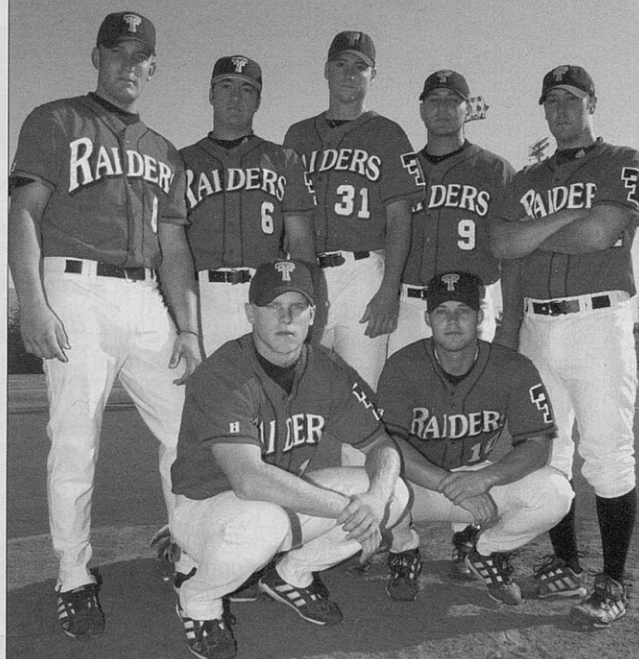

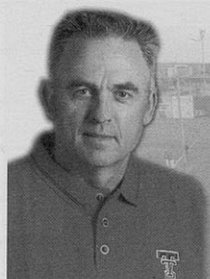

HEAD COACH LARRY HAYS



HEAD COACH LARRY HAYS #27

16th Season at Texas Tech
Eastern New Mexico '66

There is an old sports cliché that reads "Behind every great team is a great coach." When you take a glance through the history of Texas Tech baseball, you will find this overused cliché come to life in Texas Tech head coach Larry Hays.

Amazingly, Hays has spent his entire collegiate coaching career in Lubbock where he is the all-time win leader at Lubbock Christian University (695) and at Texas Tech (583). When Hays took over the Texas Tech baseball program in the fall of 1986, he inherited a very unusual situation. Prior to Hays arrival, the Tech baseball program had a losing overall record of 550-576 through 37 years of play meaning Hays had plenty of work cut out for him just to get Tech to the .500 mark.

Hays has led the Red Raiders to three conference championships, posted winning seasons in 14 of 15 years as head coach, led Tech to seven consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances and has established Texas Tech as a national power in baseball.

Successful seasons have been the norm for Larry Hays, who won his 1,000th game on April 12, 1995. In his 31 years as a college head coach, he has produced 19 teams that have surpassed at least 40 wins. He has led teams to 12 league titles and guided his 1983 Lubbock Christian University team to the national NAIA championship.

Hays' players have also seen unbelievable individual success. He has coached 29 NAIA All-Americans, one NAIA Player of the Year, 36 All-Southwest Conference performers, 12 First Team All-Big 12 recipients, 13 consensus NCAA Division I All-Americans, five NAIA Academic All-Americans and three NCAA Academic All-Americans. To date, 69 of his former Red Raider players have been drafted by Major League Baseball while five of the six Texas Tech former players to appear in a big league uniform played for Hays.

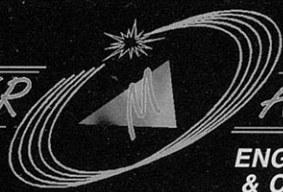
Texas Tech has played in the last seven (two SWC/five Big 12) conference tournaments, winning both the 1998 Big 12 Conference title and the 1995 Southwest Conference crown and placing runner-up in the inaugural 1997 Big 12 Conference tournament. Hays is currently ranked among the nation's top-10 all-time and active NCAA Division I head coaches in victories (1,278) and is the sixth winningest coach on the NCAA all-time list.

Greg Evans enters his eighth season as an assistant baseball coach at Texas Tech University. Evans, Texas Tech's first base and infield coach, has been primarily responsible for Texas Tech's improved fielding over the past years. Evans rejoined the Red Raider coaching staff in 1998 for the first time in two seasons after serving an assistant at Texas Tech from 1993-1995.

Under Evans' direction, Texas Tech had a fielding percentage of .971 in 1999 which was ranked in the nation's top five. In 2000, Evans guided the team to a .967 fielding percentage and in 2001 his team was the best in the Big 12 at .971.

