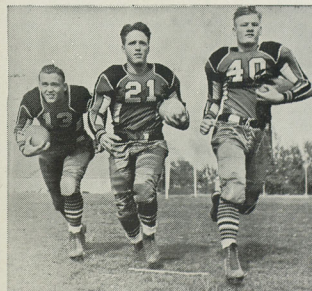

Only Game Fish Swim Upstream!

Texas Tech's freshman prospects are the brightest in several seasons. Some of the stand-out stars from the 1938 Texas Interscholastic league crop are enrolled in Texas Tech and busy learning their A. B. C's of football under the very able guidance of Coach Berl Huffman and Cy La Master.

Four of this season's "Fish" aggregation competed in the big Class All-Star game at Houston and whipped through with colors flying. The four who played at Houston were Walter "Jumbo" Webster from Lubbock High, Thayne "Red" Amonett from Flomot, Wayne Pipes from Lubbock High and Kenneth "Cock-Robin" Robbins from Sunset High at Dallas.

In the Class B All-Star game at Wichita Falls, Don "Donald Duck" Austin of Wellington, Howard Swan of Rotan, Walter Nelson of Wellington and "Red" Amonett turned in great games. Amonett, the phantom runner who is working in

the quarterback slot for the freshmen, had the honor of playing in both All-Star games.

Only game "Fish" swim upstream and don't be surprised if Tech's young, hustling "Little Raiders" blaze through with an unblemished season. Beyond doubt they've got the old touchdown power and are versatile enough to rattle-dazzle and dippy-doodle all opponents.

Of course Coach Huffman is shy a little weight at the tackle positions. He only has Lacy Burleson, 253-pounds from Littlefield at left tackle, and Mack "Truck" Cayse, 245-pounds of mauling power from Woodrow Wilson at Dallas. Another "diminutive" tackle is Warren Cudd from Perryton who just barely gets the scales around to 216-pounds. Huffman and La Master are confident their "Fish" will have a great season if they can only keep them from the water bucket, but like all good "Fish" they like their water.

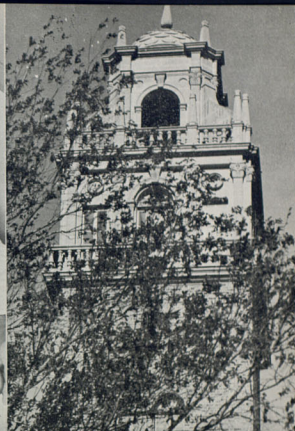

Somewhere in this big horse-shoe stadium today there's a man who will play each play just as hard as any man on the field. That man is W. L. Stangel, chairman of the Texas Tech Athletic Council. 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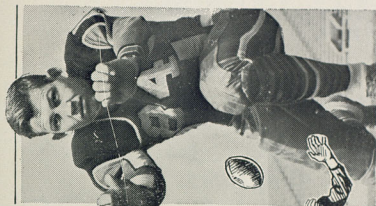

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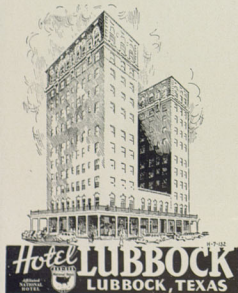

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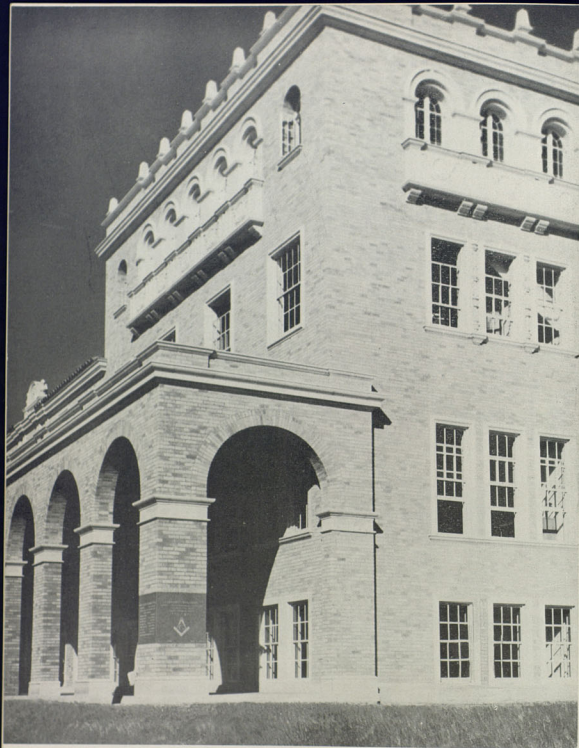
