that I have.

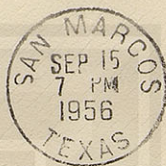
I went out yesterday and told Beebie & Alma

Mill & Mary, Kate and John went to the valley Christmas to visit Thelma & Mary, both married they are E.P.'s daughters. We had a nice time during the holidays. Rudolph and John were down - they seemed so happy - of course that made me happy - she says every one of John's friends have been wonderful to her, and have made her feel so at home.

Hazel and Jay, had a grand dinner on Christmas eve, afterwards the tree, we had a lot of fun.

When I returned home I found a nice letter from Campbell, he seemed a little blue about his operation. I sent him a Christmas card. Speaking of cards, thanks for your sweet card, I received 169 cards - and I enjoyed every one - Beebie, isn't at all well, she had a funny spell as she calls it, about ten days ago, she thinks it was her heart but sister Alma, and myself think it was indigestion, caused by constipation, she wouldn't have a Dr. nor would she do a thing about it.

Sunday sister Alma, called me and asked me to come out and see if I could persuade her to have a Dr. But I got no where, she said she didn't want to live and she was worn out. I told her we couldn't die when we wanted too - that if she got down neither Alma nor myself were

able to wait on her and she would have to go to the hospital, said she wouldn't go.

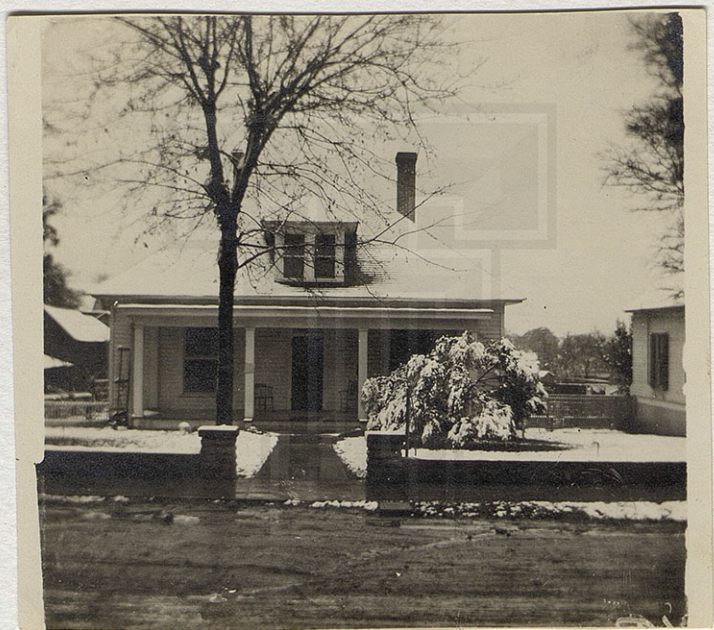

It was in the Church of St. Dunstan-in-the-East that Capt. John Pitts and Jane Ingram were married June 21, 1797.

The couple later came to America. Their son, John Drayton Pitts, was born on the Atlantic Ocean, August 26, 1798, in a sailing ship. He was one month old when the ship landed at Charleston, S. C. Thus was founded the American branch of the Pitts family.

The Sir Christopher Wren tower was added to the church in 1698. The church had been rebuilt by Wren in 1671. It was severely damaged by enemy action 1941 and is now being restored.

This picture was made by C. J. Duggan, a great-grandson of John Pitts, in August, 1954.

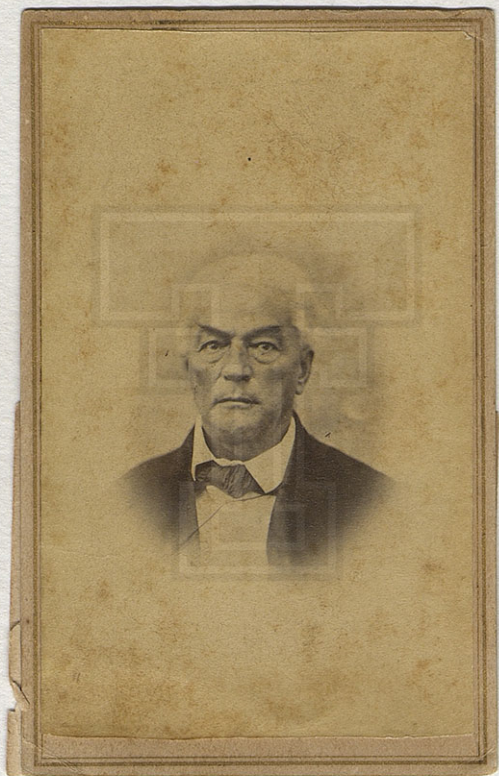

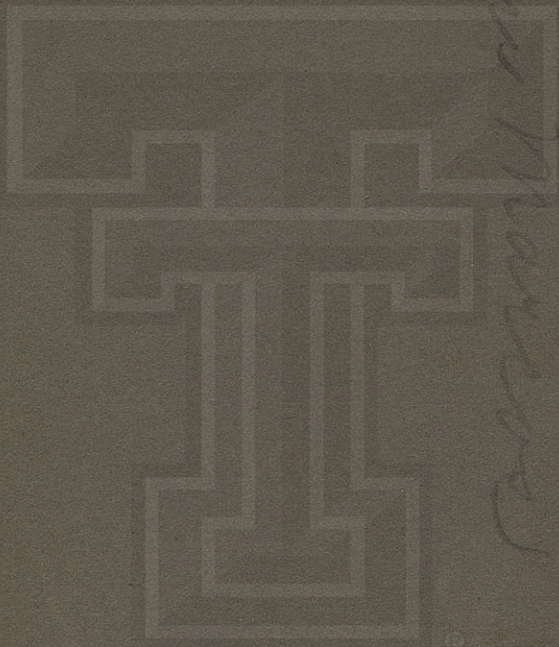

City Pioneer William Malone Succumbs at 88

William Malone, a member of a pioneer Texas family and himself a pioneer of the early development of Houston, died Thursday afternoon in the home of his daughter, Mrs. W. L. Thaxton of 2509 Riverside.

