Letter from the Founder

It's hard to believe 2014 is quickly drawing to a close. It's been an exciting year, starting with a January gift from the J.T. and Margaret Talkington Foundation, our seed money to begin planning and executing renovation of our unfinished 27 year old 3-story barn. We're also adding a waterfowl facility for the many dozens of ducklings and water birds we admit each year.

Also in January, National Geographic photojournalist Joel Sartore visited and spent the day in Lubbock photographing some of our birds and bats.

As the year progressed, we selected an architect (Mary Crites) and a construction company (Teinert Building Services) and began brainstorming, committing ideas to paper, and meeting periodically to hammer out major and minor details for our two projects.

We received several other grants throughout 2014 that helped with animal food and care costs, veterinary expenses, and operating costs. Other funding allowed us to buy additional caging units and helped fund our two employees' rabies vaccination and blood titer level costs. Help also came in the form of grants to be used for education, for equipment, supplies, printing of materials, an education intern and other expenses.

We are sincerely appreciative for help in these areas. Collectively, these funds allow us to continue our work to serve wildlife and residents from near and far. During the summer, two more Eagle Scout projects were completed, bringing the total number of projects done at SPWRC to 54 since 1992.

This year, as in the past, we'll be sending a Holiday Appeal – donations will help us with our expenses over the winter months, because in September when 'baby season' ends, our donations drop off sharply.

During 2015 we'll finish our two major building projects, and hope to plan a fun "Barn Raising" event come spring.

As this newsletter issue heads to the printer December 2nd, we know work will begin any day now on our two projects – the barn renovation and construction of a new facility for our water birds and waterfowl.

It's been almost a year in the planning stages, and now work is just about to commence.

On October 7th, Carol and Rob Lee met again with architect Mary Crites, Chad Henthorn and Daniel Horton from Teinert Construction, the great people who are spearheading our projects.

Discussion centered on lighting, concrete, insulation, plumbing, flooring, paint and finishes and a multitude of other topics. It will be an energy-efficient facility.

Rob met again with them in November, and a contract was signed before Thanksgiving.


We've been saving for this upgrade for twenty-five years, and now it's finally going to happen, thanks to help from many sources!

Swainson's Hawk Transferred

Two Swainson's Hawks were admitted in October 2013, with their primary and secondary feathers on one wing cut back to the feather follicle. The birds were likely nest mates and had been stolen from their nest. Texas Parks & Wildlife game wardens found the birds in Muleshoe, Texas.

SPWRC over-wintered the hawks, and one bird was finally able to be released.

The other Swainson's Hawk couldn't fly straight but flew sideways instead. We decided to place the hawk for education and it was transferred mid-November to Wild Wings Rehabilitation Center, in Centennial, Colorado. Like SPWRC, Wild Wings is also a nonprofit 501(c)3 tax-exempt educational organization.

Thanks to Operations Manager Daniel Andrews for driving the hawk to its final destination!

2014 Marks the 115th Christmas Bird Count

and

How Frank Chapman made a difference for birds in 1900



First organized in 1900 by ornithologist Frank Chapman, the Christmas Bird Count, or "CBC" is the oldest and largest wildlife sur-

vey in the world. It began as an early effort with a group of 27 conservationists protesting the annual "side hunt," a tradition and hunting contest to see who could shoot the most birds and animals each year on Christmas Day. Chapman organized 26 friends in 25 locations on Christmas Day 1900, and instead of shooting birds, they counted them.

Fewer than 500 people participated prior to 1940. The Audubon Society implemented uniform standards in the late 1950s, and these are still in use. Presently many thousands of individuals participate in all 50 states, every Canadian province, Central and South America, the Caribbean and several Pacific Islands, providing critical data on avian population trends. Census periods are determined by the National Audubon Society, but the actual day/days are chosen by the local count coordinator.

Early on, CBC data marked the decline in several birds, notably the Peregrine Falcon, Trumpeter Swan, and Bald Eagle. CBCs also brought attention to over 100 species of other birds that significantly declined. Count results are integral in assessing the "Watch List," a record of birds that are either in decline or in potential danger.

