





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# Two Grandpas

Story as told to me by Pat Dickerson via e-mail:

From stories my dad told me, His grandpa Petty was in the Union Army and his Grandpa Newby was in the Confederate Army. I have copies of Grandpa Newby's discharge papers and copies of Grandma Newby's confederate widow's pension. I will get those together and send them if you need those. Dad used to tell me "When I was a boy Mama (Effie Lee) used to beg Johnny (John S. Petty) please talk to the Grandpas cause they would get into terrible fights regarding the war and first thing we knew those two old men were rolling around on the floor trying to hurt one another!" Grandpa Newby apparently had a cane he liked to swat the children with if they came too close. My dad said he was just a boy when all of this was happening. Aunt Gen also said the above happened. Apparently the Grandpas lived with John and Effie Lee when they were in Borden Co.

Another story from Pat Dickerson:

Dad and Aunt Gen would love to know their story about the Grandpas is out there. I think it is very funny ....Dad and Aunt Gen both said it wasn't very funny at the time cause the Grandpas were very serious in their squabbles! You probably know about the sing a longs that were held at the Petty house in Borden Co. John S was a great



In June, 1892 Douglas Whaley Newby and hiw wife, Emma White Newby, purchased Gail's first hotel from F.A. and W.R. Clark. The price for the hotel, located across from the southeast corner of the courthouse square, and for six business lots was \$400. This hotel was sold by the Newby's in February, 1901 to J.D. Hurley, when the Newbys moved to Puerto, New Mexico.

Grandfather Newby, of English descent, was born in Nashville, Tennessee and joined the fighting in the Civil War when he was 17 years old. He was wounded at the Battle of Shiloh and carried a bullet in his heel all his life. He was also wounded by Bushwhackers near Nashville. He served in the Texas Rangers and perhaps in the Mexican War. Grandma Newby was a midwife, "almost a doctor". She was born in Tallahassee, Florida, and according to her granddaughter she was English blue eyed, black haired, and raised in a very "up to up" family. The Newbys were the parents of five daughters and two sons, all of whom were probably born in Johnson County where they had lived before coming to Gail.

The five Newby daughters must have been a decided asset to the social life of Gail in the nine years they lived at the hotel. Julia, the eldest, was married in 1895 to Konrad (Fred) Walther, foreman of the NK Ranch. Her daughter, Ruby Walther Isler, said that one year Julia was given a prize for

being "The Belle of Gail." Beulah had been married in 1893 to J.H. Nix, first superintendent of the Gail Union Sunday School and occassional preacher. Mr. Nix first wife had died and was buried somewhere on the Johnson ranch, leaving a new born baby and three other small children.

Loula married first J.F. Allen. He went with a group of men to the Klondike in search of gold and the entire party was lost. Loula and J.F. Allen had a son, Connie, born in Gail. Loula married second Natha. Strandley. The Strandleys were members and leaders in the Gail Methodist Church.

In February 1897, Effie Lee, the fourth daughter was married to John S. Petty, son of the Rev. J.H. Petty, who preached many a sermon in Gail and surrounding communities.

In 1901, or soon afterwards, all these families, together with the Locklears, George Clarks, and other Borden County families migrated to New Mexico and established the town of Puerto. There Grandpa Newby served as mail carrier and operated a wind driven grist mill to grind corn and wheat for his neighbors. Fred Walther ran the small store.

The youngest daughter, Jessie, married Foley Griggs, son of a sheep man and descendant of a line of Americans reaching back to the

Mayflower.

In 1903 John and Effie Petty moved back to Gail. Most of the others remained at Puerto until about 1920. The Strandleys moved to Amarillo, the Nixes to Hereford, the Walthers to Colorado. The Griggs remained in the Tucumcari area.