A former collegiate baseball player at Ole Miss from 1981-85, Evans played second base, third base and in the outfield. He graduated from Ole Miss in 1985 with a Bachelor's degree in Public Administration and received his Master's degree in Sports Administration from Texas Tech in 1987.

Evans and his wife, Allyn, have a four-year old daughter named Kathryn Adele.

Entering his second season at Texas Tech is Ryan Brewer. Brewer serves the Red Raiders as the team pitching coach and was a former pitcher for the Texas Tech in 1995 and 1996.

Brewer came to Texas Tech following a career in minor league baseball in which he played in the Kansas City Royals organization. He spent two seasons on the Texas Tech pitching staff in 1995 and 1996. During his two year career at Tech, the Red Raiders went 100-29 overall and claimed the 1995 Southwest Conference Championship. During the 1996 season, Brewer recorded 10 wins on the mound while racking up a .769 winning percentage. Following the 1996 season, he was rewarded by the Southwest Conference as a second-team All-SWC selection.

Last season, Brewer directed the Tech pitching staff to a final 4.24 ERA and had two players finish with more than 11 wins (Chris Phillips - 11; Brandon Roberson - 13).

He is married to the former Lacy Nye who was a standout volleyball player at Texas Tech from 1993-1996. Lacy is a teacher/volleyball coach at Coronado High School. The couple has one son, Noah.

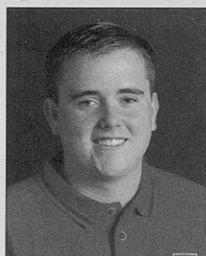

Daren Hays, entering his third season at Texas Tech, works directly with the Red Raider outfielders and hitters. Hays spent the 1991 season as an assistant baseball coach at Texas Tech where he served as hitting coach. He helped lead the Red Raiders to a 42-18 record in 1991 as Texas Tech led the Southwest Conference with a .303 team batting average.

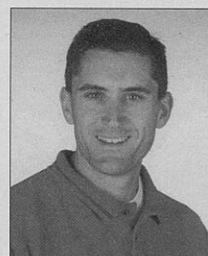
Hays spent the following eight seasons as head baseball coach at crosstown Lubbock Christian University where he amassed a 356-163 overall record. He became the first coach in LCU history to win 300 games in only seven seasons.

Since Hays joined the Texas Tech staff, the Red Raider hitting attack has been nothing short of impressive. Last season, the Red Raiders hit .318 which was second-best in the Big 12.

Hays is married to the former Kristi McGee of Lubbock. The couple resides in Lubbock and have two daughters, Brittany and Brogan.

"The great thing about baseball is that baseball has not had to change to honor America," said Texas Tech head coach Larry Hays, "Baseball has honored America all the way through. We stand together with our fingers crossed, hoping and praying the same prayer, "let him do it just one more time" so that we can forever remember this moment in the back of our minds.

Baseball means so much more for Americans outside the traditional ballpark. The game is played in backyards, alleys, sandlots and city streets. Playing catch is such a small aspect of the game, but for generations, it has bonded fathers and sons, brothers, sisters and families. Baseball means taking a break from working to spend time with those people in our lives that really matter.

Baseball helps to teach us life lessons. It helps us learn, to work as a team, to strive to succeed, and to be a part of something greater than ourselves.

"What I like about baseball is that it's like life, it is right or wrong, safe or out, ball or strike, there is a justice there." said Hays

Many people remember the first time their parents took them to a ballpark or put a ball in our hands more than their first day at school. This is an experience that has genuinely become an American tradition.

In the wild excitement of a baseball game there is one moment when everyone and everything is silent and still, the National Anthem. Most of us have known the words all of our lives but now more than ever they take on a new meaning. We sing them with our hand over our heart and with joyful tears in our eyes. The Star Spangled Banner reminds us of the valiant efforts by our countrymen and how a sport like baseball can make us one people, a **UNITED** States of America.

SEASON PREVIEW

Before the Olympics arrive, BYU's baseball team will be in action as its season begins on Jan. 24 with a three-game series at Texas Tech.

One player can't replace the nation's winningest pitcher. Then again, third-year BYU Coach Vance Law has his other three first-team all-conference players returning to defend the Mountain West title.

"I am encouraged by the talent pool which keeps rising," says Law, who was MWC Coach of the Year last season. "If we can mesh that talent and have players continue to accept their roles, we can have another outstanding year."

Gone from last year's 38-22 championship squad is All-American pitcher Nate Fernley. Back are juniors Matt Carson and the Hawaiian tandem of Kainoa Obrey and Doug Jackson. Joining them are some veteran pitchers like Jeff Stone and a couple of sluggers who have recently returned from Church missions.

