#### Board of Regents Meeting August 21, 1970

M165. The Board of Regents of Texas Tech University met in a regular session on Friday, August 21, 1970, at 3:30 p.m. in the Board Room on the Texas Tech University campus. The following Regents were present: R. Trent Campbell. Waggoner Carr, Marshall Formby, Frank Junell, Retha R. Martin, Judson F. Williams. Regents absent were: Roy Furr, James Ling, Field Scovell. University officials present were: Dr. Grover E. Murray, President; Dr. Glenn E. Barnett, Executive Vice President; Dr. S. M. Kennedy, Vice President for Academic Affairs; G. C. Gardner, Jr., Vice President for Financial Affairs; Bill J. Parsley, Vice President for Public Affairs; Dr. Orlo Childs, Vice President for Research and Special Projects; Mrs. Jean K. Baker, Assistant to the President; Mrs. Freda Pierce, Secretary of the Board; Dr. Owen L. Caskey, Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs; Fred J. Wehmeyer, Assistant Vice President for Administrative Services; Dr. Art Howard, Assistant to the Dean, School of Medicine; Dr. W. W. Frye, Special Consultant on Medical Affairs: Lewis N. Others present were: Dr. Knox Jones, Dean of the Graduate School effective June, 1971; Kenneth May, Avalanche-Journal; Paul Beane and Clarence Cahill, KSEL-TV; Sammy Smith, KLBK-TV; Bonnie Craddick, Jim Boynton, Larry Myers, John Simpson, students; Ronda Casey and Barbara Gilstrap, secretaries, Office of the Board of Regents.

- M166. Chairman Martin called the meeting to order, and asked Dr. S. M. Kennedy, Vice President for Academic Affairs, to give the invocation.
- M167. Upon motion made by Dr. Williams, seconded by Mr. Campbell, the Board by unanimous vote approved the Minutes of the Board Meeting of June 5, 1970.
- M168. Upon motion made by Mr. Campbell, seconded by Mr. Carr, the Board by unanimous vote approved and/or ratified administrative action not previously acted upon by the Board, Items 9a. through 13n., (dated August 21, 1970).
- M169. Mr. Junell gave the report of the Campus and Building Committee. The next eight items (M170 through M177) are a record of the official action on the committee recommendations.
- M170. Upon motion made by Mr. Junell, seconded by Mr. Campbell, the Board by unanimous vote approved that the traffic and parking regulations for the school year 1970-71 as distributed to the Board be approved. The Traffic and Parking Regulations are attached and made a part of the minutes; Attachment No. 1.

- M171. Upon motion made by Mr. June11, seconded by Mr. Campbell, the Board by unanimous vote approved that June 26, 1970 be recorded as the acceptance date for the Relighting System for Jones Stadium.
- M172. Upon motion made by Mr. Junell, seconded by Dr. Williams, the Board by unanimous vote approved that the action of the Board authorizing execution of the contract in the amount of \$43,465.50 to Brown-McKee, dated August 5, 1970, for the repair of the light poles at Jones Stadium be ratified and adopted. The contract is attached and made a part of the minutes; Attachment No. 2.
- M173. Upon motion made by Mr. Junell, seconded by Mr. Carr, the Board by unanimous vote approved that July 15, 1970 be recorded as the acceptance date for the four Varsity Tennis Courts. The application of a color-coated plastic latex surface to the four Varsity Tennis Courts was authorized in the Board Meeting of February 14, 1970, Item M80.
- M174. Upon motion made by Mr. Junell, seconded by Mr. Campbell, the Board by unanimous vote approved that based upon the recommendation of the architect, that of the final contract amount of \$34,702.00 for carpet for the Wiggins Complex, that 7/20 of this amount, or \$12,145.70 credit, is fair compensation to the University for value of carpeting received in comparison to the value the University would have received from carpeting meeting the specifications, and that this offer of acceptance for this credit be extended to the contractor.
- M175. Upon motion made by Mr. Junell, seconded by Mr. Formby, the Board by unanimous vote approved that the administration proceed with the planning for facilities and additions to facilities for the Library, Music Department, and the College of Home Economics.
- M176. Upon motion made by Mr. Junell, seconded by Mr. Campbell, the Board by unanimous vote approved that the Board of Regents authorize the Administration to take the necessary steps to have the former Planetarium demolished and to pave that area east of the former Museum for additional parking. Further, that the Board of Regents authorize the Chairman to sign the contract documents as may be necessary.
- M177. Upon motion made by Mr. Junell, seconded by Mr. Formby, the Board by unanimous vote approved that June 29, 1970 be recorded as the acceptance date for the Texas Tech University Museum.
- M178. Mr. Junell gave the report of the Finance Committee. The next four items (M179 through M182) are a record of the official action on the committee recommendations.
- M179. Upon motion made by Mr. Junell, seconded by Dr. Williams, the Board by unanimous vote approved that Mr. G. C. Gardner, Jr., Vice President for Financial Affairs, be granted authority to execute any and all instruments necessary to effectuate changes in stock certificates held by Texas Technological College, the Board of Directors of Texas Technological College, or for the benefit of Texas Technological College to reflect that the owner of the stock represented by the certificate is, in fact, Texas Tech University, and also to reflect that any payment of dividends is to be made directly to Texas Tech University. Mr. Junell commented that a number of these certificates carry

the names of individuals as trustees for the University, so the intent is to have all the certificates changed to show the ownership to be Texas Tech University and all dividends come to the University.

M180. Upon motion made by Mr. Junell, seconded by Mr. Campbell, the Board by unanimous vote approved that Dr. S. M. Kennedy, Vice President for Academic Affairs, be included among those individuals authorized to approve travel leaves involving travel expenses both in-State and out-of-State for employees traveling on official business for the University.

M181. Upon motion made by Mr. Junell, seconded by Mr. Carr, the Board by unanimous vote approved that the name of Mr. W. C. Lawrence, Accounts Payable Supervisor, be added to the named persons, by previous resolution, authorized to approve payment of accounts covering expenditures from State funds and all other University controlled funds for the period September 1, 1970, through August 31, 1971.

M182. Upon motion made by Mr. Junell, seconded by Dr. Williams, the Board by unanimous vote ratified the actions of the Board in a telephone conference call on July 20, 1970, which concerned the acceptance of the bond resolutions as prepared by the University's bond attorney. The actions are enumerated below.

Accept the two annual interest subsidy grants for the Chemistry Building project and the Architecture and Art Building project in the total amount of \$135,008.00 annually.

Approve the plan to sell the \$5,000,000.00 in bonds financed with a \$5.00 General Building Use Fee, effective with the fall 1970 semester.

Approve increasing the new General Building Use Fee an additional \$5.00 per semester, effective with the fall 1970 semester, with the amount to be set aside in a separate account until needed by the Board of Regents for University Center improvements or to help finance a future bond sale for such purposes. The Resolution is attached and made a part of the minutes; Attachment No. 3.

Authorize the filing of an application for a Department of Housing and Urban Development debt service subsidy for University Center improvements as soon as possible.

Approve specifically designating \$2.50 of the existing \$25.00 Building Use Fee to finance the use of space in West Hall, Doak Hall, and Drane Hall of the Texas Tech University Residence Halls System, effective with the fall 1970 semester. The Resolutions are attached and made a part of the minutes; Attachments Nos. 4 and 5.

Specific approval and adoption for the record of the bond resolutions prepared by the bond attorney to implement the above actions.

M183. Dr. Williams gave the report of the Academic and Student Affairs Committee. The next three items (M184 through M186) are a record of the official action on the committee recommendations.

