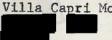

STATE BOARD MEETING ARRANGEMENTS -- Donna Green and Jan A. have been busily making the necessary arrangements for our meeting in January.

Since Rather House is not available, we will be at the Villa Capri. Donna will cater breakfasts in the suite and one dinner at Jan's Wednesday evening. Lunch (submit vouchers) will be on your own. Soup & Salad luncheons are available at the Villa Capri for \$3.00 (or you may bring peanut butter). As you know, our lunch allowance is \$2.50. Tuesday evening, dinner will be on your own. If you have any money left after the holidays, would you be willing to pay for this meal yourself (or fast). The motel will cost \$110 more than Rather House. If we do not voucher for the Tuesday evening meal, we will save \$68.00).

If you would like to be at the Capitol for the beginning of the session, we have allowed two hours for this.

The deadline for suggested bylaws changes is Dec. 30. At deadline for preboard I have not received any suggested changes except the Lubbock "Sunset" proposal. I understand that Houston LWV will present an amendment. I'll have that by board time. Please bring your copy of the Lubbock change.

If you have any suggestions please send them to me immediately.

I have one suggested change:

Article VIIIConvention Sec. 2 Composition

The convention shall consist of the delegates chosen by members of the local Leagues, as provided in Sec. 4 of this Article, the presidents of local Leagues, or an alternate, in the event the president is unable to attend, and the members of the board of directors of the League of Women Voters of Texas.

Sec. 4 Representation The members of the League of Women Voters of the United States who are organized into recognized local Leagues in the state of Texas shall be entitled to woting representation in the convention as follows: the president of the local League or an alternate, in the event the president is unable to attend, one delegate for the first 15 voting members and one delegate for every 10 additional voting members or major fraction thereof belonging to said local League on January 1st of said year. The record in the state office of paid voting members shall determine the official membership count for this purpose.

This is in the Standard Bylaws for State Leagues. Although the present bylaws provides for the LL president as a delegate in addition to the number chosen by the members it does not specify that the president may have an alternate. This has been generally understood but perhaps should be spelled out.

This was clearedup for council when we changed the name from Presidents Council to Council and specified that each local League shall have 2 delegates.

LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS OF TEXAS LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS OF TEXAS EDUCATION FUND BUDGETS FOR 1979 - 80

"A budget is a guide that reflects the priorities of the organization in terms of money. A budget is flexible enough for the board to plan its activities, but general enough to allow for unexpected expenditures or changing priorities. A budget is imaginative in that it translates creative ideas into dollars and cents; and at the same time it is realistic in terms of what those creative ideas will cost." These are some of the thoughts expressed at the budget committee meeting on November 13. We also defined our role in the budget making process as follows: "The committee proposes options for the board to consider. The committee does research and presents the results of that research to the board." These goals and responsibilities were considered very carefully in the preparation of the budget(s) on the following pages.

The LWV-Texas and TEF are supported financially by the local leagues. The PMP paid by local leagues accounts for the largest single item of income: about 60% of the T budget, none of the TEF, and about 30% of the combined budgets. Outside support from the community accounts for the next big item: 12% of the T budget, 60% of TEF, and about 40% of the combined budgets, including the restricted grants. The other large source of income, and expenses, is the "in-out" category; like council fees, DPM orders, etc. The "in-out"'s account for about 18% of the T budget, 30% of the TEF, and about 25% of the combined budgets.

Keeping the office open is the one big expense: about 25% of the T budget, 10% of the TEF, and about 20% of the combined budgets. The second biggest expense is "Board and Administrative": about 20% of the T budget, 6% of TEF, and about 12% of the combined budgets. As with the income, "in-out"'s account for about 18% of the T budget, 30% of TEF, and about 25% of the combined budgets. The other approximately 35% of the T budget, 45% of TEF, and about 40% of the combined budgets goes for the things that we think of in league as organization, public relations, program, and restricted grants.

The budget committee is presenting to you two budgets. We recommend Budget A. We feel that this budget allows for some flexibility and allows the board to do more of the things it would like to do. Budget A does mean that the PMP will be raised to \$7.50. The committee did get a strong recommendation that the PMP not be raised; but we feel that Budget B with a \$7 PMP is just too restrictive. These PMP recommendations are based upon the membership as of January 1, 1978. Neither Budget A nor Budget B will fund everything that league leaders would like. Both budgets allow for only two updates of the Voter mailing list a year, allow for no mini-board meeting in February, and some other reductions. It would take an additional 50¢ in PMP in order to fund these items.

Both budgets reflect additional sources of income for TEF. We recommend that all restricted grants have an administrative fee written into them and that the total of these fees be \$900. The total for restricted grants is a "guess" only. The grants listed are those suggested to us. The board will have to decide which specific grants to try to get funded. The TEF budget also depends upon a "Fund Raising Event". This was suggested by the Development Chair as "An event (possibly a testimonial dinner) coordinated by the Development Chair and designed to raise significant funds for the TEF". These two TEF additional sources of income represent a saving of about 50¢ in PMP. Without them the PMP would have to be raised to \$8 for Budget A and \$7.50 for Budget B. If this were done the additional 50¢ could be paid with tax-deductible monies; such is not the case with the proposed budgets.

We do not intend to send all this material to the Local League Presidents nor to be a portion of the Convention Workbook. A condensed form, about half this size will be available for your consideration at the January Board meeting. Feel free to contact the chair or any of the committee members, if you have any questions concerning these budgets.

Pre-board TEF--Jan Wilbur

1. Environmental Legislation Conference—attendees partially funded by the EQ pass-though grant: Betty Anderson, Catherine Perrine, Meg Titus, Laura Keever, and Jan Wilbur. (Eleanor Sutherland could not come but through slow communications, registration fee was paid for her. We cannot get a refund.)

The conference was very well done although it was a disappointment that some of the expected speakers failed to show—Doug Costle and Adlene Harrison were two no-shows. The panels were well balanced and each had a humanist comment on the issue which added an interesting dimension (in most cases). Preliminary expense figures indicate wewill exceed the allotted funds by between \$10-\$50 depending on whether we pay all of Nana's expenses and what Meg's hotel bill is. Would like your approval to take extra money out of S.2 (attendance at Conferences and workshops). The upcoming issue of Enviro-notes will be devoted to reports of the various sessions.

- 2. Nana Rylander attended the municipal water conservation conference in Chicago Nov. 28-29. The Clean Water Fund came through with all of Nana's transportation costs. I would like us to pay Nana's out of pocket expenses for room and ground transportation (\$41.20) from the EQ pass-through grant (or S.2). Nana has written a comprehensive report. Madeleine suggests we might want to put out another issue of Enviro-notes devoted to municiapl water conservation. What's your pleasure?
- 3. Envrio-notes: Per your instructions, I will approach Terry Hershey with aleternative proposals for funding: re-fund Envior-notes (with an off-board person handling it); fund publication of VOTER inserts; or fund League News Service articles on environmental issues. Will report results at board meeting.
- 2. (cont.) According to Ethel's figures we have \$270 left to fund the current issue of E-N and a January issue, if we choose to go with it. This includes a contribution from Lt. Col Hennies (a m-a-l) and one from Ruth Lofgren.
- 4. In reviewing minutes, I find the approval of paying Jan C.'s registration fee for the "Onshore Impacts..." Conference is not reflected therein.

 Move we correct the September minutes to reflect this approval (or approve it in retrospect at this meeting.)

Pre-board Report LWV-T--Jan Wilbur

- 2. Landlord-tenant legislation—National replied that this does fall under the national position.
 "The LWVUS agrees with the Dallas League's conclusion that enforcement of tenant-landlord laws, such as the model law endorsed by the American Bar Association, would encourage the maintenance of the housing supply and provide greater equality of opportunity in housing..."
 Accordingly, I have given Dallas the green light to contact other local Leagues for their support of landlord-tenant legislation.
- 3. Jan C. (and Kathleen Kenefick, Brazos Co.) reviewed the <u>Wisconsin film</u> on urban crisis and decided it would not be appropriate to Texas. For a detailed report on how a simple job can mushroom into one <u>big</u> headache, ask Jan.
- 4. Hope you all read Laura's comments on the "Draft report to the President by the Interagency Review Group on Nuclear Waste Management." (If you think the comments are long and complex, you should see what she had to read!) I call your particular attention to sec. 2 under Institutional Issues on p. 5. It's important for us to remember that "While the LWV-T does not support an arbitrary "veto power" being extended to states, states should have the right to veto nuclear waste disposal sites if they are persuaded that environmental or safety problems are not adequately addressed...."
- 5. Meanwhile on the water front-Marshall/harrison County League is opposing drawing water from Caddo Lake to supply Shreveport. They are keeping in touch with Shreveport LWV and with Catherine on that. Latest word is that they want us to oppose the Red River Compact in its present form. Catherine tells me it has taken years of negotiations involving a cast of thousands to arrive finally at the Compact which has already been approved by the Louisiana Legislature and maybe one other state (?). Catherine will bring us the latest work on this issue.
- 6. Have you suggestions on the way to conduct program development breaks at Convention? In Fort Worth, we had (ahem) our management by objective exercise. How should the groups be divided—arbitrarity? by program items? big league, small league? Should the discussion by unstructured? Structured along the lines of what we did in Lubbock? Structured some other way? I'd liek to have your suggestions before board meeting but if that's not possible bring themto board meeting, please.
- 7. The three Jans and LucyAwill probably meet before the board meeting to arrive at some suggestions on what to do with our school finance positions (unless it says in the agenda that we will meet some time during the board meeting). Any suggestions on that issue would be welcome as well.

Preboard report - Adult Corrections from Lucy Polter and Diana Clark December 18, 1978

We hope that there will be some time, perhaps one evening, when we can share our three-day experience of prison affairs. We need to talk about what we saw and what we felt about what we saw not only to get your reactions but to test some of our preliminary conclusions.

We visited the Ferguson Unit (first offenders from 17-21male) Saw cells, unoccupied at the time, painted bright colors,
reasonably clean, very small to have to hold three. Wide corridors with lines painted on floor. Inmates must walk between wall
and painted line only (single file) for security reasons...guards
can see down corridors to prevent hanky panky?. School bright and
well equipped. Run by a regular school district. Visited all
vocational shops--machine, auto repair, meatcutting, etc. Not used
at time of day of our visit. Mess hall clean, prisoners allowed to
talk in reasonable tones. Did not see administrative segregation or
solitary unit. The thought of three locked up in a single sell for
ad. seg. bothersome. Came home to find there had been a bad incident just before we had arrived. Perhaps that is why we did not meet warden. Food adequate if heavy. Overall impression subdued,
tightly controlled. No fear. (Also watched brooms & mops being made.

Afternoon visit to hospital at "Walls" unit. five stories where patients on stretchers must be strapped in a basket to get up narrow stairs or tiny elevator. Reasonably clean, not full. Paraplegic ward most distressing. First floor clinics terribly crowded. Built in 1933 needs to be torn down. Health care looked reasonable to LP.

In pouring rain saw all the industry and shops at this unit. Textile mill straight out of Dickens. Even with earplugs I would be deaf in an hour. Inmates manning machinery issued ear plugs and masks...many not wearing them. Provides all uniforms, bedding, towels, etc for the entire system from the raw cotton to finished product. Machinery repair shops comparable to free world but much cleaner and neater. Construction division cheerful office, inmate draftsmen. We were told by Const. div. chief that all can get excellent jobs in free world. We can believe it. Did not see inmate living quarters on this unit. Did see magnificent brass bars in visiting area.

Second day..visit to Diagnostic Unit where all new inmates come for processing. Same impression generally as got from Ferguson. Howevery, inmates very subdued (I suppose those coming thru for second or third time were more bored than scared). After all testing and screening, nothing much to do so inmates spend a lot of time in cells.

Meeting and lunch with (male) warden of Goree Unit for women.

More like a typical prison than was Mountain View. Relatively cheerful. Some older cell blocks dreary but at least women can have more personal things around than can the men who are limited to what can fit on a shelf over cell door. Women knit or chochet spreads, etc. Classrooms very cheerful, garment factory well lit. (Only industry at this unit) Women not required to walk single file in corridors

Second afternoon and third morning....interviews with division heads. Treatment, in which we had most questions was newly promoted. Had been former administrative assistant to Estelle which meant that he had taken a lot of flack in the past few months. He also had a terrible cold. We talked a lot about educational opportunities and found that limits on vocational training is mainly space. Inmates apply to participate when courses are advertised thru system. Only accepted after review of record and opinion of counselor (DC is not sure just who is considered a "counselor") Also touched on pre-release programs. Interview was too short for indepth coverage of all inmate affairs with which this division is responsible.

We learned more than we wanted to know (almost) about agriculture. Most interesting fact is that budget has so far not allowed much to be spent on improving the land used for pasture or crops. Nor has the available land increased to provide food, yet the inmate population to be fed has doubled in past 10 years. System owns

105,000 acres

Legal division chief reviewd statutes. Discussed "Ruiz" although he personally has little to do with case directly. The Attorney General's office is handling it as it does all suits against the system (it sounded like there are always a lot). Is also in charge of a staff of 12 inmate lawyers who handle civil matters-divorce, child custody, etc. They do not represent inmates with suits aginst the system. (The lawyers are not inmates, they represent them)

Industries Division...meemingly more interested in making money for the system than in training inmates, or even keeping them busy.

Money goes into a revolving fund.

Construction Division...always has plenty of work for inmates. Covers all maintenance too. Has building trades training programs. One at college level uses union teachers --plumbing and electrical mostly. By using inmate labor, 1/3 to 1/2 cost savings. Inmates can be in a special trusty classification earning "good time". We think Texas' good time law is quite liberal and probably substitutes for pay.

