We, your Committee appointed to draft and furnish suitable resolutions on the death of our late Comrade, A. R. Mignon, beg leave to submit the following:

Comrade A. R. Mignon was born January, 1844, in Paris, France, and came to the United States in 1861 and enlisted in the Confederate Army at Salisbury, N. C. in 1863, - first joining Capt. Sands Company of Junior Guards, of North Carolina; was soon transferred to the Quarter Masters Department for the Salisbury Post, under General Mayer, where he served until April, 1865, frequently doing ^{"guard"} ~~guard~~ duty under General Alexander and Major Gee, of Florida. He left the Post at Salisbury, N. C. April 6th, 1865, with Major Gee, and Col. Forment and others, and ~~surrendered~~ May 1st, 1865 at Augusta, Georgia.

Comrade Mignon came to Fort Worth in 1880, _____, where he has continuously resided up to the time of his death, Sunday morning, ^{"1915"} October 25th, leaving surviving him his wife, of Fort Worth, and one sister; Therefore be it

RESOLVED: First, In the death of Comrade Mignon, his family loses a kind and loving husband and brother, our city and honored and upright citizen and R. E.
