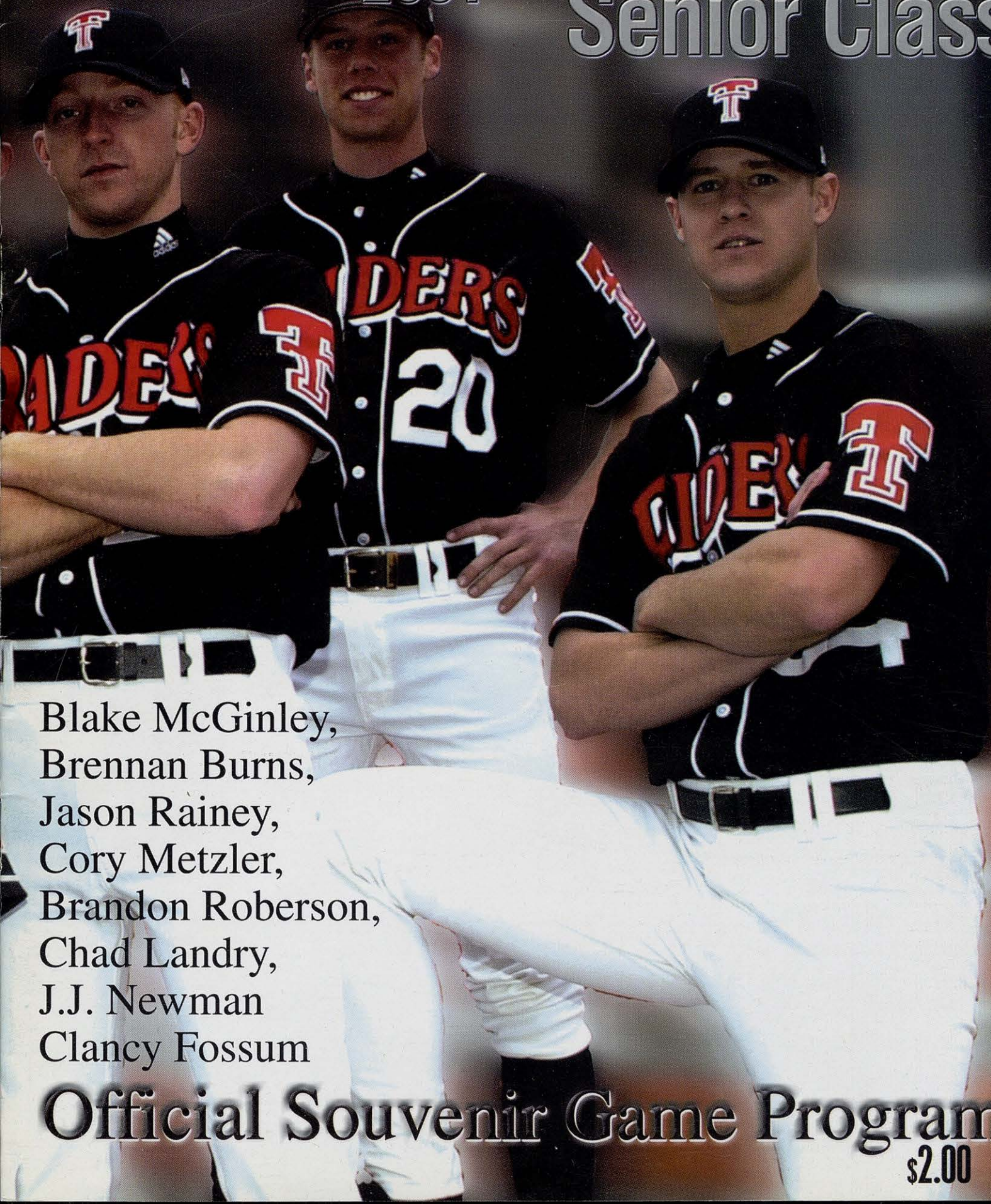

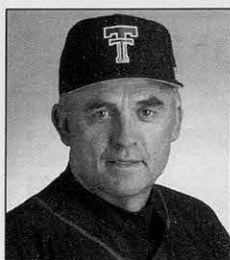

HEAD COACH LARRY HAYS



HEAD COACH LARRY HAYS 27

15th Season

Throughout his coaching career and life, Texas Tech head baseball coach Larry Hays has maintained that his priorities are his religious beliefs, family and at a distant third baseball. That focus on life and his leadership ability have been cornerstones for the Texas Tech baseball program through the years.