Special Services division head not available. Talked to personnel chief. They do have problems at lowestlevel of correctional officers. Low salary primary problem. Legislature must solve. Ratio of 1 c.o to 11 inmates is set by legis. Presently exceeded by overcrowding.

Business division chief...very capable, should have been on Broadway. Explained budget, need for prison in Valley (good ag. land with enuf water is reason) "west Texas is too dry and too cold for ag" What defines "west Texas?"

Perhaps it was a fitting end to three extremely interesting, but depressing days. When we woke up at 6:30 a.m., all the electricity in the Institute of Contemporary Corrections hotel where we were staying went out. We crept down four flights of stairs in the pitch dark. Have you ever tried to put toothpaste on the brush with your eyes shut? It had rained hard most of the time and Friday morning everything was frozen, including the windshield wipers on Lucy's car. Fortunately it stopped raining and we got back to Dallas exhausted both physically and mentally, lbut knowing a lot more than when we started and very glad we went.

The plan to hire a work-study student to help out on L.O. and monitoring didn't work out for a number of reasons. So I then called UT Volunteer Services and the gal there was most excited about finding students to help monitor. Three students have already called me and one even has legislative experience. I visit with each about his/her interests, send a priorities flyer, annual report, and anything else that seems appropriate, and tell them we'll get in touch in January after their class schedule is finalized. Needless to say, I don't know how this will work out, but it certainly seems worth a try.

Unless it gets too expensive, my plan is to obtain two copies of each bill that relates to issues included in our priorities flyer. One copy will remain in new office filing cabinet (thanks to the Lynn Albers lend-lease program), and the other copy will go to the appropriate program chair.

The following procedures are suggested:

- 1. Program chair receives second copy of bill and notifies LO immediately
 - a. don't worry about it;
 - b. will take some time to look over -- we may act on it;
 - c. ready to recommend action -- if so, please send analysis with reasons for support or opposition to LO with copies to president and program vicepresident. If I don't hear from either, and concur with recommendation, and there is room, it will go in the newsletter (COPY FOR WHICH SHOULD ARRIVE IN THE OFFICE BY WEDNESDAY);
 - d. let LO know if this bill is important enough to warrant testimony, either written or oral, and who will be responsible for the testimony (if program chair is unable to testify, don't count on an Austin League member, just prepare written testimony.) The LO will check with sponsors of bills we support to find out if sponsor wants us to keep low profile or be visible. If progr m chair has already contacted sponsor, let LO know.
 - e. you may wish to write an analysis of a bill "For Your Information" only, but I hope this won't happen too often, as newsletter should primarily be used for issues needing action.
- Because LO may not know the importance of some bills (we don't read them before we send them out), program chairs will receive the only copy of some bills.

Happy Holidays!

My favorite quote of the season:
Brazos River Authority General Manager Walter Wells, addressing the Governor's Water Task Force on the topic of President Carter's water policy-"We're all for conservation, but not the President's definition. Are we going to capitulate and say reduce the use of water, or are we going to fight for what we believe?"

Jan A.—Many thanks for the two bills. I'll report on these & other prospects at the Bd. meeting. Here's another one to look for: legislation to boost the value of the \$176,000 remaining in the Water Development Fund to \$1.7 billion. It works something like this: The TWDB Board sells the bonds authorized and puts the money in a reserve fund; then issues more bonds with a 10% guarantee of the bonding commitment from the reserve fund. River Authorities, MUDs, etc. would pledge revenues from water supply projects for the latter bonds, with the state reserve fund as back-up. The front page of this week's Texas Water Report is devoted to this brainstorm of "bonds expert W. E. (Buck) Tinsley," who suggested it to Gov.'s Water Task Force. Proposed title: "Regional Water Supply Act of 1979."

And another: Rumor (Stuart Henry) has it that Vincent, Elkins is drafting a bill that would enable developers—as in Ft. Bend & Harris Counties—to build their levees without the inconvenience of getting them approved by the Texas Water Commission.

Enclosed (or on the back if Joann is in a paper-saving mood) is a letter from Marshall/Harrison County Pres. Sallie Gullion. I have suggested via phone, and will do so again in writing, that she get assent for their position (that the Red River Compact should not be approved until protection is provided for Caddo Lake) from other Leagues in the Red River Basin: Wichita Falls, Lamar County, and Sherman. Will also write Herb Grubb asking the status of their "firm yield" studies on Caddo, which were in progress last time I inquired. What the Marshall people want is a definite limit on the quantity of water that can be pumped from the lake by Shreveport. We'll need to write the Arkansas, Oklahoma, & Louisiana Leagues if we give them the OK to testify and lobby on this.

Speaking of Arkansas, today's mail brought a hot-off-the-press copy of the water supply section of the Arkansas State Water Plan, detailing the various studies that need to be made prior to any interstate agreement for export of water from those basins where surpluses may exist in some years and some months. Copy was courtesy of Arkansas LWV water chair Lois Imhoff.

Nana Rylander did to to the Chicago conference on water conservation (yes, that means using less to EPA), found it very interesting, & has written an article on it for the next (final?) Enviro-Notes. She has also agreed to come to Dallas for an EPA conference Jan. 24-25 on coordinating water quality requirements & water supply planning. Joanne Adams (LWV-San Antonio), who has served on the S.A. "201" advisory committee on construction grants planning, and I went to an EPA planning meeting last week on public participation in "201" committees, also attended by LWV people from other states in the region.

Dear Katherine:

During this session of the Texas Legislature the Red River Compact will come up for consideration. We have some reservations about the Compact which we would like for you to consider.

The portion of the Compact which refers to Caddo Lake makes use of the term "conservation storage capacity." Although that term is defined in the compact, it is not clearly defined as it pertains to natural lakes, particularly Caddo. We fear that the term may mean all the water in the lake.

Shreveport, Louisiana, has submitted a request to the New Orleans Corps of Engineers to build a pipeline of 100 million gallons per day capacity. We fear that Shreveport's withdrawal endangers Marshall's water supply and the ecological balance of this unique lake. There is no protection in the Red River Compact for either eventuality.

We request the support of the League of Women Voters of Texas in lobbying to prevent the passage of the Red River Compact in the Texas Legislature in its present form.

- I. On the annual report to LWVUS I am asked to respond to the following question:
 - " C. Citizen participation is now mandated for many government programs. Has your experience shown that these requirements make an impact on the way these programs are carried out? Please give specific examples."

I have mixed feelings about some of the citizen participation I have observed. If any of you have some specific examples would you please jot them down for me or tell me about them at the board meeting?

Following you will find the revised guideline for Local Leagues who wish to take II. action on an item thatx on which there is no state position.

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TAKING ACTION --- GUIDBLINES FOR LOCAL LEAGUES

In our lobby efforts with the state legislature it is important to remember that the strength of the League of Women Voters lies in the fact that we take concerted action and speak with one voice. Because of limited people power and other resources it is important that our major lobbying efforts to focused on the legislative priorities determined by the board of directors of the State League.

We recognize that occasionally a local league will have spent a good deal of time studying an issue which requires state legislation for implementation. The following guidelines will help local leagues when they need to take action at the state level on an issue on, which there is no state position.

when the issue in question requires action for only the area of the ZSt state where that particualr league is located the local league should:

1) Obtain local board authorization

An example of the above would be where there is a bill in the legislature to build a hospital in Midland. The Midland League supports the building as a result of a local study. The Midland League could lobby for the bill.

mg,

When the issue in question will be one on the which the state league has no position and when it would require a solution that would affect other areas of the state, the local league should:

1) Obtain local board authorization to act

2) In form the state league board

3) Outline the affected positions their relationship to pending legislation or regulations and ste the action requested

legislation or regulations, and the the action requested
4) Sand plans and proposals to all local leagues affected by the proposed action

5) All local Leagues affected must then reply promptly and must:

a) assent to the proposed action

- b) raise no objection to the proposal (Note: failure to reply is regarded as assent)
- c) object and give reasons
- 6) The local league requesting the action must then send the data from the responses to the state office with copies to the president and the program vice-president. The state board or the legislative executive committee will then consider the proposal and either grant or deny permission to act.

An example of the above would be when a local league with a position on libraries would ask permission to have other leagues with like positions join them in the lobbying for more state funds for libraries.

First, I enjoyed the EQ Legislative Conference enormously. It was particularly helpful to talk to Bill Keese and his aide—Bill is going to introduce an empities solar energy bill, and I'm delighted to be in on the beginning of that. (For a change, I'll have something comparable to property tax reform, instead of several "little" bills—though of course we will still have those too!) I have had several communiques with Bill's aide, and I hope the omnibus bill will be a good one.

The status of retrofitting of state buildings is indeterminate. I was able to add to the legislation the Texas Energy Advisory Council is supporting a statement on retrofitting of state-owned buildings (my motion passed unanimously-whoopee!) but I'm not at all sure what that means. I think Gov. Hobby then chooses that legislation which he wants to support and has it prepared (or sees that it gets prepared)-whether or not he will choose this is anybody's guess-he at least seemed impressed with my figures of what we could save, but he could have been just being tolerant that day. Rep. Barrientos' aide that was interested in this is leaving to work for Bob Armstrong; I have no idea if her replacement will be interested. I will hope to see Barrientos after the first of the year.

TOP NEWS OF ALL! The TEAC accepted the recommendation of the Environmental Committee (advisory) that a special committee be formed to look at policy issues of nuclear energy in a m comprehensive manner. The committee will report back to the Council and then to the legislature & governor by next September 1. And I have been appointed chairman! I have wanted to do this for several years; I am absolutely thrilled to have this chance to work with outstanding people, make the trips we need to make, hold the hearings we need to hold, etc. and really do an outstanding jub. I think it is an opportunity to really do something positive for the State of Texasand, happily, for the League as well. As you can tell, I'm on Cloud 9.

Carole, I have had my interview with Don Crawford, and I think it went very well—despite the fact that I went into his office without a stitch of underwaar on. I hope I will be allowed to have 2 minutes of board time to explain that statement—I'll know by your comments how many of you read this far in my board report. I think they will contribute \$1,000, though I suggested that between \$2,000 and \$12,000 would be appropriate! So much for that approach!

The Project Outreach Committee has met once and plans to meet once more before the board meeting. I am pleased with our progress, though we still have a lot of thinking to do.

The statement on nuclear waste storage is enclosed for those of you who have the stamma to read. I forget what a pleasure it is to do something substantive.

Happy holidays to all of you. It is a pleasure for me to serve with you.

P.S. I am fairly pleased with the revisions to the policy document adopted by the TEAC. I finally got in a commitment to energy conservation in state buildings, plus support of continuing the Energy Development Fund. The public hearing on the policy document lasted from 9:30 - 3:00-with quite a number of people presenting statements. I was pleased.

The Department of Energy hearing also went quite well, though it was difficult to be on my feet all day. The room was filled with industry representatives with only a few "citizens", which was unfortunate. DOE did servi top people down, however, (Ruth Clusen was one!) and made a good effort to pay fax the expenses for citizen group representatives from each state. On the whole, the dialog was positive and helpful in my opinion. I received the following letter from the Regional Administrator: (I am not going to give the honorarium to the League; I'm going to buy a filing cabinet with it instead before I go under.)

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Dear Mrs Keever:

We deeply appreciate your serving as Moderator for the NEP-II Public Hearing in Dallas, Texas on December 6, 1978. Your skill and fairness as a presiding officer enabled persons with differing views to express their opinions within a framework that remained open and amicable. Your expertise in facilitating audience participation contributed to the overall success of the Public Hearing.

Gathering in Austin for the January board meeting brought us back to Leaguedom after the holiday season. Compared to Lubbock, I usually consider Austin a warm spot — but not this time. We shivered as we dashed from the state office to the Capitol to see the legislators sworn in, and then to our board meeting.

Planning for Convention and the legislative session occupied most of our agenda time. In the four-month period remaining in this biennium, Legislative Day will be the last of February (the 28th); Convention will be the last of March (March 30-April 1); and the end of the session will be the last of May (May 28th). The pace of activities will heighten in the days ahead.

CONVENTION -- One of the serious matters the board considered was the proposed per-member payment (PMP) figure and the budget. The subject was fully debated before our final recommendation. We are proposing to convention delegates a PMP figure of \$7.50 for each year of the next biennium. We had hoped to increase our membership by nearly 400, and an increase in PMP would not have been necessary. However, we did not reach our goal. Our membership report shows 3,635 for 1979 as compared with 3,842 for 1978. We are grateful to those Leagues who have been able to significantly increase their membership; we will recognize you at Convention.

A great deal of time was also spent on various other Convention matters. The bylaws and program recommendations are included in the mailings to presidents. Workbooks containing all the pertinent Convention material will be mailed in early March.

The Proposed Program recommends a continuation of the Administration of Justice study and a restudy of school finance. In addition, the board is recommending deleting several support positions under various items.

We are anticipating a fantastic Convention, and we urge you to be among those present. Speakers will be the LWVUS President, Ruth Hinerfeld; and Sarah Weddington.

President's Letter

LEGISLATIVE SESSION -- The session is proceeding with its deliberations, and by the 28th of February activities should be well underway. We are striving to adhere to our legislative priorities; we know you will be alert to action possibilities. Read the Legislative Newsletter for the latest information.

Remember, it is very important for local Leagues to contact either the appropriate state program chair or the LWV-T Legislative Office (512) 478-6932 when testimony before a legislative committee or state agency is contemplated.

