FORT WORTH LEAGUE

SUBJECT: METROPOLITAN PLANNING (in an era of rapid expansion)

- SCOPE; 1. A co-ordinated system of traffic management and transportation.
 - 2. Orderly industrial expansion, with regard for the welfare of the citizens and in terms of the best use of available land.
 - 3. A co-ordinated plan to meet welfare needs, including day nurseries, and care and facilities for psychiatric patients.
 - 4. Standards of housing which will empahize health and sanitary codes and zoning regulations, and which will seek to eliminate and prevent neighborhood blight.
 - 5. Efforts to co-ordinate city-county services where feasible, and to week areas for cooperation in the greater metropolitan area comprising Tarrant and adjoining counties.
 - 6. Study of the economic resources of the area to determine present and future ability of the city and the metropolitan area to meet its needs; and study of all comprehensive tax and fiscal reports procured or published by governmental agencies within this metropolitan area.

Of the mix items originally intended for study this year, only three were brought to any kind of fruition:

1. Co-ordination of City County Services Ch. Jean Owens

3. Traffic and Transportation Ch. Connie Curtis

- 2. Orderly Industrial Expansion Ch. Margaret Rogers and Effic Gish
- The remaining sub-committees had to be shelved for the time being, as we were unable to get chairmen for these items. This indicates that in choosing a Local Current Agenda study for next year, we should keep in mind the small number of people available for work in the Fort Worth League, and limit our study to fewer items. In proposing a continuation of this study for next year, we plan to combine some of the items as originally outlined, so as to have only three or four

The three sub-committees that made reports to the general membership this year accomplished these things, briefly:

1. City County Services

items instead of six.

- a. Informed our members of the need for change in our present city-county set-up.
- b. Prepared the Fort Worth League to take action (after continued study) on the upcoming legislation for County Home Rule Charter on the State level.
- 2. Industrial Expansion
 - a. Informed our members of the importance of attracting the right kind of industry to our city.
 (Skit prepared and given by this committee was quite effective in pointing up what a city looks for inanindustry, and vice versa.)

3. Traffic

- a. Presented the membership with a brief but comprehensive picture of the Freeway-Beltway system now being developed around the Fort Worth area.
- b. Submitted a list of in-city traffic problems that need attention, as a guide for the next step in this study.

Step-by-step, this is how we accomplished the above:

Briefing Meeting, Sept. 8, 1958:

We outlined the general problem ahead of us thus:

What are we trying to do?

Study

Educate...ourselves and others

Legislate...if and where it seems necessary

Publish...if our results justify it

Overall Goal

Local problems...study these first

Area planning...possibly the second-year phase of this study...may want cooperation with Dallas League when we come to this phase.

How to go about it:

Set aside specific time each week, to work on it. Each member of each committee be responsible for:

1 source book

1 clipping

1 personal visit

1 original observation

Each committee chairman should submit a progress report to LCA chairman at least once a month. This should be typed in four copies, to be included in chairman's final report.

Unit Meeting, Sept. 15, 1958

Discussion at this meeting was limited to industrial expansion. Interest seems to center around problems of zoning as they affect home-owners. The idea of planned industrial areas obviously is dictated as second step.

Chairmen's Meeting with LCA Chairman, Sept. 26, 1958

The three items under study must be ready for presentation to general memebership by January and February.

Briefing and Two Unit Meetings in January, 1959 City-County Services

Chairman prepared several pages of typed information for unit discussion leaders:

- 1. General information on the faults in our citycounty services, as they apply to all incorporated areas.
- 2. Specific information on such subjects as hospitals, welfare, etc., of interest to special areas.
- 3. Copy of the proposed legislation to be introduced in State Legislature on County Home Rule Charter. The plan was to have the units discuss the information at one meeting, and to reach a concensus, if possible, at the second meeting on the need to change some of the city-county services.

Proposed Items for Continued Study:

- 1. Industrial Expansion
 - a. Inform public of need for leadership and of support for industrial growth of city.
 - b. Try to get zoning information better publicized.
 - c. Study planned indutrial areas in other cities.
 - d. Correlate need for good housing, schools, recreation etc. in well-planned cities, capable of attracting industries.

- B. Study in-city traffic problems, such as school traffic, downtown parking, etc.

Traffic Planning. Mr. Bob Buckman, Traffic Engineer.

