If you're a really serious Texas music collector, you should have Long the Chicago House's Open Mike thoroughbreds, Jimmy LaFave has this song on a 1966 Texas Plainsmen 45, put out by the band's own Big Springs label, Plainsman. If you're willing to compromise, you might settle for the 1975 single put out by Don Walser & The Country Edition on RoRo Records of Hereford (near Lubbock), the version on the Henry's Bar & Grill jukebox. But if you don't want to spend the rest of your life scouring West Texas garage sales, you can just go up to Musicmania and get it on Singing Pure Texas, the first independent cassette put out by Don Walser's Pure Texas Band featuring Jimmy Day, or maybe wait for Music City Texas—The Album on import CD. One way or another, you do need to hear a recorded version because it's impossible to transcribe the extraordinary yodelling breaks that make this one of Walser's most popular tunes. THE RUNNERS

Emily Kaitz • Appealing if eccentric performer, but her record, a few outings over the Chameleon's, Pappy's and Chicago House courses, while long and varied, reveals little about her stamina over the distance. Likely to show well early but fade in the home stretch.

Barb Donovan • Powerful and intelligent workhorse with strong personality, has displayed winning form as an occasional substitute host. Seasoned, consistent runner with steady pace, shows well in rough going. Lillian Standfield • Similar to Donovan with more experience under poor conditions. Comes smoothly out of the gate, maintains good pace, shrugs off jostling, finishes strongly. Short on recent Open Mike experience Susan Colton • Open Mike maiden accustomed to running in team events. Shows well in these, but given the special rigors of solo hosting, she may find difficulty hitting her stride.

Susan Lindfors • Another maiden, her temperament seems ill-suited to this particularly hazardous track and she may well balk at some of the tougher

obstacles. As we turfsters say, "Nice fillies finish last."

Beth Galiger • Reliable pacesetter for others, may have trouble when pacing herself. Handicapped by very little solo/front running experience. Teri Joyce • Sturdy and spirited regularette at amateur meets, likely to put pressure on the front runners. May well provide an upset.

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

Junior: Hi Dad, it's me.

If, as reported, Massey's major label debut friends. He might need them on his way out the revolving door. Massey seems upset about MCT's criticisms of the production, odd since he's also been heard to acknowledge that his last independent cassette, Slow Study, was a better record.

Last issue we reviewed their Amazing CD and now we hear that they're off to tour with Little Feat. But I worry when I learn they may also be opening for The Allman Brothers. Seems they're destined to work with bands whose reason to exist died long ago.
- Oh God, not another family band? At least man Pat's Dutch sound engineer tells to turn Jo Carol Pierce had the decency to acquire her outstanding guitar accompanist by marriage (Dan Yates is wed to Jo Carol and Jimmie Dale Gilmore's daughter Elyse), but David Rodriguez is rubbing people's noses in the reality of genetics, playing with his daughter Carrie, or rather Scarrie, Rodriguez. Starting this month, and until December 2nd, bands can submit applications for 1992 SXSW Showcases. Last year I volunteered some time in the office and ended up spending most of my tenure opening, sorting and processing Showcase submission packets. In the interest of the economy, ecology and efficiency of the whole process, here are a few hints that will help your application:

• Forget the fancy folders, color-coordinated mailing envelopes and all that stuff. I love to look at them, but they have to be taken apart and all the excess discarded. Do put the application form, submission fee (not cash), one black & white publicity picture, the best of your reviews and your promotional information in a plain manilla folder—that's where it will all end up anyway, and the office volunteers will love your sensitivity and awareness.

• Don't bother to send more than one sample of your product. You can send a tape, CD, LP and/or video, but be sure it is cued up to play the cut you most want listeners to hear—you may only get a few seconds, so the raters may not get past that dynamite guitar lead to hear the great song it introduces.

• Don't send xerox copies of every mention of your name in print, just the best of the lot. Nobody cares if you are constantly in local listings (unless you have no other press). Do use a good copier; illegible copies are just a waste of trees and postage.

• Please omit cellophane wrappings on your products; they are ecologically unnecessary, the devil to remove and so forth.

• Finally, as obvious as it may seem, label every piece you submit with your band name, contact name, contact phone # and mailing address. Tapes should have at least band name and expense of sending off Showcase submissions that lack even this basic information. I just sigh, "Survival of the fittest," and toss them in the Too Dumb To Live file.