And a reminder that if the Leg. Ofc. does not hear from you regarding who is to receive the second free copy of the Newsletter, the LL president will receive both copies.

The deadline for returning legislative interviews is January 31.

There are two issues (constitutional initiative and ERA) not on our priorities that we discussed at the board meeting, and I would like to share our thinking with you. The Sept. Board Report stated that we did not plan to actively engage in supporting constitutional initiative. In fact, conditions have changed so much since this position was reached, the state board is recommending deletion of the position. Since monies from corporations and unions can now support ballot issues, it is felt that initiative would be dominated by an intense, unelected minority using direct mail, TV commercials, and other techinques of mass persuasion. Clear, settled opinion about policy rarely sprouts spontaneously from the public. It is best given shape by representative institutions which are deliberative bodies.

The strategy of Texans for ERA, with which we concur, calls for a very low-key approach. The legislative leaders do not want to bring it up, and the legislators do not want to vote on ERA rescission. Keeping the turbulent waters as quiet as possible will be our goal. The Legislature has already decided the issue, and there are important issues concerning Texans that legislators must address rather than reopening the ERA case.

OTHER NEWS

- . The field service consultants will be at Convention for consultation.
- . Membership awards will be presented at Convention.
- . The latest LWV-Texas Publications Catalog is enclosed. LL Presidents, please pass your second copy (along with order blanks) to your Publications Chair who does the ordering for your League.
- . Also included for LL Presidents & DPM are the LWV-T and TEF budget analyses as of 12/31/78. Note that they also list current PMP payments and LL TEF account balances. Please check these with your treasurer's records.
- Remember the complaint we filed with the Department of Justice in 1975 after monitoring revenue-sharing funds? The case is finally settled, and seven state agencies have agreed to refrain from future discrimination and have approved the implementation of recruitment programs to attract more blacks, Hispanics, and females.
- Dallas will be one of the 15 Leagues monitoring local use of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds under a national LWVEF project.
- . The nuclear waste disposal documentary, funded through a LWVUS-EF grant, is on schedule. Pat Bruno and Pat Nickell of Lubbock have acquired ten hours of raw footage from their trips to Albuquerque, Los Alamos, Denver, and Austin. They also plan to do on-site filming of the Waste Isolation Pilot Project (WIPP) site near Carlsbad, N.M.

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- . LWV-Texas members of national committees include Madeleine Appel, chair of the LWVUS budget committee; Jan Coggeshall, Urban Crisis committee; and Meg Titus, EQ committee.
- . Meg presented the LWVUS statement on EPA's new source performance standards for coal-fired utility plants at EPA's public hearing November 29-30 in Washington, D.C. A letter was also sent early in January urging that the standards not be weakened in any areas of the U.S.; it supported (among other things) uniform controls, including "full scrubbing" on all new coalburning power plants. If you wish to have the complete text of the letter for your files or to discuss it with local industries or your Chamber of Commerce, request a copy from the state office.
- . Diana Clark and Lucy Polter spent three days in December in Huntsville collecting material for the Adult Corrections publication.
- . Jan Wilbur, Catherine Perrine, Laura Keever, Meg Titus, and I attended the Environmental Legislation Conference, directed by Bobette Higgins, in Austin in December. The report can be found in the November-December Enviro-Notes.

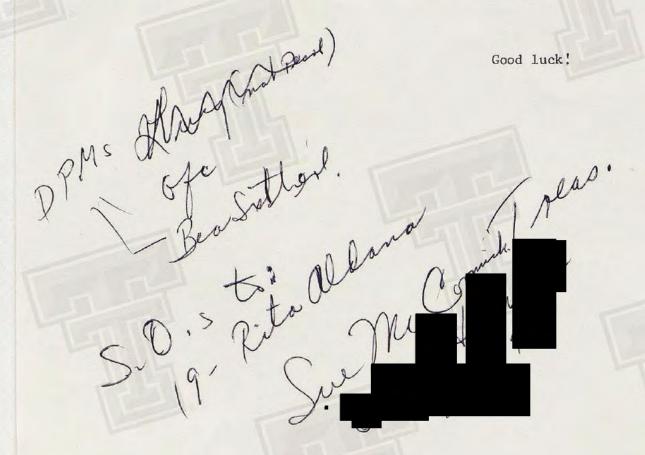

C. Probation Officer

- 1. How effective do you think probation is in adult correction and rehabilitation?
- 2. What is you opinion of combining probation and parole services?

- 2. The League will provide a food stamp slide for PSA use on television stations across the state. It will have the League name on it and recorded words stating that "There is a new food stamp program in Texas. For information, call 1-800-xxxxx or your local food stamp office." Texas, of course, pays \$140 a month for a family of four for everything!

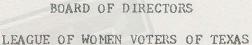
LWV of Texas January, 1979 State Board Report S. Public Relations

Subject: A case study of a League and its impact on a community in an election or why your city can't live without the League of Women Voters!

Problem: Just 30 days before January 20, 1979, the City Council in the city of Galveston called an election to allow the citizens to vote yes or no on five complicated charter amendments. Since the local League had no position on the amendments, the challenge was to inform the public so they at least knew what they were voting on. This is how the Galveston board took action, which could not begin until after 10 days were lost over the Christmas holidays, leaving only 19 days before the election to do the following:

- 1. Three consecutive Friday mornings, on the League <u>Insight</u> public service radio program, opponents and proponents debated the issues with call-in questions, each program lasting an hour and a half. They had a huge listening audience.
- 2. The League sponsored an evening public forum for the community which was broadcast live and taped for Community Television. The League requested funds from the Texas Education Fund to purchase the colored tape used to record the TV and it was shown two times again on community television. The meeting was crowded.
- 3. The League took call-in questions on another radio show with call-in questions for a different station; publicity for the League for that Sunday!! The League printed a Voter Guide with the pros and cons of the amendments. It was also reprinted in the newspaper.
- 4. The League surveyed the community and developed ten questions which seemed to be on the public's mind. They asked both sides to answer them and they were run on the front page of the local paper as a "Charge-Countercharge" every day, using the League name and questions.
- 5. The League did PSAs about voting and did the usual election night reporting by League members for all the radio stations.

The result of all this was the League's name before the public every day prior to the election. This is how "visibility" helps strengthen a League. The Assistant Manager of the Chamber of Commerce stated on the air that the League had done an outstanding job on the election, and added, "I don't know what this city would have done without the League in this election."

ABSENT: Hunter and Shlipak

President Anderson called the meeting to order at 4:10 p.m., January 9.

1. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Anderson announced that Shlipak was absent for several reasons including a house being flooded due to frozen water pipes, and that Hunter was ill and would not be coming. This is the first board meeting Hunter has missed in eight years. Coggeshall MOVED the following resolution expressing our regret:

WHEREAS the BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS OF TEXAS has traditionally been an instrument of service to the League community and to the State of Texas through the service of its members of the Board of Directors; and

WHEREAS one of the members of its Board of Directors has rendered exceptional and long service to the League at the local, state and national level; and

WHEREAS her dedicated service as a member of the Board of Directors has been evidenced by her perfect attendance at state board meetings during the past eight years;

Anderson asked for suggestions the state board wished to make to the national board. Responses included the following:

1. President's Report, Suggestions to national, cont'd

ACTION. Keever suggested there should be more Action Alerts, about ten per year, because there are so many action suggestions in Report from the Hill that LLs do not know just where to place priority. Clark suggested that could be done by simply better identifying action priorities in the R/H.

TREASURER'S ANNUAL REPORTS. Sturgis urged that annual reports be based on a local or state League's own fiscal year.

DEVELOPMENT. Coggeshall and Clark suggested we affirm our support for use of a generous sharing formula and continuation of current clearance procedures.

PUBLICATIONS. Perrine and Clark felt the national publications have been excellent, but there have been so many that they may not be getting the attention they deserve. Coggeshall and Brown suggested the traditional cover letter sent with new publications is unnecessary.

ROLE OF STATE BOARDS. Coggeshall thought state boards should somehow be encouraged to take a more active role as liaison between national League program and LLs. Appel suggested a memo on how SBs can be effective in helping promote goals and program of the national board might be included in the new kit Taking the Lead.

NATIONAL VISITS. Sturgis said it would be helpful if national board members could each make one visit to a state board meeting, perhaps in conjunction with that state's council or convention.

2. MINUTES THE REST TO MODERNING BOTH BUTTON BENEFIT

Minutes of the November state board meeting were approved with the following corrections:

Page 3, #6 Nembership by men, first line, insert some members of after "reported."

Page 4, #8 Organization, State Units, third paragraph, Other SUs, in second line strike "members" and insert interested people instead.

Page 6, #10 Program, Water, third line, strike "Abilene" and insert Adlene Harrison, EPA Regional Administrator, and in the fourth line, strike "Abilene" and insert Dallas.

Also on page 6, #12 Convention Task Force Recommendations, strike entire last sentence.

Page 7, #13 Legislative Session, Legislative Priorities, under Administration of Justice, third item should read, "Jail Standards Commission funding."

Page 8, #14 Calendar, third item, deadline for bylaw changes, change date to Dec. 30.

3. TREASURER'S REPORT

Sturgis reviewed the Budget Analysis for June 1, 1978 through December 31, 1978 as well as estimates of income and expenses for the remainder of the fiscal year. She estimates an uncommitted balance of about \$2000. She pointed out that under budget category S. Organization, field service will probably be underspent while state units and membership will be overspent. Item S.10. Mailings to LL presidents, is also running high, and board members were urged to be selective with these communications.

3. Treasurer's Report, cont'd

Brown called attention to page 4 of the Budget Analysis which shows six LLs have still made no PMP for this fiscal year. She will alert the Field Service Representatives about this. (It was later discovered that some of this had been paid.)

4. BYLAWS

Due to Hunter's absence Brown reported various proposed bylaw changes.

Proposal from Bylaw Committee, Hunter. Albers MOVED we accept the Bylaw Committee proposal and recommend to state Convention 1979 that Article VIII Convention, Section 2 Composition and Section 4 Representation be changed for clarification and to conform to standard bylaws for local Leagues by inserting in Section 2 after the phrase "presidents of local Leagues" the words or an alternate, in the event the president is unable to attend and by inserting in Section 4 after "shall be entitled to" the words voting representation in the convention as follows: the president of the local League or an alternate, in the event the president is unable to attend. SECONDED AND CARRIED. (See also bylaw proposals from LWV-Houston, Article VIII.)

Proposal from LWV-Lubbock. The Lubbock League had proposed a "sunset" bylaw for state League program, Article XI, which would require either restudy or dropping of a program item (with the exception of vertical program) ten years after member agreement. Keever MOVED we NOT recommend to Convention that the Lubbock proposal be adopted. SECONDED. There are some LLs who support this proposal and also some who oppose it. Some opposing it stress that it is the job of each Convention to carefully consider each program item. Several SB members felt it is our responsibility too, to more carefully review existing program items when making recommendations to Convention. Keever MOVED the previous question. The motion to close debate CARRIED. The main motion was then voted upon and CARRIED.

Proposals from LWV-Houston. Article III. Houston suggested adding the concept of state units as a specific classification of membership in Article III Nembership, Section 2 How Composed and Section 3 Types of Membership. Hunter's report stated that this was not necessary because members of state units are members-at-large who are now listed as a membership classification. Also she had stated that wording of Article III must be consistent with Article III of national League bylaws. Wilbur MOVED that in Article III, Section 3 Types of Membership, part c. second sentence, the last two words "state League" be struck and the words League of Women Voters of Texas be inserted in their place in order to make LWV-T bylaws conform to LWVUS bylaws. She further MOVED we NOT recommend to Convention passage of the LWV-Houston proposal for changes in Article III. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

Article V. Houston proposed inserting a new second sentence in Article V Board of Directors, Section 6 Special Meetings, to read A majority of the current board members may call a special meeting. Hunter's report indicated this change was unnecessary because the president pro tem (or designated vice president) could, in case of an emergency, act in place of the president and therefore could call a special meeting. (This provision is in Article IV Officers, Section 3 The Vice-presidents.) Keever MOVED we NOT recommend this change to Convention. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

Article VI. Houston proposed reversal of the order of parts a and b in Sections 1 and 2 of Article VI Recognition of Local Leagues, to improve the

logical sequence of ideas. The state board felt the present sequence is logical. Sturgis MOVED we NOT recommend this change. SECONDED AND CARRIED. Houston proposed adding to Article VI a new Section 3 State Units as follows:

a. A state unit is a group of members-at-large in a community who wish to share League study and discussion.

b. The board of directors of the League of Women Voters of Texas has the responsibility for the establishment of state units. State units may be organized in communities in which no local League exists or where it is not possible at the time to carry on the full program of local League activities. Perrine MOVED we DO recommend this change in order to explain the state unit process. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

Article VIII. Houston proposed reversal of the order of Sections 1 and 2 of Article VIII Convention. The state board felt the present sequence is the more logical. Clark MOVED we NOT recommend this change. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

Article IX. In Article IX Council, Section 3 Authorization for Action, second sentence, Houston proposed to strike the word "majority" and to insert in its place the word vote. They also proposed in Section 4 Quorum to strike the word "more" and insert in its place the word fewer. Wilbur MOVED we DO recommend these changes for clarification and correction and further MOVED the state board recommend reversal of the order of Sections 1 and 2 of Article IX in order to be consistent with the sequence in Article VIII. SECONDED AND CARRED.

Article XIII. Houston proposed to strike the comma in Section 1 Parliamentary Authority. We agreed this editorial change should be made.

Recessed at 6:15 p.m.

