexible, proclaim the gospel, brings meaning to life, seeking the will of God, to be involved, outreach, willing to change, accepting, church as an agency of change, understanding, education, stewardship, discipleship, servanthood, ecumenical, oneness.

Ben's definitions include: "A growing, inclusive and ethnically diverse church that sees itself as one that serves through missions, evangelism, social concerns and compassion in the spirit of the Master." "A church that has begun to reverse the trend of decline and on its way to greater inclusiveness, whose membership of persons of diverse cultural backgrounds work together in mutual respect for one another." Other definitions discussed were "Helping people to know God through caring and serving",; "A fellowship of persons who have been made aware of. .?" "A fellowship of people who seek to make God known in the community"; "A fellowship that recognizes cultural diversity as an opportunity for growth in service and worship - diversity is not a problem but an opportunity".

There will be a meeting the first of June for the leaders right after church. Do some reading before then. Helen pointed out the books on the subject. Everyone is to read ast least one book before the Conference.

Helen reported that Religion and Race Committee met on 5-14-80. Also reported the Talent PROJECT. Will receive \$10.00 next Sunday and bring back increase November 2.

I have many friends, read voraciously, and love swimming several times a week.

In Feb. I had my first operation, for removal of a lump which fortunately was not cancer. The last of the estates I was settling is nearly completed. I tried raising a vegetable garden and learned many things to do differently next time, but I did have some good tomatoes, beans, lettuce and chard to eat. While I painted a fence and the living room ceiling, I had hoped to do much more in this line.

In Sept., I had a wonderful vacation with my sister and brother-in-law when we backpacked in from Sequoia to Sugarloaf Creek and Seville Lake, which is one of the most beautiful lakes I have ever seen. The memory of this trip will stay with me for a long time.

(The letter reprinted below is from Delbert and Helen Asay, missionaries whom we help to support. First Church is happy to share this letter with you.)

August 1980

Dear Friends:

We have much news since our last letter, which was sent from Montevideo, Uruguay. For circumstancial reasons, not all of you good friends received it, so we beg the pardon of those who did for the repetition of some facts which are already known to you.

We begin with the sad tidings. Just two weeks before last Christmas our beloved eldest daughter, Beth, was fatally stricken by a sudden heart attack. She was living at the time with her husband and two small children in Newmarket, England. Coping with that tragedy required all our physical and spiritual resources, especially as it came at a time in which we were winding up our work in Montevideo, Uruguay to prepare ourselves for our new assignment in Juarez, Mexico. However, tragedy is never convenient, and although our pain still seems very fresh, we have found as have others that we can praise God in all things. Our bereaved Mike, Gene, and Ginny Saxon are carrying on courageously, and they have been blessed in many, many ways by God through countless friends and relatives. We take this opportunity once again to thank each of you who lifted our spirits and inspired our courage through your loving and understanding messages, especially those of you who have already walked "through the valley of the shadow of death."

Through these and by the grace of God we were encouraged as we undertook other projects. On March 1, the first anniversary of the death of Carlos Kramer, a member of the United Evangelical Choir, Delbert directed his farewell concert in the Central Methodist Church of Montevideo. On the day following our youngest daughter, Kathy, was married to Carlos Enrique Benech, a young Uruguayan engineer, in a beautiful double wedding ceremony along with Rosa Vecino and Bernabe Louise, good friends and companion members of the choir. By March 22 we had finished packing and arranged for the shipping of the few personal belongings we would need in Mexico. We spent several days bidding a nostalgic farewell to the wonderful people of Uruguay, and were comforted by the fact that because we were leaving a part of our family there, we would always remain a part of that Christian community in more ways than one.

We arrived in the United States on the 23rd of March. Since then our schedules have been full of gainful activity, although a summer furlough plus classes and preparation for our new assignment have not been conducive to much itineration. We will begin our new assignment about September 15. Our work will be primarily in the field of health, social work, and literacy in a very underprivileged area of Juarez, a Mexican industrial city just across the Rio Grande River from El Paso, Texas. The suburb known as Colonia Echeverria, though surprisingly clean, lacks city water, sanitation and electricity, although these elements will probably be provided little by little in the future. The people generally have come to the city to seek opportunities of work and education. Some wish to cross the river to the U.S. as itinerant agriculture workers or as permanent residents. Health, counseling services and educational opportunities for these people are practically nil, to say nothing of their provision for spiritual needs. These are the urgent priorities of the moment. A small pilot project, sponsored by the local Methodist Church, has already been established by Olivia Dickhaut and Jane Hahne, Methodist missionaries with whom we have lately been in communication and whom many of you have known over the years through their letters and personal contacts. We have found them wonderful people and we proudly undertake to carry forward their banners of service.

For this we shall continue to need your supportive partnership through the Board of Global Ministries of our United Methodist Church. We praise God for you, for the many expressions of love on our birthdays, and other special moments by Women's societies, churches, and individuals, thus making evident your care and concern for others outside your immediate vicinity. Without your prayers and your material gifts, we could have accomplished nothing during our twenty-eight years of service in Argentina and Uruguay, and we will be able to do nothing in Mexico. Our effectiveness has rested and will continue to rest always on our mutual love for each other, and for God and his Son, Jesus, who admonishes us all to be "the world's seasoning, to make it tolerable." (Mat. 5:13, The Living Bible) Concrete ways you can help beyond your World Service and Advance commitments are to send servicable used clothing, Christmas cards, calendar pictures and school supplies. Monies you send through the approved Advance Special project for the Social Center and Educational Building of Juarez will be applied to erecting and equipping an adequate edifice which will include a modern clinic and educational unit for our work.