ON SXSW SUBMISSIONS AND HOLLY DUNN

Recently there's been a dust devil of controversy surrounding San Antonian Holly Dunn's song and video, Maybe I Mean Yes, which perpetuates the pernicious sexual myth that when a woman says NO, she really means Maybe. While people aware that one woman in four has been, or will be, a victim of date rape screamed, the Statesman's Don McLeese opined that debate on this type of issue should take place in the marketplace rather than as "censorship" demands that the tune be dropped

from radio playlists.

· Unfortunately, while marketplace pressures might be appropriate in a truly democratic capitalism of educated and aware consumers, goodness knows we're far from that at this time in America, and that same marketplace is the major purveyor of our culture's sexual and social myths. This is the marketplace that refused to allow Clint Black's realistic view of domestic violence on CMT or even consider promotion of a single release of Rosanne Cash's cover of Eliza Gilkyson's Rosie Strikes Back (also about refusing to be battered by one's mate) because of their "controversial" nature, even though the artists wanted to have the songs call attention to the social problem among wider audiences.

• But though establishment support for this and other social myths are a real problem, woman to woman, my question to Holly Dunn is why in hell did you chose this song? My real disappointment is that Ms Dunn doesn't have a better understanding of this concept and all it implies. She must a] be out of touch with the sensibilities of women in the 90s or b] have absolutely no power of decision in her career or c] be

incredibly dense—not a good choice among them.

• I take this issue very seriously, but I am heartened by the phone #. Every year several somebodies go to the trouble and practical philosophy of Honest John, who tells me that many men do understand, all too well, that when a woman says NO, she invariably means NO, and when she says Maybe, she probably means NO. later. 
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

• Bad Attitude, edited by Chris Carlsson with Mark Ledger (Verso, \$19.95), is a collection of essays, poetry, graphics and other stuff composed by folks who are pretty sick of standards themselves—labor standards that is. RECORD & TAPE REVIEWS

JIMMY DAY FOR JIMMY DAY FANS ONLY

(J&M Productions, cassette)

Twenty two rare recordings by the legendary steel guitarist, from his very first single (Rippin' Out/Blue Wind) to a radio talk with DJ Fontana about playing with Elvis Presley (get the title?) on The Lousiana Hayride in 1954 plus Tweedle Dee from that show. Other highlights include Bud's Bounce and Steelin' Home with Jim Reeves' Blueboys, Somebody Else Is Taking My Place with Ray Price on vocals, and Fancy Pants with Floyd Cramer on piano, both men's first big hit. There's a book to written about Day, but to call this tape's liner notes minimal would be to pass up a perfect opportunity to use the word skeletal. However, the lack of information dodges the tricky issue of identifying the "Friend"(s) on several tracks, some of whom are obvious when you hear the tape and easy to work out in advance if you know enough about the career of a master instrumentalist who has played and recorded with Lefty Frizzell, Ray Price, George Jones, Patsy Cline, the Everly Brothers, Willie Nelson, Johnny Bush and many, many others—you could stock a juke box with country classics that all featured Day's steel guitar wizardry. Great playing, real country music and don't take the title seriously—if you aren't a fan, it's because you've not heard Jimmy Day.

DON WALSER SINGS MORE PURE TEXAS WITH JIMMY DAY & THE PURE TEXAS BAND

(Sight & Sound SW, cassette)

"I hate yodelling, but I'd cross six lanes of heavy traffic to listen to Don Walser." Thus Olin Murrell, member of the ever-growing Walser cult that includes Jo Carol Pierce, Troy Campbell, Barbara Clark ("I have heard Don Walser vodel, therefore I am") and Sarah Elizabeth Campbell ("my hero"), and of which JC is proud to be an evangelist. Fortuitously recorded before steel guitar maestro Jimmy Day took off for Nashville, this tape follows the Singing Pure Texas blueprint; four Walser originals, Country (Begging To You, Curtain In The Window, Love Me) and Western (Big Ball In Cow Town, All Around Cowboy) classics and, though dashes of his brilliant yodelling abound, two set-pieces (Chime Bells and Walser's Yodel Polka). I can't be doing with Walser's Dixie Blues—even for a singer this good, Presley and Berry make a horrible rhyme—but his other songs, especially You, are gems. The Pure Texas sound, given an added dimension by the twin fiddle (with Howard Kalish) of 16-year-old prodigy Jason Roberts, is uncompromisingly hard country and if there's a better male voice in Austin, I for one don't know of it.