SECOND: PLENARY SESSION
Called to order by President Anderson at 10:00 a.m. January 10. All present except Shlipak and Hunter.

5. CONVENTION

Rules. Cummins suggested we propose the same rules as the last convention with one exception. When Convention occurs during the legislative session, a procedure is needed for handling of action suggestions. Cummins proposed a rule to set up an Action Motions Committee similar to that used at the last LWVUS convention. Keever suggested there be a time set aside early in the agenda for suggestions from the floor to this committee. Written suggestions could also be given to this committee until a set deadline. There was general agreement to follow both these suggestions.

Arrangements. Tilley reported that Governor-Elect Clements had declined our invitation to speak. She has invited Sarah Weddington and awaits a reply. Tilley goes to San Antonio next week to work on Convention details. She will try to locate any needed audio-visual equipment for showing of films or video-tapes. Possibilities for showings include Lubbock's bandwagon, the Austin energy conference, the nuclear waste documentary, and the welfare slide show. These could be shown during Friday morning registration period as well as Saturday evening. If a pre-convention briefing is held on how to be a good delegate, it will be given by the president and the parliamentarian.

5. Convention, cont'd

Membership and Representation. Brown reminded us that LLs had been told there would be a special celebration if each local League is represented at Convention. She will make provisions for that eventuality. The awards for the membership contest with its several categories will be scrapbooks embossed or engraved with the League's name, Membership Contest, 1979, and scrolls prepared by Diana Tilley.

Program Development. It was agreed that delegates would break into small interest groups for program development, then regroup to share ideas.

Agenda. Clark MOVED the proposed convention agenda be adopted. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

6. ORGANIZATION

Brown reported that the provisional LWV of Rockwall has circulated their survey among the provisional committee members (Anderson, Hunter, Brown, Sturgis, and Polter). With the correction of a minor budgetary imbalance, it is all in good order. Brown MOVED we recommend to the LWVUS board that the PLWV of Rockwall be given full local League status. SECONDED AND CARRIED. The survey and this recommendation will be hand carried tonight to the national board meeting by Appel. The Rockwall League will be informed of our action promptly.

7. PROJECT OUTREACH

Chairperson Keever reported that the committee (Appel, Brown, Coggeshall, Hunter, Keever, and Field Service Representative Sugihara) recommends that Project Outreach be specifically a field service project aimed at local Leagues close to failure such as the valley Leagues. They further recommend the LWV-Brownsville for a pilot study on what to do for a League in this situation. They urge appointment of a special committee to include both on and off board representatives as well as representatives from the LL involved. This committee would then develop specific plans for the project. Keever's committee suggested this special committee might initially meet and attend League meetings for a 2 or 3 day period in a community away from the valley which has a successful League that could serve as a role model. That would hopefully provide a rejuvenating experience for the troubled League. This could be followed by a series of several meetings in the area of the targeted League. These procedures would probably expend all the funds (\$1000) we hope will be allocated for the project.

There followed some discussion on how to involve members of minority groups in League activity. Several board members expressed the feeling that such persons are more often oriented toward action rather than study and can best be involved in League action activities.

The Project Outreach Committee recommended that state board members more often develop off-board committees to involve local League members with us in our various activities. They also felt the budget allocation for membership should be increased so that an active membership committee could function.

Brown suggested this project could begin by consultation among the LL president, the FSR, and the state board at the February state board meeting and Legislative Day. The board agreed.

7. Project Outreach, cont'd

Appel MOVED acceptance of the Project Outreach Committee's report. SECONDED AND CARRIED. Anderson thanked the committee, and it was agreed that its work was finished, and it could disband.

8, VOTER

Appel announced the deadline has to be February 1, in order to have the VOTER out before Convention. It will be basically devoted to Convention with background information, workshop news, proposed program, proposed bylaw changes, proposed budget, and the nominating committee report. There will also be a president's column, information on legislative issues and the Capitol Corps, the statement of ownership, and possibly a story on D.C. representation and ERA status.

9. PROPOSED BUDGETS

Budget Chair Jeannette Vanderwater explained how the committee had functioned in four subcommittees which researched separate portions of the budget. She then reviewed two proposed budgets for LWV-T. Draft A totaled \$48,859 based on a per-member-payment of \$7.50. Draft B totaled \$46,895 based on a PMP of \$7.00. These drafts were based on an unofficial membership count of 3930, a figure she said may be too high. She pointed out that a drop of one percent in membership would mean lowering the budget by \$300. Neither of the draft budgets allowed funds for expenses should there be a special legislative session. Vanderwater was also not sure the draft budgets allowed enough for the increase in postal rates. She asked that our recommendation for the 1980-81 PMP allow some cushion for inflation as well as possible fund-raising difficulties.

Vanderwater also presented two proposed budgets for LWV-TEF. Draft A was based on a PMP of \$7.50 and draft B, a PMP of \$7.00. Both totaled \$62,910 with the few differences in specific items appearing mostly in the category of shared services with LWV-T.

There was a lengthy question and discussion period. Then Wilbur MOVED we recommend adoption of draft A (\$7.50 PMP) for both LWV-T and LWV-TEF. SECONDED. Coggeshall MOVED TO AMEND the proposed TEF budget by changing category C. 2. Administrative fees, restricted grants, from \$900 to \$300 and, to compensate for the \$600 loss in income, by reducing:

- O.1.b. Public Relations, VS/CI, Communications from \$300 to \$200.
- O.1.e. Public Relations, VS/CI, Precinct participation from \$300 to \$100,
- 0.2.a. Public Relations, Development, External Contributions from \$1200 to \$1000, and
- P.2.c. Program, Publications, Promotion from \$200 to \$100.

SECONDED AND CARRIED. Polter MOVED to further AMEND the proposed TEF budget by changing categories A.3. Contributions, Restricted cash and Q. Publications and Projects, Restricted from \$27,050 to \$63,550. SECONDED AND CARRIED. It was understood that Vanderwater would make the necessary adjustments in the explanation column.

Brown MOVED TO AMEND the proposed LWV-T budget by reducing category S.2.a. Organization, Field Service, Representatives and Director from \$2200 to \$2100 and by adding a new category under S. Field Service to be titled New Leagues and allocated \$100 as seed money. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

9. Proposed Budgets, cont'd

Keever suggested the proposed LWV-T budget be amended by changing category S.5. Organization, Membership from \$100 to \$250, category T.2. Program Action from \$2600 to \$2500, and category R.3. Public Relations, VOTER from \$3280 to \$3230. General consent was given.

There was concern about category E. Special Fund-Raising Event, \$1150 in the proposed TEF budget. Several board members felt a clearer proposal for such an event should be prepared for presentation to the general membership. However there were no specific changes or suggestions, so the category and explanation remained as proposed.

Discussion followed on the differences between the two draft budgets which result from the differing PMP proposals. Anderson pointed out that we had alerted the membership that an increase of 329 members would be a virtual necessity for us to recommend the \$7.00 PMP. The main difference between the two budget drafts is that draft A provides funds for a professionally led leadership workshop to be held in conjunction with Council in 1980. Draft A also would provide minor increases in mailings to LLPs and program action. It was pointed out that Draft B provides no leeway for changes due to inflation, catastrophes, or unexpected postal rate increases.

After lengthy debate Carpenter MOVED the previous question. The motion CARRIED. Wilbur's main motion to recommend the draft A budget proposals for LWV-T and TEF was then put to a vote and CARRIED 8 to 4.

Coggeshall MOVED we recommend a PMP of \$7.50 for the 1980-81 fiscal year. SECONDED. There was brief discussion, and Appel said that other fund-raising events would be necessary. The motion CARRIED twelve to one.

It was agreed that if cuts in the proposed budget must be made at Convention, we recommend dropping the leadership workshop set for Council 1980.

Vanderwater then distributed draft copies of proposed budget information for the LLPs, DPM and Convention workbook, as well as the March VOTER. She invited our comments on it.

Recessed at 12:45 p.m.

Reconvened at 2:45 p.m.

10. MEDIA 108499 and more abuser bisso party and the states suode

Appel announced plans for increased quantity of press releases to record our reaction to legislative happenings. Albers and Tilley will make the decision on when these are appropriate. It is hoped this procedure will increase League's political impact and visibility.

Cummins distributed copies of the proposed convention agenda. It was agreed that adjustments would be made to start the Sunday meeting earlier and add a time for general direction to the board.

18. NOVEMBER LEGISLATIVE BRIEFINGS

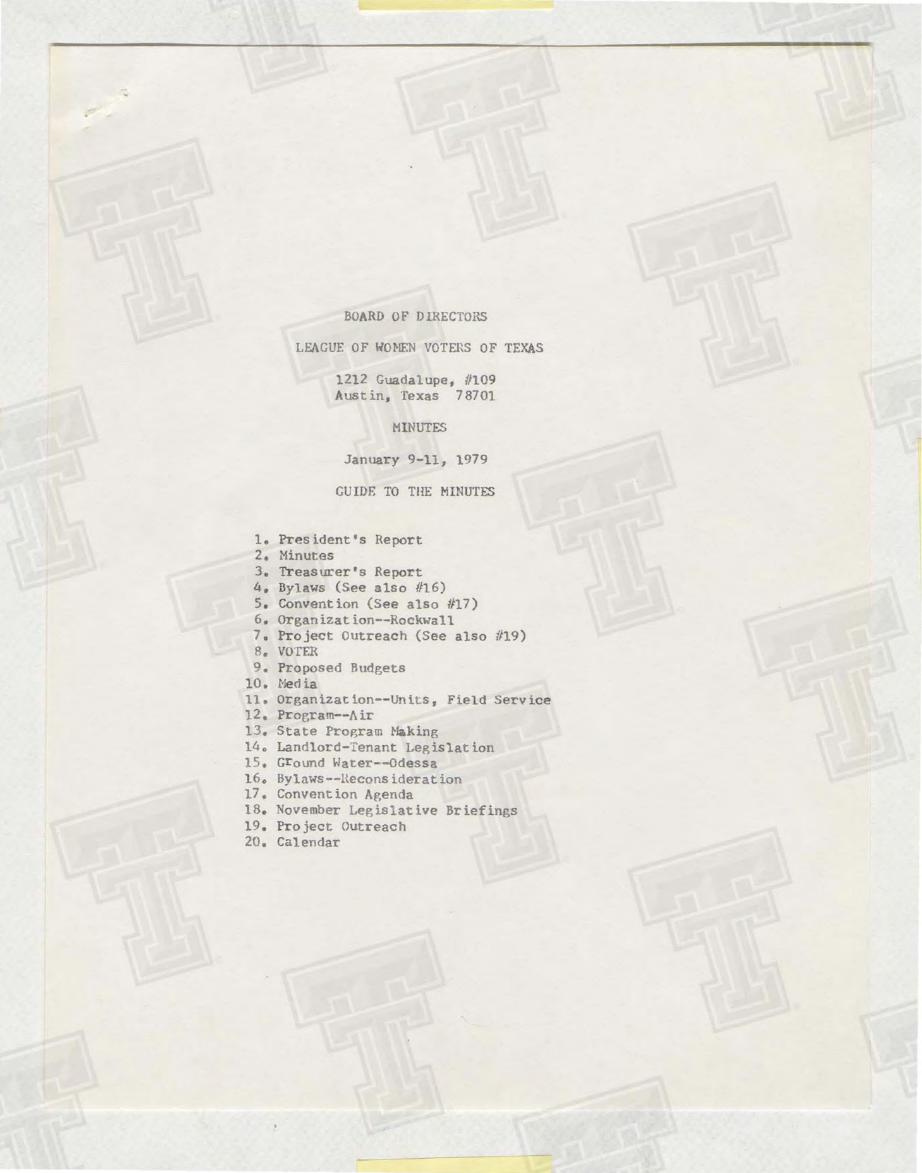

PUBLICATIONS. Perrine and Clark felt the national publications have been excellent, but there have been so many that they may not be getting the attention they deserve. Coggeshall and Brown suggested the traditional cover letter sent with new publications is unnecessary.

ROLE OF STATE BOARDS. Coggeshall thought state boards should somehow be encouraged to take a more active role as liaison between national League program and LLs. Appel suggested a memo on how SBs can be effective in helping promote goals and program of the national board might be included in the new kit Taking the Lead.

NATIONAL VISITS. Sturgis said it would be helpful if national board members could each make one visit to a state board meeting, perhaps in conjunction with that state's council or convention.

2. MINUTES

Minutes of the November state board meeting were approved with the following corrections:

Page 8, #14 Calendar, third item, deadline for bylaw changes, change date to Dec. 30.

3. TREASURER'S REPORT

Sturgis reviewed the Budget Analysis for June 1, 1978 through December 31, 1978 as well as estimates of income and expenses for the remainder of the fiscal year. She estimates an uncommitted balance of about \$2000. She pointed out that under budget category S. Organization, field service will probably be underspent while state units and membership will be overspent. Item S.10. Mailings to LL presidents, is also running high, and board members were urged to be selective with these communications.

3. Treasurer's Report, cont'd

Brown called attention to page 4 of the Budget Analysis which shows six LLs have still made no PMP for this fiscal year. She will alert the Field Service Representatives about this. (It was later discovered that some of this had been paid.)

4. BYLAWS

Due to Hunter's absence Brown reported various proposed bylaw changes.