- M184. Upon motion made by Dr. Williams, seconded by Mr. Carr, the Board by unanimous vote approved that the rates for instruction in extension courses be increased from \$200.00 per semester credit hour to \$333.33 per semester credit hour effective immediately.
- M185. Upon motion made by Dr. Williams, seconded by Mr. Carr, the Board by unanimous vote approved that the student fee assessed for Home Management 432 be increased to \$150.00 per student per one-half semester during the long session and \$110.00 per student per summer term, beginning with the fall semester 1970.
- M186. Upon motion made by Dr. Williams, seconded by Mr. Carr, the Board by unanimous vote approved that the official name of the Tech Union be changed to The University Center effective this date. This name is intended to refer to the existing Tech Union Building and any additional buildings or expansion to existing or future buildings adjacent thereto.
- M187. Mr. Formby reported that the Public Relations and Legislative Committee met and stated that Texas Tech would be given some nice publicity in various magazines. He also commented that they were working for additional operating money from the Legislature.
- M188. Upon motion made by Mr. Campbell, seconded by Dr. Williams, the Board by unanimous vote elected Mr. Frank Junell Chairman of the Board of Regents for the coming year.
- M189. Upon motion made by Mr. Carr, seconded by Mr. Formby, the Board by unanimous vote requested that a proper resolution be prepared thanking Mr. Martin for his distinguished service to this Board and this University, and it be entered into the minutes. The Resolution is attached and made a part of the minutes; Attachment No. 6.
- M190. Upon motion made by Dr. Williams, seconded by Mr. Formby, the Board by unanimous vote elected Mr. Waggoner Carr Vice Chairman of the Board of Regents for the coming year.
- M191. Upon motion made by Mr. Carr, seconded by Mr. Formby, the Board by unanimous vote requested that a resolution of appreciation be prepared honoring Mr. Campbell for the service he has given in his position as Vice Chairman of the Board, and that such resolution be entered into the minutes. The Resolution is attached and made a part of the minutes; Attachment No. 7.
- M192. Upon motion made by Mr. Campbell, seconded by Dr. Williams, the Board by unanimous vote elected Freda Pierce Secretary of the Board for the coming year.
- M193. Dr. Murray complimented Mr. Martin and Mr. Campbell for their invaluable assistance during the past year, and stated that the two had been of inestimable value to us. Dr. Murray also read an ad from the Texas Bankers Record and the Bankers Digest placed there by the Frost National Bank of San Antonio, commending the Saddle Tramps of Texas Tech. He introduced Dr. Orlo Childs, Vice President for Research and Special Projects; Dr. Jack Steele, Dean of Business Administration; Dr. Knox Jones, who will become Dean of the Graduate School June 1 of next year; Dr. Thomas Langford, Interim Dean of the Graduate

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School; Dr. Larry Graves, Dean of Arts and Sciences; Dr. Sam Curl, Interim Dean, College of Agricultural Sciences; Dr. Art Howard, Assistant to the Dean of the Medical School, and Dr. William W. Frye, Special Consultant on Medical Affairs.

M194. Dr. Williams stated that Regents Robes had been designed and purchased, and Mr. Formby modeled one.

M195. There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 4:10 p.m.

### TRAFFIC AND PARKING REGULATIONS for SCHOOL YEAR 1970-71 Effective Date--August 25, 1970

#### INTRODUCTION

These regulations are established by the University to facilitate the safe and orderly conduct of University business and to provide parking space as conveniently as possible within the limits of space available. Operating a motor vehicle on the campus is a privilege and is conditioned, in-part, on complying with these rules and regulations.

#### RESPONSIBILITY

THE PERSON IN WHOSE NAME A VEHICLE IS REGISTERED BY THE UNIVERSITY IS RESPONSIBLE FOR THE PROPER OPERATION AND PARKING OF THIS VEHICLE, AND WILL BE HELD RESPONSIBLE FOR VIOLATION OF UNIVERSITY RULES. The University does not assume responsibility for the safety of vehicles or their contents, or for damages caused to vehicles parked or driven on the campus. The responsibility must be assumed by the owner or operator of the vehicle.

#### REGISTRATION OF VEHICLES

- A. All motor vehicles operated on the campus, other than those qualified by a visitor's permit as hereinafter provided, must be registered by the University and have the parking permit displayed as required.
- B. Operation of a motor vehicle by a student upon the campus without registration is a violation of the Code of Student Affairs and will subject the student to possible probation or suspension from the University.
- C. THE CAMPUS IS DEFINED AS ALL LANDS OWNED BY THE UNIVERSITY WITHIN THE CITY OF LUBBOCK, TEXAS.
- D. Rules for registering vehicles are as follows:
  - Vehicles will be registered at the Traffic and Parking Counselor's Office located in the Physical Plant area and at the Coliseum -Auditorium during registration for classes.
  - Students are required to register motor vehicles to be operated on campus at the time they register for school, or at the time they commence operating a vehicle on campus.
  - 3. All other personnel, with the exception of those individuals who qualify as visitors, shall register their vehicles on or before the date they commence operating their vehicle on the campus.
  - Any person giving false information on his vehicle registration form will be subject to disciplinary action.
  - 5. When an individual obtains a 1971 license plate the Office of the Traffic and Parking Counselor must be notified immediately of the new license number on a form to be provided by the Office of the Traffic and Parking Counselor.

- 6. Upon registration and payment of the parking fee, a numbered parking permit will be issued assigning the vehicle to a specific parking lot.
- 7. THE ISSUED PARKING PERMIT SHALL BE PERMANENTLY ATTACHED (NO SCOTCH OR OTHER TYPE TAPE PERMITTED) ADJACENT TO OR ABOVE, THE STATE OF TEXAS SAFETY INSPECTION STICKER IN THE LOWER LEFT CORNER OF THE FRONT WINDSHIELD.
- 8. RESIDENCE HALL OCCUPANTS WILL RECEIVE A VEHICLE REGISTRATION PERMIT AND A PARKING LOT NUMBER. THE PARKING LOT NUMBER WILL BE PERMANENTLY AFFIXED TO THE INSIDE, LOWER LEFT CORNER OF THE REAR WINDOW. CONVERTIBLES WILL USE THE LEFT REAR SIDEVIEW WINDOW IN LIEU OF REAR WINDOW.
- 9. In the event it is necessary to replace a parking permit or parking lot number because of purchase or acquisition of a different vehicle, or at the request of the owner, a replacement fee of \$0.50 will be charged. The remnants of the original parking permit will be surrendered at the time a replacement permit is requested. If the original permit is not turned in, certification will be made attesting to the fact that the permit has been destroyed.
- 10. In the event of loss of a parking permit, a replacement will be issued upon certification or evidence of such loss. A fee of \$0.50 will be charged.
- Reserved parking space holders may obtain two duplicate permits for any reserved space. A fee of \$0.50 will be charged for each additional permit.
- 12. REVOKED OR SUSPENDED PARKING PERMITS SHALL BE REMOVED BY THE VEHICLE REGISTRANT WHEN NOTIFIED TO DO SO. THE REMOVED PARKING PERMIT WILL THEN BE TURNED IN TO THE OFFICE OF THE TRAFFIC AND PARKING COUNSELOR. FAILURE TO REMOVE THE PARKING PERMIT AS PROVIDED HEREIN, AND THE OPERATION OF A VEHICLE ON CAMPUS WHEN A PARKING PERMIT IS REVOKED OR HAS EXPIRED, SHALL BE CONSIDERED A VIOLATION OF THE STANDARD OF CONDUCT REQUIRED BY THE UNIVERSITY.
- E. TYPES OF PARKING PERMITS. A map printed on the reverse side of the regulations will locate and identify available parking facilities.
  - Reserved Permits to be issued to faculty and staff. Each parking
    permit will designate a specific lot and space number which will be
    assigned to each individual, with the exception of the Physical Plant,
    Museum and Residence Hall Kitchen areas which are zone parking--first
    come, first served. This permit authorizes parking in the particular
    space assigned to the individual for the hours of 7:00 A.M. to 5:30
    P.M. only Monday through Friday. Spaces are not reserved on
    SATURDAYS, SUNDAYS, HOLIDAYS, OR WHEN THE UNIVERSITY IS NOT IN
    SESSION.

Any vehicle that does not have a permit or owner's space identification card displayed for the reserved space in which it is parked will be subject to towing at the owner's expense.

A limited area on each reserved lot will be designated for use after 5:30 P.M. by any individual who has reserved parking permit for that respective lot.

#### NOTE

A RESERVED PARKING PERMIT DOES NOT PERMIT THE FACULTY/STAFF MEMBER TO PARK IN DESIGNATED VISITOR AREAS. THE FACULTY/STAFF MAY UTILIZE DESIGNATED TEMPORARY PARKING ZONES. (See Map).

- (b) Students who teach eight (8) semester hours or work forty (40) hours a week for the University may register as staff. WRITTEN CONFIRMATION BY THE DEPARTMENT CHAIRMAN WILL BE REQUIRED.
- (c) In the event that reserved parking is available after assignment to faculty, staff and employees, STUDENTS WILL BE PERMITTED TO PURCHASE RESERVED PARKING PERMITS ON THE BASIS OF THEIR ACADEMIC CLASSIFICATION.
- 2. Residence Hall Permits to be issued to residents for their cars only. A parking permit and a parking lot identification number will be attached as herein provided. This will permit the vehicle to be parked in the indicated Residence Hall lot only. Vehicle assignments will be to capacity only. Assignments will be made on a priority established by receipt of letter of intent from Residence Hall students. Excess vehicles will be assigned to other lots until proximity Residence Hall parking is available.
- 3. Off Campus Permits to be issued to students who do not live in Residence Halls. The parking permit will designate the lot or lots on which a vehicle may be parked from 7:00 A.M. to 5:30 P.M., Monday through Friday.

