Today I finally received a letter from Ruben Ruiz, giving permission to publish "Mantos y Palmas" (Hosanna). I am enclosing a photocopy of the letter and a translation.

In my first letter to him, I said, "...your song [Mantos y palmas] is sung enthusiastically in many part of the United States, and now it is going to be included in the new hymnal of the United Methodist Church, but with some changes in the words of the translation.

"The editors inform me that I should have asked for your permission to translate it when Celebremos II was published. I ask your pardon, and ask you to give me this permission now."

In my letter of Dec. 19 to Mr. Ruiz, I specifically asked for permission to translate (permiso para traducir). In his reply he does not use the word "translate", but gives permission to publish, and then goes on to give performance suggestions. He also refers to the "Celebremos" hymnal, instead of the hymnal I mentioned.

The whole tone of the letter, however, says, "Go right ahead, you have my permission." I hope these matters will not hold things up any longer.

Translation of letter from Ruben Ruiz to Gertrude Suppe - Dec. 20, 1987
Dear sister Gertrude:

Please pardon me for not answering you before. I have been very much pressed by my work, without having time to do the most important things (those of the Kingdom of God).

It gives me great pleasure to know that what God has given me is being used to praise him in other parts of the world (now his useless servant can breathe again). You [plural] have my permission to publish it. The original wording is as follows. Later I made changes which I authorize:

1. MANTOS Y PALMAS ESPARCIENDO VA. EL PUEBLO ALEGRE DE JERUSALEM. ALLA A LO LEJOS SE EMPIEZA A MIRAR EN UN POLLINO AL HIJO DEL REY.

MIENTRAS MIL VOCES RESUENAN POR DOQUIER HOSANA AL QUE VIENE EN EL NOMBRE DEL SENOR CON UN ALIENTO DE GRAN EXCLAMACION PRORRUMPEN CON VOZ TRIUNFAL HOSANA HOSANA AL REY HOSANA HOSANA AL REY.

Note: The manner of singing is like this:

Begin with "Hosana, hosana al rey" (the second part of the refrain). Afterward the women continue singing the same "Hosana, hosana al rey". While the men sing verse No. 1, afterward they unite in the complete refrain, and the men continue with "Hosana, hosana al rey." While the women sing the second verse. And at the end they unite in the refrain (which begins softly and finishes loud)

Finally, I want to tell you, sister, that you [plural] can use the original version or the corrected one in the Celebremos hymnal.

"Mantos y palmas" AKA "Filled with excitement"

For several years I have been puzzled about the fact that the translation I made for the second verse of "Mantos y palmas", as it appears in the Supplement, does not say the same as the Spanish that is printed there.

The question came up again when I received the letter dated Dec. 20, 1987, from the composer, Ruben Ruiz, which I sent on to you. In it he includes the text of the song, which matches my translation in the Supplement.

This morning the answer came to me at last.

In his letter he also says, "The following text is the original. Later changes were made which I authorized...You may use the original version or the changed one in the hymnal..."

The only thing that concerns me now is: If the Spanish text is to be used in the hymnal, the second verse should not be the one that appears in his letter. It does not match the English text.

Instead, the Spanish words should be used which appear in Celebremos II and the Supplement. This is the version we worked with in the Hispanic Consultation, which is:

"Como en la entrada de Jerusalen todos cantamos a Jesus el Rey, al Cristo vivo que nos llama hoy para seguirle con amor y fe."

Raquel is setting up the meeting, and will be joined by Roy Barton and a representative from MARCHA, San Antonio.