Proposal from Bylaw Committee, Hunter. Albers MOVED we accept the Bylaw Committee proposal and recommend to state Convention 1979 that Article VIII Convention, Section 2 Composition and Section 4 Representation be changed for clarification and to conform to standard bylaws for local Leagues by inserting in Section 2 after the phrase "presidents of local Leagues" the words or an alternate, in the event the president is unable to attend and by inserting in Section 4 after "shall be entitled to" the words voting representation in the convention as follows: the president of the local League or an alternate, in the event the president is unable to attend. SECONDED AND CARRIED. (See also bylaw proposals from LWV-Houston, Article VIII.)

Proposal from LWV-Lubbock. The Lubbock League had proposed a "sunset" bylaw for state League program, Article XI, which would require either restudy or dropping of a program item (with the exception of vertical program) ten years after member agreement. Keever MOVED we NOT recommend to Convention that the Lubbock proposal be adopted. SECONDED. There are some LLs who support this proposal and also some who oppose it. Some opposing it stress that it is the job of each Convention to carefully consider each program item. Several SB members felt it is our responsibility too, to more carefully review existing program items when making recommendations to Convention. Keever MOVED the previous question. The motion to close debate CARRIED. The main motion was then voted upon and CARRIED.

Proposals from LWV-Houston. Article III. Houston suggested adding the concept of state units as a specific classification of membership in Article III Membership, Section 2 How Composed and Section 3 Types of Membership. Hunter's report stated that this was not necessary because members of state units are members-at-large who are now listed as a membership classification. Also she had stated that wording of Article III must be consistent with Article III of national League bylaws. Wilbur MOVED that in Article III, Section 3 Types of Membership, part c. second sentence, the last two words "state League" be struck and the words League of Women Voters of Texas be inserted in their place in order to make LWV-T bylaws conform to LWVUS bylaws. She further MOVED we NOT recommend to Convention passage of the LWV-Houston proposal for changes in Article III. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

Article V. Houston proposed inserting a new second sentence in Article V Board of Directors, Section 6 Special Meetings, to read A majority of the current board members may call a special meeting. Hunter's report indicated this change was unnecessary because the president pro tem (or designated vice president) could, in case of an emergency, act in place of the president and therefore could call a special meeting. (This provision is in Article IV Officers, Section 3 The Vice-presidents.) Keever MOVED we NOT recommend this change to Convention. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

Article VI. Houston proposed reversal of the order of parts a and b in Sections 1 and 2 of Article VI Recognition of Local Leagues, to improve the

logical sequence of ideas. The state board felt the present sequence is logical. Sturgis MOVED we NOT recommend this change. SECONDED AND CARRIED. Houston proposed adding to Article VI a new Section 3 State Units as follows:

a. A state unit is a group of members-at-large in a community who wish to share League study and discussion.

b. The board of directors of the League of Women Voters of Texas has the responsibility for the establishment of state units. State units may be organized in communities in which no local League exists or where it is not possible at the time to carry on the full program of local League activities. Perrine MOVED we DO recommend this change in order to explain the state unit process. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

Article VIII. Houston proposed reversal of the order of Sections 1 and 2 of Article VIII Convention. The state board felt the present sequence is the more logical. Clark MOVED we NOT recommend this change. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

Article IX. In Article IX Council, Section 3 Authorization for Action, second sentence, Houston proposed to strike the word "majority" and to insert in its place the word vote. They also proposed in Section 4 Quorum to strike the word "more" and insert in its place the word fewer. Wilbur MOVED we DO recommend these changes for clarification and correction and further MOVED the state board recommend reversal of the order of Sections 1 and 2 of Article IX in order to be consistent with the sequence in Article VIII. SECONDED AND CARRED.

Article XIII. Houston proposed to strike the comma in Section 1 Parliamentary Authority. We agreed this editorial change should be made.

Recessed at 6:15 p.m.

SECOND: PLENARY SESSION
Called to order by President Anderson at 10:00 a.m. January 10. All present except Shlipak and Hunter.

5. CONVENTION

Rules. Cummins suggested we propose the same rules as the last convention with one exception. When Convention occurs during the legislative session, a procedure is needed for handling of action suggestions. Cummins proposed a rule to set up an Action Motions Committee similar to that used at the last LWVUS convention. Keever suggested there be a time set aside early in the agenda for suggestions from the floor to this committee. Written suggestions could also be given to this committee until a set deadline. There was general agreement to follow both these suggestions.

Arrangements. Tilley reported that Governor-Elect Clements had declined our invitation to speak. She has invited Sarah Weddington and awaits a reply. Tilley goes to San Antonio next week to work on Convention details. She will try to locate any needed audio-visual equipment for showing of films or video-tapes. Possibilities for showings include Lubbock's bandwagon, the Austin energy conference, the nuclear waste documentary, and the welfare slide show. These could be shown during Friday morning registration period as well as Saturday evening. If a pre-convention briefing is held on how to be a good delegate, it will be given by the president and the parliamentarian.

5. Convention, cont'd

Membership and Representation. Brown reminded us that LLs had been told there would be a special celebration if each local League is represented at Convention. She will make provisions for that eventuality. The awards for the membership contest with its several categories will be scrapbooks embossed or engraved with the League's name, Membership Contest, 1979, and scrolls prepared by Diana Tilley.

Program Development. It was agreed that delegates would break into small interest groups for program development, then regroup to share ideas.

Agenda. Clark MOVED the proposed convention agenda be adopted. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

6. ORGANIZATION

Brown reported that the provisional LWV of Rockwall has circulated their survey among the provisional committee members (Anderson, Hunter, Brown, Sturgis, and Polter). With the correction of a minor budgetary imbalance, it is all in good order. Brown MOVED we recommend to the LWVUS board that the PLWV of Rockwall be given full local League status. SECONDED AND CARRIED. The survey and this recommendation will be hand carried tonight to the national board meeting by Appel. The Rockwall League will be informed of our action promptly.

7. PROJECT OUTREACH

Chairperson Keever reported that the committee (Appel, Brown, Coggeshall, Hunter, Keever, and Field Service Representative Sugihara) recommends that Project Outreach be specifically a field service project aimed at local Leagues close to failure such as the valley Leagues. They further recommend the LWV-Brownsville for a pilot study on what to do for a League in this situation. They urge appointment of a special committee to include both on and off board representatives as well as representatives from the LL involved. This committee would then develop specific plans for the project. Keever's committee suggested this special committee might initially meet and attend League meetings for a 2 or 3 day period in a community away from the valley which has a successful League that could serve as a role model. That would hopefully provide a rejuvenating experience for the troubled League. This could be followed by a series of several meetings in the area of the targeted League. These procedures would probably expend all the funds (\$1000) we hope will be allocated for the project.

There followed some discussion on how to involve members of minority groups in League activity. Several board members expressed the feeling that such persons are more often oriented toward action rather than study and can best be involved in League action activities.

The Project Outreach Committee recommended that state board members more often develop off-board committees to involve local League members with us in our various activities. They also felt the budget allocation for membership should be increased so that an active membership committee could function.

Brown suggested this project could begin by consultation among the LL president, the FSR, and the state board at the February state board meeting and Legislative Day. The board agreed.

7. Project Outreach, cont'd

Appel MOVED acceptance of the Project Outreach Committee's report. SECONDED AND CARRIED. Anderson thanked the committee, and it was agreed that its work was finished, and it could disband.

8. VOTER

Appel announced the deadline has to be February 1, in order to have the VOTER out before Convention. It will be basically devoted to Convention with background information, workshop news, proposed program, proposed bylaw changes, proposed budget, and the nominating committee report. There will also be a president's column, information on legislative issues and the Capitol Corps, the statement of ownership, and possibly a story on D.C. representation and ERA status.

9. PROPOSED BUDGETS

Budget Chair Jeannette Vanderwater explained how the committee had functioned in four subcommittees which researched separate portions of the budget. She then reviewed two proposed budgets for LWV-T. Draft A totaled \$48,859 based on a per-member-payment of \$7.50. Draft B totaled \$46,895 based on a PMP of \$7.00. These drafts were based on an unofficial membership count of 3930, a figure she said may be too high. She pointed out that a drop of one percent in membership would mean lowering the budget by \$300. Neither of the draft budgets allowed funds for expenses should there be a special legislative session. Vanderwater was also not sure the draft budgets allowed enough for the increase in postal rates. She asked that our recommendation for the 1980-81 PMP allow some cushion for inflation as well as possible fund-raising difficulties.

Vanderwater also presented two proposed budgets for LWV-TEF. Draft $\bf A$ was based on a PMP of \$7.50 and draft B, a PMP of \$7.00. Both totaled \$62,910 with the few differences in specific items appearing mostly in the category of shared services with LWV-T.

There was a lengthy question and discussion period. Then Wilbur MOVED we recommend adoption of draft A (\$7.50 PMP) for both LWV-T and LWV-TEF. SECONDED. Coggeshall MOVED TO AMEND the proposed TEF budget by changing category C. 2. Administrative fees, restricted grants, from \$900 to \$300 and, to compensate for the \$600 loss in income, by reducing:

- O.1.b. Public Relations, VS/CI, Communications from \$300 to \$200.
- 0.1.e. Public Relations, VS/CI, Precinct participation from \$300 to \$100,
- 0.2.a. Public Relations, Development, External Contributions from \$1200 to \$1000, and
- P.2.c. Program, Publications, Promotion from \$200 to \$100.

SECONDED AND CARRIED. Polter MOVED to further AMEND the proposed TEF budget by changing categories A.3. Contributions, Restricted cash and Q. Publications and Projects, Restricted from \$27,050 to \$63,550. SECONDED AND CARRIED. It was understood that Vanderwater would make the necessary adjustments in the explanation column.

Brown MOVED TO AMEND the proposed LNV-T budget by reducing category S.2.a. Organization, Field Service, Representatives and Director from \$2200 to \$2100 and by adding a new category under S. Field Service to be titled New Leagues and allocated \$100 as seed money. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

9. Proposed Budgets, cont'd

Keever suggested the proposed LWV-T budget be amended by changing category S.5. Organization, Membership from \$100 to \$250, category T.2. Program Action from \$2600 to \$2500, and category R.3. Public Relations, VOTER from \$3280 to \$3230. General consent was given.

There was concern about category E. Special Fund-Raising Event, \$1150 in the proposed TEF budget. Several board members felt a clearer proposal for such an event should be prepared for presentation to the general membership. However there were no specific changes or suggestions, so the category and explanation remained as proposed.

Discussion followed on the differences between the two draft budgets which result from the differing PMP proposals. Anderson pointed out that we had alerted the membership that an increase of 329 members would be a virtual necessity for us to recommend the \$7.00 PMP. The main difference between the two budget drafts is that draft A provides funds for a professionally led leadership workshop to be held in conjunction with Council in 1980. Draft A also would provide minor increases in mailings to LLPs and program action. It was pointed out that Draft B provides no leeway for changes due to inflation, catastrophes, or unexpected postal rate increases.

After lengthy debate Carpenter MOVED the previous question. The motion CARRIED. Wilbur's main motion to recommend the draft A budget proposals for LWV-T and TEF was then put to a vote and CARRIED 8 to 4.

Coggeshall MOVED we recommend a PMP of \$7.50 for the 1980-81 fiscal year. SECONDED. There was brief discussion, and Appel said that other fund-raising events would be necessary. The motion CARRIED twelve to one.

It was agreed that if cuts in the proposed budget must be made at Convention, we recommend dropping the leadership workshop set for Council 1980.

Vanderwater then distributed draft copies of proposed budget information for the LLPs, DPM and Convention workbook, as well as the March VOTER. She invited our comments on it,

Reconvened at 2:45 p.m.

10. MEDIA

Appel announced plans for increased quantity of press releases to record our reaction to legislative happenings. Albers and Tilley will make the decision on when these are appropriate. It is hoped this procedure will increase League's political impact and visibility.

Appel then left to go to national board meeting.

Recessed at 3:00 p.m.

THIRD PLENARY SESSION

Called to order by President Anderson at 8:45 a.m., January 11. Absent were Appel, Hunter, Shlipak, and Tilley, who was caring for an injured child at home.

11. ORGANIZATION

State Units. Hunter's report was given by Brown. The Deer Park unit is down to eleven members and may not be able to continue. The Pasadena SU is very active with 22 members. Montgomery County is doing fine. Hunter is checking with the Atascosa County SU.

Field Service. Brown started the new year by contacting each Field Service Representative for an assessment, and she gave a very complete and up-to-date report. She and Berthelson had visited the Orange Area League for board training. Several Leagues are worried about finding presidents for next year. The LWV-Richardson will vote January 25 on whether or not to become a unit of LWV-Dallas. FSR Nana Rylander has resigned from the board of LWV-Sherman and filed to run for city council. It appears that one of our greatest League needs is leadership development, particularly in view of the increasing numbers of employed board members.

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Anderson reported on a recent conversation with off-board air director Meg Titus who asked that we help EPA cosponsor an environmentalists workshop on implementation of the Clean Air Act amendments. The board agreed.

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Perrine reported on a call from LWV-Odessa regarding their action in support of water quality at the DOE hearing in Hobbs, New Mexico recently on the Waste Isolation Pilot Project. Odessa's concern is due to possible pollution to

ground water near the Texas state line, but not far from the proposed nuclear waste disposal site in New Mexico. Several West Texas municipalities, including Odessa, hold ground water rights in this area.

16. BYLAWS

Keever MOVED reconsideration of our action on Article V, Section 6. (See #4 Bylaws.) SECONDED AND CARRIED. Keever MOVED to AMEND that motion by substituting that we recommend insertion of a new second sentence in Article V, Section 6 to read, If the president fails to call such a meeting, a majority of the current board may call a special meeting. SECONDED AND FAILED 5 to 6.

