

from the Port Hudson. We had to work & I walked about two miles & then went to a plantation & hired a couple of horses & a negro to take them back. He carried the valise & the bundle. Arrived at town about dark.

There was only one place that any body could stop at & there were eleven already there & of course this
was crowded. We eat coarse corn bread & meat & slept on the floor on our blankets. The town has been evacuated by citizens for fear of the Yankee shells. They have holes in the hills back of the town to which they go. The country is very broken around Port Hudson & very favorable for defense. Many little muddy creeks to cross.

Many soldiers are encamped here & many are in town in the houses. Went out this morning (27) & had a good view of the Yankee boats. This is the day the President has appointed for fasting & prayer. Had no place to worship to go to & did not stop. My host invited with the rest things in a prayer for peace. Left in the evening at 1½ o'clock for Clinton, a distance of 24 miles up the N. R. road. Arrived there at 5 P.M. Got horse for station, engaged a hotel & put up at the hotel until morning. March 28th. This morning after a ride of twelve succeeded in getting the hotel closed at 10 o'clock pd \$15.00 apie. Wore the last to close with a sickly vehicle & long team. The road was bad in places & we drove carefully & walked a great deal.

When we got in two miles of the place, Ed got careless & drove recklessly & broke the vehicle & we had to foot it the balance of the way. Arrived at Tongipahova, or Camp House, at night, distance 34 miles. Tongipahova is 78 miles from N.O & 183 from Jacksonville.

Left Camp House at 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ A.M. & arrived at Jacksonville at 10 A.M. The cars being delayed & the pay connection. Passed the night at Confederate House.

30th - Wrote to Belle, Lou & brother John
Got transportation through to Phenix
and by way of Selma. Left in
afternoon at 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock. Got to Phenix
96 miles at 8 A.M.³¹, breakfasted &
left at 7 A.M. Arrived at Tombigby
River, dist. 56 ms at 10 o'clock. Took dinner
best while going up the river 4 ms

Then with the cars at Demopolis for
Selma dist. 50. Demopolis is 2 ms
below the junction of Tombigby & Black
Warrior rivers. Beautiful country between
these & Selma. Something like Texas.
Arrived at Selma at night & took
the boat for Montgomery dist. 80 ms
April 1st. Arrived in Montgomery at
7 A.M., two hours too late for cars
to West Point - Forgot to say that
Austin Jones went down to Clinton from
Jackson to see Dick, & Camp Klein,
Gould, Herby, Fudus & others went
by way of Mobile, leaving us at Phenix
- Remained in Montgomery until
5 P.M. - Wrote two letters & walked over
city - ladies at Capitol engaged in signing
& clipping money. Slept at Exchange Hotel
Very pretty good - Reached West
Point at ^{2d} & Atlanta at 7 A.M.

Did not have time for breakfast at Atlanta - Arrived at Dalton at 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ P.M. & here we waited home bound to let over for the regular train until 2 o'clock A.M. next morning but preferred to get on a freight train going out west at Knoxville. We had a passenger car & had a whole seat to myself & slept all the way - stopped at State Line mes house. Arrived at Knoxville at 4 A.M. Ops. 3^a took breakfast & waited until 12 M^l for regular train. There as a great

April 12th Sunday joined the army this evening while it was besieging Suffolk - Remained around Suffolk until Sunday night the 3^d of May, the day of the fight at Chancellorsville May 3^d Made a very hard march

21 miles on 24 hours besides
carrying rations at Franklin
May 5th Got to Petersburg, Staid
there until the morning of the 7th. Passed
through Richmond the morning of
the 8th & camped about 17 miles from
the City. on the road to Louisa C.H.
Having marched 4 ms beyond Richmond
Next day marched 19 miles (9th)
10th Reached Frederick Hall 12 miles
Left F. Hall morning of 13th camping
at Louisa C.H. 14 miles.
Next day went to Camp 4 ms of Pop-
idon River & remained until the even-

ing of the 3rd, when we moved to
a camp 1 mile from Rapiidan.
Remained here on picket until Sunday
the 3rd of May, when we started for
Fredericksburg. Marched 16 miles &
then went back to a camp near the
old one & there remained two days.
(1st-3^d June) - June 4th Started &
for Culpeper crossing at Raccoon
Ford - 5th Went to see Stuarts
Carabry review at Brandy St.
6th Went down the Rappahannock
17 miles to a ford, starting at 2 P.M.
& returned by 1 P.M. the 7th
8th Moved camp 1/2 East.
9th-4th Va & 2^d S.C. Carabry sum-
moned by Yankee Carr. & caused
as to take up line of march to
Lookout Mt. S.E. of camp.

I forgot to say that on the 7th
4th Gen Lee brought his whole
army thru' Fairfax except the
Division. This morning the 9th
heavy firing N.E. of us supposed
to be on the Rappahannock.
10th Was detailed on Engineers
provid to be simply a "recon" com^{tee}
and I returned to the regt on the 12th
13th At 1 o'clock moved camp to Gray-
son Mt., scene of one of Lee's greatest
victories (Aug. 8th 1862).
14th In the evening walked over the
battle field & saw many skeletons
& saw marks of bullets on the trees.
15th Left camp at 1 am hrs. came
through Culpeper en route for
Monterey. Was detailed to look after
of Gen. Com. Train. Army took
right hand road & we the left.

We came through Boston & Woodville carrying 1 mile West of Woodville. The country is beautiful - less room of the Blue Ridge - Culpeper to Woodville 15 miles.

15th Rose early & got off by sun rise mailed a letter which I wrote the evening before to Bettie at Sperryville 5 ms from Mt. Here we turned to the right pretty abruptly & travelled E of Mt. Had been travelling W of Mt before passing thro' Gains Washington 5 ms from Sperryville & Gains Cross Roads 10 ms from Sp. & Flint Hill about 3 ms further on - Camped 3 ms from Flint Hill towards Front Royal Sperryville at foot of Blue Ridge - We however parallel with the Rds. At 3 X R the troops came into our road but immediately took a left hand road

Had great deal of trouble with wagons
breaking down

16th Started at six o'clock for F.R. but 11 now I went on with a crazy wag on to have opinion but did not decide - Sat dinner at F.R. with wheelwright Petty - We crossed Blue Ridge & ran for F.R. then entered Warren Co. Had been in Rappa Lannock - Heard other rumors confirming the capture of Meloy & forces at Winchester by Gen. Snell, viz 6,000 troops & \$150,000 worth of commissary & ordnance stores - Here it may all turn out a fortys reported to hold Millions long & Charlestown - Enemy at H. Henry Had another break down this evening 3 ms from F.R. I had to put up the wagon Day before hot & dusty - Saw a man raising cabbage plants & he said it had not seemed for six weeks. At F.R. left the Winchester pike & took a left hand road by Morgan's Ford on Shenandoah river. Wagons broke down
