LUBBOCK -- Dr. John Schweitzer, director of graduate studies in the Department of Mass Communications at Texas Tech University has been selected as one of 15 faculty members from throughout the United States to attend the Poynter Institute's Media Management Program.

The teaching workshop on journalism education is conducted by top media management personnel and will take place July 19-29 in St. Petersburg, Fla.

Schweitzer said journalism educators will learn about media management, public image, credibility, ethics, labor relations and technology among other topics and will study the Dallas market and its two competing newspapers in a group case analysis.

A professor at Texas Tech since 1984, Schweitzer has published 16 journal articles, has presented academic papers at annual meetings of the Association for Education in Journalism and Mass Communications and the American Academy of Advertising and serves on the editorial review board of the Newspaper Research Journal.

Schweitzer's previous experience includes work as publisher of the Terre-Haute Tribune-Star, a morning-evening and Sunday newspaper of 50,000 combined circulation in southwestern Indiana from 1980-83. In 1979-80, he formed his own marketing research company in Dallas. He was a visiting professor at Kent State University in Kent, Ohio, in 1983-84.

LUBBOCK -- Director of Office Planning Bob Bray announced the appointment of Larry J. Tanner as the new director of Facility Planning and Construction at Texas Tech University.

Tanner, who has been assistant director of planning and construction for the past two years, assumed the new position Monday. He replaces former director Jack Fenwick, who accepted a similar position at Georgia Tech University.

"I'm very delighted to have a man of his calibre and his experience. He has good support across the campus," said Bray.

As chief architect for the campus, Tanner will be responsible for hiring architects, supervising campus construction and enforcing the architectural and code compliance styles of the university.

Tanner is a 1971 graduate of the TTU School of Architecture and has since been associated with the university in numerous capacities. While in private practice he taught part time in the departments of Architecture and Civil Engineering.

During his initial employment with the Office of Planning he served as a campus inspector of university construction. As assistant director of Facility Planning and Construction he shared responsibility with the director for the construction of \$33 million in campus projects.

During his career, Tanner has been involved in numerous multi-million dollar projects in both the private and institutional sectors. His projects have varied from commercial, public school, medical and hospital to university.

LUBBOCK -- Interior designers can learn to use AutoCAD (Computer Assisted Design) Monday through Wednesday (June 29 through July 1) at Texas Tech University.

Participants will draft simple floor plans, draw elevations, plan lighting and electrical overlays and arrange furniture on the computer program. Topics to be covered include operating commands, program terminology, creating graphics, editing drawings, making symbols and three-dimensional drawings and advantages and disadvantages of the AutoCAD program.

Dr. Janet Schrock, Texas Tech professor of merchandising, environmental design and consumer economics, will conduct the workshop. She teaches a class in computer-aided drafting and has used computers in designing for more than eight years.

The workshop will meet from 1-4 p.m. Monday (June 29) and 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday and Wednesday (June 30 and July 1) in the College of Home Economics' Computer Learning Center. The workshop is sponsored by the Division of Continuing Education and the College of Home Economics' Department of Merchandising, Environmental Design and Consumer Economics.

Ten individuals can attend the workshop which costs \$197.