A. Areas of special interest.

School areas. One-way traffic plan has worked only in Ridglea Hills, and not well there. Not enough money available for adequate signal system or policing. Tolution seems to lie with control by citizens, ideally through PTA or school authorities. No statistics available on accidents, but inconvenience now might eventually be extreme danger.

2. Shopping centers. Off-street facilities usually well handled by developers. City requires 3 sq. ft. parking area for each square foot of floor space; chain stores and others require 5-1 ratio. Increasing problem with downtown workers who leave

cars all day and ride bus to work.

3. Churches. Signals and speed limit signs used if general traffic

situation warrants. No special light.

4. Railroad crossings. Improvement must be cooperative. City can force railroad to pay only 10% of cost (Federal law.) Railroad may pay more in very dangerous situation.

5. Traffic signals. Placed on basis of reports from counters. Simplest type costs about \$3,000; automatics range from \$10,000 to 15,000. Any expense over 5500 must be approved by City Council. One man responsible for locating and timing all signals, two assistants keep constant check on traffic count.

6. Parking areas. City is forbidden by State Law from owning. Blocks of old buildings often cannot be razed because of complications

of ownership and high prices asked for property.

7. Condition of streets. Poor surfaces divert traffic to less desirable traffic patterns.

Industrial development affects everyone. When we think of it in terms of the economic structure, it is the backbone of our community. Let us see what 100 factory workers mean to a city.

Fort Worth is encouraging industry through the Industrial Development Committee, The Chamber of Commerce, large banks as well as Texas Electric and Lone Star Gas industrial departments.

It is an interesting fact that out of 100 suspects, three prospects are interested and in 3 years 1 industry is procured.

In November 1952, Fort Worth adopted a permissive type of zoning ordinance. This type of ordinance protects industrial areas from residential encroachment.

Many municipalities using the restrictive type of zoning have found that it is impossible to list all undesirable uses or have excluded certain inoffensive uses. It is impossible to anticipate all the new developments.

As an example of restrictive type of zoning - under the ordinance a plant manufacturing a particular plastic was established 9plastics were unknown at the time the ordinance was made). Because of distinctive and offensive odors it became a source of discomfort to nearby residents. If, under the permissive type of zoning, it would have been handled to permit it in a certain zone because of its odors.

Generally speaking light industry as differentiated from heavy industry is one in which no offensive vibrations, odors, dust, smoke, noise or gas is emitted.

From time to time changes in the zoning take place. This can be accomplished in the following way.

1. Get 50% or more of owners within 200 ft. to sign approval of change.

2. Return petition to Zoning Board.

3. Public notice given 15 days before hearing-all property owners within 200 ft. notified 10 days before hearing.

 Petitions heard. Recommendations given to City Council.
 City Council passes on Zoning Commission recommendations or turns it back to Zoning Board.

Zoning Board meets 3rd Tuesday of each month at 1:00 p.m. at City Hall Bldg. Three-fourths of members approval to pass.

Two late developments have been to require \$25.00 charge for each petition and a lapse of 3 months before re-petitioning. This is designed to cut down the repetitioning; it has not proved very effective. Erratic changes can take place, such as, a jump from residential to heavy industry.

Dear Mrs. Davis:

The Board of Directors of the League of Women Voters of Texas has granted permission to the League of Women Voters of Fort Worth to join with other Texas Leagues in metropolitan areas in working for a County Home Rule Amendment to the State Constitution. Your studies of coordination of city-county services and the decisions reached by your membership regarding the wisdom of a County Home Rule provision would seem to provide adequate background for a knowledgeable legislative program for your members.

I should like, however, to remind members that permission to work on State legislation for County Home Rule was a departure from the "rule" on such activities, as explained on page 10 of the Local League Handbook. Even at this writing we do not know exactly which local Leagues may be affected by the proposed Amendment. However, the State Board gave long and serious study to all aspects of this legislation and the local Leagues' positions on the subject, and concluded that it would be unthinkable for Leagues with positions of support not to work for this legislation. In other words, the Board felt that the County Home Rule Amendment might be supported by the few Leagues prepared to do so, but that this must not be construed as permission to work for separate and individual bills designed to correct individual defects in our present county government in Texas. Permission to support any other State legislation outside our State Program will require a new consideration by the State Board.

