Thank you for your letter to President Bush regarding an Office of Management and Budget (OMB) proposal concerning Cost-of-Living-Allowances (COLAs). Owing to the nature of your concerns White House officials forwarded your correspondence to the Department of Defense for reply.

Defense officials certainly appreciate the contributions made by military retirees and understand the concerns you have raised about the OMB proposal. The Department of Defense proposed Fiscal Year 1993 budget does include a full COLA for military and civilian retirees provided under existing statutes.

A review of the proposal's current status might be helpful. The Military Retirement Reforms Act of 1986 provides a full COLA adjustment for those individuals who entered the military before August 1, 1986. This Act remains in force, and all its provisions apply, including the requirement for a full COLA.

If the OMB proposal is enacted there would be no COLA increase for Fiscal Year 1993. Future COLAs for these individuals would be limited to the increase in the Consumer Price Index (CPI) minus one percent. However, it is important to point out that final Congressional action on this or any other Administration budget proposals has not taken place. This proposal is one of many intended to deal with the compelling need to reduce the Federal deficit. It should be noted that implementation of the OMB proposal would require specific legislation enacted by Congress to set aside the permanent protections included in the Military Retirement Reforms Act cited above.

Please be assured that the Department of Defense will continue to work for equitable compensation for both military members and their survivors. We appreciate your concerns and recommendation in this very important matter.
