To the Commander and Comrades of R. E. Lee Camp, 158, U. C. V.

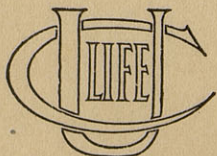
Once more your organization and the community at large, is made poorer in the death of a distinguished citizen, comrade, and soldier — Dr. J. L. Isaacs — who recently passed over the River to dwell with the Immortals.

He was born in Dickens County, Alabama, in May 1826. He afterwards lived some years in Mississippi, and prior to the War between the States removed to Arkansas.

His war record as dictated by himself reads as follows:- "I assisted in the organization of a Company in Saline County, Arkansas, and was elected second lieutenant, L. H. Mooney being captain. Our company became a part of the 11th Arkansas Infantry. Col. J. M. Smith commanding the regiment appointed me his staff surgeon, in which capacity I served until the regiment was captured at Island No. 10, or Madrid Bend. Being sick at the time I escaped capture. So soon, however, as I was able I reported for duty and was assigned to a position in the Overton Hospital, Memphis, Tennessee. After serving for sometime there, I was ordered to report for duty to General Bragg's headquarters at Corinth, Miss., where Dr. A. J. Ford, surgeon and medical director, assigned me to hospital duty on the Mobile and Ohio Rail Road. I established hospitals and put them in working order at Gun Town and at Tupelo, Miss. which was subsequently the headquarters of the army. I was never engaged in any important battles except as surgeon."

This simple plain statement of our comrade's services in the Confederate Army, demonstrates, not only his learning and skill in his chosen profession, but, his high order of executive ability and his devotion to the Southern Cause as well.

He removed to Texas in 1879; and was for many years a useful and honored citizen of this city, giving to humanity the benefit of an active service in the heal-

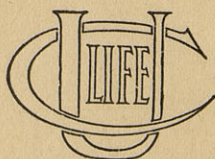