I am sure you are already in communication with the Leagues' threemember steering committee: Mrs. Sher, Mrs. Passmore and Mrs. Brownscombe. Let me wish you much success --- and I do hope you will keep the State Board informed of your activities. If there is anything you feel we can do to assist you, please let me know.

LWV of Fort Worth Bulletin January

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GOVERNOR PRICE DANIEL has proclaimed the week of January 25th as PAY YOUR POLL TAX week.

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LOCAL ITEM: Coordination between city and county services.

One of the items included in this study will be the problems of metropolitan financial relation ships. The process of paying for metropolitan services throughout Tarrant County pre ents several types of intergovernmental problems.

Many of Tarrant County's services are provided only to the unincorporated areas of the county or, at best, to the unincorporated areas plus the smaller cities and vill. Tes. Yet the services are financed from a county-wide tax levy, about 80% of which is paid by Fort Worth tax-payers.

The county Sheriff and hiway patrol, while theoretically serving the entire county, (377,535 in 1956) in practice provide police protection only for the unincorporated areas of the county. The incorporated areas provide for their own police protection in addition to paying most of the costs of rural police protection.

Dear Del:

While I have not yet heard if you will be able to go to Wichita Falls on October 1 with Halcyon Baggett, I'm hoping this will be possible for you, for we are so anxious to include you in the Consultant program next year. I know I promised that you would not be asked to do this kind of work until you had had some training, but you will be getting some training on that visit with Halcyon, and when Miss Urban gets here we'll evolve a much more formal training program. Incidentally, Wichita Falls has had a great blow -- Betty Story was forced to resign and as of this morning's mail no new president has been found -- so they'll need an extraordinary amount of help there.

The real purpose of this letter is to tell you that the first Consultant training session will be held with Miss Urban in Amarillo, immediately following the Area Conference there. But I should like to suggest that you plan to come with your delegation to Austin, and we'll try to set up at least a brief meeting with you and the members of the State Organization Committee who will be in Austin at that time. While it won't be so formal a training session, it will precede the Amarillo training and will undoubtedly consist to a garge degree of exploring particular areas to be included in the training session. I think this would be helpful to you, and I'm sure your suggestions and questions would be helpful to Miss Urban and the Organization chairman. There's absolutely no time available during the Austin Conference -- but perhaps you and the Organization people can have dinner with Miss Urban and develop at least the basics which will be needed for the training session.

I also would like to know if you've given any thought to my suggestion that Fort Worth delegates might like to spend the evening session of the Austin Conference in a private meeting with Miss Urban, rather than in the general session which will be devoted to legislative plans for the County Home Rule Amendment. Your decision will probably be based on how much of your present and potential leadership will be able to come to Austin -- and so I will leave this decision to you. But if you would like the special evening conference with Miss Urban, I would appreciate it if you would let me know so that she can make her plans for it.

Your August and September bulletins were, as usual, beautiful pictures of a good, going League. I am so especially angious that Ruth Hughes, state LCA chairman, shall receive as much information as possible on your work on metropolitan planning -- for this will

METROPOLITAN PLANING

MARY LEE ROLLOW

This month marks the launching of the Fort Worth League of Women Voters' BIGGEST project in its history - METROPOLITAN PLANING. With six important items included in the scope, your local current agenda committee proposed at their August 25th meeting that we take only two items for active discussion at our Unit Meetings in September. They will be Items II and IV. Below are discussion questions to be used at the Unit meetings.

Item II. Orderly industrial expansion with regard for the welfare of the citizens and in terms of the best use of available land.

1. What comprises disorderly industrial expansion? Give an example.

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2. In what ways can this be remedied?

3. Define the terms "light industry" and "heavy industry" as interpreted by zoning regulations.

What plans does our city have at present for the restrictions of locations of trades and industries? What protection does our present zoning system give the homeowners?

5. What inducements are given to new industries to bring them to Fort Worth? What factors influence them to settle here?

Item IV. Standards of housing which will emphasize health and sanitary codes and zoning regulations, and which will seek to eliminate and prevent neighborhood blight.

1. What changes do we need in our housing codes to prevent overcrowding in rental areas?

2. Is an educational program, plus a change in housing codes and zoning regulations, the answer to the problem of neighborhood blight?

3. Why are Fort Worth's housing standards so low and can we achieve a more rigid enforcement of up to date requirements?

NATIONAL ITEM II

How fine to hear from you again. So many times in the last fee menths I have langed for a visit with you, for I'm always interested in talking about the things that are going on which don't get into the minutes or the VOIER's. And your letter was full of just that kind of information.