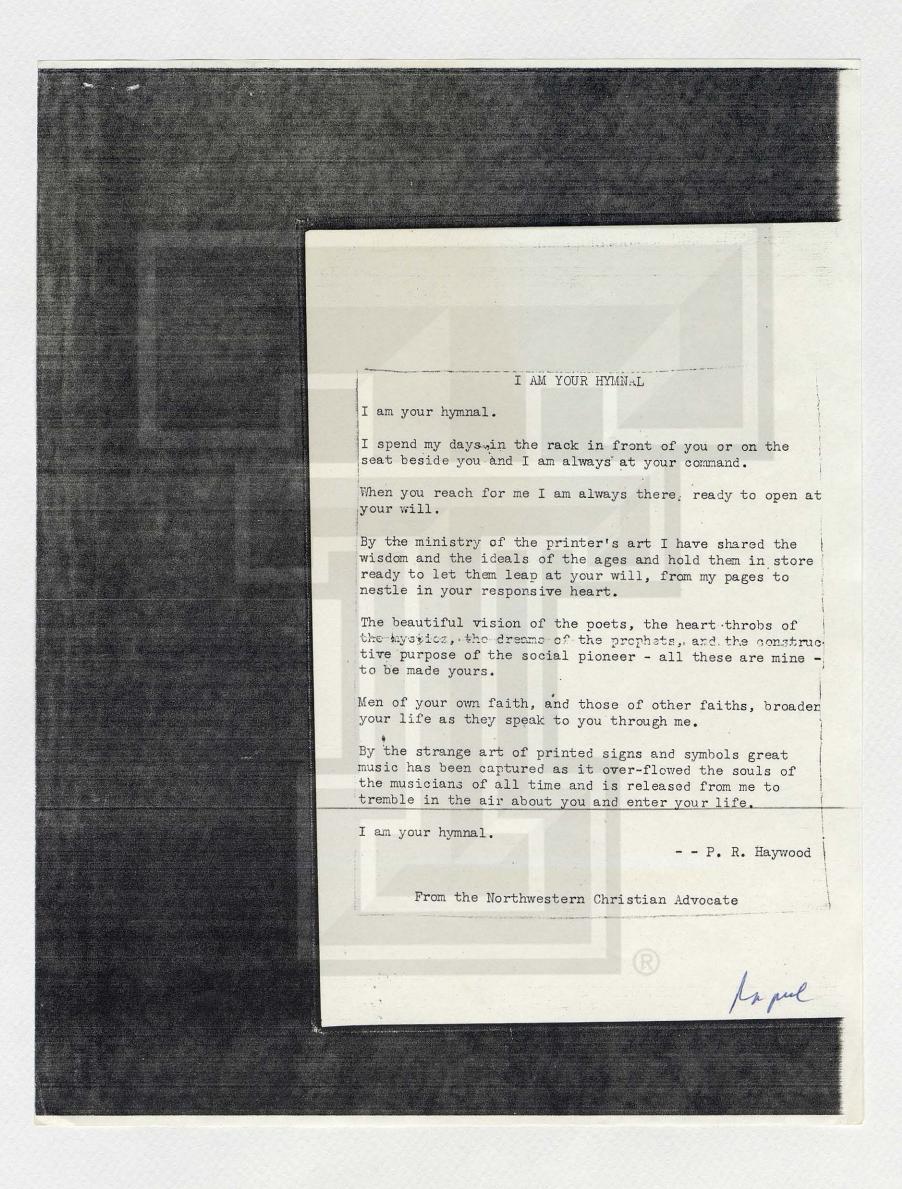

Popular children's hymn cut

Panel says reference to races offensive

Hymn verses offensive to speechimpaired people and ethnic minorities continue to get the third degree from the United Methodist hymnal revision committee, which wraps up a weeklong meeting here today.

The 25-member committee voted to exclude the popular children's song Jesus Loves the Little Children from the new hymnal partly because its reference to races as "red and yellow, black and white" offends some and excludes others.

"Most Asians don't want to be called yellow," committee member Hope Kawashima, a Japanese-American from Flushing, N.Y., said yesterday.

"It has bad connotations. Yellow means cowardice. If anything, we'd prefer gold, golden or tan. A song like that can make children too color-conscious. But children tend to accept that we all children of God. Children aren't as color-conscious as adults."

A Hispanic committee member, Raquel Achon of Long Beach, Calif., said the array of colors in the song does not include a place for brown people.

Committee members also agreed to leave the song out of the new hymnal because it is so popular and easy to learn that adults will teach it to children in Sunday schools, regardless.

It is not included in the current denominational hymnal, the 1966 Book of Hymns, which the new hymnal is designed to replace.