All the original family who lived at Gail are now dead. Puerto is a ghost town, almost obliterated, but third and fourth generation descendants still hear stories of Borden County and the


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

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#### SIXTH TEXAS CAVALRY

SIXTH TEXAS CAVALRY. The Sixth Texas Cavalry was organized and mustered into Confederate service at Dallas on September 6, 1861. Ten companies of volunteers were brought into the service of the Confederate states at Camp Bartow in Dallas County. The regiment totaled about 1,150 men. Col. <u>Barton Warren Stone, Jr.</u>, a Dallas attorney, had the responsibility of recruiting a regiment of volunteer cavalrymen from seven North Texas counties: Dallas, Kaufman, Henderson, Collin, Fannin, Grayson, and Van Zandt. Also included in the Sixth Texas Cavalry was Throckmorton's Company of Mounted Riflemen, a Texas State Militia unit from Collin County. They became Company K, and <u>James W. Throckmorton</u>, a lawyer from McKinney, was elected captain. All volunteers were required to serve for twelve months until the Conscription Act required them to be committed for the duration of the war.

Some of the companies were made up as follows: A, commanded by Capt. A. J. Hardin, raised from Kaufman County; B, the "Rockwall Cavalry," mostly from Kaufman County and commanded by John Summerfield Griffith; C, raised in Dallas County and commanded by Capt. Fayette Smith; D, composed primarily of men from Collin County who had previously served in Capt. Thomas H. Bowen's Mantua Company of Mounted Volunteers; E, also known as the "Texas Wide Awakes," commanded by Capt. Jack Wharton, and composed of men from Van Zandt County; F, known as the "Lancaster Guard," from Dallas County, commanded by Capt. Robert S. Guy; G, recruited from McLennan County, commanded by Capt. Peter F. Ross (older brother of eventual regiment leader Lawrence Sullivan "Sul" Ross); H, commanded by Capt. Robert M. White and organized in Bell County; I, known as the "Titus Grays," recruited from Henderson County with Henry W. Bridges as captain; and K, led by Capt. James W. Throckmorton and composed of men from Collin County.

In late November 1861 the Sixth Texas Cavalry was ordered to Fort Smith, Arkansas, to join Gen. Ben McCulloch's Army of the West, which was awaiting the arrival of Gen. Sterling Price and his Missouri state troops. Before beginning the march, the regiment was divided into three divisions with Maj. "Sul" Ross commanding the first, Lt. Col. John S. Griffith commanding the second, and Col. Warren Stone commanding the third. Over its career, the Sixth Texas Cavalry participated in more than eighty-five various skirmishes, engagements, and battles. These included Pea Ridge, Holly Springs, the Atlanta campaign and siege, and John Bell Hood's operations in northern Georgia and Alabama. The first engagement for the Sixth came on December 26, 1861, in Chustenahlah, Indian Territory, on Battle Creek. Although the fight was short, thirteen men were killed and thirty more injured. At this point, the Sixth Texas Cavalry was combined with the Third and the Ninth under Gen. James McIntosh.

Before the battle of Pea Ridge (or Elkhorn Tavern, fought between March 6–8, 1862) the Sixth was absorbed into the army of Maj. Gen. <u>Earl Van Dom</u>. The Confederate forces included 16,000 men and 800

Cherokees against a Union force of 10,250. This encounter claimed the lives of both Gen. Ben McCulloch and Gen. James McIntosh, leaving the Sixth Texas Cavalry and the Army of the West without a commanding officer. Soon after the battle, the Sixth Texas Cavalry was sent to help Gen. Pierre G. T. Beauregard's men in Tennessee at Shiloh. On April 15, 1862, they were dismounted and their horses sent back to Texas. They were now a dismounted cavalry with the strength of 935 men. They were also too late in helping General Beauregard, as the battle at Shiloh was over before they arrived.

After the Conscription Act of April 16, 1862, the Sixth Texas Cavalry was temporarily put under the command of the unpopular Col. Barton Warren Stone, Jr., who resigned and returned to Texas after not being promoted to brigadier general. During this time, disease ravaged the lines of the Sixth, with forty-one deaths reported in Arkansas and sixty-two in Mississippi. Due to the successes of Ross and his mounted troops in slipping behind enemy lines and providing vital information, only four months after the Sixth Texas Cavalry was dismounted, detailing parties from each regiment were to return to Texas and bring horses back to Mississippi. Before their horses would arrive, the Sixth was involved in the battle of Corinth on October 3–4, 1862. The Sixth suffered heavy losses, including some men taken prisoner.