David Jensen, was in Argentina the past two seasons, but was a Freshman All-American first baseman at BYU when he batted .368 with 23 doubles in 1999. Joining Jensen is sophomore Ranger Wiens, a returned missionary from Hawaii, via the University of Nevada. Wiens will fill the vacancy at shortstop, while redshirt Han Yi gets the nod at second base.

Jensen will start at first and Obrey (.381 with 20 doubles) will be at third. Not to be forgotten is summer league All-American catcher Lars Birkeland, a senior.

Carson and Jackson are joined by junior speedster Cameron Coughlan in the outfield. Carson (.335, 70 RBI, 18 homers) has twice been a part of the USA Team trials and may have the strongest arm of any rightfielder in college, with a bat to match.

"Matt has been the team leader since his freshman year and we anticipate him having a great season again anchoring the middle of our lineup," says Law. "He has an above-average, major-league arm."

Jackson (.370 eight triples) moves from left to centerfield and has the speed and bat which defy his 5-7 stature. Coughlan (six triples and 14 stolen bases), also a junior speedster, moves from

second base to left field.

Transfer Jake Stubblefield, the defensive player of the Scenic West junior college conference, has a potent bat at designated hitter. Another transfer, Mike Weingarten from UVSC, backs up at catcher.

Stone, a senior southpaw, is six wins shy of the school career record with his 26-11 mark. However, Fernley's 16-3 record last season will be missed now that he has graduated and pitching for the Cleveland Indians organization. Keeping pace with Fernley last season was Ryan Adams, who had a 5-1 record before injuring his hand.

"I like our depth on our pitching staff, particularly the sophomores who got a lot of experience last season," says Law.

Adams is now healthy and is joined by fellow senior reliever Matt Ward (four saves). However, veteran lefty James Ray (three saves) will miss part of the season because of surgery for a ruptured disk in his neck.

Sophomores Scott Koffman (3-1), Jeff Mousser (3-0) and flame-thrower Jake Chrisman (a basketball player who stands 6-8 and throws 94 mph) and transfer hurlers Tyler Dabo and Jason

Garcia give needed depth. Another sophomore, Curt Rodriguez, could be ready by mid-season after a mission and surgery or could redshirt.

Joining Rodriguez, Wiens and Jensen as players returning from missions are Rob Itri (pitcher-infielder), Paul Jacinto (pitcher), Kevin Bills (third base) and Adam Wilkes (catcher). Freshmen Clayton Carson and Ryan Chambers and walk-ons Kirk Williamson, Ryan Thurgood, Jeff Pugmire, and Brian Nielsen join Dabo, Garcia, Stubblefield, Weingarten and Wiens as newcomers to the squad, while Sam Fernley returns after a semester absence.

Gone from last year's team are mission departures in freshman All-America pitcher Justin Su'a (serving in Nicaragua), Jeff Hiestand (serving in Colorado), Brad Hales (serving in Spain) and Jeff Stearman (serving in Perth, Australia).

The schedule for the first full year in Miller Park is complemented by a three-game season opener at Texas Tech, a 10-game California trip which includes NCAA runner-up Stanford, a six-game trip in Hawai'i, a three-game series at Washington, and a two-game series at Notre Dame.

Additionally, the Cougars host the MWC Tournament on May 22-25.

TWO BYU PLAYERS EARN PRESEASON NOD

A pair of BYU baseball players have been selected to pre-season All America honors as the season is set to start in two weeks.

Juniors Matt Carson and Kainoa Obrey have been selected to All-America baseball teams by Baseball America and Collegiate Baseball magazines, respectively.

Carson, a right fielder from Yucaipa, Calif., ranked 25th last season in the NCAA, with 70 RBI and 18 home runs with a .335 batting average. He was selected to Baseball America's second team.

Obrey, a third baseman from Honolulu, brings a current 12-game hitting streak into this season and batted .381 with 86 hits and 20 doubles last season. He was named to Collegiate Baseball's pre-season All-America, third team.

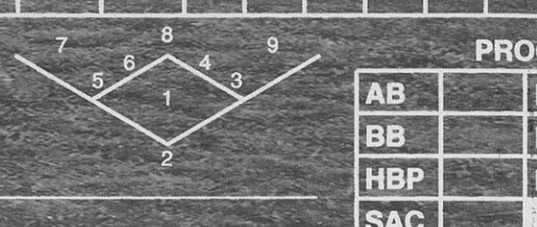
Carson and Obrey join teammates Lars Birkeland, a catcher, and Jeff Stone, a pitcher, in being named co-captains for the 2002 team.