The Lubbock County CBC will be 20 December 2014. Each team will have an experienced leader and birders of all ages and experience levels are welcome.

The Muleshoe Refuge CBC will be 21 December 2014, and the White River Lake CBC will be 3 January 2015.

Enthusiastic birdwatchers all don warm clothes, pack field guides and binoculars and head out for the fun annual counts.



Food for Thought

...Carol Lee

Do you get tired of sending money to a charity you like or support, only to have them send you a "free gift" and then contact you several weeks later asking for more money?

Over the past years, I've limited the number of charities I contribute to. I don't want a thank you gift, and prefer that money stay with "the cause." Many times, donations may also go toward high salaries and administrative fees.

The Wildlife Center was 100% volunteer and paid no salaries until 19 years after our founding, and only then because we needed reliable people to work when we needed them as we grew. Now we have only one full time salaried person who works 5 days a week caring for animals, and 1 person who fills in the other two days. We have **no** "administrative fees."

We're very protective of our donors and funds. Board Members map out a budget each year. We never sell, share, or give out any donor information. We don't share our mailing list with anyone. If someone doesn't want their name acknowledged in our newsletter, their gift is listed anonymously.

We've published a newsletter since 1995 and for many years, issues have been quarterly. *The Mockingbird Chronicles* is our conduit to the public, and lets donors know what their contributions are being used for.

All our expenses continue to rise: utilities, insurance, printing, postage, and annual food, treatment and care costs for our ever-increasing number of wildlife admissions....that number up significantly this year.

Thanks to former Board Member and current Development Director Stacy Keith, we've had the good fortune of receiving a number of grants in 2014 that provide help we need for operations, food and veterinary expenses, utilities and also to improve our overall facilities: to finally finish and renovate our 27-year-old barn that still has a dirt floor, no heating, cooling or plumbing - and add a much needed addition for our waterfowl and water birds.

Everyone's gift makes a difference for the Wildlife Center!

From the Wildlife Society's e-News-letter:



"Just outside San Antonio, Texas, resides the world's largest bat colony.

Approximately 20 million migrating Mexican Free-tailed Bats roost in Bracken Cave every summer, but urban sprawl and the accompanying light pollution threatened their habitat-- until now.

Last month, the Nature Conservancy of Texas and Bat Conservation International—with help from other groups — purchased a swath of undeveloped and unprotected land adjacent to the cave for \$20.5 million ending a developer's plans to construct 3,500 homes on the property and ensuring the skies around the cave remain dark.

Bracken Cave's Mexican Free-tailed Bats comprise nearly one-fifth of the species and play an important ecological role.

At summer's peak, the colony consumes 140 tons of insects each night, saving farmers \$23 billion in reduced crop damage and pesticide use, according to the Nature Conservancy. You can read the entire article at http://wildlife.org/worlds-largest-bat-colony-saved-by-land-deal/"

*SPWRC raises all its funds to keep our doors open. (Donations when animals are brought in; gifts; grants; newsletter subscriptions; wildlife ambassador adoptions; Tributes; education programs; fundraising or special events and sale of Commemorative Bricks. We get no funds from our state or federal regulatory agencies and have no "parent" organization.

*For the first 19 of our last 26 years we were 100% volunteer.

*Wildlife admissions arrive from all over the Texas South Plains, and often beyond. Our goal is release back to the wild.

*Printing and mailing costs are high and keep rising. If you give a \$20.00 donation, you'll receive one complimentary newsletter acknowledging your gift. Gifts of \$25.00 or more receive four issues - Mar, Jun, Sep and Dec. Our Holiday issue usually goes to the printer around December 1st.

*Your gifts are tax deductible to the extent allowed by law; SPWRC receives many year-end donations for this reason.

*Our annual Holiday Appeal is also mailed in December. Once September arrives, our animal donations drop off sharply (because "baby season" and breeding season is over, so our admissions drop, too). One



thing doesn't drop: our expenses.