Last season, Hays took a team riddled with injuries to the school's sixth straight NCAA Tournament and sixth tournament in school history. Hays' 2000 Red Raiders put together a strong finish to wrap up the Big 12 with an 18-12 record and went on to win two games in the Big 12 Tournament in Oklahoma City. The two wins in the Big 12 Tournament solidified Texas Tech as an at-large team.

In 1998 he guided Texas Tech to the 1998 Big 12 Conference Tournament title in Oklahoma City, Okla. The championship was especially impressive considering the Red Raiders accomplished that feat with only seven pitchers. The former professional softball pitcher also led Texas Tech to its first-ever Big 12 Conference regular season championship with a 23-7 conference and 46-14 overall record in 1997. Texas Tech also claimed the No. 1 ranking in collegiate baseball for several weeks, the first time a Red Raider sport was ranked No. 1 in school history. The Hays-led squad also hosted its second consecutive NCAA regional and appeared in regional competition for the third time in three seasons.

Hays also guided the Red Raiders to their first-ever Southwest Conference championship in 1995 as they posted a school-record 51 wins (51-14) and advanced to the Midwest I Region championship game. In 1996, Tech posted a 49-15 ledger as the Raiders hosted both the Southwest Conference Post-Season Tournament (finished third), then hosted the NCAA Central II Regional.

Successful seasons have been the norm for Larry Hays, who won his 1,000th game on April 12, 1995. In his 28 years as a college head coach, he has produced 16 teams that have surpassed at least 40 wins. And he has led teams to 12 league titles and guided his 1983 Lubbock Christian University team to the national NAIA championship.

Hays is also highly regarded by his coaching peers. He has been honored as "Coach of the

Year" following nine different seasons including the 1997 season when he was selected Big 12 Conference Coach of the Year by both the Big 12 coaches, the Dallas Morning News and the Austin American-Statesman. Plus, he has been inducted into the NAIA Hall of Fame.

Hays' players have also seen unbelievable individual success. He has coached 29 NAIA All-Americans, one NAIA Player of the Year, 36 All-Southwest Conference performers, nine First Team All-Big 12 recipients, 13 consensus NCAA Division I All-Americans, five NAIA Academic All-Americans and three NCAA Academic All-Americans. To date, 48 of his former Red Raider players have been drafted by Major League Baseball while four of the six Texas Tech former players to appear in a big league uniform played for Hays.

Tech has played in the last six (two SWC/four Big 12) conference tournaments, winning the 1997 Big 12 Conference title, the 1998 Big 12 Conference Tournament title, the 1995 Southwest Conference crown and placing runner-up in the inaugural 1997 Big 12 Conference tournament. Hays is currently ranked among the nation's top-10 all-time and active NCAA Division I head coaches in victories (1,235).

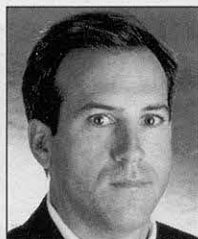

TEXAS TECH ASSISTANT COACHES

Greg Evans enters his seventh season as an assistant baseball coach at Texas Tech University. Evans, Texas Tech's first base and infield coach, has been primarily responsible for Texas Tech's improved fielding over the past year. Evans rejoined the Red Raider coaching staff in 1998 for the first time in two seasons and after serving as an assistant at Texas Tech from 1993-1995.

Evans, nicknamed "E-moe," served as an area scout for the Montreal Expos in 1997. His scouting area included the Southeast Region including Arkansas, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia and Northern Florida. In his yearlong stint with Montreal, Evans signed three first round

picks including three players among the top-50 picks.

Under Evans' direction, Texas Tech had a fielding percentage of .971 in 1999 which was ranked in the nation's top five. In 2000, Evans guided the team to a .967 fielding percentage.