The committee's sensitivity to language that might offend minorities points up the panel's attempts to demonstrate an openness to diversity within the 9.2 million-member denomination, members said, despite sometimes strident criticism from traditionalists who want old favorites to remain untouched.

Examining the popular hymn There is a Fountain Filled with Blood, the committee decided to place an asterisk by the last stanza to denote that congregations may opt not to sing it because it might offend disabled people.

The stanza includes the lines, "Then in a nobler, sweeter song, I'll sing thy power to save,

When this poor lisping, stammer-

ing tongue

Lies silent in the grave."

"The suggestion is that someone without the vocal skills doesn't sing as sweetly as someone who can talk in a 'sweet and noble' way," said Nancy Starnes of Dallas, a committee member who uses a wheelchair.

"I bring a certain perspective on

behalf of disabled people that I simply wanted to lay on the table."

The committee this week has approved dozens of other hymns for the new hymnal, including songs the panel refused to alter, such as Am I a Soldier of the Cross and Brightly Beams. Our Father's Mercy.

But the committee decided to delete a liberal favorite, Once to Every Man and Nation, because of multiple "sexist" references to "man."

When possible, the committee tries to change "man" and "mankind" in hymns to more inclusive terms, such as "we," "us," "world" and "people."

Thus the committee changed Good Christian Men, Rejoice and Sing to Good Christian Friends, Rejoice and Sing

Members also voted yesterday to place worship liturgy instructions before the hymns in the new hymnal, a seemingly technical point that nevertheless has some members nervous that lay people will not accept it.

"Anything we do that makes the hymnal look different will be an impediment to some," said Robert Feaster, president of the United Methodist Publishing House.

"But I think a large majority will accept it on its contents regardless of these changes," said Feaster, who heads the Nashville-based publishing house that will produce and market the hymnal to United Methodism's 39,000 churches in 1989.

Dear Friends,

Our deliberations and decisions have been closely followed by the press, as you know. This is both a bane and a blessing; we are fortunate in being able to achieve a high level of advance constituent awareness and interest in the new hymnal, yet it is extremely important to ensure that our decisions are presented accurately, and in balanced form.

At this significant juncture of our work, it would be well for each of us to remember the Hymnal Revision Committee's stated policies regarding interviews/statements to the news media, as previously circulated on January 20, 1986. (See attached photocopy.)

While these policies are focused on our relationship to the press, it would also be well to be exercise discretion in our discussions with friends, associates, fellow members of the denomination, and the general public, with specific regard to subcommittee work in progress which has not yet been reported to/acted upon by the full voting HRC. Preliminary 'leaks' of privileged information have in the past aroused unwanted attention from aggressive persons outside the process, whose expressed suggestions/requests have previously been carefully considered --and rejected, in part or in whole-- by the committee or its consultations.

Please exercise good judgment -- and a certain degree of caution-in sharing information with others.

PRESS RELATIONS POLICY Hymnal Revision Committee

As consistent with our action of January 3, 1985, page 8, the Editor and the Chair of the Hymnal Revision Committee are the contacts to the press as interpreters of HRC actions. In practice, this has meant that members of the press present for HRC meetings, including subcommittee meetings, develop their stories and releases from actions taken at that particular meeting and are briefed at the conclusion of each meeting, if desired, by the Editor. The Editor and Chair have granted interviews and reflections on particular interim activity of the HRC and its subcommittees when it is felt appropriate and timely.

At the local level, the press and talk shows have provided HRC members the opportunity to provide background elaboration on those actions of the HRC that are a matter of public record, matters that can and ought to be interpreted in light of the work of individual HRC members in his/her church, academic, and community settings and their individual efforts and contributions need to be highlighted in that regard.

It is extremely important as we enter the "it shall be this way" phase of our work, as opposed to the "thus far" phase, that interviews granted by HRC members to the press be allowed only on matters that are the results of actions of the HRC, or in the instance of a subcommittee action, that which has been released to the public by either the Chair or the Editor. Consultants to the HRC and staff of the UMPH and BOD should not grant any interviews with the press on any matter excepting elaboration of actions already in the public domain, unless prior approval is given by the Chair or the Editor.