TOM PACHECO

EAGLE IN THE RAIN

(Ringsend Road, import CD/cassette)

SUNFLOWERS & SCARECROWS

(Round Tower, import CD/cassette) Like Butch Hancock, with whom he often shared a stage before leaving Austin in the early 80s, Pacheco could be thought of as Dylan living in the real world. But while he also sees the romance of the commonplace, Hancock's "perfection in the mud," he's much bleaker, with marginalised characters in the Terry Allen vein, more socio-political, even polemical, recalling Harry Chapin, while his love songs can have an Eric Andersen or Steve Goodman feel. This isn't to say, however, that Pacheco is some kind of Dylan/Hancock/Allen/ Chapin/Andersen/Goodman synthesis. These are merely cross-bearings to locate a man who's powerfully and distinctively talented in his own right. Now living in the Republic of Ireland, he recorded Eagle there with all star Irish musicians led by producer Arty McGlynn, the rockier, hard-driving Sunflowers in London with Austin recorded accordion overdubs by Flaco Jimenez. Both albums display Pacheco's versatile songwriting scope, from The Last Blue Whale In The Ocean to Jesus In A Leather Jacket, Hippy On The Highway to Midnite Waters Of The Rio Grande, a revisiting of Deportee and my personal favorite.

DOC MASON & GOOD MEDICINE WE GOT OUR DANCIN' SHOES ON

(Road's End, cassette)

From out Fredericksburg way, a country band that usually doesn't get much closer than Luckenbach (whose general manager, Lydia Hays, helped with the evocative wrap design), except that they came into town to record at MARS with Charlie Hollis. They're known, if at all, in Austin because David Halley is their big gig lead guitarist. Which makes you think, well, how bad can they be? Halley isn't on this 1990 tape, but this is still a very solid honky tonk unit whose saving grace is that all the material is original, and if you know anything about the country bands out on the fringes of Civilization As We Know It (ie Austin), you'll realize this is a very big plus. Ten songs are by Mason, with Jimmy Christian, who shares lead and harmony vocals with him, contributing two more, and though some are fair to average retreads of familiar themes, competent if uninspired, both men do have their moments. Mason's title track, A Melancholy Man and Oh, Never Mind (It's Just An Old Song) and Christian's Grown Ups At Play are superior roadhouse fare, well delivered and, as always with MARS products, produced to a T. JC

LAURIE FREELOVE SMELLS LIKE TRUTH

(Chrysalis/Ensign, import cassette/CD) This release is getting lots of ink of late and for good reason. We're not altogether surprised since it was MCT's review of the preceding EP-length independent release that brought Freelove to Ensign's attention a year ago last March. No one else sounds or thinks quite like her. The unusual orchestration is one reason she employs aboriginal instruments, hi-tech wizardry and something called a waterphone in a deft mixture to support her intelligent lyrics and unusual voice. She's going to be compared with Laurie Anderson, David Byrne and other pioneering, experimental spirits, but how does one compare iconoclasts? It's interesting also that Freelove is another instance of European music producers being willing to take risks on talent—in this case, an artist with absolutely no hints of Texas roots—that the US industry would have no idea what to do with. The title cut is my favorite, mostly because it is based on the soul-stirring sounds of Paul Taylor on the bull-roarer and didjeridoo, providing the perfect setting for Laurie's voice (and vice versa). Each cut, however, stands easily on its own while the whole provides a seamless flow of interesting sounds. It is going to be interesting to watch what Ensign does with this extraordinary offering from one of Austin's steller, and most innovative, talents.