Prior to arriving at Texas Tech in January 1993, Evans was an assistant at Lubbock Christian University from 1988-90. He served as head coach at Frank Phillips Junior College in Borger, Texas from 1990-92 where he compiled a two-year mark of 64-46. In his second season as head coach, his team established a school record with a 39-16 record. Helping Evans accomplish that feat were two ex-Red Raiders, Robin Hariss and Travis Smith. In 1996, he was named head coach at Grayson Junior College where he assembled and recruited a squad that finished seventh in the nation in 1997. In addition, he coached the Elkhart entry of the Jayhawk League in 1994-95 that consisted of Texas Tech players Matt Kastelic, Brandon Kolb and Scott Pfeifer. That team won its league title and finished fifth in the national tournament.

A former collegiate baseball player at Ole Miss from 1981-85, Evans played second base, third base and in the outfield. He graduated from Ole Miss in 1985 with a Bachelor's degree in Public Administration and received his Master's degree in Sports Administration from Texas Tech in 1987.

Evans and his wife, Allyn, have a three-year old daughter named Kathryn Adele.

Daren Hays will enter his second season at Texas Tech after joining the staff last season. Hays will work directly with the Red Raider outfielders and hitters. Hays spent the 1991 season as an assistant baseball coach at Texas Tech where he served as hitting coach. He helped lead the Red Raiders to a 42-18 record in 1991 as Texas Tech led the Southwest Conference with a .303 team batting average.

Hays spent the following eight seasons as head baseball coach at cross-town Lubbock Christian University where he amassed a 356-163 overall record. He became the first coach in LCU history to win 300 games in only seven seasons. Last season, Hays was named the Sooner Athletic Conference Coach of the Year after leading Lubbock Christian to a 47-17 record and

a number seven NAIA national ranking. He won 40+ games in six of his eight seasons at LCU and won 50+ games two seasons, leading the Chaparrals to a 52-16 record in 1995 and 52-18 record in 1998. Hays received NAIA District VIII Coach of the Year honors in 1993 after his Chaparral hitters led the nation in batting average. During his tenure at LCU, 14 of his players were selected as NAIA All-Americans, four were named GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-Americans while 20 of his players were named to the All-Sooner Athletic Conference team in its five years of existence. In 1998, LCU player Keith Hart was named the NAIA National Player of the Year. In eight seasons at LCU, Hays sent 28 players to professional baseball.

In 1995, Coach Hays was the hitting coach for the Lubbock Crickets of the Texas-Louisiana League. The Crickets won the league title in their first season of play that year.

After receiving his Bachelor of Science degree from Lubbock Christian in 1989, Hays played professionally for two years in the Texas Rangers organization. He played his rookie league season at Butte, Montana, after being drafted in 1989. He ranked ninth in the league with a .316 batting average and ranked second in both RBI (51) and doubles (17). The following season, he hit .280 with three home runs and 40 RBI for Class A Port Charlotte in the Florida State League.

Hays is married to the former Kristi McGee of Lubbock. The couple resides in Lubbock and have two daughters, Brittany and Brogan.

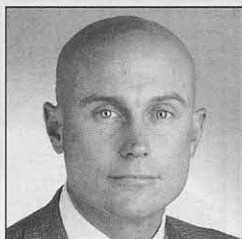

Entering his first season at Texas Tech is Ryan Brewer. Brewer will serve the Red Raiders as the team pitching coach.

Brewer comes Texas Tech following a career in minor league baseball in which he played in the Kansas City Royals organization. He spent two seasons on the Texas Tech pitching staff in 1995 and 1996. During his two year career at Tech, the Red Raiders went 100-29 overall and claimed the 1995 Southwest Conference Championship. During the 1996 season, Brewer recorded 10 wins on the mound while racking up a .769 winning percentage. Following the 1996 season, he was rewarded by the Southwest Conference as a second-team All-SWC selection.

He is married to the former Lacy Nye who was a standout volleyball player at Texas Tech from 1993-1996. Lacy serves as a volunteer assistant for the Tech volleyball team. The couple makes their home in Lubbock.

Britt Smith enters his second season at Texas Tech and will serve as director of baseball operations.