WHEN NOT IN USE FOR PROGRAMS AND EVENTS, ARRANGEMENTS HAVE BEEN MADE TO UTILIZE THE FACILITIES OF THE CITY-OWNED COLISEUM-AUDITORIUM PARKING LOT. NOTIFICATION WILL BE POSTED AT THE ENTRANCES TO THE PARKING LOT PRECEDING ANY OCCASION REQUIRING CITY USAGE OF THE FACILITIES.

- 4. HANDICAPPED STUDENTS PERMITS Individuals having physical handicaps may apply for special parking assignments by submitting a letter to the Traffic and Parking Counselor's Office, setting forth the reason for the request. If approved by the Director of the Student Health Center, parking will be provided in designated reserved lots and spaces Monday through Friday during the hours 7:00 A.M. 9:00 P.M. only. The normal reserved parking fee will be charged.
- 5. Motorcycle Permits to be issued to two-wheel vehicles for parking in designated two-wheel areas. (See Map).
- 6. Summer School Permits to be issued to students attending one (1) or more Summer Sessions.

- (a) Summer School students (Residence Hall or Commuter) may use those Residence Hall facilities NOT ASSIGNED TO STUDENTS.
- (b) Reserved parking facilities will be enforced Monday through Friday from 7:00 A.M. 3:00 P.M. and on the specific Saturdays designated for attendance.
- F. Fees for parking permits according to designation and location are shown elsewhere in the regulations.
- G. Refunds for unused parking fees will be given on a pro-rata basis (See Chart). REMNANTS OF THE ISSUED PERMIT MUST BE PRESENTED OR ACCOMPANY THE REQUEST FOR REFUND.

#### PARKING

- A. A valid parking space is defined as an area designated on three sides by yellow lines and/or post, curbs or other types of barriers. EXCEP-TIONS ARE MADE ON DIRT LOTS WHERE ONE MUST PARK WITHIN DESIGNATED LINES MARKED BY POSTS.
- B. Designated parking areas are identified on the reverse side of this pamphlet.
- C. Parking is permitted only in areas clearly identified for parking. Parking on streets is prohibited except where signs indicate parking is permitted.
- D. On streets where parking is permitted, it is a violation to park on the opposite side of the street against the normal flow of traffic. The right-hand wheels of the vehicle must be parallel to the right-hand curb.

#### VISITORS

- A. Visitors are welcome to the Campus and special parking areas have been set aside for them. Visitor passes are required during the hours of 7:00 A.M. to 5:30 P.M., Monday through Friday, excluding holidays, and may be obtained at all campus entry stations.
- B. Visitors parking in areas not designated for visitors will be charged with a parking violation. Parking citations will be returnable to the City of Lubbock, Corporation Court. ILLEGALLY PARKED VEHICLES ARE SUBJECT TO BEING TOWED AND IMPOUNDED AT THE OWNER'S EXPENSE.
- C. The visitor parking areas are reserved for persons not connected with the University. The faculty, staff or students are not permitted to use these areas during the hours of 7:00 A.M. to 5:30 P.M., Monday through Friday excluding holidays.

#### TECH BOOKSTORE

Individuals may obtain permits at Entry Station No. 2, located at University Avenue and 15th Street, to visit the Tech Bookstore. Permits to

the Bookstore are limited to thirty (30) minutes parking in designated areas and must be stamped at the Bookstore.

#### STUDENT HEALTH CENTER

Individuals may obtain permits at Entry Station No. 2, located at University Avenue and 15th Street, to visit the Student Health Center. Permits must be stamped when leaving the Student Health Center.

#### ENFORCEMENT

- A. PARKING IN ANY AREA ON CAMPUS NOT CLEARLY IDENTIFIED FOR PARKING IS A VIOLATION.
- B. Parking in any area not authorized by a valid parking permit, or by an exception set out herein, is in violation of the parking regulations.
- C. Unregistered vehicles which are illegally parked on campus shall receive a traffic citation returnable to City of Lubbock, Corporation Court. Students, faculty and staff who park illegally on the campus, may be charged, additionally, with a violation of University parking regulations.
- D. Parking violations received by vehicles registered with the University shall be returnable to the Office of University Traffic and Parking Counselor.
- E. The individual to whom a vehicle is registered, upon receiving a parking violation, shall have five (5) days from time of issuance of the charge of violation to appear at the Office of University Traffic and Parking Counselor to answer the violation charges. The individual shall be entitled, upon request, to a hearing wherein witnesses against him will appear for questioning. The Traffic and Parking Counselor will then determine whether or not a violation has occurred. If the individual does not appear within the 5-day period, it will be assumed that a violation has been committed and the individual will be notified that his parking permit has been temporarily suspended.
- F. If it is concluded by the Traffic and Parking Counselor, that an individual has committed a violation, an order suspending the parking permit of the individual will be entered.
- G. AFTER A SUSPENSION ORDER HAS BEEN ISSUED, THE INDIVIDUAL CHARGED WITH THE VIOLATION SHALL HAVE 72 HOURS TO PAY A REINSTATEMENT FEE OR TO DELIVER THE REMNANTS OF HIS PARKING PERMIT. The schedule of reinstatement fees is set out on the reverse side of this pamphlet. The individual may surrender his permit in lieu of paying the reinstatment fee for the first ticket. All tickets must be paid prior to issuance of any refund. Upon surrendering a permit, the individual loses the right to re-register any vehicle until all reinstatement fees are paid.
- H. FAILURE TO PAY PROMPTLY ANY FEES ASSESSED SHALL RESULT IN THE REVOCATION OF THE INDIVIDUAL'S PRIVILEGE TO HOLD A PARKING PERMIT. If a revocation notice is issued, the individual loses his privilege of a refund and all

reinstatement fees must be paid. Failure to do so will be considered a violation of the standard of conduct required by the University.

- I. Six valid violations of the traffic and parking regulations within any fiscal year, commencing with the date that the vehicle was registered with the University, shall result in the revocation of the individual's parking privileges for a period of ninety (90) days. If, at the end of 90 days the individual's parking privileges are restored, a single valid traffic and parking violation will result in revocation of the parking permit for a period of 180 days. At the end of this period and if the individual's parking permit is restored, a single valid traffic and parking violation will result in permanent revocation. When a parking permit is suspended or revoked, the individual will not be permitted to register a vehicle, or utilize the parking facilities of the University. All reinstatement fees must be paid before any parking privileges are restored.
- J. Vehicles parked in violation of University rules and regulations may also be impounded and towed away. The vehicle will receive a traffic citation of parking violation and before the vehicle will be released the individual must pay the towing fee (\$5.00) to Traffic Security.

#### APPEALS OF PARKING VIOLATIONS

- A. INDIVIDUALS WHO WISH TO APPEAL A RULING UNDER THESE REGULATIONS SHALL HAVE TWENTY-FOUR (24) HOURS TO FILE A WRITTEN APPEAL WITH THE OFFICE OF THE UNIVERSITY TRAFFIC AND PARKING COUNSELOR EXPLAINING THE BASIS OF APPEAL. This office shall promptly deliver the written appeal to the Parking Violation Appeals Board along with the findings and determination of the Traffic and Parking Counselor. The suspension of parking permit shall be held in abeyance until the appeal has been determined.
- B. Notification will be given to the individual in writing of the Board's determination. If the action of the Traffic and Parking Counselor is affirmed, the individual will have 72 hours to deliver his parking permit or to pay the reinstatement fee assessed.
- C. Individuals will not be permitted to appear in person before the Appeals Board. The above procedures must be utilized for appeals.

#### ENFORCEMENT OF MOVING VIOLATIONS

- A. Speed limits on campus are established as follows:
  - Twenty miles per hour on all streets on campus unless posted otherwise.
  - 2. Ten miles per hour on all parking lots on campus.
- B. Vehicle operators and pedestrians shall obey traffic signals. Where possible students shall cross at intersections or designated crosswalks.