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Cummins distributed copies of the proposed convention agenda. It was agreed that adjustments would be made to start the Sunday meeting earlier and add a time for general direction to the board.

18. NOVEMBER LEGISLATIVE BRIEFINGS

A few less than half the local Leagues were represented at the legislative briefings. The briefings seemed to be well received. Cummins recommended that for future briefings the information packets be sent out prior to the meetings, the purpose of the briefings be clarified, and that an evaluation sheet be included.

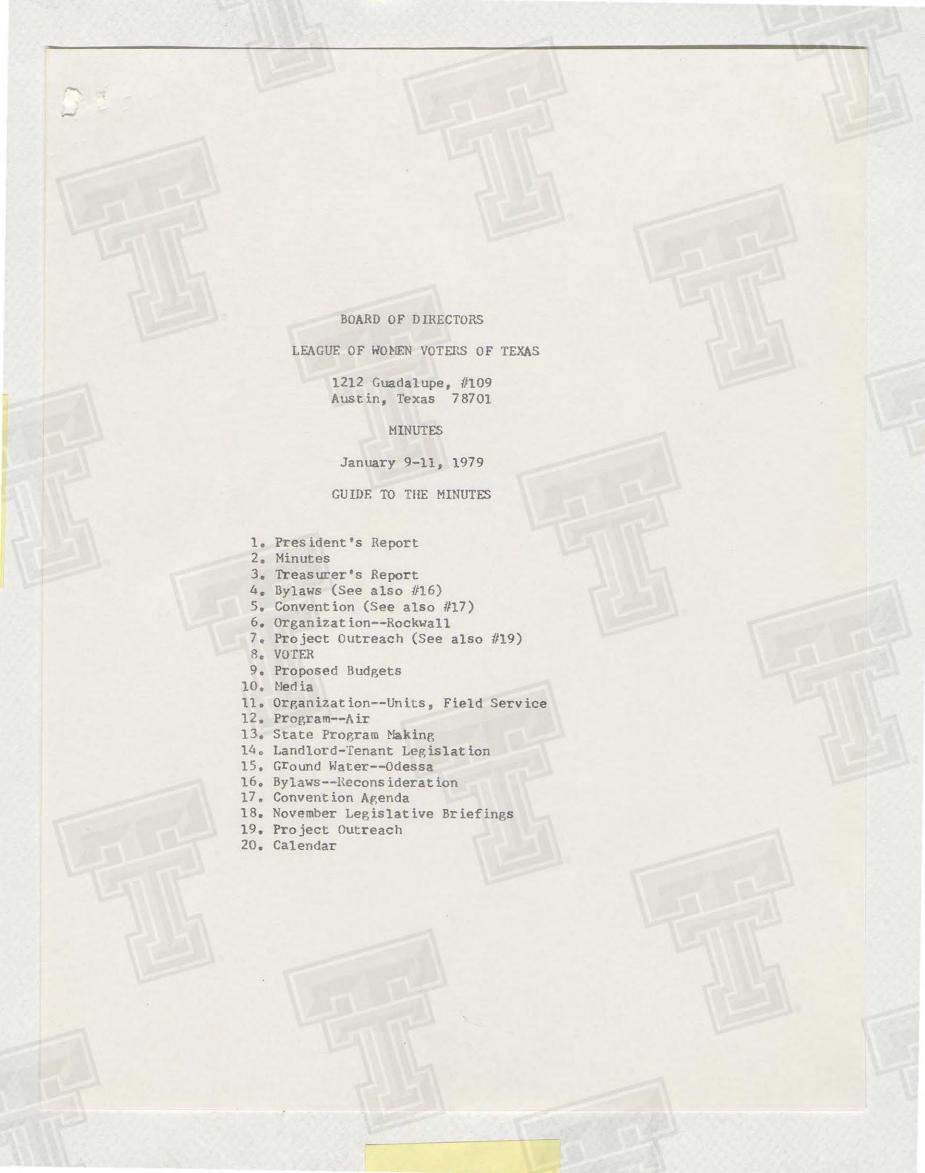

State units may be organized in communities in which no local League exists or where it is not possible at the time to carry on the full program of local League activities. Perrine MOVED we DO recommend this change in order to explain the state unit process. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

Article VIII. Houston proposed reversal of the order of Sections 1 and 2 of Article VIII Convention. The state board felt the present sequence is the more logical. Clark MOVED we NOT recommend this change. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

Article IX. In Article IX Council, Section 3 Authorization for Action, second sentence, Houston proposed to strike the word "majority" and to insert in its place the word vote. They also proposed in Section 4 Quorum to strike the word "more" and insert in its place the word fewer. Wilbur MOVED we DO recommend these changes for clarification and correction and further MOVED the state board recommend reversal of the order of Sections 1 and 2 of Article IX in order to be consistent with the sequence in Article VIII. SECONDED AND CARRED.

Article XIII. Houston proposed to strike the comma in Section 1 Parliamentary Authority. We agreed this editorial change should be made.

Recessed at 6:15 p.m.

SECOND: PLENARY SESSION
Called to order by President Anderson at 10:00 a.m. January 10. All present except Shlipak and Hunter.

5. CONVENTION

Rules. Cummins suggested we propose the same rules as the last convention with one exception. When Convention occurs during the legislative session, a procedure is needed for handling of action suggestions. Cummins proposed a rule to set up an Action Motions Committee similar to that used at the last LWVUS convention. Keever suggested there be a time set aside early in the agenda for suggestions from the floor to this committee. Written suggestions could also be given to this committee until a set deadline. There was general agreement to follow both these suggestions.

Arrangements. Tilley reported that Governor-Elect Clements had declined our invitation to speak. She has invited Sarah Weddington and awaits a reply. Tilley goes to San Antonio next week to work on Convention details. She will try to locate any needed audio-visual equipment for showing of films or video-tapes. Possibilities for showings include Lubbock's bandwagon, the Austin energy conference, the nuclear waste documentary, and the welfare slide show. These could be shown during Friday morning registration period as well as Saturday evening. If a pre-convention briefing is held on how to be a good delegate, it will be given by the president and the parliamentarian.

5. Convention, cont'd

Membership and Representation. Brown reminded us that LLs had been told there would be a special celebration if each local League is represented at Convention. She will make provisions for that eventuality. The awards for the membership contest with its several categories will be scrapbooks embossed or engraved with the League's name, Membership Contest, 1979, and scrolls prepared by Diana Tilley.

Program Development. It was agreed that delegates would break into small interest groups for program development, then regroup to share ideas.

Agenda. Clark MOVED the proposed convention agenda be adopted. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

6. ORGANIZATION

Brown reported that the provisional LWV of Rockwall has circulated their survey among the provisional committee members (Anderson, Hunter, Brown, Sturgis, and Polter). With the correction of a minor budgetary imbalance, it is all in good order. Brown MOVED we recommend to the LWVUS board that the PLWV of Rockwall be given full local League status. SECONDED AND CARRIED. The survey and this recommendation will be hand carried tonight to the national board meeting by Appel. The Rockwall League will be informed of our action promptly.

7. PROJECT OUTREACH

Chairperson Keever reported that the committee (Appel, Brown, Coggeshall, Hunter, Keever, and Field Service Representative Sugihara) recommends that Project Outreach be specifically a field service project aimed at local Leagues close to failure such as the valley Leagues. They further recommend the LWV-Brownsville for a pilot study on what to do for a League in this situation. They urge appointment of a special committee to include both on and off board representatives as well as representatives from the LL involved. This committee would then develop specific plans for the project. Keever's committee suggested this special committee might initially meet and attend League meetings for a 2 or 3 day period in a community away from the valley which has a successful League that could serve as a role model. That would hopefully provide a rejuvenating experience for the troubled League. This could be followed by a series of several meetings in the area of the targeted League. These procedures would probably expend all the funds (\$1000) we hope will be allocated for the project.

There followed some discussion on how to involve members of minority groups in League activity. Several board members expressed the feeling that such persons are more often oriented toward action rather than study and can best be involved in League action activities.

The Project Outreach Committee recommended that state board members more often develop off-board committees to involve local League members with us in our various activities. They also felt the budget allocation for membership should be increased so that an active membership committee could function.

Brown suggested this project could begin by consultation among the LL president, the FSR, and the state board at the February state board meeting and Legislative Day. The board agreed.

7. Project Outreach, cont'd

Appel MOVED acceptance of the Project Outreach Committee's report. SECONDED AND CARRIED. Anderson thanked the committee, and it was agreed that its work was finished, and it could disband.

8. VOTER

Appel announced the deadline has to be February 1, in order to have the VOTER out before Convention. It will be basically devoted to Convention with background information, workshop news, proposed program, proposed bylaw changes, proposed budget, and the nominating committee report. There will also be a president's column, information on legislative issues and the Capitol Corps, the statement of ownership, and possibly a story on D.C. representation and ERA status.

9. PROPOSED BUDGETS

Budget Chair Jeannette Vanderwater explained how the committee had functioned in four subcommittees which researched separate portions of the budget. She then reviewed two proposed budgets for LWV-T. Draft A totaled \$48,859 based on a per-member-payment of \$7.50. Draft B totaled \$46,895 based on a PMP of \$7.00. These drafts were based on an unofficial membership count of 3930, a figure she said may be too high. She pointed out that a drop of one percent in membership would mean lowering the budget by \$300. Neither of the draft budgets allowed funds for expenses should there be a special legislative session. Vanderwater was also not sure the draft budgets allowed enough for the increase in postal rates. She asked that our recommendation for the 1980-81 PMP allow some cushion for inflation as well as possible fund-raising difficulties.

Vanderwater also presented two proposed budgets for LWV-TEF. Draft $\bf A$ was based on a PMP of \$7.50 and draft B, a PMP of \$7.00. Both totaled \$62,910 with the few differences in specific items appearing mostly in the category of shared services with LWV-T.

There was a lengthy question and discussion period. Then Wilbur MOVED we recommend adoption of draft A (\$7.50 PMP) for both LWV-T and LWV-TEF. SECONDED. Coggeshall MOVED TO AMEND the proposed TEF budget by changing category C. 2. Administrative fees, restricted grants, from \$900 to \$300 and, to compensate for the \$600 loss in income, by reducing:

- 0.1.b. Public Relations, VS/CI, Communications from \$300 to \$200.
- O.l.e. Public Relations, VS/CI, Precinct participation from \$300 to \$100,
- 0.2.a. Public Relations, Development, External Contributions from \$1200 to \$1000, and
- P.2.c. Program, Publications, Promotion from \$200 to \$100.

SECONDED AND CARRIED. Polter MOVED to further AMEND the proposed TEF budget by changing categories A.3. Contributions, Restricted cash and Q. Publications and Projects, Restricted from \$27,050 to \$63,550. SECONDED AND CARRIED. It was understood that Vanderwater would make the necessary adjustments in the explanation column.

Brown MOVED TO AMEND the proposed LNV-T budget by reducing category S.2.a. Organization, Field Service, Representatives and Director from \$2200 to \$2100 and by adding a new category under S. Field Service to be titled New Leagues and allocated \$100 as seed money. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

9. Proposed Budgets, cont'd

Keever suggested the proposed LWV-T budget be amended by changing category S.5. Organization, Membership from \$100 to \$250, category T.2. Program Action from \$2600 to \$2500, and category R.3. Public Relations, VOTER from \$3280 to \$3230. General consent was given.

There was concern about category E. Special Fund-Raising Event, \$1150 in the proposed TEF budget. Several board members felt a clearer proposal for such an event should be prepared for presentation to the general membership. However there were no specific changes or suggestions, so the category and explanation remained as proposed.

Discussion followed on the differences between the two draft budgets which result from the differing PMP proposals. Anderson pointed out that we had alerted the membership that an increase of 329 members would be a virtual necessity for us to recommend the \$7.00 PMP. The main difference between the two budget drafts is that draft A provides funds for a professionally led leadership workshop to be held in conjunction with Council in 1980. Draft A also would provide minor increases in mailings to LLPs and program action. It was pointed out that Draft B provides no leeway for changes due to inflation, catastrophes, or unexpected postal rate increases.

After lengthy debate Carpenter MOVED the previous question. The motion CARRIED. Wilbur's main motion to recommend the draft A budget proposals for LWV-T and TEF was then put to a vote and CARRIED 8 to 4.

Coggeshall MOVED we recommend a PMP of \$7.50 for the 1980-81 fiscal year. SECONDED. There was brief discussion, and Appel said that other fund-raising events would be necessary. The motion CARRIED twelve to one.

It was agreed that if cuts in the proposed budget must be made at Convention, we recommend dropping the leadership workshop set for Council 1980.

Vanderwater then distributed draft copies of proposed budget information for the LLPs, DPM and Convention workbook, as well as the March VOTER. She invited our comments on it.

Recessed at 12:45 p.m.

Reconvened at 2:45 p.m.

10. MEDIA

Appel announced plans for increased quantity of press releases to record our reaction to legislative happenings. Albers and Tilley will make the decision on when these are appropriate. It is hoped this procedure will increase League's political impact and visibility.

Appel then left to go to national board meeting.

Recessed at 3:00 p.m.

THIRD PLENARY SESSION

Called to order by President Anderson at 8:45 a.m., January 11. Absent were Appel, Hunter, Shlipak, and Tilley, who was caring for an injured child at home.

11. ORGANIZATION

State Units. Hunter's report was given by Brown. The Deer Park unit is down to eleven members and may not be able to continue. The Pasadena SU is very active with 22 members. Montgomery County is doing fine. Hunter is checking with the Atascosa County SU.

