MINUTES OF BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

1952-1953

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May 18, 1953

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The Board of Directors of Texas Technological College met in regular session in the Office of the President, Texas Technological College, Lubbock, Texas, at 3:30 p.m. on Monday, May 18, 1953. The following directors were present: Chairman Thompson, Mr. Benson, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Pfluger, Mr. Abbott, Mr. Moore and Mr. Watkins. In addition, President Jones, Vice President and Comptroller Pennington, Secretary Gaston and Assistant Secretary Wells were present.

1218. Upon motion by Mr. Abbott, seconded by Mr. Pfluger, Mr. Thompson was re-elected Chairman of the Board by acclamation. Chairman Thompson then appointed the Committees for the year. A list of committee appointments is attached and made a part of these minutes. (Attachment #5).

1219. President Jones presented the Agenda under date of May 5, 1953, and recommended its approval. Upon motion by Mr. Benson, seconded by Mr. Pfluger, the Board approved the first twelve (12) pages of the Agenda (Items No. 1076 to 1217, inclusive). A copy of the Agenda is attached and made a part of these minutes. (Attachment #1).

1220. Upon motion by Mr. Pfluger, seconded by Mr. Abbott, the Board appropriated from the Unappropriated Balance, the sum of \$1,873.14 to recondition the old greenhouse for use by the Department of Biology.

1221. Upon motion by Mr. McLaughlin, seconded by Mr. Watkins, the Board approved a resolution granting Mr. Harold O. Purvine, Military Property Custodian, authority to requisition, receive, store and account for military property issued to Texas Technological College and authorized Chairman Thompson to sign the Resolution for and on behalf of the Board. A copy of the Resolution is attached and made a part of these minutes. (Attachment #2).

1222. Upon motion by Mr. Abbott, seconded by Mr. Pfluger, the Board referred a request from the American Legion for a lease of a tract of land on Texas Technological College Campus to be used for armory purposes by the ROTC, Organized Reserves, National Guard and Air Force Reserves to the Building Committee with a request that this Committee report to the Board at a later meeting. It was agreed by the Board that this request would be considered favorably if the building needs of the College ROTC and drill area are adequately provided for. The complete file of correspondence is attached and made a part of these minutes. (Attachment #3). Building Committee: Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Pfluger and Mr. Price.

1223. Upon motion by Mr. McLaughlin, seconded by Mr. Pfluger, the Board granted a right-of-way easement to the State Highway Commission of the State of Texas to certain land as described in H.B. No. 479, Fifty-third (53rd) Legislature and authorized the Chairman of the Board of Directors to execute and deliver such conveyance to the State Highway Commission of the State of Texas after the form of such conveyance has been approved by the Attorney General. House Bill No. 479 is attached and made a part of these minutes. (Attachment #4).

1224. Mr. McLaughlin gave a brief report on the status of PanTech as a result of interviews on April 29 and 30 in Washington by Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Wiggins and Mr. Pennington with Mr. Earl Johnson, Acting Under Secretary of Army and other Government officials. Mr. McLaughlin reported that the College should know something definite on PanTech within a short time.

The Board expressed its appreciation for the work which Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Wiggins and Mr. Pennington did to help determine the final status of PanTech.

1225. Upon motion by Mr. Benson, seconded by Mr. Pfluger, the Board approved the appointment of Mr. Edward W. Smith as Director of Development, effective July 1, 1953, at a salary of \$10,500.00 for twelve months; \$5,500.00 to be paid from College Funds and \$5,000.00 to be transferred from the Texas Technological College Foundation for this purpose. The Board authorized the preparation and submission of a budget for Mr. Smith's office covering secretarial help, maintenance, equipment and travel.


1226. Upon motion by Mr. Pfluger, seconded by Mr. Watkins, the Board approved the erection of a Memorial Building upon the campus of Texas Technological College as a memorial to Mr. or Mr. and Mrs. Len McClellan. The Memorial Building is to be financed, at least in part, by the proceeds from the sale of the McClellan property located at 2501 - 19th Street, Lubbock, which is being deeded to the Texas Technological College Foundation for this purpose.