- C. Individuals operating motor vehicles on the campus in violation of University traffic regulations or the State of Texas traffic laws will receive citations. Moving violations are returnable to City of Lubbock, Corporation Court.
- D. Appeals of moving violations are governed by the laws of the State of Texas.
- E. Individuals who operate vehicles on campus in such a manner as to impair the safety of the University community or to inflict damage to property shall be subject to appropriate disciplinary action by the University.

Parking fees, reinstatement fees and refund schedule remain the same. These items to be printed on the regulations in the same location as previous year.

#### AGREEMENT

#### BETWEEN

The Board of Regents, Texas Tech University, Lubbock, Lubbock County, Texas, acting herein by and through Retha R. Martin, Lubbock, Lubbock County, Texas, Chairman of the Board of Regents, the Owner, and Brown-McKee, Inc., the Contractor.

The Owner and the Contractor agree as set forth below.

#### ARTICLE 1

#### THE CONTRACT DOCUMENTS

The Contract Documents consist of this Agreement, the Uniform General Conditions, Supplementary General Conditions, Drawings and Specifications. These form the Contract, and all are as fully a part of the Contract as if attached to this Agreement or repeated herein. An enumeration of the Contract Documents appears in Article 8.

#### ARTICLE 2

#### THE WORK

The Contractor shall furnish all of the materials and perform all of the work shown on the drawings and described in the specifications entitled "Repair of Light Poles for Jones Stadium" as prepared by William L. Ducker, P.E., of Product Engineering Company for Texas Tech University of Lubbock, Texas, acting as and in these Contract Documents entitled the Engineer; and shall do everything required by this Agreement, the Uniform General Conditions of the Contract, the Supplementary General Conditions, the Specifications, and the Drawings.

#### ARTICLE 3

#### ENGINEER

The Engineer for this Project is William L. Ducker, P.E., Lubbock, Texas.

#### ARTICLE 4

#### TIME OF COMMENCEMENT AND COMPLETION

The Work to be performed under this Contract shall be commenced immediately and shall be completed on or before September 10, 1970.

#### ARTICLE 5

#### CONTRACT SUM

The Owner shall pay the Contractor for performance of the Contract, subject to additions and deductions provided therein, the sum of Forty-three Thousand Four Hundred Sixty-five Dollars and Fifty Cents. (\$43,465.50)

#### ARTICLE 6

#### PROGRESS PAYMENTS

Based upon Applications for Payment submitted to the Engineer by the Contractor and Certificates for Payment issued by the Engineer, the Owner shall make progress payments on account of the Contract Sum to the Contractor as provided in the conditions of the Contract as follows:

Once each calendar month, the Owner shall make a progress payment to the Contractor on the basis of a duly certified and approved estimate of the work performed during the preceding calendar month under this Contract and materials suitably stored at the site; but to insure the proper performance of this Contract, the Owner shall retain ten percent (10%) of the amount of each estimate until final completion and acceptance of all work covered by this Contract. It shall be the Owner's option that upon "substantial completion" of the entire work he may increase the total payments to ninety-five percent (95%) of the Contract price provided satisfactory evidence is furnished that all payrolls, material bills, and other indebtedness connected with the work have been paid.

In addition, and in connection with any progress payment, if the Owner requests same, he shall be furnished manifest proof of any Subcontractors' actual fiscal account as related to the actual Subcontract value; and such account shall be in a form as requested by the Owner.

#### ARTICLE 7

#### FINAL PAYMENT

Final payment, constituting the entire unpaid balance of the Contract Sum, shall be paid by the Owner to the Contractor thirty days after Substantial Completion of the Work unless otherwise stipulated in the Certificate of Substantial Completion, provided the work has then been completed, the Contract fully performed, and a final Certificate for Payment has been issued by the Engineer.

#### ARTICLE 8

#### MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

- 8.1 Terms used in this Agreement which are defined in the Conditions of the Contract shall have the meanings designated in those Conditions.

- \$1.75 per student enrolled for 8 Semester Credit Hours
- \$1.55 per student enrolled for 7 Semester Credit Hours

- \$0.95 per student enrolled for 4 Semester Credit Hours

11. f. Ratify the following Agreement between Texas Tech University and Lubbock Transit Corporation for the purpose of furnishing transportation service on the campus. The execution of this Contract was authorized in the Board Meeting of June 5, 1970, Item M151.

## AGREEMENT

This Agreement, made and entered into this <u>5th</u> day of <u>June</u>, 1970, by and between LUBBOCK TRANSIT CORP., (hereinafter referred to as the "Company"), and THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF TEXAS TECH UNIVERSITY at Lubbock, Texas (hereinafter referred to as the "University"):

#### WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the parties hereto are aware of the traffic and parking problems on the campus of the University as it relates to the expanding campus and the increasing number of students, staff, and faculty of the University; and

WHEREAS, the above-named parties are desirous of relieving some of the traffic congestion and expediting transit between areas in and immediately adjacent to said University campus; and

WHEREAS, this Agreement embodies the intention and resolution of the above-named parties;

NOW, THEREFORE, WITNESSETH THIS AGREEMENT:

I.

#### Term

It is agreed and understood by and between the parties hereto that a University bus service utilizing eight (8) buses will be provided by Company during a period beginning with August 31, 1970, and terminating on August 20, 1971, provided, however, that either Company or University may terminate said bus service upon Thirty (30) days' written notice delivered to the other by registered mail.

II.

## Bus Operations

With respect to bus operations, Company and University agree that the following conditions shall apply:

A. Company will furnish buses having a seating capacity (Manufacture rated) of not less than 35 with driver, operated front and side doors, and personnel necessary to provide service on the route or routes designated by the University during the period specified in the preceding Paragraph I of this Agreement. The number of buses and the operating periods will be subject to continuous review, and the University will advise Company with regard to its needs and with respect to any changes in the number of buses and/or operating periods; subject to equipment availability, said changes shall be instituted by Company within five (5) days after receipt of written notice from University. Initial service commencing on August 31, 1970, shall be as indicated on Exhibit "A", attached hereto and made a part hereof.

- B. In the event that it develops during any portion of the period first specified in Paragraph I hereinabove, that a change in or extension of a route, or a new route, is necessary or desirable, Company shall make such change or extensions of a route or routes, or add a new route, upon University's request. The charges to be made by Company therefor shall be upon the basis, and shall be subject to the conditions and limitations, as are set forth in Subparagraph E of this Paragraph hereinbelow. Also in the event it develops during said period that an additional bus or buses are required in order to meet the demand for said bus service during any operating period or periods, Company, if it is able to provide same, at the University's written request, shall provide such additional bus or buses for said service during said operating period or periods upon the same basis, as is set forth hereinabove. University shall have the right to terminate any such changes, extensions, or new routes upon five (5) days' written notice to the Company.
- C. Buses shall stop to receive or discharge the passengers entitled to use, and using, bus service at such points as shall be agreed upon from time to time during said period, between Company and University, and University will identify the points at which stops will be made by said buses. Acceptable markers will be provided by the Company.
- D. Company will exercise due diligence to adhere to the time schedules hereinabove referred to, but minor deviations therefrom due to variations in traffic, weather or load conditions shall not be deemed to be a default hereunder.
- E. Company shall not collect fares from its passengers, but shall charge University for providing said bus service the sum of six dollars and twenty-five cents (\$6.25) per hour for each bus used in said service. Company shall submit an invoice at the end of each month showing the amount due for service provided. Contemporaneously therewith, Company will present University with a billing at the close of operations on the last day of each month, such bills to be paid as promptly as possible in the usual course of University business. The Company will provide income and expense statement at the end of contract period.

## III.

## Supplemental Bus Service

In addition to the scheduled bus service over specified routes as provided for in Paragraph II hereinabove, Company shall furnish such other supplemental service, if equipment is available, for the transportation of special groups as may be designated by University. Such supplemental service shall be furnished by Company at any time during the hours from 7:00 a.m. to 11:30 p.m., upon receipt of three (3) days' written notice from University. Company will charge University for providing said supplemental service the sum of six dollars and twenty-five cents (\$6.25) per hour, for a minimum

of three hours, for each bus used in said service. Billing periods and reports of operation shall be submitted in accordance with the provisions of Subparagraph E of Paragraph II hereinabove, and subject to Paragraph II, Subparagraphs A and B.

IV.

## Publicity

University will undertake and conduct a program designed to publicize the existence of said bus service and to acquaint its staff members and students with the availability of the same during the period in which it is provided in accordance with and under this Agreement. The Company will provide appropriate time tables for convenience of students.

v.