Field Service. Brown started the new year by contacting each Field Service Representative for an assessment, and she gave a very complete and up-to-date report. She and Berthelson had visited the Orange Area League for board training. Several Leagues are worried about finding presidents for next year. The LWV-Richardson will vote January 25 on whether or not to become a unit of LWV-Dallas. FSR Nana Kylander has resigned from the board of LWV-Sherman and filed to run for city council. It appears that one of our greatest League needs is leadership development, particularly in view of the increasing numbers of employed board members.

12. PROGRAM--AIR

Anderson reported on a recent conversation with off-board air director Meg Titus who asked that we help EPA cosponsor an environmentalists workshop on implementation of the Clean Air Act amendments. The board agreed.

13. STATE PROGRAM MAKING

Wilbur reviewed the program making process which began last summer with opportunities for LLs to circularize other LLs about their suggestions. There were about a half dozen responses to that. State program report forms were received from 21 local Leagues and one provisional League. Wilbur showed charts listing the responses and reviewed the majority and minority reports.

Perrine MOVED we recommend dropping the AJ positions that call for a state-wide system of court administration and enhancement of a sentence for second and subsequent offenses and for offenses committed with a deadly weapon, because these have been accomplished. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

Perrine MOVED we recommend dropping our voting rights position on initiative and referendum which urges allowing ten percent of those who voted in the last gubernatorial election to call a constitutional amendment. SECONDED. Reasons for this include:

--Concern about possible effects which could result from the recent Supreme Court decision allowing corporations and labor unions to form political action committees for ballot issues,

--Concern that a constitutional amendment could be placed on the ballot by a relatively small number of persons not representing the views of a broad enough spectrum of citizens. (This is because the number of persons actually voting in elections has continually decreased in recent years.) Motion CARRIED.

Perrine MOVED we recommend dropping the position calling for no declaration of party affiliation when registering. Five Leagues suggested that this be dropped, and three asked for restudy. At the 1977 convention there was only a one-vote difference on the question, indicating no true consensus among Leaguers. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

Cummins MOVED we recommend dropping the voting rights position calling for permanent registration for voter convenience because it has been accomplished. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

13. State Program Making, cont'd

Cummins MOVED we recommend dropping the position calling for a Human Relations Commission for Texas. SECONDED. Two LLs had recommended this be dropped. Some localities have no form of human relations group either public or private. Dropping a position does not mean opposition to it. Local Leagues who wish to do so could list it on their local program. Motion CARRIED 9 to 4.

Clark MOVED we recommend dropping the position under Executive which calls for a party's candidates for governor and lieutenant governor to run for office as a team. SECONDED. It was pointed out that many Texans feel the Lt. Governor should be directly accountable to the electorate because he has more powers than in many other states. Motion CARRIED 10 to 3.

Wilbur MOVED we recommend continued study of the adult correction system, parole and community-based alternatives to incarceration. SECONDED. This study is already in process, and interest is high. LL suggestions for study on women offenders, women in prison, and prison health care can be incorporated in the ongoing study. Motion CARRIED.

Wilbur MOVED we recommend restudy of the school finance system with emphasis on equitable distribution of funds and financial accountability. SECONDED. Eight LLs recommended further study, one wanted to drop all school finance positions, and another wanted to drop the ten percent limit on local enrichment. The motion CARRIED 8 to 2.

The program core did not recommend a study on accountability in education, which had been urged by seven LLs but not by the two LLs who studied the topic in their communities. Perrine then MOVED the remainder of the program core report, which recommended no other study items for the next biennium, be accepted. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

Wilbur pointed out that LL recommendations on state action priorities parallel our intentions.

14. LANDLORD-TENANT LEGISLATION

Wilbur reported that LWVUS has indicated it would be appropriate to take action in support of landlord-tenant legislation under the LWVUS human resources positions. LWV-Dallas has been advised they may act at the state level in their own name and they may seek support from other Texas LLs. (See November state board minutes, #13.) Discussion followed on whether or not LWV-Dallas could lobby for the state League on this issue. Wilbur MOVED that LWV-Dallas, if they wish, be permitted to act on tenant-landlord legislation for the LWV-T with plans yo be coordinated through the H.R. Director. Dallas would prepare a plan of action to be approved by the legislative and H.R. Chairs. SECONDED. Several board members felt this would counter our efforts to limit legislative priorities. Also, LWV-Dallas had not asked for this permission. Polter MOVED to TABLE the motion. The tabling motion CARRIED.

15. GROUND WATER--ODESSA

Perrine reported on a call from LWV-Odessa regarding their action in support of water quality at the DOE hearing in Hobbs, New Mexico recently on the Waste Isolation Pilot Project. Odessa's concern is due to possible pollution to

ground water near the Texas state line, but not far from the proposed nuclear waste disposal site in New Mexico. Several West Texas municipalities, including Odessa, hold ground water rights in this area.

16. BYLANS CHARLES her soll management and a restrict and the soll of the soll

Keever MOVED reconsideration of our action on Article V, Section 6. (See #4 Bylaws.) SECONDED AND CARRIED. Keever MOVED to AMEND that motion by substituting that we recommend insertion of a new second sentence in Article V, Section 6 to read, If the president fails to call such a meeting, a majority of the current board may call a special meeting. SECONDED AND FAILED 5 to 6.

17. CONVENTION AGENDA

Cummins distributed copies of the proposed convention agenda. It was agreed that adjustments would be made to start the Sunday meeting earlier and add a time for general direction to the board.

18. NOVEMBER LEGISLATIVE BRIEFINGS TO VALUE OF THE STATE OF THE STATE

A few less than half the local Leagues were represented at the legislative briefings. The briefings seemed to be well received. Cummins recommended that for future briefings the information packets be sent out prior to the meetings, the purpose of the briefings be clarified, and that an evaluation sheet be included.

19. PROJECT OUTREACH of the associations and distributions of the association of

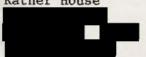

Program . Trade Education Outreach Project

April 5-7, 1979 is the Trade conference in Wingspread, Wisconsin. Pearl Wincorn has been recruited to be our conference participant project director. Following the April conference, Leagues will have approximately two months to interview constituency opinion leaders and submit project proposals to the national IR Committee. There will be \$500 seed money as a pass-through grant and each state League will be responsible for raising additional funds during the summer; project should get underway in the fall. Final reports to the national office will be due in mid-March 1980.

Goals of the Project: 1) to identify gaps in information/understanding of trade issues among the public and run a project designed to fill those gaps; 2) to begin to build a climate for ongoing discussion and interaction, and 3) to develop techniques for an educational exchange of conflicting viewpoints.

To: State Board From: Laura Keever LWV-Texas Preboard Feb., 1979

While in some respects the Session has required prompt action in energy already, in others it is moving very slowly. I did make a statement to the Senate Finance Committee supporting an increase in the Energy Development Fund to \$5 million, and I will attend the House Energy Appropriative Matters Subcommittee today (which is discussing the same thing.) Dan Kubiak (whose bill this was) serves on the House Appropriations Committee, however, and my judgement is that if there is any increase, it will come in conference between the House and Senate committees.

We are opposing the 55 MPH speed limit removal (by Head), but as Clements has said, he will veto it, so we are not putting much energy there.

The other bills I hope to support (mainly solar) have yet to be introduced—Keese will be carrying one (in the House), Vale willbe carrying the Senate bill.

I hope to discuss the nuclear reprocessing bill (yet to be introduced) and the gasahol bill with the EQ core on Friday.

My nuclear committee has had its first organizational meeting. Nearly everyone (25) came—the room was filled! We have divided into subcommittees (transportation; high level waste and reprocessing; mining and milling and low level wastes; and general—including nuclear plant types). I am meeting with all the subcommittee chairs this week—plus having made a special trip to Austin to "redirect the thinking" of three of the committee "troublemakers" (CONFIDENTIAL please)—all of whom were professors at UT. Their attitudes ranged from being thoughtless to intellectual arrogance. I think, after much stroking, they will all now be supportive. (People are the same the world over.)

I have just returned from an emergency meeting of TEAC regarding gasoline rationing and other implications of the oil shortage due to the Iranian cutback. Friends, things could be serious, not only from supply standpoint but also from an international security standpoint. I hate to raise red flags (a pun?) but the energy problems of this country could become perilous.

A recent amusing remark at a Mexico conference: "The United States has just discovered oil in Mexico--what it hasn't discovered is that it doesn't own the leases, the mineral rights or the royalties."

Mexico will not save us; but we sure need to stop playing games with them (L.K. personal opinion).

To the members of the State Board:

When the final membership figures came into the State Office, we found that the membership across the state of Texas had dropped by 5%. This meant that \$1,352 had to be taken out of the recommended LWV-T budget. This was done in conference with Diana Clark as follows: No leadership workshop, \$414 out of 03b and \$896 out of S3b; reduction of funds for board training, \$42 out of 03a. The budget as corrected was sent to State Board members and Local League Presidents about February 1. It was not sent on DPM.

Final, final membership figures have now come in and another \$200 needs to be taken out of the budget. Again in conference with Diana Clark, a decision was made to include the budget as is in the Convention Workbook. The State Board will have to decide where to cut \$200 and such changes will be announced to the Convention.

More bad news!! It is entirely possible that the Convention will not go along with the increased PMP. If the Convention decides on a PMP of \$7.25, we will need to take an additional \$875 out of the LWV-T budget. If the Convention decides on a PMP of \$7 we need to take another \$865, or a grand total of \$1,940, out of the LWV-T budget. The State Board needs to make some difficult decisions at this February meeting. First, you need to decide where to cut \$200, that has to be done. Second, you need to decide where to cut another \$1,740 if it should become necessary. I will need priorities on the second decision in the event the Convention chooses \$7.25.

I have listed the areas where changes can be made without interferring with the "in-out"s. None of these suggestions are very palatable.

- (1) Changes in Section N. Items N7 and N8 are about the only items which can be changed unless the board wants to move the State Office to another location. The budget committee did not research this possibility. Denying the raise to Joanne would save \$300 in N7 and \$18 in N8. Cutting out the additional 100 hours would save \$290 in N7 and \$39 in N8.
- (2) Changes in Section O. The budget committee recommended a cut of \$100 in items O1b and O1c (The more detailed budget sent to you in December 1978 has this breakdown.). The president's trips to the State Office cost \$56 each. Maybe the number could be cut. A board member costs about \$370 for all board meetings and another \$65 for mailings. Maybe the number could be cut.
 - (3) Changes in Section P. The only possibility is P2.
- (4) Changes in Section Q. This is all balanced with other items and there are no possibilities here.
- (5) Changes in Section R. All of R5 is balanced with income. Gutting of one issue of the Voter would save \$625. Updating the mailing list for the Voter only once during the year would save \$360. Items R1, R2, and R4 could be changed.
- (6) Changes in Section S. Items S9 and S10 are balanced with other items so cannot be changed. If you wish to reduce the \$7 per member for publications, each \$1 of reduction will save \$81. The budget committee recommended a cut of \$200 in item S11. Other items in this section can be changed.
- (7) Changes in Section T. The budget committee recommended a out of \$200 in T2. Any of these items can be changed.

(8) Changes in Sections U through Y. Not much hope!
(9) Other things!! We may still be saved by item N6, rent.
That figure is still only a guess Don't put much hope on this one.
The membership for M-A-L and SU was 50 less than projected. Changes will have to be made in Sections A2a, A3, Q, S9, and S10. I will take care of that bookkeeping.

There are a few other possibilities.

(1) We plan to make \$100 on the publication, "We Support".

This profit could be increased. See items C4 and R5e.

(2) We expect a net of \$3,760 in outside contributions. We also expect to get a net of \$10,465 in TEF contributions. Could this total of \$14,225 in outside contributions be raised? I doubt it. Carole needs to address this.

(3) Do not try to solve this problem by putting into the income side a sizeable amount for non-cash contributions by members, UNLESS you are willing to specify certain already budgeted expenses as non-cash as has been done with items G and W.

I will be available by phone at home or at the Houston league office most of the time during the board meeting. I am leaving for California on Thursday, March 1.

When you are through making these agonizing decisions, please give some thought as to ways in which the \$7.50 PMP can be sold to the Convention so that the drastic cuts will not be necessary.

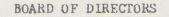

PRESENT: Anderson, Appel, Brown, Carpenter, Clark, Clem, Cummins, Hunter, Keever, Polter, Shlipak, Sturgis, Tilley and Wilbur.

ABSENT: Albers and Coggeshall

President Anderson called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m. She explained that Albers was observing a legislative committee meeting and Coggeshall was at home organizing her campaign for city council.

- 1. MINUTES. The minutes were approved as circulated.
- 2. TREASURER'S REPORT. Sturgis reviewed the budget analysis for June 1, 1978 through February 28, 1979 as well as estimates of income and expenses for the remainder of the fiscal year. She estimates an uncommitted balance of \$1935, however that may be as much as \$500 less if field service expenses for beginning Project Outreach are charged before June 1. Legislative office expenses may be higher than anticipated, but it was agreed that if necessary, money for legislative action could be applied to the appropriate category under program action expenses. Sturgis urged all persons who have expenses to turn in their vouchers as soon as possible.

3. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Appointments. Anderson reported that on Keever's recommendation she had sent a letter urging the appointment of Irma Hooks of Houston to the board of Texas Parks and Wildlife. We agreed to work for the appointments of air associate director Meg Titus to the Texas Air Control Board and land associate director Bobette Higgins to the Texas Historical Commission. Anderson had received a letter from Texas Women's Political Caucus lobbyist Cathy Bonner of Austin asking LWV-T for a letter recommending her for appointment to the board of the Texas Department of Corrections. The board preferred to suggest our own Lucy Polter, who agreed that she would consider it, and try to draw up a list of possible supporters.

