The youngest daughter said, "If the padisah were to choose me as his wife, I would bear him beautiful twin children with golden hair and pearly teeth.

The padisah was informed about the conversation of these three sisters, and he was very impressed with what they had

But Şah İsmail refused to change his mind. He said to his father, "No, I intend to go there!"

The black giant said then, "If you insist on going there, then at least listen to these directions very carefully. You must take with you nine large jars of wine. the laughing rose while Güllüzar was sleeping, and as he was about to depart, he kissed her two cheeks and then her forehead. Then she called to the two doors to stop Şah İsmail,

Time passed, and the padisah was still beating the two evil sisters in order to try to learn more from them about his children. Once more these two older sisters went to the witch woman and told her that she must find a solution to their problem. After listening to their demand, the witch again went to Mihriban's house and said to the girl, "Oh, my daughter, the beauty of all the world, I know that you must feel very lonely much of the time, and I think that your brother must feel lonely too. You need a friend, and your brother needs a wife. Only Güllüzar would be suitable to be both friend to you and wife to your brother. Tell him to bring Güllüzar here and to marry her.

Once again when Sah İsmail returned home from hunting, he found his sister very sad and crying. "Now why are you crying?" he asked her.

Mihriban said, "My dear Brother, both of us are very lonely here. You ought to get married. Go and get Güllüzar as a wife for yourself and as a companion for me."

Just as he had done previously, Sah İsmail stopped at the home of his giant father and mother and told them about his sister's wish. His giant father tried to explain what a

The twins' mother has been lost since the beginning of the tale, and the audience does not hear of her again until she is invited to the final recognition scene. By the time of the final recognition scene, there are no characters left to be identified! Their identities have all already been announced. Another failure of the final scene is the lack of punishment or even verbal criticism of the despicable behavior of the two older sisters. Normally in this tale type, they are severely punished.