Smith came to Texas Tech after serving one season as Daren Hays' pitching coach at Lubbock Christian University. In 1998, Smith's LCU staff helped the Chaparrals to a 47-17 overall record and No. 16 ranking in NAIA. LCU senior Paco Escamilla was selected an honorable mention NAIA All-American. Smith spent the 2000 season at Texas Tech as the pitching coach.

Prior to his one-year stint at Lubbock Christian, Smith played and coached at West Texas

A&M for past five seasons. He played all nine positions during his playing days with the Buffaloes. An all-conference outfielder in 1996 at West Texas A&M, Smith holds both the school and Lone Star Conference game records for hits (6) and walks (5).

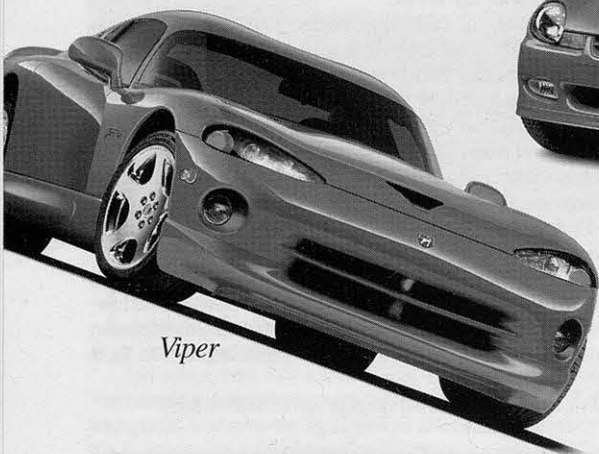

A CLASS OF THEIR OWN

RED RAIDER SENIORS REFLECT ON THEIR CAREERS AT TECH

Talking to the seven seniors of Red Raider baseball would lead you to believe that they had grown up hitting homeruns and stealing bases on a remote sandlot in the same neighborhood. However, these seniors have formed a brotherhood brought together by the fences of Dan Law Field.

Four-year veteran Brennan Burns came to Texas Tech after a brief stay at UCLA. Burns saw action at catcher, third base, first base and designated hitter throughout his four years at Tech. In 1998, Burns was ranked among the nation's leaders in doubles per game all season. Burns went on a 20-game hitting streak, the second longest ever for a freshman at Tech. In 1999, he ended the season with five multi-hit games. With all of these achievements, Burn's greatest memories come from the fans and player.

"Most of my memories are of other guys making big plays. It was such a great feeling to be standing on second base and look up into the stands and see my teammates and the fans on their feet cheering."

Burns will graduate in May with a degree in business communications. He looks to attend graduate school or go straight into the professional world.

Right-handed pitcher Brandon Roberson has spent the last year fighting injuries that plagued him during the 2000 season.

"I was really anxious to get back and also kind of nervous. I felt like it was my first game ever when I got back out there. There was also a fear factor of getting hurt again."

In 1999, Roberson was nationally ranked all season in saves, earned run average and strikeouts per nine innings. He broke the Texas Tech season save record and led the Big 12 conference in saves. Roberson racked up honors including All-Big 12 Conference First Team by coaches and All Texas Team by Lone

Star baseball. Roberson's post-college goals include playing baseball as long as he can and then coaching.

Senior outfielder Jason Rainey broke into the starting lineup in 2000 after an impressive showing in 1999 fall practice. Rainey started all 62 games and set a Texas Tech single season record for a number of triples (9), tallied 76 hits on 232 at-bats, scored 69 times, had 17 doubles and led the teams with homeruns (13) and stolen bases (18). Rainey cites the series against USC as his fondest memory.

