I have been making a study of the route of Albert Pike's trip through Texas in 1831. He mentions a Canon "Resgate". This name is close enough to that given on your map to identify them in my mind as being one and the same. If you have any information as to where you obtained the name, I will greatly appreciate a line from you.