#### Service Provided

A. Company will provide and use at all times buses that are in good and safe mechanical condition, and are also in reasonable clean condition, and will also provide competent and duly licensed drivers by whom said buses shall be driven, and Company will assume full and complete responsibility for the condition of said buses and the qualifications and competence of their drivers, at all times, and University assumes no obligations whatsoever for either of the same.

B. Said bus service to be provided hereunder during said period shall not be open to use, or to be used, by the general public, but the use thereof shall be limited exclusively to University staff members, students, and such persons as may be designated by University as "Authorized Passengers"; provided, however, that nothing herein shall be construed to prohibit the use by the Company of such buses for purposes other than as set forth herein, when such buses are not needed by Company to carry out the terms hereof.

VI.

## Independent Contractor Relationship

In providing and furnishing said bus service during the term hereof, Company shall act solely in the capacity of and as an independent contractor, and not as agent or employee of University, and University shall have no control over Company's operations in connection with providing said service except as hereinabove provided, and University shall have no control or supervision whatever over the drivers of the buses used in said service who shall be employed by Company. Said drivers shall constitute Company's employees only, shall not constitute agents or employees of University, and shall be subject solely to Company's supervision and control.

VII.

#### Insurance and Risk

A. At all times during which Company shall provide the abovementioned bus service upon the above and foregoing terms and conditions,

Company shall carry and keep in force, at Company's expense, an insurance policy insuring both Company and University against liability for personal injuries or property damages arising out of the operation of said bus service, and covering each and all of the buses used by Company in that service, to the extent of at least \$100,000.00 for personal injury to any one person, \$300,000.00 for each occurrence, and \$50,000.00 for property damages sustained in any accident or occurrence arising out of the operation of such bus service. In that connection, Company shall furnish University a certificate of Company's insurer showing coverage to be at least in the sums just stated. Said insurance policy shall name and include "The Board of Regents of Texas Tech University" as named insured. Said policy or policies shall, upon request, be subject to the examination and approval of University.

B. Company assumes the risk of, and University shall not be liable for, damage to any and all buses or other Company property, used in the bus service operation, regardless of the cause thereof. The University shall be reimbursed by the Company for any damage or injury to University property arising out of or resulting from the said bus service operation, except that no such reimbursement shall be made for (1) damage to pavement by normal operations of buses, or (2) any damage or injury caused by acts or omissions over which Company, its employees, or agents had no control.

#### VIII.

#### Maintenance

Company agrees to maintain and operate said bus service and the buses used in providing the same in a safe, efficient and lawful manner and, in so doing, shall fully comply with all applicable statutes, municipal ordinances, and traffic rules and regulations promulgated by the University.

IX.

#### Miscellaneous

- A. It is further agreed that this Agreement is made solely for the benefit of University and Company, that it is not made for the benefit of any third person, whether a staff member or student of University, or otherwise, and that no action or defense may be founded upon this Agreement except by the parties signatory hereto.
- B. In no event shall the Company be deemed to be in default of any provision of this Agreement for failure to perform where such failure is due solely to strikes, walkouts, civil insurrections or disorders, acts of God, or for any other cause or causes wholly beyond the control of the Company. In such eventuality the University shall have the right to procure appropriate transportation service from others during the period. If, for any reason beyond the control of the University, including but not limited to epidemics, student strikes or disorders, or severe weather conditions, the University should deem it necessary or expedient to suspend classes, the University may, upon twelve (12) hours notice to the Company, request the temporary suspension of bus service until the resumption of normal class

schedules, in which event the Company will not furnish buses or be paid for services until the resumption of service. The University shall, in such cases, notify the Company twelve (12) hours in advance of the time service is to be resumed.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the parties hereto have caused this Agreement to be executed in their respective names and behalf by their duly authorized officers and agents and their respective seals to be hereunto affixed, all as of the <u>5th</u> day of <u>June</u>, A.D. 1970.

The execution of this Agreement was authorized in the Board meeting of February 14, 1970, Item M84.

#### SALE AND INSTALLATION AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT, made by and between MINNESOTA MINING AND MANU-FACTURING COMPANY, 3M Center, St. Paul, Minnesota 55101, a Delaware corporation (hereinafter referred to as "3M"), and The Board of Regents.

Texas Tech University, Lubbock, Lubbock County, Texas (hereinafter referred to as "PURCHASER");

## WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, 3M manufactures and sells a synthetic surfacing material having the properties set forth in the specification sheet dated February 21, 1968 attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and made a part hereof, which product is marketed by 3M under the name "TARTAN Brand Surfacing", incorporating its registered trademark of "TARTAN" (hereinafter referred to as "TARTAN"); and

WHEREAS, 3M desires to sell and PURCHASER desires to buy TARTAN on an installed basis and the parties desire to set forth in writing their agreement with respect thereto;

NOW, THEREFORE, 3M and PURCHASER agree as follows:

1. SALE AND PURCHASE: PURCHASER hereby agrees to purchase from 3M and 3M hereby agrees to sell to PURCHASER and, at its expense, provide all necessary labor, supervision, materials, equipment and supplies to: (Define work to be performed, specifically referencing only applicable sections of specification - if insufficient space attach additional sheet(s).)

Furnish and install 15,568 square feet of 3/8" thick standard red TARTAN on the jog track at Texas Tech University as shown on Drawing #D-398, dated February 2, 1970, Sheet 10 of 12.

2. SUBSTRUCTURE CONSTRUCTION: 3M's work does not include, nor is 3M responsible for, the installation or preparation of the substructure upon which the TARTAN is to be installed but will, upon written request, furnish a general guide for specifications at no charge to PURCHASER.

PURCHASER shall on or before May 1 , 1970, complete the installation and preparation of a substructure suitable for the reception and installation of TARTAN and meeting the requirements of 3M set forth in Exhibit "B" attached hereto dated May 1, 1966. Upon substantial completion, but prior to the installation of the final layer of asphalt (if the substructure is asphalt), of the substructure, PURCHASER shall notify 3M thereof and of the date of anticipated completion and shall afford 3M such opportunity to inspect the substructure, as 3M deems necessary. 3M shall, if it elects to inspect the substructure, advise PURCHASER of any known defects or deviation from Exhibit "B" in the substructure, provided, however, that no such inspection or advice shall relieve PURCHASER of any obligation nor place any responsibility upon 3M regarding the substructure. PURCHASER shall correct any such defects as 3M may bring to its attention within five (5) days after being advised thereof; if PURCHASER fails to correct same within such time, 3M may but shall not be required to make such corrections. If 3M elects to correct such deviation or defects, there shall be added to the contract price the cost and expenses incurred by 3M in doing so.

Anything in this agreement to the contrary notwithstanding, if PURCHASER has not fulfilled its obligations set forth in this Article 2 within sixty (60) days after the completion date set forth in this Article 2, 3M may, at its option, any time thereafter either (i) terminate this agreement and all of 3M's duties and obligations hereunder, or (ii) increase the sum to be paid by PURCHASER under the provisions of Article 4 hereof, to reflect any increases in 3M's published or suggested retail price for material and/or in any installation costs or expenses from and after the date of this agreement.

3. LOCATION OF LINES AND BOUNDARIES: PURCHASER will locate and point out the boundary lines of the area to be surfaced with TARTAN and shall furnish all surveying and construction layout, including all layout for

painting, for any and all lines and symbols, including game lines, court markings, lines and markings for track and field events and PURCHASER assumes all liability and responsibility in connection with the location of same.

4. <u>COST AND PAYMENT</u>: As payment for said sale and installation of the TARTAN, <u>PURCHASER shall</u> pay to 3M the sum of <u>FORTY-TWO THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED TWELVE AND NO/100 DOLLARS (\$ 42,812.00)</u>. Said sum shall be payable as <u>follows</u>: <u>SEE ATTACHED PAYMENT SCHEDULE</u>

No waiver or release of mechanic's lien given by 3M or its subcontractors shall be binding until all payments due to 3M when the release was executed have actually been made.

If corrective or repair work of a minor nature for which 3M is responsible remains to be accomplished by 3M after the TARTAN has been installed and is ready for use, 3M will perform such work expeditiously and the PURCHASER will not withhold any payment pending the completion of such work.

If major corrective or repair work for which 3M is responsible remains to be accomplished after 3M notifies PURCHASER of substantial completion of the work, the cost of which work aggregates more than ten per cent (10%) of the gross contract price, then the PURCHASER, pending completion of such work, may withhold payment of a sufficient amount to pay for completion of such work, but shall not withhold any greater amount. No interest shall accrue on any duly withheld amount during the time of rightful withholding.