1227. President Jones reported to the Board that House Bill No. 478 which authorized and empowered the Board to select a tract of land, not exceeding seven and one-half (7.5) acres upon the campus of Texas Technological College and to convey such tract so selected to the City of Lubbock for the purpose of erecting thereon a City Auditorium-Coliseum had passed the 53rd Legislature and had been signed by the Governor.

1228. President Jones recommended the conferring of degrees on May 25, 1953, upon all students who are certified by the Faculty, Divisional Deans and the Registrar as having met all the degree requirements for the degree as indicated by the printed program. Upon motion by Mr. McLaughlin, seconded by Mr. Moore, the awarding of the degrees was approved. A printed list, as certified by the Faculty, Divisional Deans and the Registrar is attached and made a part of these minutes. (Attachment #6).

Adjournment--The Board adjourned at 5:30 p.m., May 18, 1953, until the call meeting on Monday, June 29, 1953, to be held at 9:30 a.m., in the Office of the President, Texas Technological College, Lubbock, Texas.



R E S O L U T I O N

ARMORY AT LUBBOCK, TEXAS

WHEREAS, The Preamble to the Constitution of the American Legion, composed by men from all segments, and sectors of the American Expeditionary Forces, in France, near the end of World War No. I, with the folly of unpreparedness uppermost in their thoughts, committed the organization "TO UPHOLD AND DEFEND THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA", and

WHEREAS, The American Legion, from the Post to the National level, has consistently sought to impress upon the people of America the vital importance of National Security, and, beginning with the National Defense Act of 1920, has constantly urged the Congress of the United States to appropriate funds to provide for a ready striking force, of land, air, and naval components, of sufficient size, and with ample equipment and material, backed by organized, well trained, and equipped Reserves, - Army, Air, Navy, Marine, National Guard, and ROTC Units in educational institutions desiring same, to assure our National Security, and

WHEREAS, There now exists a menace to our Nation of such magnitude that we are in a state of semi-mobilization; and by Selective Service; Recall of Reserves, by individuals, and units; Recruitment and activation of the National Guard; and drawing upon our ROTC Units, expanding our striking force, and at the same time creating a larger Reserve, since those who are qualified for additional service upon termination of their tour of active duty, are transferred to the Reserve, and

WHEREAS, It has ever been our Nations policy to have a small professional armed force, and depend upon the citizen-soldiers, to fight wars, and

WHEREAS, The City, and County of Lubbock, has made a liberal contribution of men and women to the Armed Forces, and now has a great number who are, by operation of law, in the status of Reserves, hence should be organized and trained, but are not because of makeshift facilities - except for the Naval and Marine Corps Reserve, and

WHEREAS, The Statutes vests in the Board of Directors of Texas Technological College, power to lease for a term of 99 years, twelve acres of land, more or less, to The Armory Board, and to the Federal

Government, for Armory purposes, and one building can be, and should be used by the Organized Reserves, National Guard, Air Force Reserve, and ROTC of Texas Tech. (There has already been leased to the Navy approximately one-half acre of land, and there is now an Armory for the Naval and Marine Reserve on Tech Campus.)

NOW, Therefore, be it Resolved by Allen Brothers Post No. 148, The American Legion, that we request the Armory Board of the State of Texas; the appropriate authority of The Department of Defense; and The Board of Directors of Texas Technological College, to immediately select a tract of land on the Campus of Texas Tech as the Statutes provide, and forthwith cause to be erected a building to be used for Armory purposes, by the ROTC, Organized Reserves, National Guard, and Air Force Reserves.

Be it further Resolved that the aid of other organizations in the City of Lubbock be enlisted, and that, if necessary, we present this Resolution to our Representatives, and Senators, in the Texas Legislature, and The Congress of the United States.

