one or what I think of myself, I promised you when I left you to write
soon after I came to Beje and one day I sat down with a full resolution
to write but come to look for paper and there was but a half sheet in
the house instead of I wrote on that it would only provoke you so I thought

of excellent company and about in the bargain, on getting in the

Osbornes Mr C inquired after Mrs Sands the Duggett called here
about a week since he asked me if I left - Mrs Sands well I replied
very well I thank you she sent her respects to you thank you he says
I saw all the gentlemen to Church on Sunday last had a very
poor show from the St Patrick. Have you had any shingles
since I left you we had one St Patricks Day but we found here

and there a black spot - we went to Church in a ship last
Thursday that is ahead of you How is the count - do you see him
often and what does he say about me give my respects to him
and I Thompson, I have just been interrupted by a call from
Mr Chumney and three other gentlemen, Dont and I were over
to the Plains on Monday we found our people all well Abiah
was down to see Isabel she went on Sunday and stays till
Friday quite a visit Isabel had the misfortune to stick a fork
through her cheek which I think will make a bad scar, when
have you seen Amanda and is she well give my love to her
when you see her, Margaret I wish you would learn to
comp on a bike Don and I and then come up and show me
how I would like to work me for the Ladies Society, I wish you
had been here on Sunday to hear Mr Chumney I am sure you
would say I wish we could get him to preach at St Stephens,
I presume you are fixing to be bridesmaid for Emily has
she recovered from her cold, I have enjoyed myself very much
since I have been here I have been out riding a number of
times and we have had company to tea, I wish you could
be here to spend some of this mild weather with us as we
shall leave to house all the time and it will be lonely
but we will excuse you until the weather becomes pleasant
when we will expect you, Dont sends her kind regards to you
and says she will be pleased to see you any time just send
