
In ending a year as President of COMA, I want to express my appreciation to all the members who have been active and have helped in the various projects that we have had for COMA.





His first job in the United States was as a dishwasher in an El Paso restaurant. Having previously worked in Juarez, Mexico, as a bank teller, he was determined to succeed in the United

A few months after his arrival in the United States, Mr. Cisneros started working as a laborer in the insulation industry. This proved to be the turning point in his employment career. He worked as a truck driver, a warehouseman, worked in shipping and receiving, in purchasing and then 12 years after having started out as a laborer, was made Vice-President of the company. For a man who had been a U.S. citizen for only seven years, this was quite an accomplishment.

At age of 33, with an investment of \$3,000, Mr. Cisneros was cofounder of Star Insulation Company.

Ever resourceful and innovative, Mr. Cisneros took the initiative to design and build much of the firm's operating equipment - some of which is still in use today. An initial investment of \$3,000 is now netting sales of over two million dollars a year

History and Purpose of COMA

Comerciantes Organizados Mexico Americanos

Comerciantes Organizados Mexico Americanos or as it has grown to be known. COMA, is an organization of Chicano businesspersons and professionals which grew out of the organizational efforts of Bidal Aguero. It was in December of 1973, that a group of businessmen called together by Mr. Aguero gathered to organize COMA. This was the second effort to try to follow through with initial plans which were conceived almost one year prior and had failed to materialize into an organization.

The businessmen present at this organizational meeting in December were: Roy Montelongo, Gilbert Flores, Pete Alcorte, Ismael Hernandez, Gonzalo Ramirez, Bidal Aguero, Manuel Alaniz, and Agustin Medina. It was at the urging of Roy Montelongo to act without delay that the organization was officially chartered as a non-profit organization by the State of Texas in February of 1974.

Throughout the first year, Mr. Aguero, who had been appointed as temporary President, presided. A subsequent meeting was held where the following officers and directors were elected: Mr. Ismael Hernandez, Vice President: Mr. Tony Reves, Secretary; Mr. Roy Montelongo Treasurer, along with directors, Mr. Marcos García Ayala, Mr. Ramon Chapa, Mr. Jorge Moreno, Mr. Albert Perez, and Mr. Julio Ysasaga. This steering body of successful businessmen and professionals provided the leadership

which assured the initial success of the "Mexican American Chamber of Commerce — COMA" and provided twenty initial members.

During the second year, Gilbert Flores presided as President of the organization. It was a year of much success and outstanding recognition. It was during COMA's second year that a state organization. The Texas Association of Mexican American Chambers of Commerce, was chartered. At the first state convention, two members of COMA, Bidal Aguero and Tony Reyes, were elected Vice-President and Secretary, respectively, of the statewide organization, TAMACC. COMA grew to be recognized and respected throughout the State and Nation.

It was during this administration that members of COMA, Gilbert Flores and Bidal Aguero along with Executive Director, Hector DeLeon, traveled to Washington D.C. for a series of meeting sponsored by the U.S. Department of Commerce—Office of Minority Business Enterprise for TAMACC. Delegates to the Washington meeting met with top administrators of S.B.A., V.A., C.S.A., E.D.A., and the Under Secretary of Commerce. The highlight of the trip was an opportunity to attend a reception held for President Gerald Ford by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce at which delegates met and talked with the President.

Keynote Speaker

Dr. Lauro Cavazos

President of Texas Tech University

Lauro F. Cavazos, President of Texas Tech University and Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center in 1980 truly marks the beginning of the Hispanic Decade. Aside from his interest in administration, Dr. Cavazos also practices academic health planning and promotes medical and graduate education. He is presently a professor of Anatomy for the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center and a professor of Biological Sciences for Texas Tech University.

Dr. Cavazos acquired his B.A. degree in Zoology in 1949 from Texas Tech. In 1951 he acquired his M.A. degree in Cytology and thereafter in 1954 acquired his Ph.D. degree in Physiology from the Iowa State University in Ames, Iowa. His basic research interest is in physiological studies by electron microscopy and histochemistry of the reproduction tract. He has assisted in over seventy-six scientific publications which include Spanish versions on the subject of reproductive physiology and medical education.