5. TIMETABLE: PURCHASER shall notify 3M of the estimated date it desires 3M to commence installation of the TARTAN at least thirty (30) days in advance thereof and shall give to 3M a written notice to proceed, specifying the exact starting date, at least fifteen (15) days prior to such date. If given the required notice, 3M shall complete the installation of the TARTAN within 15 regular working days after the proper and full completion (as set forth in Article 2 hereof) of the substructure by PURCHASER.

PURCHASER understands that 3M's scheduling and transportation of materials and men, including personnel from its home office in St. Paul, Minnesota, to the worksite will be carried out in reliance upon the completion date recited in Article 2 and more particularly the notice given by PURCHASER pursuant to this Article and any expenses incurred by 3M as a result of the substructure not being ready on the commencement date specified in PURCHASER'S notice given pursuant to this Article shall be added to the purchase price.

- 6. DELAY: 3M shall be excused for any delay in completion of the contract caused by any contingencies beyond the reasonable control of 3M including, but not in limitation thereof, acts of God, acts of the PURCHASER or the PURCHASER'S agent, inclement weather, labor trouble, acts of public utilities, public bodies or inspectors, extra work or substructure not properly and fully completed on the commencement date specified by PURCHASER pursuant to Article 5.
- 7. LABOR AND MATERIAL CHARGES AND LIENS: 3M shall pay all valid charges for labor and materials incurred by 3M and used in the construction

of the project but is excused from this obligation for bills received in any period during which PURCHASER is in arrears in making required payments to 3M.

Should 3M fail to make any payments required under this Article 7, PURCHASER may make such payments on behalf of 3M, and 3M shall reimburse PURCHASER for the amount actually paid on demand, but PURCHASER shall not, by means of assignment or otherwise, be entitled to collect any greater amount from 3M than the amount actually paid for labor and materials under this paragraph.

3M agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the PURCHASER from and against all labor, material and similar liens, and statutory claims granted in lieu of such liens, arising out of the work performed by 3M hereunder, provided, however, that 3M shall not be required to indemnify or hold harmless the PURCHASER with respect to liens or claims to the extent that 3M is not required, pursuant to this Article 7, to pay for labor and material, and provide further that nothing contained herein shall be construed as a waiver or release of any claims or lien which 3M may have in connection with labor and materials furnished by it.

- 8. PLANS, SPECIFICATIONS AND SUBCONTRACT: The plans, specifications and this contract are intended to supplement each other. In case of conflict, however, the plans shall control the specifications, and the provisions of this contract shall control both the plans and the specifications.
- 9. COMPLETION AND FINAL ACCEPTANCE: Upon substantial completion by 3M of the work specified in Article 1 hereof, 3M shall give written notice thereof to PURCHASER, whereupon PURCHASER shall, within ten (10) days after receipt of said notice, either give written notice to 3M of its "Final Acceptance" or provide 3M with a list in writing of any objections it may have to said "Final Acceptance". In the event PURCHASER desires to submit to 3M a list of objections, PURCHASER shall specifically state wherein 3M has failed to comply with its covenants hereunder, whereupon the date of "Final Acceptance" for purposes of this agreement shall be, if such objections are valid, the date upon which 3M notifies PURCHASER that said objections were corrected. If neither of the notices herein provided for are received by 3M within the stipulated ten (10) days, PURCHASER shall be deemed to have given its "Final Acceptance".
- 10. WITHDRAWAL OF BID: This contract will be considered a proposal until a copy, signed by the PURCHASER, has been delivered to 3M's office. 3M has the right any time after sixty (60) days from the date submitted to withdraw this proposal by written notice, either by telegraph or otherwise, to the PURCHASER.
- 11. CHANGES AND EXTRA WORK: 3M shall make such minor changes of or addition to the work as the PURCHASER may request provided 3M has sufficient equipment and materials available at the worksite to accomplish same. Should the PURCHASER direct changes or additions, the contract price shall be increased or decreased, as the case may be, as follows:

- (a) increase in area covered with TARTAN by an equivalent per square foot price reflected by Articles 1 and 4:
- (b) decrease in area covered by TARTAN by an equivalent per square foot price reflected by Articles 1 and 4 less incidental expenses, including freight and handling, incurred in returning materials to St. Paul, Minnesota;
- (c) any other changes by such amount as may be agreed upon by the parties.
- 12. GUARANTEE: THE FOLLOWING ARE GIVEN IN LIEU OF ALL OTHER GUARANTEES AND WARRANTIES, EITHER EXPRESS OR IMPLIED. IN NO EVENT SHALL 3M BE LIABLE FOR ANY INJURY, LOSS OR DAMAGE, EITHER DIRECT, INCIDENTAL, SPECIAL OR CONSEQUENTIAL, HOWEVER ARISING, IN CONNECTION WITH MATERIAL OR EQUIPMENT FURNISHED OR WORK PERFORMED UNDER THIS AGREEMENT:
  - (a) TARTAN MATERIAL AND INSTALLATION: 3M guarantees the TARTAN for a period of one (1) year from the date of substantial completion of the installation thereof against defects defects in material and workmanship, and further that the TARTAN shall under reasonable usage for the purposes recited below in this Article 12 retain the qualities specified in the 3M specifications attached hereto as Exhibit "A" without material variance for a like period of one (1) year. 3M shall not in any manner be liable for any defects, variance, injury, loss or damage, directly or indirectly caused by or arising out of defects, variations or change of condition of the substructure over which the TARTAN is installed. This guarantee applies to the TARTAN only and does not cover any goods (paint, tape, etc.), material or equipment furnished or sold by 3M hereunder to be used in conjunction therewith.

INTENDED	USES:		
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PURCHASER acknowledges and represents that he has examined such specifications and samples as he deems necessary and has determined the suitability of the product for his intended use, and 3M assumes no risk or liability whatsoever in connection therewith.

(b) GOODS, MATERIAL AND EQUIPMENT OTHER THAN TARTAN:

3M guarantees all goods, material and equipment, including, but without limitation thereof, paid and/or other line marking material other than TARTAN, furnished by it hereunder for a period of one (1) year from the date of delivery to PURCHASER against defects in material and workmanship, expressly excluding normal wear and tear, abuse, misuse, neglect, weather and the like.

3M's only obligation under the aforementioned guarantees shall be to repair or replace, at 3M's option, such quantity, area or part of the goods, material or equipment proved to be defective or otherwise not in conformance with such guarantee within the above-specified guarantee period.

- 13. INSPECTION BY PURCHASER: During the entire time in which 3M is carrying out the provisions of Article 1, PURCHASER shall call to 3M's attention, as soon as possible, any irregularity or deviation from the specifications, in the material or workmanship furnished by 3M, which may come to the attention of PURCHASER. Such inspection and advice by PURCHASER shall not relieve 3M of any of its obligations under this agreement.
- 14. PAYMENT NOT APPROVAL: No payment made to 3M shall be construed as acceptance or approval of any part of the work, or release of any duty of 3M to correct the work.
- 15. INDEMNITY: 3M shall indemnify PURCHASER against all claims, liability, losses, damages, costs and expenses which PURCHASER may suffer or be required to pay by reason of personal injury (including death) or property damage caused solely by the negligent or intentional acts of 3M, its employees, agents or contractors during the performance of 3M's installation work hereunder.
- 16. <u>INSURANCE</u>: 3M shall maintain, during the installation of the TARTAN, the following insurance:
  - (a) Workmen's Compensation Insurance: As provided by the laws of the State of Texas;
  - (b) Public Liability Insurance: Not less than -
    - (1) Bodily Injury or Death: \$ 300,000.00 each person \$ 500,000.00 each accident;
    - (ii) Property Damage: \$ 300,000.00 each accident.

3M will, upon written request, provide PURCHASER with certificates of insurance or other satisfactory evidence of such insurance.

- 17. 3M CONTRACTORS: 3M will, upon written request from PURCHASER after the execution of this agreement by PURCHASER, advise PURCHASER of the names of any contractors which are to perform work or furnish materials or equipment as part of 3M's work as and when 3M selects same. Nothing contained herein shall create any contractual relationship between PURCHASER and any contractor of 3M nor shall such contracting relieve 3M of any of its obligations under this agreement.
- 18. PERMITS, LAWS AND REGULATIONS: PURCHASER shall obtain and pay for all building permits required in connection with 3M's work. 3M shall obtain all their permits, certificates or authorizations which are required in direct connection with the performance of its work; provided, however, that PURCHASER shall assist and cooperate with 3M in obtaining such documents.

