Do we pause to think, while dropping a tear, on the bier of the departed,  
" who will be next? Will the detail be you? or will it be I?

Our comrade having answered evry call to duty, in the light given him to  
see, had no cause to dread the summons. He had been a good, loving, devoted  
husband, a patient, faithful, and affectionate father, sacraficing at all tim  
-es his own comfort for those whom he loved. He was kind, courteous and  
generous, to all with whom he came in contact. He was a good soldier, made  
a good fight for the cause he knew to be right, and when overcome by untold  
leigons, he laid down his impliments of war, and made a good citizen.