Your problems relating to Units in areas not insluted in Fort Worth proper are precisely those which received so much attention at the Dallas Conference. This is not only a present problem in many places but is abvicually one that will affect more and more Leagues in the very most fature. As for as I know, Dallas is our only Taxas League that has so far experienced real difficulty with this, for I believe they lost several Units for the very reasons that you mantioned. I have not heard that either houston or San Antonio has yet had any real difficulties here, but I assume the reason for this is that their life has been a subject which went beyond the city limits. Houston has had a school item and San Antonio a Knew Year County and them a county budget item. Houston's present item on Immination of Overlayping Services has proved to be a transcalous interesting and smiting one — and one that I think every League in Texas will some or later feel an impolyement in.

I would engage that the only immediate solution open to you is to provide several possible LCA items for discussion for most year's LCA — items that do cover a larger governmental unit than the city. I would also strongly urgs that you appoint a consiste to explore those possibilities and make these proposals to the Units in the spring, a consiste composed of both board and make these proposeds to the Units in the spring, a consiste composed of both board and man-board annexes. URBAN RENEWAL ELECTION

ELECTION DATE — DECEMBER 16, 1958

Marking The Ballot!

SCRATCHING the candidates you don't want is now the ONLY legal method of marking the ballot. At the 55th session of the Legislature in 1957, the Election Law Code was changed for marking paper ballots. The SCRATCH METHOD is now mandatory. The desire of most voters to mark out the names of candidates not wanted was the reason given by most legislators for adopting this method. To make your vote count, just SCRATCH!

A referendum vote is required by State Law. All legally qualified voters who are property owners and who have rendered their proprty may vote.

The Federal Govenment will assist in carrying out Urban Renewal programs by paying two-thirds of the cost of:

> Providing streets and street lights Parks

Recreation facilities

Sanitary and storm sewers

Water

Demolition work

Land acquisition

The City pays the other one-third of the cost by:

- 1. Meeting its share of the cost directly in the yearly operating budget.
- 2. Schedule required public improvements so that they can be counted as all or part of the necessary contributions to projects.
 - 3. Establish a capital improvements

program.

Improvement to private property must be financed by the property owner. The Federal Government has provided under section 220 and 221 of the National Housing Act FHA mortgage insurance on 100% loans for as long as 40 years.

If the buildings on the private property are not suitable for rehabilitation the city may purchase the property, demolish the buildings and resell the property for private use.

Lake Como is the only area at present that qualifies for the Urban Renewal Program. There are seven other areas in Fort Worth that are eligible to qualify for Urban Renewal.

AIDS FOR REHOUSING DISPLACED FAMILIES

The law requires that decent, safe and sanitary housing be available to the displaced families at prices and rents within their means.

The FHA can insure loans on liberal terms for new or rehabilitated low cost private relocation housing anywhere in the community. Eligible for this housing are any families in the Urban Renewal area or those displaced by any other type of governmental activity.

Preference for admission to new or existing low-rent public housing is provided by law for displaced families of low income.

Payments up to \$100 for an individual or family, and up to \$3,000 for a business concern, may be made by local redevelopment or urban renewal agencies to cover actual moving expenses and other direct losses of property resulting from displacement from the project area.

HOW URBAN RENEWAL IS ADMINISTERED

A group of citizens or board will be

appointed by the City Council to govern the local program. Actions of this board will be subject to approval by the City Council.

FOR:

Slum areas require twice as much fire protection, four times as much police protection, seven times as much health service, yet the income to the City from these areas does not begin to offset the cost.

The exact wording of this item is:

Support of constitutional provisions for an effective judicial structure.

- 1) a single system of centrally administered statewide courts with a uniform fiscal policy;
- 2) a uniform code of criminal and civil procedure formulated by the Supreme Court with legislative approval;
- 3) assignment of judges according to special training and docket needs;
- 4) a full-time, legally trained judiciary;
- 5) integration of Justice of the Peace Court functions into courts of record.

The Fort Worth League submitted its second round of program recomendations to State this past week. A majority of our Board favored a study of accounting procedures in State government as part of continued TCR study. A minority favored a study of assessing penalties by juries, also under TCR: These items were not recommended by the State Board, but may have some chance for consideration at the State Convention.