To avoid governmental red tape, clothing and school materials may be sent to us directly in care of our near neighbors and colleagues of Lydia Patterson Institute, 517 S. Florence Street, El Paso, Texas 79940. Designated money gifts should be sent through the Board of Global Ministries, 475 Riverside Drive, New York, New York, 10115. Our temporary mailing address will be: Venustiano Carranza 261 Sur, Ciudad Juarez, Chih., Mexico. We will notify you immediately of our permanent address when we have one.

We close this message with a prayer for you in the words of Heb. 13:20-21 "And now may the God of peace, who brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, equip you with all you need for doing his will."

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I simply must not delay any longer if I expect to greet you during this Christmas season. Even now, it may be too late to expect my Sherman Oaks friends to get this letter to you by Christmas, so if it is late, put that to my delay - not theirs!

As always, I am most grateful to them for helping me keep in touch with you.

Last Sunday was the first Sunday in Advent and so candles of HOPE were set aglow in many churches and once again we re-alized that our hope is truly in Him. My prayer for all of us this season is that all our expectations and hopes may come to fruition in His time and will as we renew our trust in Him and commitment to follow His ways in all things.

During the first part of the year, I was on home assignment and lived in Pasadena, California in "my apartment" at the hospitable House of Rest. From this base, I went out to speak in many Southern California churches and twice ventured further afield - once to Littleton, Colorado where a new personal interest relationship was established with the Littleton U.P. Church and to Detroit for the U.P. General Assembly. I returned to Egypt mid-June and after a month getting settled, went with Marge Dye on vacation to beautiful Switzerland. We stayed in our favorite pension in Frutigen and from there used our convenient Swiss Rail Cards to take day trips to many other cities. It was a month of beauty, refreshment and blessedly cool weather.

The Music Center is going well. The Advisory Committee continues to meet and we hope we now have a workable set of Regulations. Dick Gibson, a U.P. colleague, is now Administrator of both the Audio-Visual and Music Centers and I am Music Director. There are two full-time Egyptian employees at the Center kept busy, especially now, in scheduling rehearsals, as many groups come in to prepare Christmas music. Stop by any night and you will hear instrumental, choral, and handbell groups in full practice - music coming literally from every corner. Through it all, two Egyptian teachers and myself continue to give regular music lessons - piano, theory, guitar, recorder, violin, and accordion. We hope to have lute lessons in progress soon.

Several new developments have taken place. Six of the Center orchestra members auditioned and were accepted as members of the Cairo Symphony. Also, several orchestra members decided to train a new group of instrumentalists and so began to give lessons in note reading and rhythm. Twenty young adults joined the class and after a few weeks made their choice of instruments. So now, we have lessons going on in clarinet, violin, cello and percussion. We had hoped by now to have the instruments I

collected in the States. But, alas, they are still in customs at the airport. I cannot begin to tell you how frustrating this experience has been and continues to be. We almost finished early November, but at the last minute found over 100 cassettes to be missing and they won't release anything until a search has been made. It was the low point of the year when I saw all our things loaded back on the cart to be put in storage again. I keep telling myself God has a purpose in this delay. Please pray with us that the instruments may be released soon, as the students are ready and eager to have them in hand. I really appreciate the response to my requests for instruments. My promise of pictures of the students with the instruments will yet be kept—but not just yet!

Speaking of instruments!--My friends in the Littleton U.P. Church decided to start a fund for a new set of handbells for us. Our Dutch bells have been remarkably durable, but after fifteen years and hundreds of ringers, they are, understandably, beginning to show signs of wear--and we do long for another set. If any of you care to share in this project, please send your check made out to "Cairo Bell Fund" to Mrs. Evelyn Amorose, 655 W. Peakview Ave., Littleton, Colorado, 80120. She is on the look-out for a good set of bells for us, and when they're purchased we'll get them here--somehow! Thanks for helping us to continue to ring the Good News!

When my Pepppy-cat died last year, I said "no more cats!"--and thought I meant it. However, little Tippy Tail's appearance last September changed my good resolve! He's a loving, friendly little kitty and the white tip of his tail gives him his name, which goes nicely into Arabic as Tibby-Dail. I nearly lost him when he was given a drug overdose during an operation and neither of us would care to relive those two weeks. I really praise God he is still alive--and his sweet personality not changed by all he went through. My current vow is not to stray from my regular vet again! Now, I'm wondering how to anchor my Christmas tree, which, I feel sure will be of great attraction to my seven-or-so-month old kitten!

My helper and friend, Haneyya, is in the kitchen baking cookies and we'll most likely do some entertaining. Christmas will be spent in the way, now traditional for our mission family . . . Christmas Eve worship; supper at Dottie Cushman's; breakfast with Marge Dye' lunch at Lois Finney's; supper at Lorimer's. It's a wonderful blend of worship and fun and we all look forward to this special time.

May this season be a special time for all of you, too. May His Presence fill it to meet your special needs, whatever they may be, and in the words of our Advent service: Remember--Jesus is the Hope of the world; the Light of our lives. May the prince of Hope be with you all.
