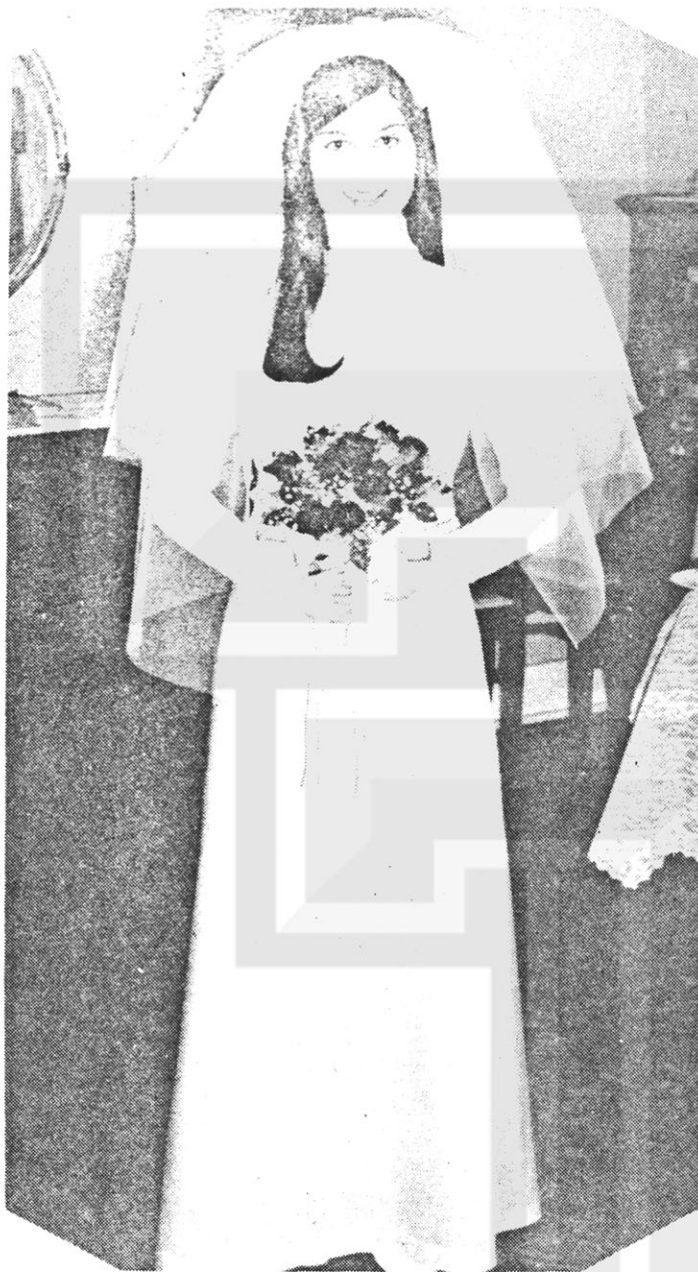

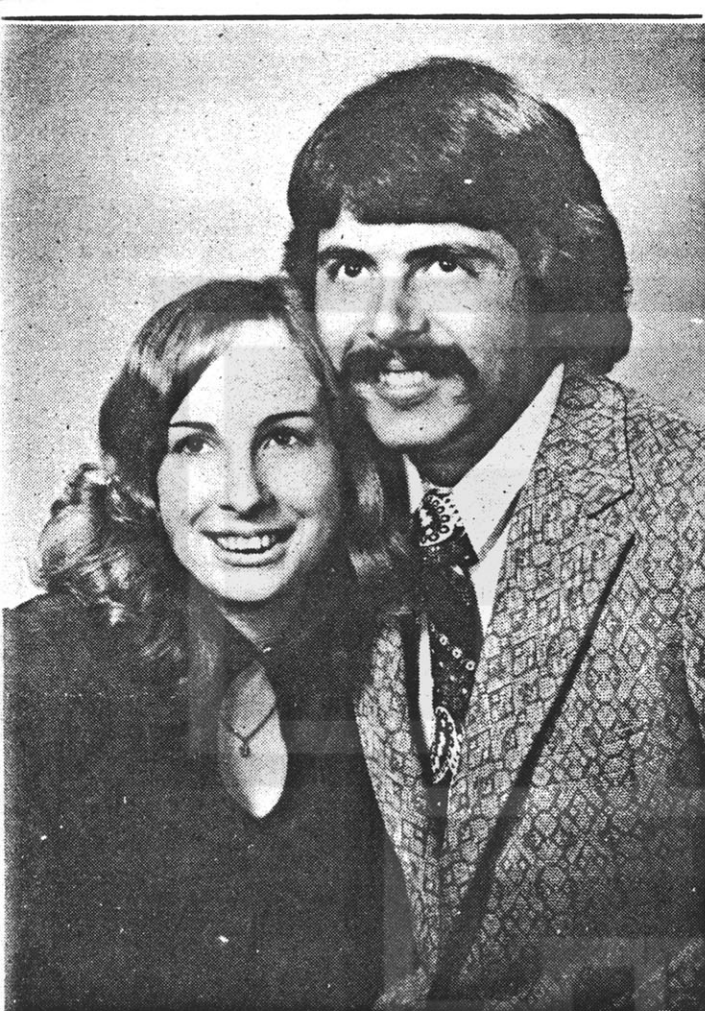
Mrs. Ronnie Nell, Topeka, presided at the guest book.