The Sixth Texas Cavalry, along with the Third and the Twenty-Seventh, were remounted in November 1862 and organized into the Texas Cavalry Brigade. The Ninth joined later for the Holly Springs raid. They were under the command of General Van Dorn, but it was Colonel Griffith of the Sixth Texas Cavalry who conceived of the plan to raid Holly Springs in December 1862. This was a costly surprise to General Grant and his operations in Mississippi and a great morale boost for the Confederacy. Holly Springs was captured, the Federal Army fell back to Memphis, and the Texans helped themselves to some much needed supplies. The rebels destroyed an estimated \$1.5 million worth of military stores being stockpiled for General Grant's advance on Vicksburg, and they also took 2,800 to 3,000 soldiers prisoner. The success at Holly Springs set the pattern for later Confederate cavalry attacks in the west.

By January 1862 the Sixth headed for Middle Tennessee and was joined by its immensely popular commanding officer, Col. Sul Ross. Ross and his Sixth Texas Cavalry were a part of Col. John W. Whitfield's Brigade, one of five brigades under the command of Maj. Gen. Earl Van Dorn. After the untimely death of General Van Dorn on May 7, 1863, the cavalry corps was broken up, and John Whitfield was promoted to brigadier general and placed in command of the Texas Cavalry Brigade, including the Third, Sixth, Ninth, and the Twenty-seventh regiments. After Whitfield's health deteriorated, Sul Ross of the Sixth Texas Cavalry was appointed brigade commander. He was appointed brigadier general in December 1863.

During the Atlanta campaign, the Sixth spent 112 days under fire and participated in eighty-six engagements as part of Ross's Brigade. After the fall of Atlanta, the Texans marched with John Bell Hood's troops into Tennessee; they served as rear guards, raided Union supply trains and battled Federal cavalry. In the withdrawal from Nashville, they were one of Gen. Nathan Bedford Forrest's two brigades covering the Confederate retreat. At this point, dissension was rife in the brigade, and desertions occurred frequently. When the brigade surrendered on May 4, 1865, at Jackson, Mississippi, General Ross was in Texas attempting to recruit replacements for the depleted ranks.

The Sixth Texas Cavalry was paroled in Jackson, Mississippi, in mid-May 1865. At the time of surrender, there were only 160 men left from Ross's Brigade. Col. Jack Wharton, the commander of the Sixth Texas Cavalry at the time of surrender, signed the oath. Thus, the remaining men of the Sixth Texas Cavalry, returning home via the USS *E.H. Fairchild*, disembarked at Natchitoches, Louisiana, and made their way back to Texas.

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# CONFEDERATE TEXAS TROOPS

# 6th Regiment, Texas Cavalry (Wharton, Stone's)

#### Overview:

6th Cavalry Regiment [also called 2nd Regiment] was organized with 1,150 men at Dallas, Texas, in September, 1861. Many of the men were from Dallas, McKinney, Waco, Austin, and Lancaster, and Bell County. The unit skirmished in the Indian Territory, fought at Elkhorn Tavern, then moved wast of the Mississippi River. It contained 803 effectives in the spring of 1862 and was dismounted during the battles at Corinth (http://www.nps.govsearch-battles-detail.htm?code=ms002) and Hatchie Bridge (http://www.nps.govsearch-battlesdetail.htm?code=tn007). Here the regiment reported 148 killed, wounded, or missing. Assigned to Ross' Brigade, it served with the Army of Tennessee during the Atlanta Campaign, was active in Tennessee, and ended the war in Mississippi attached to the Department of Alabama, Mississippi, and East Louisiana. The field officers were Colonels Lawrence S. Ross, B. Warren Stone, and Jack Wharton; Lieutenant Colonels John S. Griffith and Peter F. Ross; and Robert M. White and Stephen B. Wilson.

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
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# COMPANY G, 6TH TEXAS CAVALRY REGIMENT, CSA


Company G, was recruited in McLennanCounty, and was commanded by Peter F. Ross. A private in the company was Sul Ross, who had just come back from Ranger Duty.