EXCERPTS FROM VERNON'S TEXAS STATUTES, 1948

EDUCATION--PUBLIC

CHAPTER 6.--TEXAS TECHNOLOGICAL COLLEGE

Art. 2632b. Lease of campus land for National Guard Armory, etc.--

Section 1. The Board of Directors of Texas Technological College at Lubbock, Texas, is hereby authorized to select a tract of land upon the campus of the Texas Technological College at Lubbock, Texas, and to lease such tract of land so selected to the Texas National Guard Armory Board, for the purpose of erecting thereon, with money borrowed under the pledge authorized in the next Act mentioned, and with any assistance by the Federal Government or otherwise, an armory and other buildings suitable for use by the Texas National Guard under the provisions of Senate Bill No. 326, enacted by the Regular Session of the Forty-sixth Legislature of Texas, approved on May 1, 1939;<sup>1</sup> that the Board of Directors of Texas Technological College is hereby authorized to make and enter into a contract with the Texas National Guard Armory Board, providing for such lease on such terms as may be suitable and satisfactory to the Board of Directors of Texas Technological College, for a term not longer than ninety-nine (99) years.

Sec. 2. That the Board of Directors of Texas Technological College is hereby authorized to select and set aside a tract of land on the campus of Texas Technological College at Lubbock, Texas, not in excess of ten (10) acres, such tract of land so selected and set aside to be used by the Texas National Guard as a drill ground.

Sec. 3. The Board of Directors of Texas Technological College is hereby authorized to permit the Texas National Guard Armory Board and the Texas National Guard and any subdivision thereof, ingress upon the campus of the Texas Technological College, and egress therefrom, for the purpose of going to and from the Armory and other buildings and the drill ground, authorized by Sections 1 and 2 of this Act. (Acts 1939, 46th Leg., p. 272).

Section 4 of the Act of 1939 provided that a holding of partial invalidity should not affect the remaining portions of the Act.

Art. 2632c. Lease of campus land to United States for armory.

Section 1. The Board of Directors of Texas Technological College at Lubbock is hereby authorized to lease to the United States Government or any suitable agency thereof not to exceed three (3) acres of land being a part of the campus of said College to be used and occupied by the said United States Government, the Army, Navy or other department or agency thereof for a period of ninety-nine (99) years on which to erect and maintain an armory building or other suitable building or buildings for the instruction of students of said College in military and naval sciences and any other subjects that may be provided for the instruction of students of said College.

Sec. 2. Said Board of Directors is authorized to enter into such contracts, agreements and lease contracts as may be necessary and proper in carrying out the provisions in this Act. (Acts 1947, 50th Leg., p. 285, ch. 175.)

Dear Mr. Pennington:

This has reference to previous correspondence with Colonel H. L. Green, Department of Military Science and Tactics, as of December 11, 1952, the result of a conversation between the undersigned, Colonel M. E. Jones, Commanding Officer, Texas Military District, and Colonel Green; also conversation with Colonel Ross Ayers, Commanding Officer, 132nd Field Artillery Bn., National Guard, Captain N. H. Lincoln, Unit Instructor, Organized Reserve, and Honorable James H. Goodman, Chairman of the Fourth Army Advisory Board, of which I am a member, relative to the above subject. This letter is directly in keeping with our telephone conversation with you, Colonel Green, Honorable Preston Smith, former member of the Texas Legislature, and Honorable James H. Goodman, on September 5 & 6, 1953.

We find that Article 2632b of Vernon's Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, enacted by the 46th Legislature, 1939, authorized the Board of Directors of Texas Technological College to lease to the Armory Board of the State of Texas, for the use of the Texas National Guard as drill ground, armory, etc., a tract not to exceed ten acres of land, to be selected by the Board of Directors, for a term of 99 years.

