Dear Captain:

I am inclosing one dollar for which I ask
you to send me a copy of your map showing the routes of the
Fourth U. S. Cavalry.

In following up the origin of this map I got
in touch with Mr. E. D. Dorchester of Freeport, Texas, and he
gave me your name and address and stated at the same time that
if I found it was possible to obtain copies of this map, he would
like to have one.

My interest in your map is particularly due to
the fact that it is the only one that I have ever seen with the
Cañon Rescata marked thereon. This is a branch of the Double
Mountain fork of the Brazos and identified as combining with
the Yellow House at about Lubbock. I have been making a study
of the route of Albert Pike's trip through Texas in 1831. He
mentions a Cañon "Resgate". This name is close enough to that
given on your map to identify them in my mind as being one and
the same. If you have any information as to where you obtained
the name, I will greatly appreciate a line from you.

I presume that you know Albert Pike was a well
known citizen of Arkansas as well as a leader in Masonic affairs
in Washington.