Dr. Cavazos is presently a consultant for the Pan American Health Organization whose purpose is to evaluate the Anatomy Departments in Mexico and Central America. In 1974, he was a founding member of the Pan American Association of Anatomy and as Councilor from the United States represents the American Association of Anatomy. He is also a representative from North America to the Administrative Committee - Federación Panamericana de Asociaciones de Facultades (Escuelas) de Medicina. His most recent honor that deserves recognition is his 1980 appointment by U.S. President Carter to the Board of Regents of the Uniformed Services University in Virginia.

Dr. Cavazos has been active in the immediate Lubbock community as a member to the United Way Board, the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce, the Board of City Development and is an honorary member of the board of the American Red Cross.

Listed in the American Men of Science and Who's Who is America, Dr. Cavazos has recieved various education and teaching awards including Texas Tech University's 1977 "Distinguished Graduate," and Iowa State University's 1979 "Alumni Achievement Award."

Dr. Cavazos and his wife Peggy Ann Murdock, are the proud parents of ten children ranging from fourteen to twenty-four years of age.

Dr. Cavazos has undoubtedly surpassed the reality of the 80's as the "Decade of the Hispanics."



History and Purpose of COMA

Comerciantes Organizados Mexico Americanos

Comerciantes Organizados Mexico Americanos or as it has grown to be known, COMA, is an organization of Chicano businesspersons and professionals which grew out of the organizational efforts of Bidal Aguero. It was in December of 1973, that a group of businessmen called together by Mr. Aguero gathered to organize COMA. This was the second effort to try to follow through with initial plans which were conceived almost one year prior and had failed to materialize into an organization.

The businessmen present at this organizational meeting in December were: Roy Montelongo, Gilbert Flores, Pete Alcorte, Ismael Hernandez, Gonzalo Ramirez, Bidal Aguero, Manuel Alaniz, and Agustin Medina. It was at the urging of Roy Montelongo to act without delay that the organization was officially chartered as a non-profit organization by the State of Texas in February of 1974.

Throughout the first year, Mr. Aguero, who had been appointed as temporary President, presided. A subsequent meeting was held where the following officers and directors were elected:Mr. Ismael Hernandez, Vice President; Mr. Tony Reyes, Secretary; Mr. Roy Montelongo, Treasurer; and directors, Mr. Marcos García Ayala, Mr. Ramon Chapa, Mr. Jorge Moreno, Mr. Albert Perez, and Mr. Julio Ysasaga. This steering body of successful businessmen and professionals provided the leadership which assured the initial success of the "Mexican American Chamber of Commerce — COMA" and provided twenty initial members.

During the second year, Gilbert Flores presided as President of the organization. It was during COMA's second year that a state organization, The Texas Association of Mexican American Chambers of Commerce, was chartered. At the first state convention, two members of COMA, Bidal Aguero and Tony Reyes, were elected Vice-President and Secretary, respectively, of TAMACC. COMA grew to be recognized and respected throughout the State and Nation.

It was during this administration that Gilbert Flores and Bidal Aguero along with Executive Director, Hector DeLeon, traveled to Washington D.C. for a series of meeting sponsored by the U.S. Department of Commerce—Office of Minority Business Enterprise for TAMACC. The highlight of the trip was an opportunity to attend a reception held for President Gerald Ford by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce at which delegates of TAMACC met and talked with the President.

In January of 1976, Roy Montelongo was elected President of COMA. It was Mr. Montelongo's goal to get 100 members in the organization. During an intensive membership drive that goal was met and surpassed. A major highlight was the publishing of the COMA Business and Professional Directory, a first in Texas, which contains more than 300 individual listings of Chicano business and professional persons.

In July of 1977, COMA once again distinguished itself in the State and elected Mario Perez as President of TAMACC
