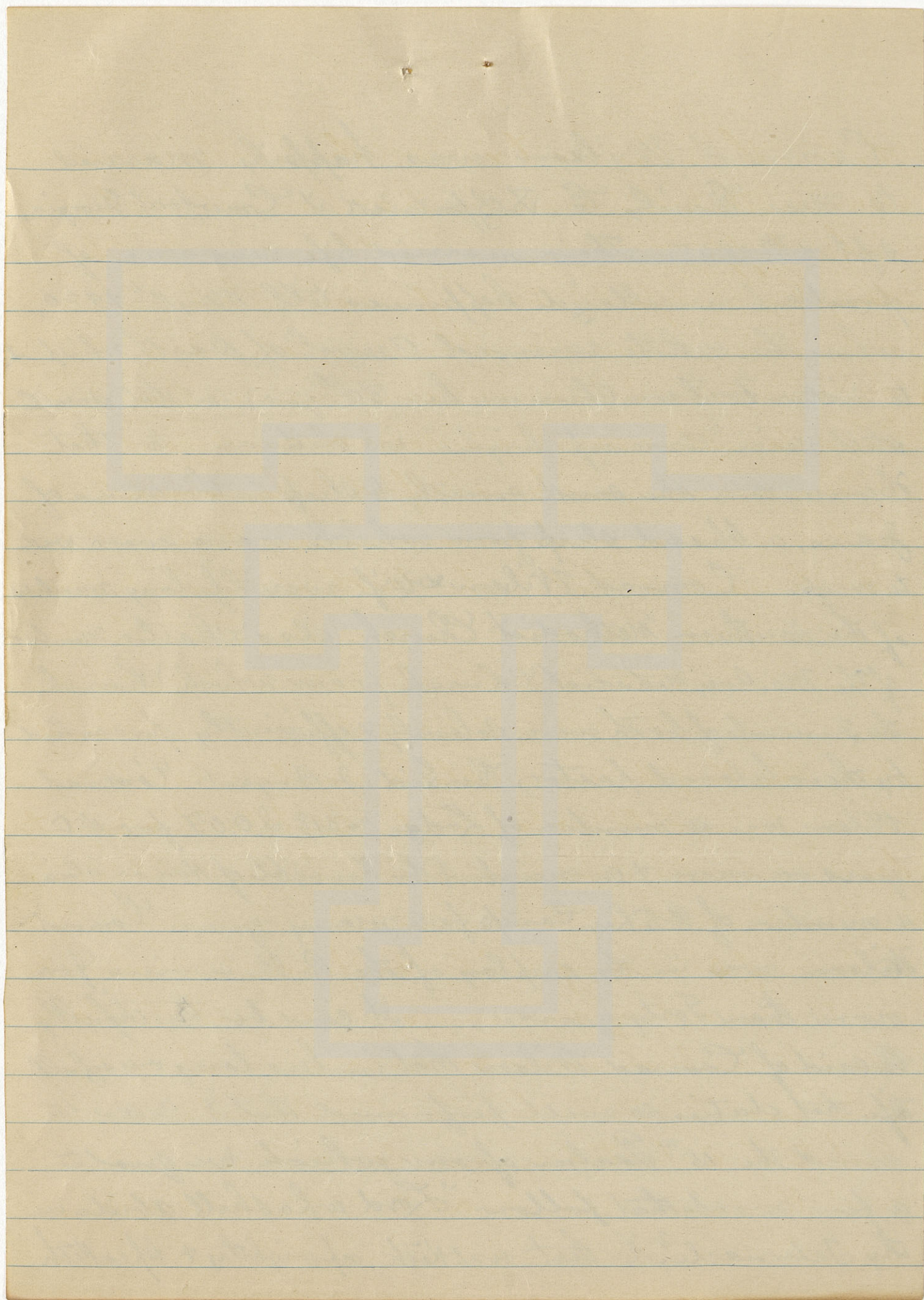
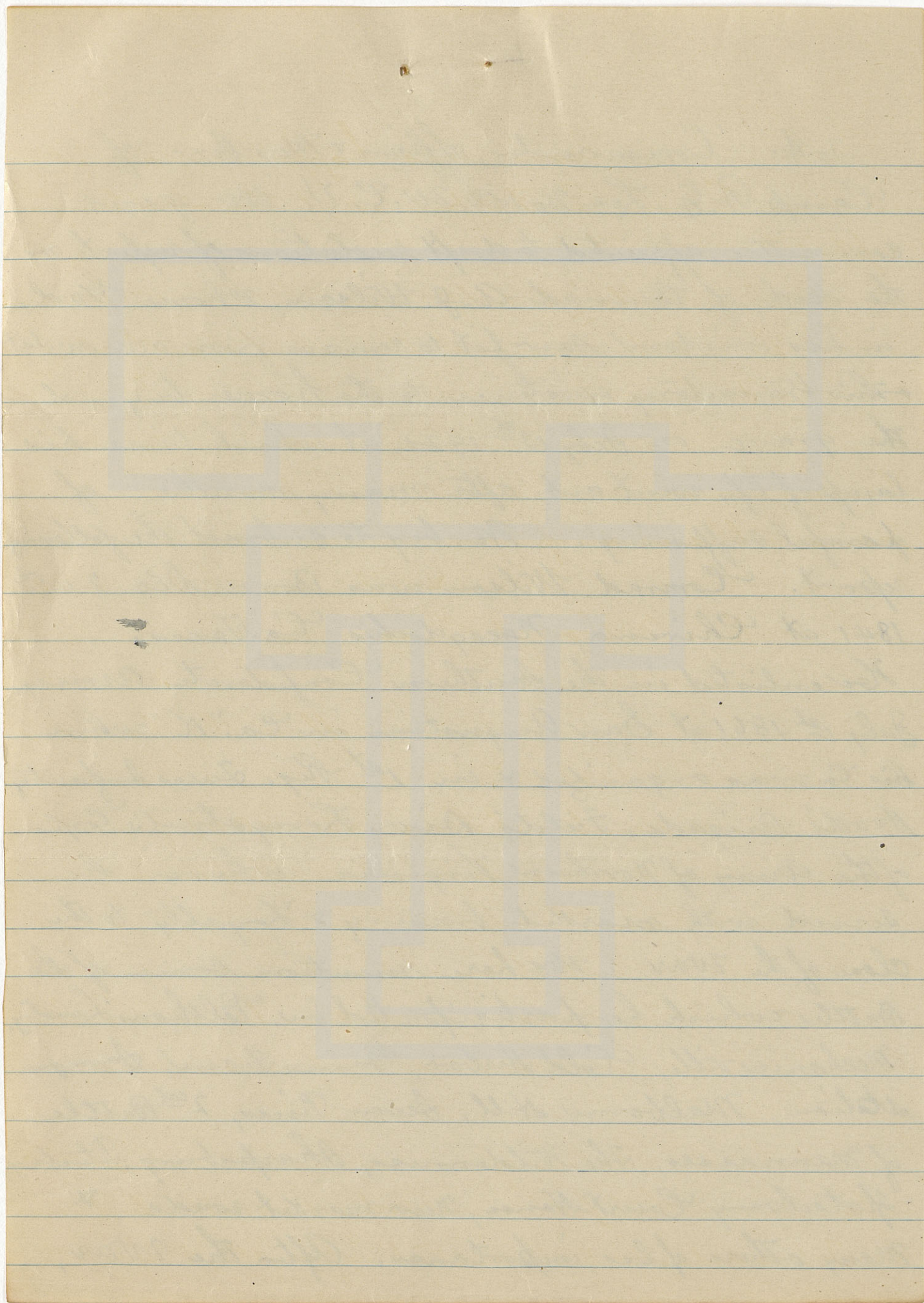