Article 2632c, Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes, enacted by the 50th Legislature, 1947, authorized the Board of Directors of Texas Technological College to lease to the United States Government, the Army, Navy, or departments or agencies thereof, a tract of land not to exceed three acres, to be selected by such Board of Directors, for a term of 99 years, upon which to erect and maintain an armory building, or other suitable building, or buildings, for the instruction of students of such college in military and naval science, etc.

It will be recalled that we had a conference in the office of President Wiggins on May 24, 1949 on this subject. It was brought out in the conversation that morning that the Legislature had authorized the use of two and one-half acres of land for armory purposes. No doubt, what was meant by the speaker was that the Navy had already erected a building and was, therefore, using approximately one-half acre.

It will be seen, therefore, that the Board of Directors has been authorized by the two aforementioned statutes to select, and lease, thirteen acres of land. Assuming that the Navy has used one-half acre, there remains twelve and one-half acres which may be leased.

Article 2632b above cited, authorizes the Board of Directors to finance such building as provided in Senate Bill No. 326 enacted by the Regular Session of the 46th Legislature, same being Article 5890b, Vernon's Revised Civil Statutes. We mention this because in our discussion with you the other day it was brought out that the college had no funds for further building and would not have until 1958.

When Colonel Jones of the Texas Military District discussed this matter with us on or about the 10th day of December, 1952, as we understand it, he was talking from Colonel Green's office and Colonel Green will, no doubt, recall such conversation, he stated that he was on the Facilities Board and that soon after his return to Austin, his headquarters, he would mail a questionnaire to the various reserve components of the Armed Forces asking to be supplied with specific information as to the

space requirements, etc. Perhaps Colonel Jones has compiled that information. Mr. Goodman has not been furnished with a copy of such although it was his understanding that the Fourth Army Advisory Board might be expected to assist in this project as well as any other project affecting the Armed Forces in this vicinity. Colonel Jones stated that he had attempted to see Mr. Goodman on that occasion but contact was not made.

Recent discussion with Colonel Ayers and Captain Lincoln points up the same problem. Recruiting is difficult due to the distance from downtown Lubbock it appears. The buildings now used by the Organized Reserve and the National Guard were not constructed for armory purposes. The life of such buildings was not expected to exceed much over five years. The Government is paying for more space than is actually needed.

It was the desire of Colonel Jones to move the Organized Reserve to a location near downtown Lubbock. A very careful survey has been made of such possibilities. Heretofore, a stipulation was made that the City should furnish the land rent free. The only land owned by the City near downtown Lubbock is that parcel purchased for the purpose of building a coliseum-auditorium, out of a portion of the bonds sold for that purpose. Such tract of land could not be used for anything else. The only way an armory could be built on that land is for the Armory Board or someone else to purchase same from the City of Lubbock. The cost would be approximately, \$100,000. It is doubtful if a suitable tract could be obtained anyway near the business district of sufficient size for less than \$100,000. and it could very easily cost twice that much, depending upon the location and the size of the tract. Another factor would be the zoning ordinances of the City of Lubbock.

We do not know the exact needs of the Organized Reserve and the National Guard except that the Organized Reserve indicated a minimum of 8,000 square feet. That would not include space for vehicles. Perhaps the National Guard would require a few thousand square feet more than the Organized Reserve.

Colonel Harlan Hodges of the Air Reserve has been out of town and we have been unable to contact him. However, the Air Reserve is comfortably situated in a Government owned building, the VA Building on 19th Street. We have no knowledge of the requirements of the ROTC.

The original plan was that such building would be used as a combination armory and field house. We understand that the coliseum-auditorium which is to be erected by the City of Lubbock on the seven and one-half acre tract of land to be set aside for that purpose by the Board of Directors of Texas Tech will eliminate the field house since such activities will be held in the coliseum-auditorium. This should simplify the financing of the armory and also diminish the cost considerably.