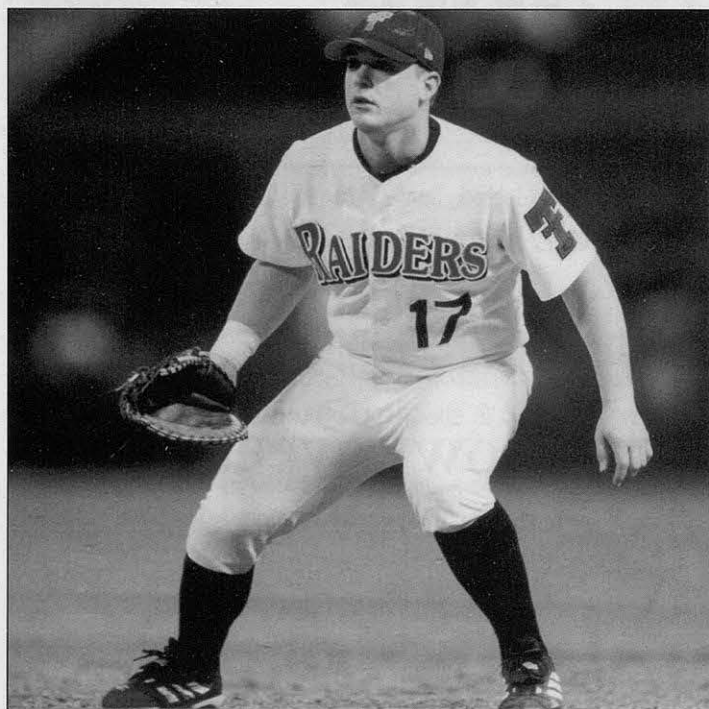
"I would say the series against USC last year was my best and favorite memory of this place. We beat them two games of the series and the stands were packed. It was awesome getting to play USC."

Graduate school and coaching are possibilities for Rainey after his graduation in December with a degree in political science.

Before coming to Tech in 2000, pitcher Cory Metzler played at Hutchinson Junior College where he finished with a 14-4 overall record. Metzler received such honors as All-Region and All-Conference. In 2000, Metzler made 22 appearances and started in 14 games. During his time on the mound, he threw three complete games and struck out 51 batters.

"I want to play professional baseball and if that doesn't happen I will try and play independent baseball. If that doesn't happen hopefully my college degree, which will be Management Information Systems, will help me to get far. I have really worked hard in my studies."

Left-handed pitcher J.J. Newman transferred to Tech after playing two years at Seward County J.C. where he was named All-Region IV and First Team Jayhawk West All Conference. At Seward, Newman hit .371 with 12 homeruns and 48 RBI.

Newman had an impressive year in 2000, starting ten games and striking out 53 batters. He also attained the spot of third on the team with a 6.27 ERA. Newman plans to graduate in May with a degree in history.

Pitcher Blake McGinley came to Tech in 2000 after a two-year stint at Bakersfield J.C. During his years at Bakersfield, he was named second team All Western States Conference and team Most Valuable Player as a sophomore. In 2000, McGinley totaled 16 appearances with five starts. McGinley had the fifth best ERA on the team of 5.58, pitching 61.1 innings and striking out 37 batters.

"I have so many great memories. The close wins and extra innings are some that I will always remember. I have also made so many great friends on the team."

McGinley will graduate in May with a degree in family studies and then become a coach or a teacher.

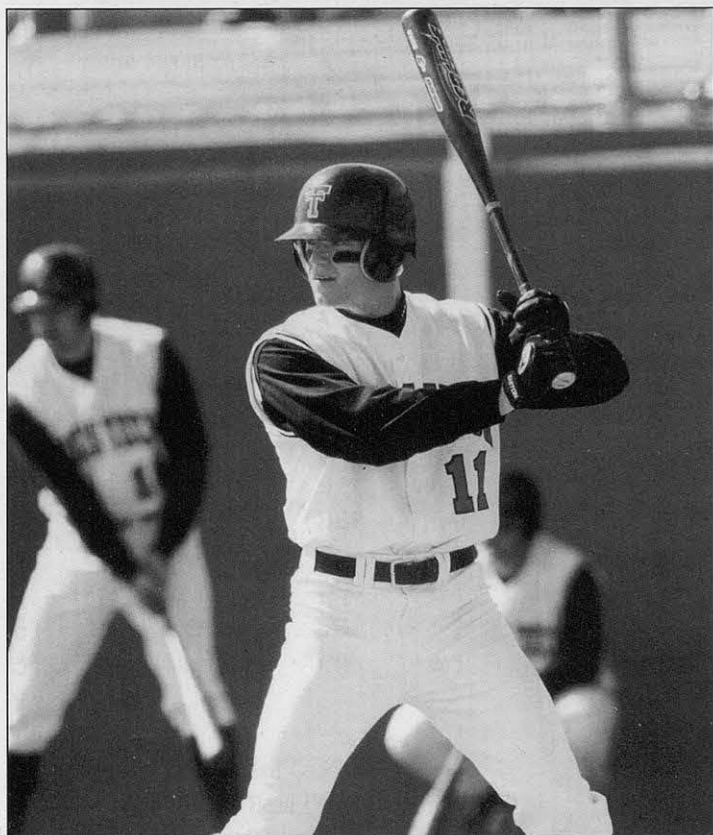
Sidearm-pitcher Clancy Fossum came to Tech in 1999 after a year's stay at Texas A & M. In 1999, Fossum contributed mainly as a middle reliever. He went a career-high of 4 1/3 innings allowing only five hits and three runs in a victory vs. Oregon State. He also went 3.2 innings and allowed only two hits and no runs against Rice in the NCAA Regional championship game. Fossum cites this as his fondest memory of the game. In 2000, Fossum made 18 appearances in relief and threw 28.2 innings. Fossum plans for the 2001 season to be the end of his baseball career.