LIVE AT URBAN CAMPFIRES

(JOR, cassette)

An unamplified solo live recording, handed over with the observation, "I was feeling like shit that night, so it's really bassy." Urban Campfires is a San Antonio operation that puts on house concerts, ie performances in members' homes, a phenomenon more common in California, the mid-West and North-East than in Texas, so much so that when they approached Standfield, her first response was "What's a house concert?" This is their first, fairly limited, release, and while they have a thing or three to learn about tape editing, they could hardly go far wrong with the basic set-up, especially with a performer as dynamic as Standfield. Even off-peak, she delivers 14 of her first class originals, ranging freely between blues, ballads, country, R&B and what can only be called 'Standfield noise,' including a children's horror song, with power and passion. Interspersed with Standfield's special brand of sardonic humor (and the odd phone call), the relaxed atmosphere makes for an engaging catch-up with her material and performing style, though a full blown studio album, with her band, is in the works and due out in November, which should really define one of Austin's most powerful singers and songwriters.

RECORD & TAPE REV

CRITICAL MASS SMALL PLANET

(Could B U Music, cassette)

Guess you'd put this Houston band in the This group's humor always seduces me right alternative rock category—heavy on urgent guitar licks, dead-pan vocals and pounding backbeats. The socio-political lyric content of most cuts is considerably more intelligent and less didactic than is often the case, setting them apart from the considerable 'alternative' pack and it's refreshing to hear sly humor (Time Of sound as creative as their songs, they'd stand a better chance of rising to the top, but, as they'd likely agree, everything is evolutionary, so I plan to keep an ear on how this particular Critical Mass develops.

JERIN LYNN • LONGINGS

(independent cassette)

my interest much, but these simple piano solos provided a welcome diversion in recent weeks. My friend says parts of this tape make her of Dylan, Townes Van Zandt, Guy Clark and cry—the good kind of tears, the ones that arise the artist's producer (and sometime co-writer) because your deepest emotions have somehow been touched. Lynn started out as an accordion player (winning a world championship as a teenager), was a Nashville session musician, played in a rock band and directed musical productions, but here he shines as a composer whose piano stylings are exceptional. JIM SCARBOROUGH

(Giraffe Entertainment, cassette)

A recent transplant from LA, this singer/ songwriter (formerly of la-la land circuit heroes The Road Scholars), offers 12 tunes, backed by LA session men, that show a diversity of style that should fit right in with Austin's eclectic mix. Although nothing here blew me away, lyrics, vocals and arrangements are clean, professional and way better than the majority of the Top 40. Lyrics are well-crafted, but the content is limited and though the occasional line shines out, my impression is that Scarborough still needs to find his particular songwriting niche. He's currently playing local clubs, and it may be interesting to watch him as he gets Austinized.

ERIC CHAPELLE PATTERNS ON REFLECTION

(Hamsa Music, cassette)

It's not often, Gawd knows, that you find MCT at a loss for words, but Chapelle's electroinstrumental tape really has us stumped, seperately and collectively. Titles like Reflection Of Inner Growth, and Serene Place Remembered menacingly signal New Age, but it's not so much vacuous mood music as lightweight avant-garde techno-classical, less confrontational than Stockhausen, less intricate than Berio and possibly quite good of its kind, but that just ain't our kind. Sorry Eric.

POOR YORICK LET'S ALL BE NORMAL

(independent cassette EP)

One thing that's always puzzled me—what's the Canadian River doing in Texas?

EN MASSE A BEGINNING . . .

(Synthadelic Sounds, cassette EP)

This new, young Austin quartet is worth keeping an ear on. Their aptly-titled 3-song debut reveals a sound that is well on the way to being their own, and the group creativity is further evident in the words they've coined to describe their music (synthadelic) and this product (cassingle). They aim to be playing around locally, so plan to check them out, especially if you like Depeche Mode, Living Color or Aerosmith.

INSTRUMENTS CRAMMED INTO INFINITY

(Rockville Records, CD)

Boy, has this one been a long time coming! Originally intended as the band's third release on Austin's own Rabid Cat Records, Crammed got lost when the label went under. It took Rockville Records of New York to wise up to the fact that these guys are really good. But at last Crammed is out and it's been worth the wait. I hope for their sake the fickle Austin crowds haven't forgotten that TI adds a lot to the credibility of the local scene. The album was produced by Spot and recorded when TI was but a three piece (having since added Clay Daniel as a second guitar player) and, in typical TI fashion, the songwriting is great. This album, however, is more rock and roll than the previous efforts—I mean, it doesn't even have any Dylan covers! Ten tracks are included, nine of them originals, all solid. Check out the title track, Don't Force Me (To Force You) and Walking Question Mark. I feel the band is really coming into it's own and predict the next release is going to be The One To Watch For. Buy this so they can keep making records! Ric