Comrad Wilson was happily married to Miss Emily E. Fitzpatrick at Conrold Georgia, Sept 12th 1865. Their married life was one of practical unalloyed happiness till May 1st 1920, when the white winged Angel of Death whispered to sister Wilson (then in her 80th year) in that small still voice, "Come up higher", in obedience to that Heavenly voice she sank sweetly to sleep in the arms of Jesus, a blessed sleep from which none ever wake to weep. Comrad Wilson & wife were life long members of the Southern Methodist Church, also charter members of the Mo. Ave. Methodist Church from which Church the Funerals of both were solemnly & efficiently preached by their beloved pastor, Rev Gid J. Bryant. Comrad Wilson was a member of Lodge No 318 I.O.O.F. for 40 years or more & a member of the Knight of Honor also a member of R.E.L. Camp for many year. Comrad Wilson was in the employ of the R.R. services for more than Forty years. It can be truthfully be said of Comrad Wilson that in his long & usefull life that duties so well performed that it calls to mind the 15th Psalm of from which we quote a few words that follow "Lord who shall abide in thy Tabernacle, He that walketh uprightly & speaketh



To the Commander, officers & Members of
Camp, R. E. Lee, No 158. W. E. V. We your
committee, appointed to draft resolutions of respects on

the grave, on Feby 13th 1921 at which time his
lamp of life went out after many months of

report. Comrad Wilson was Born Dec. 24th
1841 at Chireno, Nacogdoches Co. Texas.

He enlisted in the Southern Confederate Army,
July 1st 1861 at San Augustine in Co. "K" where
his Co. was organized & in 1st Reg. Texas Infantry,
Hood's Brigade, Field's Div. Longstreet's Corps.
of the Army of Northern Virginia where he
served with marked bravery & Loyalty to the
close of the war. We here mention some of the
Battles which he participated in, Elthons Landing,
Mechanicsville, Cold Harbor, Gains Farm, Savage
Station, Malboro Hill, Seven Pines, 2nd Battle
of Manassas, The Wilderness, Sharpsburg, Petersburg,
Spotsylvania Court House, New market roads &
Many others of less importance. After the war,



the truth in his heart & wordeth righteous men
& swearth to his own hurt & changeth not.

This happy marriage was blessed with three
daughters and four sons of whom there now
only remains one daughter Mrs Matt Perry &
one son Mr Prince Wilson, besides these two
Grand daughters, Mrs Elsie Moore & Miss Amanda Mary
Wilson & Three grand sons, Alfred Baily, ^{Roland} Paul
Wilson, whose grief & sorrow is very deep.

member, the Lodge No 318 I.O.O.F. lost a fraternal friend
& bro. The K of H. an acceptable member, Camp R.E.

lost a valuable Friend, Neighbor, Citizen & Patriot.

on the records of our Camp & request the daily
Papers to publish same & also furnish a copy
of these resolutions to the family of the Deceased.