"I plan to go to graduate school here at Tech and get my masters in Management Information Systems and then get my CPA. There will be no baseball involved."

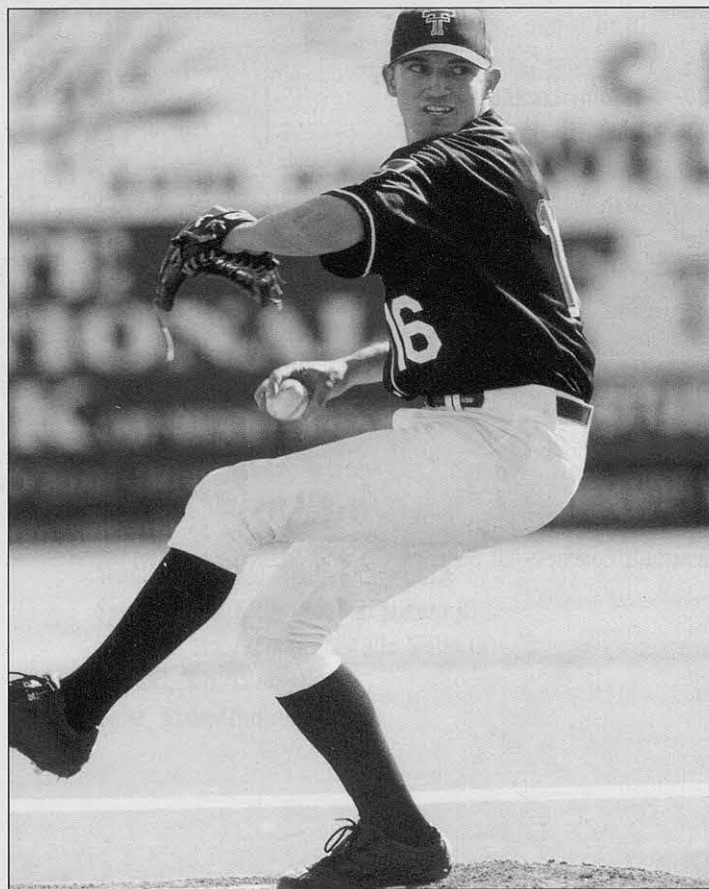

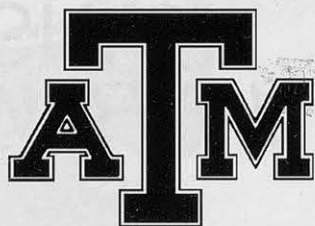

DAN LAW FIELD

Dan Law Field provides Texas Tech Baseball with a top-notch facility

Texas Tech's Dan Law Field has proved each year to be among the nation's top baseball facilities with its top-notch game atmosphere, outstanding fan support and first-rate baseball facilities. The field has also proved to be one of the toughest places for opponents to visit as the Red Raiders have posted six seasons of winning over 80 percent of their home games.