3M will comply with all laws and regulations of any governing body having jurisdiction over the work being performed by 3M directly related to its work.

- 19. STORAGE: PURCHASER shall, at his expense, make available to 3M, in close proximity to the worksite, facilities for the storage of 3M's material such as will reasonably protect same from vandalism, weather, theft and other similar perils.
- 20. AVAILABILITY OF SITE AND UTILITIES: PURCHASER shall provide for suitable ingress and egress for 3M's material and equipment to and from the jobsite, it being understood by PURCHASER that means for the movement of heavy equipment will be required. Throughout the entire period specified in Article 5 for 3M's work, PURCHASER shall keep the worksite free of materials, equipment and other contractors of PURCHASER. Any damage or injury to the TARTAN or other materials, equipment or tools of 3M caused by the presence of such materials, equipment or contractors shall be PURCHASER'S responsibility and any costs or expenses incurred by 3M in correcting such damage or injury shall be added to the contract price.

PURCHASER shall provide and pay for all utilities, including heat, light, electrical power and water, which may be required by 3M in connection with the performance of its work hereunder.

- 21. <u>DESTRUCTION OF PREMISES</u>: If the project is damaged or destroyed by accident, disaster, fire or other calamity or catastrophe, or by theft or vandalism, 3M will be paid for all work performed in restoring or rebuilding its work as extra work under Article 11.
- 22. CLEAN UP: 3M shall keep the area of its work free from accumulation of waste materials or rubbish caused by its work and at the completion thereof, 3M shall remove all of such waste materials and rubbish and all its tools, equipment and surplus materials from and about said areas and shall leave its work area in a clean condition.
- 23. ASSIGNMENT: If either or both parties under this contract assign their respective rights and/or obligations under this contract, such assignment shall not affect the rights or obligations of the parties hereto under Article 12 hereof, which rights and obligations are not subject to assignment by either party without the prior written consent of the other.
- 24. NOTICES: Any notice required or permitted under this contract shall be given by registered or certified mail at the below address, but such address may be changed by written notice given by one party to the other from time to time. Notice shall be deemed received three (3) days after deposit in the mail, postage prepaid, unless earlier received.

- 26. ACCEPTANCE BY 3M: This agreement shall not be binding upon 3M until and unless signed by the Manager of Recreation and Athletic Products Department or by an officer of 3M.
- 27. ENTIRE AGREEMENT: This agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties with respect to the work specified in Article 1 and supersedes and cancels any and all communications, literature, agreements and understandings, oral or written, by or between the parties or either of them. This agreement is not subject to modification except by written agreement signed by the persons whose signatures appear below.

# ATHLETIC RUNNING TRACKS

#### SCOPE

These specifications shall cover a specially compounded synthetic resinous material, applied in situ over a specified base, resulting in a durable, resilient, uniform, non-slip, all weather surface for athletic running tracks.

The purpose of these specifications is to insure that the installation and product performance of an all weather track shall conform to the highest standards evidenced by recent Pan American Games and Olympian installations.

#### TECHNICAL PRODUCT DESCRIPTION

- 1) SURFACE shall have a granular texture to provide proper frictional characteristics and consistent running conditions under all weather extremes. Top surface shall be formed by implanting sized and graded resilient particles of the same polymeric composition as the base material immediately after leveling and prior to hardening of the liquid resin to achieve proper penetration and adhesion of granules to surface.
- 2) BODY of the athletic track composition shall include an aggregate fraction consisting of closed-cell, synthetic, polymeric foam which will provide the proper end use physical properties and shall also provide a thickness or viscosity control for proper installation product quality.
- 3) COMPOSITION of the athletic track material shall contain no extraneous plasticizers or softening agents which are not integrally and completely bonded in the internal chemical structure which shall eliminate leaching and hardness variations under various weather and use conditions.

Athletic track composition shall contain no solvent fractions which are detrimental to the asphaltic base material causing an irreversible degradation.

- 16) DENSITY shall be 1.0 to 1.2 grams/cc.

- 18) MOISTURE ABSORPTION: between 0.8 and 1.5% by weight.

#### INSTALLATION METHODS

- Athletic track composition shall be applied to a suitable hard base of an asphaltic composition. Desired specifications concerning design and construction of base material shall be made available by the manufacturer and are covered in the attached base specification brochure.
- 2) Athletic track composition shall be mixed, poured, and cured in situ under ambient conditions which shall insure the proper leveling to maintain desired thickness over base material.
- 3) Installation equipment shall be such that mixing, pouring and leveling of liquid surfacing material is done in a continuous manner which will provide a minimum number of permanently bonded, integral seams.
- 4) Application shall be made by factory trained personnel under the direct supervision of a qualified representative of the Manufacturer and in strict accordance with manufacturer's instructions.
- 5) Surfacing material in liquid form shall be capable of solidifying at ambient temperatures to a non-flowing, slump resistant state in a period of about one hour and shall be capable of traffic use in about two to three hours.

#### MISCELLANEOUS

- 1) FIELD EVENTS attendant to, and to be installed in conjunction with, the athletic track may be supplied either as precast, factory produced sheets in the indented product form, or field applied in the wet pour form as per the above specifications.
- 2) ATHLETIC TRACK MARKING MATERIAL shall be provided by the manufacturer and applied in strict accordance with the manufacturer's instructions to insure the compatibility of the products. Markings shall be consistently resilient, flexible, polymeric coatings of the moisture cure type which have a tensile strength and elongation at break equal to or greater than the values specified for the above described athletic track composition.

#### MANUFACTURER

The manufacturer must indicate and submit evidence of successful experience in the application and performance of their athletic track product as covered by these specifications and shall submit a listing of typical installations as covered by these specifications.

#### SPECIFICATION BULLETIN (B)

#### FIELD HOUSES AND ATHLETIC TRACKS

SPECIFICATION FOR DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION
OF SUBSTRUCTURE FOR TARTAN BRAND
SURFACING

#### 1. Intent

This specification is intended as a guide for design and construction of a substructure for the TARTAN Brand Surfacing. It is a general specification which shall be modified to cover each location more specifically, giving due consideration to climatic conditions, loads expected, and sub-soil conditions.

#### 2. General

The TARTAN Brand Surfacing is applied on top of a conventional pavement similar to the pavements used on city streets and roads. This pavement shall be able to support bleachers and miscellaneous equipment. It shall also be constructed with great care to assure a perfect and complete final surface.

It is recommended that the current standard specifications for highway construction in the State that the work is to be done, be used as a reference specification for this work.

# 3. Grading

# Field Houses

The grading in a field house will consist of removing enough existing soil to make place for the base and pavement. Shallow test borings should be made to determine any deficiencies in the sub-soil. The subgrade should be rolled to maximum density and inspected for soft areas. These areas, if any, shall be repaired before placing base material.

#### Outside Athletic Track

The subgrade is the foundation for the track and a poor construction at this stage will eventually create problems which will be costly to repair-settling, cracking in the pavement, and heaving by frost.

As soon as the site has been selected, a thorough study of the soil conditions and the drainage shall be made. Test borings shall be made in pattern along the proposed track.

In the area where subgrade properties are not satisfactory, an engineer will be able to overcome these difficulties with a proper design of grading, filling, and drainage.

In some cases, existing tracks can be stabilized to support all weather resilient surfacing. An engineer can test to determine whether or not an old track can be used.

At the start of the grading operation, all topsoil shall be stripped and stockpiled where it will not interfere with the work.

The contractor shall satisfy himself as to the nature and distribution of the materials to be graded. The work shall begin at some definite place on the project and be carried forward in a continuous manner to completion.

All unsuitable materials encountered in the excavation shall be hauled to a waste area.

All suitable materials removed from the excavation shall be used as far as practicable in formation of the embankments.

In all cut areas, the contractor shall excavate to twelve inches (12") below finished subgrade. The suitable excavated material shall be deposited and spread back in layers of six inches (6") in the same place and each layer shall be compacted to a minimum density of ninety-five per cent (95%) Modified Proctor Test.

Embankment shall be formed of suitable soil, granular materials, shale, rock, or random material. All materials used in embankment shall be free from objectionable material, such as leaves, wood, coal, grass, or roots. Frozen material shall not be placed in the embankment, nor shall embankment be placed on frozen material.

In embankment construction, the materials shall be deposited and spread in successive, uniform layers of not more than six inches (6") in depth loose measurement of the full width of the required cross section, and shall be kept level or parallel to the finished subgrade.