SPIRITS & TRAINS WINDOW PAIN

(independent cassette)

I've been fortunate enough to obtain an advance copy of the band's new six song cassette, their second release since moving to Austin from Vancouver, B.C., and its a good one. While comparisons to REM are inevitable, the similarities don't overwhelm the differences. Like REM, S&T has a gift for lyrical, listenable vocal harmonies and solid song forms, but unlike REM, the songs have an edge all their own. Not buried in folksy trappings and instrumentations, the songs are clearly rock and roll. Further, S&T is not dependent on one strong personality to define their style. There's a good balance of talents and abilities. As you might have figured, I like this cassette and recommend it. My personal favorite is Please Don't Cry with Gypsy (Ode to Soosie) a close second. Can they do it live? I don't know, but I'm going to make an effort to find out. Ric

CHRIS WHITLEY LIVING WITH THE LAW


(Columbia, CD/cassette)


In a turnabout switcheroo, Ireland, which has demonstrated a strong partiality to Texas artists, is sending us one of its own, albeit one who was an Austin resident for several years. Apart from a SXSW showcase earlier this year, folk-rock balladeer TOM PACHECO's performance at Chicago House on September 29th will be his first appearance here since he left town in the early 80s. Even then a cult figure with three legendary RCA albums, two of them produced by Shadow Morton. behind him, Pacheco, originally from Massachusetts, has lived in the Republic of Ireland since 1987 and has developed a whole new, fanatical following there. Signed to Irish label Ringsend Road, he's produced two more albums (see Reviews) that can only enhance his considerable reputation, the 1990 Eagle In The Rain making, and even topping, a number of Record of the Year lists. Whether Austin remembers him from his headliner days here a decade ago remains to be seen, but MCT is proud to be sponsoring a performance by a great songwriter and performer who on one occasion was ble to look out into the audience and see Bob Dylan, Linda Ronstadt, Steve Earle and Loudon Wainwright III.



Your average musician isn't known for paying much attention to international news, but some Austin blues artists have been paying real close attention to the recent rumbles in Russia, because mid-September they're scheduled to fly there for the ARCTIC BORDER BLUES FESTIVAL. Time was the big benefits were for marginally viable African and Asian backetcase countries and it might seem a bit odd for Austin musicians to be donating time and talent to aid the Evil Empire itself. But after a Norwegian relief organization reported an imminent famine in Russia's north-west, Rock For Russia started putting together a special effort for the region. Organised at this end by Eddy Stout of PeeWee Records, the line-up for a series of shows in town squares, schools and even a mine, in Murmansk and other cities, includes Lou Ann Barton, Mike Kindred, Derek O'Brien, Mark Kazanoff, Rev Horton Heat and the Texas Harmonica Rumble mob along with Russian, British and Norwegian artists. The Festival runs from September 19-25, and there'll be a going away party, featuring all the players, at the 31 Club on September 15th.



Rubye Blevins is coming to town! No? How about PATSY MONTANA? Born in Hot Springs, Arkanas in 1914, Rubye dropped out of college to go into show biz, naming herself Rubye Montana after Monty Montana, the world's champion yodeller. Working with two other girls as The Montana Cowgirls, her name change was completed on air by Stuart Hamblen who dubbed her Patsy in honor of her Irish looks. Through the 30s and 40s "The Yodeling Cowgirl" was the biggest attraction of the WLS Barn Dance, the most popular country radio show outside the South, and in 1935 she released the song with which her name will always be associated, I Want To Be A Cowboy's Sweetheart, the first big country hit by a woman, the first record by a woman to sell a million copies and a virtuoso display of yodeling whose influence can still be felt. Guess what Marcia Ball sang on her first single? 1935, let alone 1914, is a while back; after a long, successful career, with over 200 singles and dozens of albums, Montana starting cutting back in the 60s, though college age fans rediscovered her and kept her busy during the 70s and 80s. But when she came to Austin last year for a Texas Connection taping and some live appearances, she proved that even at 76 and having to pace herself, she can still cut it. A wonderful, natural performer. At Waterloo Ice House (6th/Lamar) on September 13th and 14th, she'll be backed and supported by rockabilly trio High Noon, fresh back from their tour of Finland.
