McElroy said that the most important objectives of the meeting in relation to Texas Tech were in determining the role of educational television in academic programs at the college and university level, and discussions of ways to raise the instructional level while effecting economies.

The public is invited to inspect the new facilities for 808 women between 3 and 5 p.m. The dormitories are located off 19th Street and Boston.

Built at a cost of \$3,375,000, the two units incorporate most of 52 suggestions for improved facilities recommended by the Women's Residence Council at Tech.

Each hall contains one wing six stories high, connected to another wing four stories high. The two halls are joined by a common lounge, dining hall and kitchen area.

Interior design of the lounge includes quarry tile floors, marble columns, patterned stone, walnut paneling and two fountain and pool areas.

At each end of the common lounge is a balcony, designed as an informal lounge available to guests as well as hall residents.

The dining hall provides a view through the lounge area and large windows overlooking a landscaped view to the south.

Architects are Associated Architects of Lubbock. Construction is by H. A. Lott Co. of Houston.

Built for \$3,375,000, the two new halls incorporate most of 52 suggestions for improved facilities recommended by the Women's Residence Council at Tech.

The outside of the structures is designed to blend with nearby buildings on the Tech campus. The face brick, stone treatment, and the warm color of red roof tiles have been used to maintain harmony with neighboring buildings.

The arch forms in the extensive arcade further tie the new halls into the Spanish Renaissance architecture of the campus.

The courtyards, confined by raised retaining walls offer a private area for sunbathing and outdoor study. Forward of the arcades is a garden, planned to contain seating areas under shade trees.

The new halls are located off Boston and 19th.

LUBBOCK--A long-time friend of Texas Tech, Miss Evelyn Oppenheimer of Dallas, has donated the original manuscript, galley proofs and a first edition of her book to Tech's Southwest Collection.

Miss Oppenheimer, widely known critic, made the presentation of "Book Reviewing for an Audience" to the Collection in recognition of the fact that she taught at Tech, giving the first course of its kind on techniques of oral book reviewing.

At that time, in the summer of 1957, a course in oral book reviewing had not been offered anywhere in the United States. She began it through the adult education program at Tech as "techniques in professional oral book review and lectures," and went on to teach similar courses at the University of Texas and other schools.

Born in Dallas, Miss Oppenheimer attended the University of Chicago, where she was a Phi Beta Kappa. She worked in communications in Chicago for a while, then returned to her native Dallas, where she began her career of oral reviewing.

Miss Oppenheimer's book reviews, broadcast each Sunday on KRLD radio in Dallas, are the oldest sponsored book programs on the air in the United States.

"Book Reviewing for an Audience" was published by Chilton Company, book division. The Florida State department of education has given her book official recommendation to its teaching personnel.

In accepting the donation, Sylvan Dunn, director of the Southwest Collection, said, "We are indeed grateful to receive this valuable donation. We are always glad to get original manuscripts, and especially so, when the book has such a close relationship to the history of the College."

"Miss Oppenheimer is an established authority in her field," he added, "And her manuscript is indeed a welcome addition to the collection."

LUBBOCK--West Texas businessmen will gather Thursday and Friday (Oct. 24-25) at Texas Tech to witness the debut of a new computer which utilizes solar cells to read information directly into its memory.

The computer, an IBM 1440 data processing system, will be demonstrated in Tech's Data Processing Center to approximately 300 industry leaders.

The demonstration is being sponsored jointly by the Tech Center and International Business Machines Corporation.

The new computer incorporates disk storage drives designed with interchangeable packs, each containing six magnetic memory disks for a combined storage capacity of nearly three million characters of information.

The demonstration will include billing, accounts receivable, inventory, sales analysis, and accounting systems for mortgage and loan, savings and loan and demand deposit.

The machine will read 400 punched cards a minute using a solar cell unit. Characters are read or written at the rate of 77,000 a second. Printed reports can be generated as fast as 600 lines a minute.

Quilliam, who is serving his second term in the Texas House of Representatives, received state-wide attention during the last legislative session when a bill came before the House on a "special government course" to be set up by the legislature and taught in the public schools.

Quilliam's speech during debate on the bill brought him a standing ovation from fellow House members, and widespread praise from the editorial pages of major Texas newspapers. On the final vote, Quilliam's amendment to the bill passed overwhelmingly.

An outspoken proponent of Texas' goal for excellence in higher education, Quilliam has been a part time instructor in business law at Tech during several semesters. He was named Outstanding Freshman Legislator during his first term in the House in 1961.

which came in the last session as a result of these hearings, and his resulting amendment which received widespread publicity following its passage in the House.

Quilliam said that there are three groups which, above all others, must stand firm against the censors if we are to continue to have freedom of thought in this country.

"I represent one of these groups--persons in political and governmental positions. You as journalists represent another--the architects of the written word. The third group is the teachers and educators."

He concluded, "God give us all the strength to protect this most precious of liberties."

LUBBOCK---State Representative Reed Quilliam of Lubbock warned Thursday (Oct. 24) of "committees of vigilantes practicing censorship by fear" in an address on censorship to Texas Tech journalism students in the Tech Union.

Quilliam described these persons as "always in favor of the right to read when their own opinions are presented in print, but who would not permit the reading of thoughts which challenge their own power and place in society."

"These persons do not understand," Quilliam said, "That when a writer, particularly a textbook writer, examines problems or imperfections of our political and economic systems, he is not being disloyal to our country, but rather seeking a way to improve it."

"Censorship of the written word should, in the lexicon of our democracy, be final crime against intelligence, the most inexcusable assault in the temple of free speech," he continued.

More than 50 persons attended the luncheon meeting, sponsored by Theta Sigma Phi and Sigma Delta Chi, men's and women's professional journalism societies.

Following a brief history of the forms of censorship, Quilliam described the events and committee hearings from 1960 to 1963 when textbook "investigations" were conducted in various areas throughout the state.

The Lubbock legislator traced the developments in the bill

DALLAS--Most Texans should expect below-average rainfall in more than half the years, Texas Tech Agriculture Dean Gerald Thomas told the Texas Agricultural Workers Association here today (Oct. 31).

"Drouth of a temporary and sometimes prolonged nature is a common occurrence," he pointed out, "We are now well into another drouth period."

Dr. Thomas said no statistically significant drouth patterns have been found within the period of recorded data. However, there are tree-ring counts and other techniques for examining data prior to the weather bureau's establishment. These may yield additional information of long term cycles.

Speaking on variation in climate and vegetation of Texas, Dean Thomas also said:

It might be that some trial and error techniques in crop production could be planned more effectively if agricultural scientists and technicians had a better understanding of native vegetational patterns.

Texas provides a habitat for more than 4,600 species of vascular plants. More than 60 per cent of the genera and more than 40 per cent of the species of all U.S. grasses are represented in Texas.

Highest rainfall is in extreme east Texas, with annual averages over 55 inches. Precipitation gradually decreases from east to west, with the average at El Paso less than 8 inches.

The average frost free period ranges from 179 days in the northwestern Panhandle to 330 days along the Gulf Coast.
