Letter from the Founder

This newsletter is dedicated to our veterinarian and friend "Dr. J" who was never too busy to care for our wildlife patients or care for our sudden emergencies.

We've known her for many years, and saw her dream of a new state-of-the art- veterinary hospital come to fruition two years ago, when "Above and Beyond Pet Care Hospital" opened its doors in southwest Lubbock.

"Dr. J" was loved by her family, friends, colleagues and every one of us at SPWRC. She will be profoundly missed.

Dr. Blaine Oden and his staff will continue to care for our wildlife, and we are sincerely appreciative, and also to our other veterinarians at Animal Medical Center.

The tedium of the winter months suddenly ceased, and everyone catapulted into high gear. "Baby season" started later than usual this year, but wildlife babies don't know about calendars or Daylight Savings Time. Every year our first baby bird and mammal admissions arrive around April – but it's sometimes earlier and sometimes later.

They are all a challenge to keep up with because their demands for food keep our staff and volunteers hopping. Some animals have already been released, and are faring well on their own.

This newsletter issue was particularly difficult to finish, and I had to move or eliminate some initial articles and photos to make room for many acknowledgements and Tributes, as well as our ever-present news and activities. The baby birds are "bottomless pits" requiring feedings every half-hour during daylight hours for several weeks as they grow and rapidly develop into fledges, juveniles and adults.

Our expenses also grow rapidly - for food, supplies and utilities.

Volunteers and veterinarians have always been the backbone of our wildlife operations, providing countless hours of service so each animal receives the best care, treatment and nurturing possible....and a chance to be returned to their natural wild habitats.

We'll have much more on our building updates - the barn and waterfowl/water bird facility - in our September quarterly issue. (see also p. 3).

It's our everyday donations from Keystone Donors, from Adoptions, Tributes, contributions from animal admissions, fundraising events, *Mockingbird Chronicles* subscriptions and outreach education programs that allow us to keep our doors open, provide wildlife food and supplies and pay our bills. Foundation and other large gifts allow us to make necessary, and much-needed improvements at the Wildlife Center.

Project Updates

We met to discuss the next phase of our building project: the complete modification of our three-story barn and the waterfowl/water bird facility.

We talked at length about our dreams and requirements for a contemporary animal care facility that will encompass ample room for both baby bird and baby mammal care and all the necessary components for us to provide top quality wildlife care. The builder and architect will work hand in hand and when everything is finalized, actual construction will begin. Following our discussion, we all toured the barn's three floors.

We're excited about the work that will soon commence and we'll have a lot more to report in our September newsletter issue!

Funding for the barn project is made possible by a grant from the J.T. and Margaret Talkington Foundation, and an anonymous donor has made the addition of a waterfowl facility possible for our many ducks, geese and water birds.

Baby Birds 101

By the time this newsletter reaches mailboxes, baby bird calls are coming in frequently at the Wildlife Center. Read "Baby Birds 101" on our web site at spwrc.org before you call us. Do the right thing by the bird you find, and always rescue, don't kidnap young, healthy fledglings. The web site explains the difference

Remember, baby birds NORMALLY spend a few days on the ground hopping about learning essential survival skills from their parents, who are always close by, although they may be out of sight. Please bring injured or compromised birds as quickly as possible to SPWRC – don't feed, and keep them warm, dark and quiet. Young birds eat about every half hour during daylight hours, and proper nutrition is essential if they are to thrive. Stress and malnutrition are the biggest killers of baby birds.

Even "well-meaning" people can be a threat to a healthy young fledge. Remember, it's not legal to keep a wild, protected songbird as a pet in Texas. (Starlings, English Sparrows and Pigeons are not native, and there are no state or federal laws that protect or prohibit them from being kept as pets).

Baby mammal info is also on our web site.

Our volunteers and Board Members also decided to postpone summer Open House, traditionally held in mid-June, until our workload gets much lighter, several months down the road.


This event requires a lot of cleaning, in addition to soliciting donations of food for our summer guests as well as our volunteers.

2013 animals admitted to SPWRC in 2013!

This included 1307 songbirds, raptors, mammals and reptiles and 706 non-native birds (European Starlings, English Sparrows and Pigeons). Raptors numbered 125.

We know caring for "non-natives" is controversial, but SPWRC has always had a non-discrimination policy. ("Wildlife is accepted without regard to color, size, temperment, species, or popularity with the human race").

Several years ago, however, we had to make one amendment: we no longer accept raccoons...not because they carry rabies and nasty roundworms, but because there is nowhere to release them without causing conflict with people or other species.

During 2013, 97 Environmental Education programs were presented.

Her birthday was March 8th, 2014.



EBay Giving Works



Five Baby Falcons: American Kestrel Chicks just days old

The baby Nine-banded Armadillos came from Dickens, Texas. A man found them on the side of the road next to their mother who had been killed. They are now between 2-3 months old, thriving, growing and eating very well.

The first five newly hatched American Kestrels (top right) came from New Mexico from a drilling rig. The second group of five more kestrels came from Lehman, Texas (Hockley County), and the same situation. Our most recent kestrel chick came from Amarillo, TX.

American Kestrels are our smallest North American falcon species, and can often be seen in our area.

We raised fourteen kestrels during 2013. Youngsters are always released from our property


so they can return for food handouts untl they can hunt and catch their own food and are 100% self sufficient. The usually takes several weeks, and it's a joy to watch them zooming around outdoors.


Male Golden- cheeked Warbler

The Golden Cheeked Warbler is an endangered species in Texas and throughout the U.S. due to habitat loss and fragmentation. The species was listed May 4, 1990.
