MY PLATFORM

Before submitting my platform to the working men and women of this congressional district, I wish to state some of the fundamental principles of my belief.

First. I believe that all men are created equal, in that they are all human and therefore

deserving of equal right as human beings.

Second. I believe those rights include the right to life, liberty and the persuit of happiness. And that governments should be instituted among men for no other purpose but to insure to the

individual an equality of opportunity in the chance to possess these things.

Third. I believe that all governments should derive their power from the concent of the governed, and that whenever any form of government becomes subvertive of the interests of a majority of its citizens, it becomes the right and the duty of that majority to amend or abolish that form of government, and institute new government in its stead. Basing such new government on such principles, and organizing it in such forms, as to that mojority may seem most in keeping with the public well-fare and general safety.

Fourth. I believe the foregoing to be in accord with the spirit of our constitution and I will

give any man \$100 if he will prove that it is not.

Now when I say that all men are born equal, I do not mean that they are all born just 14 inches long, weighing just 10 pounds, and possessing the very same degree of mental and physical energy; nor do I mean that with equal opportunity, that they would every one grow to be just 6 feet high, weighing 180 pounds, and would live just 95 years, three months and two days, and then all die of the same disease. I mean that they are all born with mouths to feed, backs to clothe, heads to shelter. And in this sense, and this alone, are men born equal. Equal in need. And that equality of opportunity I am talking of is the equal opportunity of each individual to furnish for themselves those things which they equally need, and the government that would guarantee to each individual that opportunity, is the government for which I am contending. And such a government does not mean that all would be equal in possession, it does not mean that the government would say to the individual: You need food, go take it; you need clothes, go take them; you need shelter, go take it. It does not mean that the government would hand out to each individual the same quantity and quality of the things they needed. Ones possession would be measured by his earnings, some would work a little and possess a little. Some work a great deal and possess a great deal. It would be much the same as it is today, except that the government would always furnish the equal opportunity, and reward you with the full social equivilent of your labor.

Now then I stand first of all for the principles of International Socialism. If you want to

know what that is get a platform of the Socialist party and read it.

Then as immediate demands, I am in favor of a graduated land tax, and of impowering the state with the right to purchase any piece of property at an advance of ten per cent over the value rendered by its owner for taxation. I am like the democrats in that I want an inheritance tax, but I am different from them in that I want it inforced. I am in favor of the state going into the manufacture of farming implements to be sold to the farmers at cost. I am opposed to convict labor (in any of its forms) coming into competition with what is known as free labor. The above are just a few of the hundreds of simliair things that I am in favor of, and shall work to obtain. Infact I shall work for any and every concession that will tend to better the conditions of the working class, and place in their hands the powers of government, to the end that the present wasteful system of production and distribution shall be abolished and a just and economic system established in its stead.