MR. MALONE came to Houston in 1906. In that year the construction of the railroad between Cleburne and Houston was completed by the Trinity and Brazos Valley Railway company, which was incorporated in 1902 by Mr. Malone, Col. E. M. House and R. H. Baker.

The railway company is now known as the Burlington-Rock Island Railroad company, which operates between Houston and Dallas.

Mr. Malone was born on Feb. 5, 1860, in San Marcos, where his grandfathers had settled in 1846 and where they were leaders in the area's development. A member of the first class at Texas A. & M. college when the school was opened in 1876, Mr. Malone was one of two living men who had been in that class.

LOYAL TO his school and its traditions, Mr. Malone had never missed a Texas A. & M. football game in Houston since moving here. He had served as a member of the board of directors of the college in 1895.

Active in the early real estate development of Houston, Mr. Malone opened the Montrose addition in 1910 in association with J. W. Link and H. B. Jackson. The development was the first large residential addition in Houston.

In 1883 Mr. Malone married Miss Julia McLeod, daughter of James and Julia Wynne McLeod. Mrs. Malone's grandfather and grandmother, Archibald and Martha Wynne, settled in Houston in 1837. Mrs. Malone died in 1942.

FUNERAL SERVICES for Mr. Malone will be held in the cemetery at San Marcos at 4 p. m. Friday.

His survivors include two sons, Clarence M. Malone of Houston and Clayton E. Malone of Weslaco; his daughter, Mrs. Glenora Malone Thaxton of Houston; eight grandchildren, Mrs. Mildred Ryman of Lufkin, C. M. Malone Jr., Alice Malone, Dorothy Malone, W. L. Thaxton Jr., and Mrs. Betsy Thaxton Jackson, all of Houston, William Malone II and Nancy Malone, both of Weslaco; eight great-grandchildren; and three sisters, Miss B. Malone, Mrs. David Combs and Mrs. Zoe Talbot, all of San Marcos.

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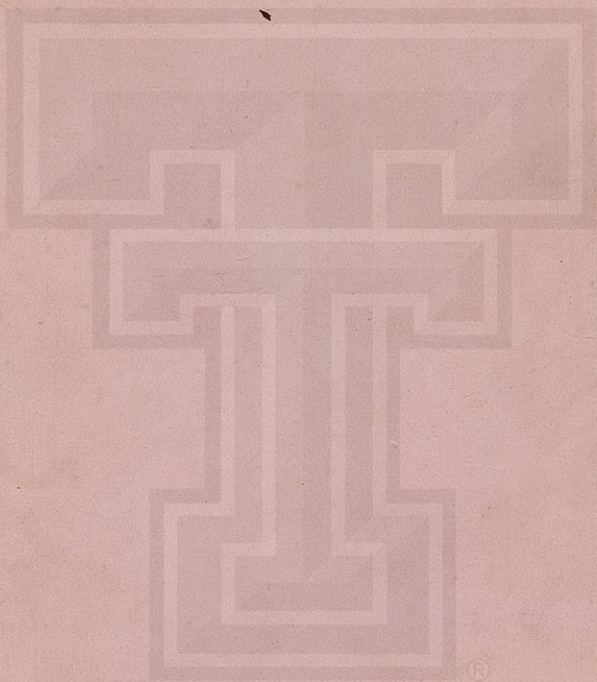

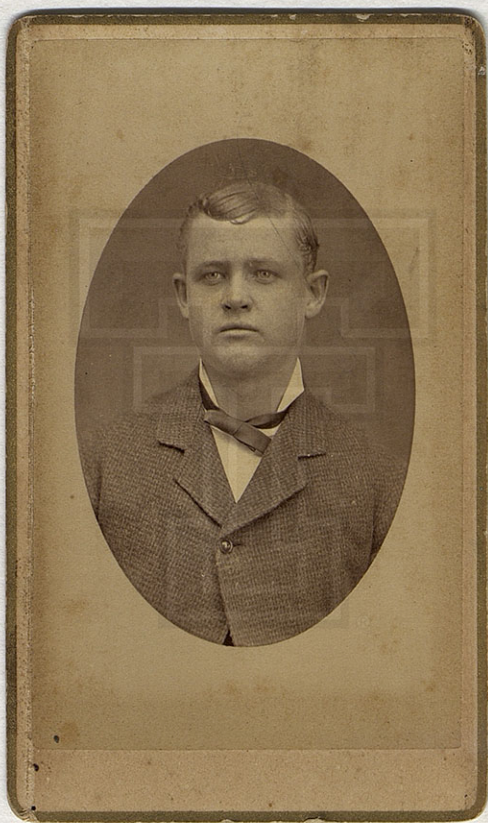

Funeral Set Monday For C. M. Malone

Funeral services for Clarence M. Malone, 75, one of Texas' most noted leaders in finance and agriculture, will be held at 11 a.m. Monday at St. Luke's Methodist Church.

A Houston resident 55 years, Malone died Friday in his home at 4 Westlane.
