A total of 72.6 per cent of the Texas Tech student body (male) participated in the men's intramural program during the 1961-62 school year. The total included 7,012 male students, enrolled in the five undergraduate schools, Edsel Buchanan, director of the men's program, reported.

Each student participated in one or more of the 21 sports offered in the program, with 737 in basketball and 736 in touch football. The next highest sport was softball with

682 participants.

Other sports in the program included swimming, track, volleyball, basketball free throw, league bowling, golf, table tennis, tug-o-war, tennis, badminton, wrestling, weight-lifting, fencing, handball, trampoline, boxing, and horseshoes.

"The growth of intramurals at Tech has been most gratifying," Buchanan said. "During the past two years we have moved into an expanded program which should result in continued growth on a larger scale.

A total of 26,125 spectators supported the intramural program. This was an increase of more than 4,500 from the previous year. The students took part in four classes - fraternity, dormitory, independent and open leagues.

West Texas State In A Nutshell

Season Prospects

The 1962 West Texas State football team will be a study in contrasts. The Buffs will have an experienced backfield to run behind a young and inexperienced line

Coach Joe Kerbel's club, owner of a 6-4 record last fall against a rugged schedule, has 17 lettermen returning. Only one—All-Border Conference guard Stu Johnson-is a starting lineman. Graduation took the team's first four ends, the two starting tackles, one regular guard, and the top two centers.

The high-scoring backfield, which averaged 30.9 points per game last year, returns intact and only one member of the second unit backfield is gone. Pistol Pete Pedro, the sophomore whiz who scored 22 touchdowns and gained 966 yards rushing, heads a fast-stepping backfield. His counterpart at halfback is Jerry Logan, a 175-pounder who is not as fast as Pedro but does everything well on offense and defense. Quarterback Jim Dawson, a veteran from Borger, is one of the best, and fullback Ollie Ross, a 215-pound pile-driver, gives the club good power. Ross gained 346 yards rushing for a 5.1 average, and scored 30 points.

Backfield depth will come from Jerry Richardson, a 6-3, 180-pound junior speedster who led the team in pass-receiving last year; Hoot Gibson, a crazvlegged junior quarterback; Woody Prude, 170pound Compton (Calif.) JC speedster; David Mc-Inturff, 160-pound junior halfback; and fullbacks Leslie Rolando, and Russell Mundy.

"Our young players in the line will have to come along fast for us to reach the stature of last year's team," said Coach Kerbel.




