Anthony da Costa NOT AFRAID OF NOTHING www.anthony dacosta.com \*\*\*

Anthony turned eighteen on January 3, and, including his collaborative recordings, NOT AFRAID OF NOTHING is his eighth release. In 2007 this personable and prolific wunderkind became the youngest winner, so far, of the Kerrville Folk Festival's New Folk Songwriting Contest. In the process he nudged out Welsh- bred Jack Harris who, aged nineteen, had won the 2005 Contest. Following a tranche of releases helmed by Fred Gillen Jr.—he plays drums/percussion on the opening song Bells & Birds-NOT AFRAID OF NOTHING was co-produced by da Costa and John Elliott. This autumn da Costa becomes a Columbia University student, and the fourteen tunes he penned for this collection amount to his final testosterone-fuelled high school report. I dropped in the 't' term since the lyrics here are exclusively relationship focused, with that four letter word 'love' appearing in twelve

Matters Of The Heart and the seasonal November are acoustic and heavenly, I Am Way Too Much climaxes with an electrically-generated sound-storm of instruments, while If You Want It and For A While come across as hi-energy power-pop statements. Anthony captures the raw emotion of love lost in the penultimate Crazy, and the album closes with the almost optimistic Sleeping On The Couch: 'You took me in from the shadows to the sunlight." Having alluded to the 'not strictly roots music' genres that da Costa embraces here, it has to be said that his songs possess potency and

listener longevity. I'm Your Son and Dolly & Porter on last year's TYPICAL AMERICAN TRAGEDY found this mature in years teenager tackling themes that did not orbit around that thing called 'love.' Catie Curtis HELLO, STRANGER

by between Catie Curtis releases, but hot on the heels of last year's SWEET LIFE, this Boston-based, Maine-bred folksinger delivers this string-band retro-collection. On this disc half-a-dozen cover songs sit comfortably with a handful of reinterpretations from Curtis' back catalogue. Recorded on Compass Records' premises, in their upstairs studio. Curtis is supported by label co-owner Alison Brown (banjo), plus Stuart Duncan (fiddle, mandolin), Todd Phillips (bass), George Marinelli (guitar, mandolin, Dobro) and Kenny Malone (percussion).

The cover songs furnish proof of Curtis' transatlantic musical influences, albeit somewhat vintage. Now approaching forty years of age Tuesday's Dead made its public debut on Cat Stevens' (aka Yusuf Islam) album TEASER AND THE FIRECAT. Penned by the late John Martyn Don't Want To Know (No Evil) is only a few years younger, while Richard Thompson's Walking On A Wire is rapidly approaching thirty years of age. Supported principally by banjo and fiddle, Catie is joined by Mary Gauthier for an energetic duet reading of Alvin Carter's Hello, Stranger. The home turf selections continue with Don White's amusing Be Sixteen With Me, wherein the conspiratorial narrator proposes adopting a shoe on the other foot approach to life, and pictures the 10am Sunday morning scene: 'The kids will ask us where we've been, And then they'll ask us again, And we'll just make up a great big lie, And swear that it's the truth until the day we die.' The final Stateside cover is Bill Monroe's I Wish I Knew (How It Would Feel To Be Free).

As for the selections from Curtis' catalogue, the standout has to be Dad's Yard-probably her best known creation. Last year, with her parents in the South Maine audience, I saw Catie perform this amusing 'real life' ditty about accumulating backvard junk-when asked her father did not deny his squirrel tendencies. Toward the close of the album the gospel flavoured Passing Through, co-written with Mark Erelli, finds the compassionate narrator reflect upon passing on personal and planetary legacies to the coming generations. I GUESS I'M LUCKY by Butch captures you with its blues country feel and quality songwriting making it one of the records of the year so far. Butch (real name Edgar Eugene Barnette) is one of the most interesting singer-songwriters to come out of Tennessee for a really long time. With influences as varied as Frank Zappa, the Allman Brothers, the Band and John Hiatt to name just a few, He is a rare find as he makes music that many musicians crave to. He appreciates quality songwriting and guitar playing and has the unique ability to be able to change how he plays to suit the song. He has a natural talent and sounds as if he found it really easy to make this record.

When you first listen to I GUESS I'M LUCKY it feels so familiar but at the same time new and fresh, he takes his influences and gives you something unique. Butch's writing is fresh, honest and truly in tune with people, their thoughts and aspirations and the human journey of life we are all on. Butch shows a great range with his guitar playing. He can play beautiful folk songs, and then also play amazingly technically perfect blues guitar solos. Dirty Water is very much in the vein of the Band if you are looking for comparisons, with its amazing harmonies, piano, and a very raw underling blues sound complimented by some of the best harmonica playing heard for a while.

My Name is Edgar is a beautiful folk guitar song again accompanied by harmonica, this is the story of his life and his name, and where he came from. Life Happens is an ode to the past and many nights drinking too much. The album finishes with the beautiful The Note, Would It Take My Breath Away with Butch's vocals sounding honest and pure. He sounds so genuine and as if he means every word he is singing