Lubbock was scheduled to have an armory in 1949. This was the information given to the undersigned by officers then high in the Department of Defense, the National Guard and the Organized Reserve. The money was spent elsewhere. We understand the subject of building an armory has not been dropped but perhaps will be revived again in the near future. We can see no reason why, in the interest of efficient use of public funds and unification of our National Security effort one building should not be sufficient for the ROTC, Organized Reserve, National Guard, and the Air Reserve.

It might be well, therefore, that this project be placed upon the agenda of the Board of Directors of Texas Tech and the Armory Board at as early a date as possible. In the interest of time and since the first move perhaps will need to be made by the Board of Directors of Texas Tech, in deciding whether or not it is feasible at this time to undertake such, it is suggested that the information as to space requirement be sent to your office by the organizations involved. Should any information reach us we shall pass it along.

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED  
AN ACT

authorizing and directing the execution and delivery by the Board of Directors of Texas Technological College, acting by the Chairman of the Board of Directors thereof, of a right-of-way easement to certain land in Lubbock County, Texas, to the State Highway Commission of the State of Texas, for the construction and maintenance of a State Highway across the campus of Texas Technological College; and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. In consideration of the benefits accruing to the State from the constructing and maintenance of a State Highway, the Chairman of the Board of Directors of Texas Technological College is hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver to the State Highway Commission of the State of Texas a proper instrument conveying to said State Highway Commission of the State of Texas a right-of-way easement to the following described tracts of land for the construction and maintenance of such Highway, the form of such conveyance to be approved by the Attorney General:

TRACT NO. 1: Being a part and out of Section No. 2 in Block E-2 in Lubbock County, Texas, more particularly described by metes and bounds as follows:

BEGINNING at a point on the north right-of-way line of 19th Street (City of Lubbock) a distance of 586.5 feet east of the intersection of the said 19th Street right-of-way line and the southeasterly right-of-way line of the Seagraves branch of the Panhandle & Santa Fe Railway, said 19th Street right-of-way line being 60.0 feet north of and parallel to the center line of 19th Street; said 19th Street right-of-way line coinciding with the south boundary line fence of the Texas Technological College property;

THENCE north a distance of 15.0 feet;

THENCE west a distance of 300.0 feet with a line 15.0 feet north of and parallel to the said 19th Street north right-of-way line;

THENCE north  $36^{\circ} 07'$  west, a distance of 21.9 feet;

THENCE in a northeasterly direction, a distance of 559.8 feet with a circular arc, the radius of which is 2924.93 feet, the center of said circular arc bearing south  $36^{\circ} 07'$  east from its beginning, central angle to said circular arc being  $100^{\circ} 58'$ ;

THENCE north  $64^{\circ} 51'$  east, a distance of 366.9 feet;

THENCE in a northeasterly direction, a distance of 292.3 feet with a circular arc, the radius of which is 1697.28 feet, to

BEGINNING at the intersection of the north boundary line of the said northeast 1/4 section and the northwest right-of-way line of the Seagraves Branch of the P & SF Railroad;

THENCE west a distance of 247.6 feet with the north boundary line of the said northeast 1/4 section to a point;

THENCE south a distance of 60 feet to a point;

THENCE east a distance of 165.4 feet with a line 60 feet south of and parallel to the north boundary line of the said northeast 1/4 section to a point in the said northwest railroad right-of-way line;

THENCE north 53° 53' east a distance of 101.8 feet with the said railroad right-of-way line to the PLACE OF BEGINNING.

The tracts contain the following areas of land more or less;

Tract No. 1 -- 1.70 acres

Tract No. 2 -- 1.33 acres

Tract No. 3 -- 0.284 acre

The Chairman of the Board of Directors of Texas Technological College is hereby authorized, for and on behalf of said Board, to execute and deliver such conveyance to the State Highway Commission of the State of Texas.

Sec. 2. The fact that the State Highway Commission of the State of Texas urgently needs the above land for highway purposes creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the Constitutional Rule requiring bills to be read on three several days in each House be suspended, and said Rule is hereby suspended and that this Act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and it is so enacted.