Dan Law Field has been home to various NCAA Regional and conference post season events as Texas Tech has been selected to host an NCAA baseball regional in three of the last four seasons. All three were enormous successes. In 1999, Texas Tech hosted the four-team NCAA Regional in Lubbock and ranked sixth among the 16 regionals in attendance as the tourney drew a total of 19,869 fans to see Texas Tech, Rice, Rutgers and UW-Milwaukee play. Tech averaged 2,838 fans over the seven-game tournament. The 1997 NCAA Regional drew 4,992 fans to see Tech play Southwest Texas State. Overall, the 10 games in the 1997 NCAA Regional drew 23,407 total fans, an average of 2304.7 fans per game. In 1996, Dan Law Field averaged 2,808.8 fans per game as Tech hosted a six-team NCAA Regional.

Texas Tech also hosted the 1996 Southwest Conference Post-Season tournament. The four-day event, which drew all seven SWC teams for the first time in history, saw 31,542 fans enter Dan Law Field, an average of 2,628.5 per game.

Perhaps no collegiate baseball facility in America has seen the renovation that Texas Tech's Dan Law Field has undergone the last eight years. And those renovations are not yet completed. Since head coach Larry Hays took over the program in 1987, not only has the quality of play been upgraded, but so have the facilities.

Not only has the ballpark been given a name- Dan Law Field in 1988 after a local businessman and Texas Tech graduate Dan Law- but the facility has now become one of the most outstanding diamond facilities in all of college baseball.

The first item on the renovation agenda was the construction of a new ultra-modern light system that Law helped fund and lead toward becoming a reality. The current \$300,000 lighting system is considered one of the finest among the nation's collegiate ranks. Next was the installation of an Astroturf infield surface. The eight-year old Astro Turf "8" infield was one of Hays' requests made to help put his program together with the extra ability to recruit speed. The 30,000 square feet of turf was installed at a cost of approximately \$125,000 which included excavation, sub-basing and carpeting.

When the infield surface changed to Astroturf, the dimensions of the park also changed. Home plate is now 405-feet from straight-away centerfield, while down the lines, it takes a 330-foot blast to leave the yard over a 16-foot high fence.

Prior to the start of the 1992 season, other fan-appealing additions to the park were added to Dan Law Field. A new concession stand was constructed directly under the main grandstand, along with a ticket booth and restroom facilities, which sit just inside the main entrance.



Special care was taken with the renovations to help those with special needs: reserved parking for handicapped fans, new hard-surface walkways and switchback ramps to gradually ascent to the main grandstands were added.

Thanks in part to the cooperation and donations of United Supermarkets, Lubbock Power & Light and Southwest Coca Cola Bottling Co., the athletic department made an addition to Dan Law Field for the 1993 season.

A new high resolution scoreboard/messageboard measuring approximately 50-feet by 25-feet now stands in the outfield. The board features a 21-foot-by-9-foot four color matrix that, along with a new computer system, enables fans to see the players and keep up with their statistics each time they come to the plate. Constant time and temperature readings are also featured on the board.

The renovations continued in 1994 as locker room facilities were constructed behind both the home (first base) and visitor (third base) dugouts.

One of the more unique features of Dan Law Field is the Skyboxes.

Fourteen luxury boxes, located atop the main grandstand, were completed during the 1996 season. Various companies and boosters pay a rental cost each year for the skyboxes complete with heat and air conditioning units. Tenants have the opportunity to decorate their own area as they wish.

"I love Dan Law Field. It gives us such a tremendous home field advantage. We have great fan support and part of that is because Dan Law Field is fan friendly- the fans are a part of the game and they're tied in with what's going on in the game. That makes it tough to play here for an opponent. Plus with the new turf on the infield, Dan Law Field is a great place to play. We have plans to upgrade it but right now it's one of the best in the country. Chancellor Montford, President Haragan and Athletic Director Gerald Myers along with the community have been extremely supportive to our needs and it shows in our facility."

I understand why so many people come to watch Texas Tech- they're really fun to watch play. They never quit and the crowd never leaves them. Tech's fans were ragging on me about my diary. They kept asking 'What are you going to talk about next- your hotel room?' and saying stuff like that. It was funny. It's great to have fans like that. They're so into it."