Each layer of embankment shall be rolled and compacted by a roller to a minimum density of ninety-five per cent (95%) Modified Proctor Test.

Embankment material which does not contain sufficient moisture to be compacted in accordance with the requirements shall be sprinkled with water.

Embankment material containing excess moisture shall be required to dry prior to or during compaction.

Soils having maximum dry weights of less than 90.0 pounds per cubic foot are considered unsuitable and shall not be used in the embankment.

Whenever possible, the natural drainage of the soil should be preserved and utilized. However, since a large all weather track may have a rapid runoff and no considerable amount of percolation, underground drainage system must be provided to remove the water easily and quickly.

The subgrade shall be given the same slope to the side as the top of the finished pavement. The gravel base shall be "daylighted" along the inside edge of the track, otherwise clay tile subdrain shall be installed. A clay tile subdrain shall be placed on the outside in any cut area to prevent seepage in under the pavement.

Proper ditches and drainage systems shall be constructed to provide a positive drainage flow on the site at all times.

During construction, all excavations shall be maintained in such a condition that they will be well drained at all times. Temporary ditches shall be constructed when necessary to maintain drainage and avoid damages. No excavated materials shall be placed or stockpiled in such a manner as to restrict free surface drainage.

#### 4. Base Material

#### Field Houses

The base material in field houses is recommended to be four inches (4") of crushed stone (lime stone) 1/4" size.

# Athletic Tracks

The base material shall be spread upon the subgrade after any prescribed subgrade and base drainage has been placed.

The base shall be constructed in layers not to exceed six inches (6") compacted depth. The material shall be compacted to the maximum density based on field density tests. The moisture content shall be as determined to obtain the desired compaction.

Compaction of the base shall be obtained using rollers.

Materials used for gravel base shall be gravel, slag, crushed stone and shall meet the following gradation or near:

3/8"	50 - 95
#4	35 - 80
#10	25 - 65
#40	10 - 35
#100	3 - 10

The finished surface for the base shall conform to the plan requirements.

Any irregularities or depressions that develop in the finished surface of the sub-base under rolling shall be corrected by loosening the surface and adding or removing material until the surface presents a smooth regular appearance.

The thickness of the base shall be four to six inches (4-6") depending on the soil and climatic conditions.

### 5. Asphaltic Pavement

# a. Asphaltic Concrete Binder Course

A prime coat shall be applied using MC-1 at 100 -175 F. at a rate of of .30 gallon per square yard.

A tack coat shall be applied shortly ahead of paving using RC-1 at 1250-1500F. at a rate of 0.05 gallon per square yard.

The asphaltic concrete shall be plant mixed and the bituminous material for mixture shall be AC-1 (85-100 penetration) at a rate of 4.2-5.0 per cent (by weight) in the composite mixture.

The gradation of the composite aggregate shall conform to the following gradation:

# b. Asphaltic Concrete Surface Course

A tack coat shall be applied using RC-1 125 -150° F., shortly ahead of the paving operation, at a rate of 0.05 gallon per square yard.

The asphaltic concrete shall be plant mixed and the bituminous material for mixture shall be AC-1 (85-100 penetration) at a rate of 5.5-6.2 per cent (by weight) in the composite mixture.

The gradation of the composite aggregate shall conform to the following gradation or near:

1/2"	95 - 100
#4	52 - 68
#10	35 - 50
#40	18 - 32
#80	10 - 18
#200	4 - 8 (50% mineral filler)

# c. Thickness

The Binder course shall be 1-1/2 inches and the Surface course shall be 1 inch thick. It shall, under all circumstances, be placed in two layers.

# d. Smoothness and Tolerances on Final Surface of the Asphalt Pavement

The completed surface shall be thoroughly compacted smooth, and true to grade and cross section, and free from ruts, lumps, depressions, cracks, open areas or other irregularities. Rolling shall be performed in such a manner that cracking, shoving or displacement will be avoided. Any ridges, indentations or other objectionable marks left in the surface shall be eliminated by either rolling or other means.

The final pavement shall be clean and free from fractures, spalling, or defects. The final surface shall not deviate more than 1/8" under a ten foot straightedge. This smoothness requirement is very IMPORTANT to assure a good running track surface.

#### e. General

The contractor shall use skilled asphalt workers, up-to-date methods, and modern equipment suitable to the size of the work in spreading, compacting and finishing the surface course. A paving machine shall be used provided that the quantity of mixture is sufficient, and the area is adaptable to its use.

The rolling of the Binder Course shall be done with a steel wheel roller weighing not more than ten (10) tons. Rolling of the final surface shall be done in the following manner:

Initial or breakdown rolling shall consist of one complete coverage of asphalt mixtures and shall be performed with a tandem or a 3-wheel roller. Such rollers shall weigh not less than 8 tons.

Rolling shall commence at the lower edge and shall progress toward the highest portion. Under no circumstances shall the center be rolled first. Rolling shall be performed with the drive wheel of the tandem roller forward with respect to the direction of spreading operations, unless otherwise permitted.

The initial or breakdown rolling shall be followed by additional rolling consisting of 3 complete coverages with a pneumatic-tired roller while the temperature of the mixture is at or above 150°F.

Joints shall be carefully made in such a manner as to insure a neat junction, thorough compaction and continuous bond throughout.

To secure a true surface, variations such as depressions or high areas which may develop during the compacting operations shall be corrected by removing the material in the defective area replacing with new mixture and recompacting. Lean, fat or segregated areas shall be removed and replaced with new mixture.

The work and operations of equipment shall conform to current State Highway Specifications in the State the work is performed.

#### BETWEEN

Texas Tech University, Lubbock, Lubbock County, Texas, acting herein by and through Mr. John G. Taylor, the Owner, and Mr. Morgan Smith, the Purchaser.

The Owner and the Purchaser agree as set forth below:

# ARTICLE 1

#### THE WORK

- 1.1 The Purchaser agrees to remove 300 serviceable utility poles, power lines excluded, to the satisfaction of the Texas Tech University Research Center Superintendent, within 120 calendar days of the date of this Agreement.
- 1.2 Site Clearance Requirements and Special Conditions:
  - (1) All poles must be pulled out of the ground and stubs resulting from breaking of the poles in pulling must be removed at least four feet below ground level.
  - (2) Poles in fence lines will be cut off above the fence and will constitute a complete pole and will be applied to the original 300 poles specified in the Agreement.
  - (3) When starting a line, all poles will be pulled or cut above the fence line, whichever case is applicable in the line, whether they are usable as complete poles or not. Broken poles will not apply to the 300 in the Agreement.
  - (4) The Purchaser will be allowed to retain 200 poles as payment for pulling 300 usable poles. The Texas Tech University Research Center will retain 100 of the 300 serviceable poles as determined on inspection by the Superintendent of the Research Center.
  - (5) Poles designated as Research Center property will be delivered by the Purchaser to a specified area and stacked.
  - (6) All debris from broken poles will be hauled to a designated area and burned by the Purchaser.
  - (7) It is understood that it may be necessary for the Purchaser to remove in excess of 300 poles since some are not usable so as to clear each line.

#### ARTICLE 2

#### PURCHASER ASSUMES RESPONSIBILITY

The Purchaser shall assume responsibilities for all injuries to persons or damages to property directly or indirectly due to, or arising out of, the operations of the Purchaser for the performance of this contract, and the Purchaser further agrees to indemnify and save harmless Texas Tech University and the United States Government against any and all claims of whatsoever kind and nature due to or arising out of the Agreement or the performance of all or any part of it.

#### ARTICLE 3

#### PERFORMANCE DEPOSITS

- 3.1 The Purchaser agrees to deliver to the Texas Tech University Research Center a performance deposit in the amount of \$100.00 prior to beginning the work under this Agreement. This deposit is to be made to insure the faithful performance of the obligation of Purchaser under the contract for sale with regard to removal of the poles from the site, including site clearance and cleanup and all related functions required to be performed by the Purchaser.
- 3.2 In the event the agreement of removal is not performed to the complete satisfaction of the University within 120 calendar days from the date of this Agreement, the poles remaining may, at the option of the University, be forfeited by the Purchaser, and the University may cause the necessary work to be performed to complete the obligations required under the Agreement, and the cost thereof will be charged against the Purchaser and the applicable deposit will be used to offset such charge. The balance remaining after such charge will be refunded to Purchaser, or any cost experienced by the University in excess of the performance deposit will be paid to the University by the Purchaser.
