Sarah Hobson Hampton, eldest daughter of Henry & Elizabeth Cary Hampton to survive child-
hood & marry, was born 16 Sept. 1750, at "Buckland"
Pr. Gen. Court - and died at "Bloomsville" Cabell County
Va. in ^{spring of} 1832. ^{during a big flood in Ohio,} She is ^{recalled} remembered by one of her
grandsons, as a very straight-backed, steam-old
lady who spent a good deal of her time in a
straight-backed choir with a large Bible open
on her knees. This old calf bound book
with a great many dried flowers, picked by Sarah
Hampton Brown, pressed between its pages is
now owned by ~~one of~~ her great-granddaughters,
Miss Lida Brown,
in Catlettsburg Kentucky,

Sarah Hobson Hampton, was evidently named for
her mother's grandmother Sarah Hobson, wife
of Thomas Hobson, III; The last of the Hobson clerks
of Northumberland County, Va. She was married
twice, first on 3 October 1766 to Francis Garner
a son of her step-mother, ^{clergyman Pastor, Gen. Hampton John Garner.} by her first husband - He
died ^{in less than} a year ^{or} after the marriage having a

Mary Bowman and her sisters were
 educated at the Salem Female Acad-
 emy, N.C. the "first school for girls
 founded in the South." (sic), and on 7. August 1827
 was married to Constantine Ladd Bauer
 a Stokes County planter, In 1822 when but
 23 years of age he was Sheriff of his county,
 and also did a great deal of surveying.
 His work as a surveyor was so ~~extremely~~
 accurate, that, ^{it is said} no error has ever been found
 in it.

Ch. Bauer was a son of Charles Bauer,
 also an early surveyor in Western North
 Carolina; grandson of Joseph Bauer an
 Officer in the Revolutionary War; and great

"Capt William Pierce + wife Jane were living at Jamestown 1623-4. He was one of the leading men of Va. and member of the Council 1631-44. He had at least 1 child, Jane who married John Rolfe." Va. Hist. Mag. I.-447. If Rolfe's first wife was Pocahontas by whom he had a son Thomas Rolfe. John + Jane Pierce Rolfe had a son Elizabeth born in 1620.

Capt Wm Pierce, Esq. granted 2000 A. in Laurens Creek. 1635.

It is thought Capt William Pierce was father of Maj Wm Pierce of Westmoreland Co. & George Pierce of Surry Co.

William Pierce was an early & prominent settler in Westmoreland County Va. He was a justice of peace of Westmoreland in 1668, & Nov 5 1677. Maj William Pierce was the presiding justice of that county. His wife was Sarah daughter of Capt John & Margaret Upton of Isle of Wight Co. and the marriage took place after the death of her father in 1652, as she was named as Sarah Upton in his will. Her marriage to Pierce is shown by the will of her sister Mrs Elizabeth Upton, Slaughter, Collett Butler of Essex Co. in 1673.