Correspondence. National convention in 1982 will be May 15-19 at the Hyatt-Regency in Houston. There have been letters of praise for Shlipak's Twelve Steps to a Superbly Successfull Finance Campaign. We have received a request from the LWVUS Nominating Committee for recommendations. Anderson stated that she did not wish to be nominated. The board requested permission to recommend Shlipak and Appel. Shlipak declined, but Appel agreed, and Anderson will send in the recommendation.

4. NATURAL RESOURCES CORE MEETING. Wilbur said the February 16 meeting of the natural resources core in Dallas proved valuable for everyone there. The discussion centered on NR legislation. There was special concern about Texas' foot-dragging on implementation of the 1977 Clean Air Act Amendments. There is a similar problem regarding coastal management plans. They agreed that statutorily dedicated funds would be acceptable if the item they were to be dedicated to was one we supported. We will continue to oppose constitutionally dedicated funds. Keever said it was decided not to support the gasahol bill because it is not clear whether there would actually be an energy saving.

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Human Resources. Anderson reported for Coggeshall that the slide show Poverty:

A Test for Texans has been completed. The credit line reads, "Prepared by the Texas

Department of Human Resources for the League of Women Voters of Texas." They will provide two copies for the state office and one for each local League. It is 18 minutes long and narration is provided by a synchronized tape. It will be shown at convention during the Sunday plenary session.

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Air. Anderson reported that with air quality issues there were numerous difficulties with public hearings or committee meetings being called, but not convening on schedule or not convening at all. This has been a problem with other issues as well.

Local League Lobbying. Wilbur had had a request from the LWV-El Paso for permission to lobby the legislature for establishment of Franklin Mountain State Park. They also asked to lobby other Texas Leagues for support. After consultation with Higgins, the permission was granted.

LWV-Lamar County requested permission to lobby for labeling of imported meat. Wilbur had suggested they consult Ruth Robbins on the national board and our state IR coordinator Joan Kyre.

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CLOG. The Citizen's Legislative Oversight Group, a coalition which LWV-T joined, was formed primarily to oversee tax legislation, but has grown concerned about other issues. Last week they presented an It's-Not-Nice-to-Fool-the-People award to a bill for an amendment to the Deceptive Trade Practices Act. Fortunately the coalition only listed as givers of the "award" the organizations who wished to be so named, and LWV-T was not included.

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ERA. Texans for ERA is working to keep legislative committees from holding hearings on ERA recission or amendment questions.

VOTER. Appel reported the VOTER is at the printer now. It is filled with convention information, so some other items will be held for a later issue or may not appear at all. 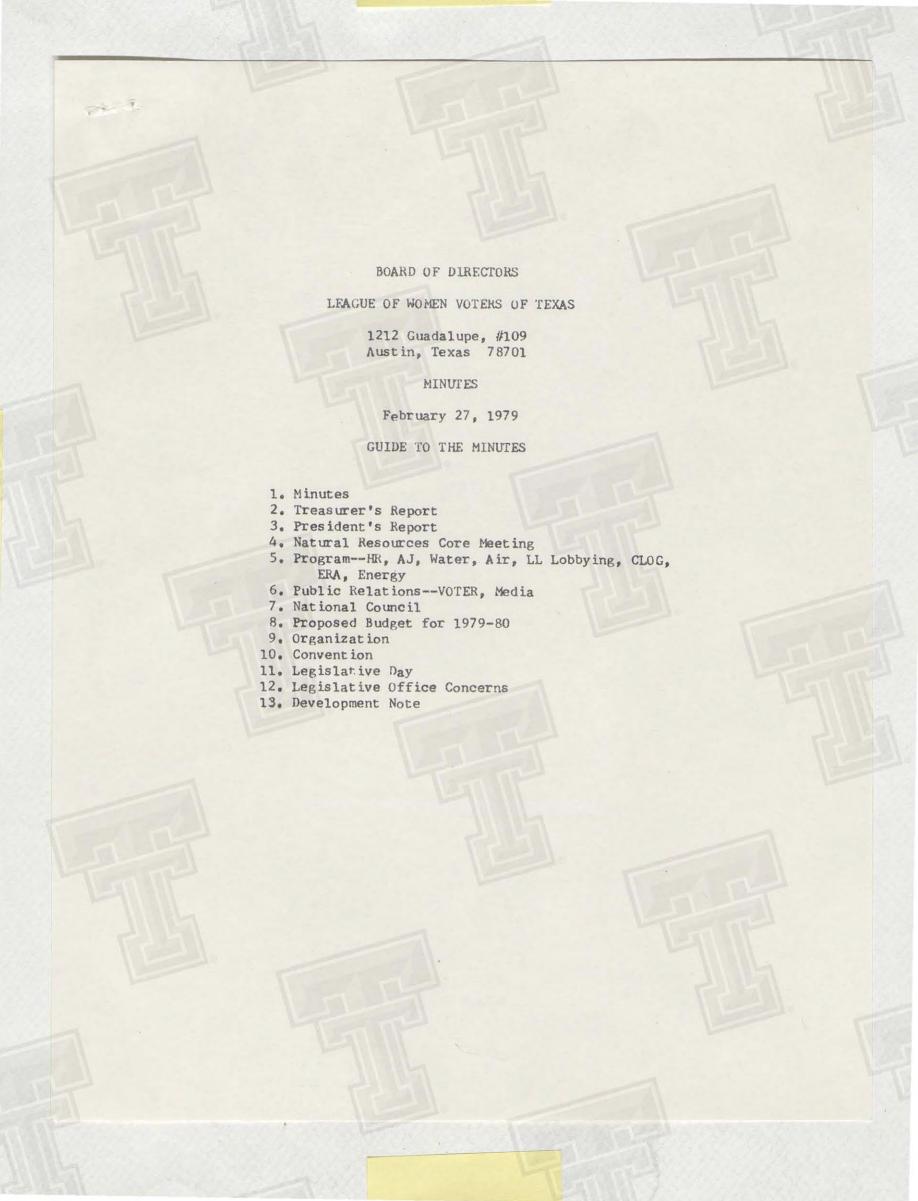

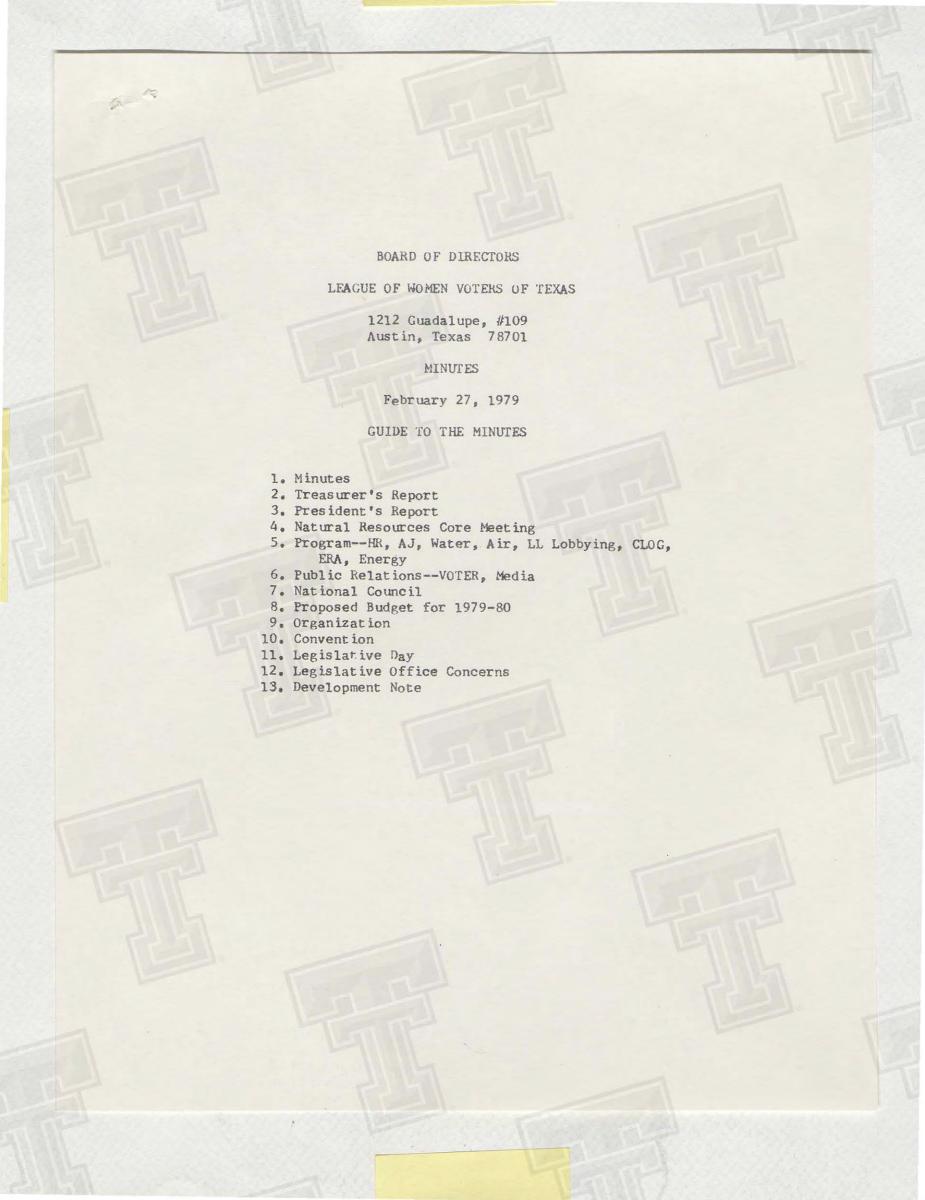

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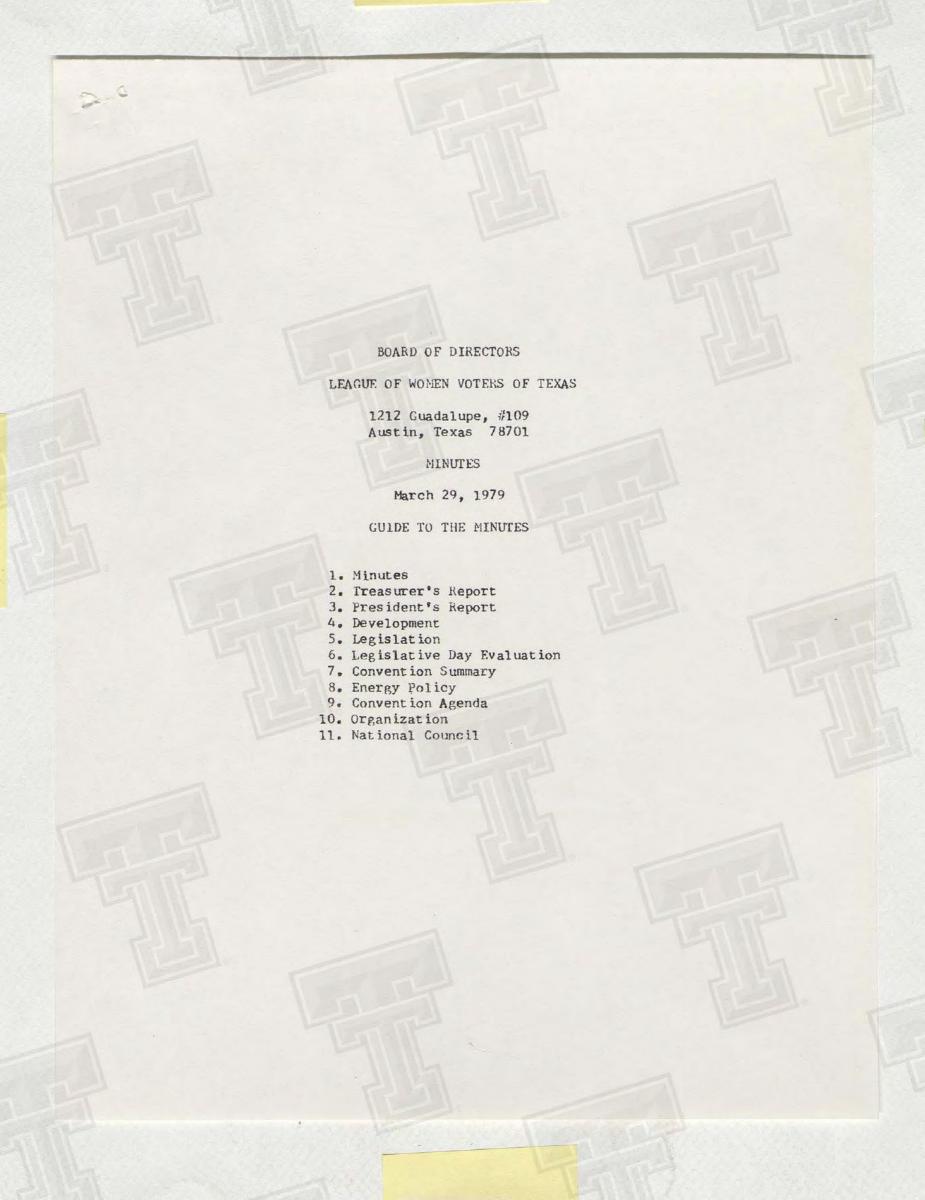

ABSENT: Albers, Coggeshall, and Cummins

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1. MINUTES.

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Add this sentence: Senator Oscar Mauzy is scheduled to speak in the afternoon.

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Sturgis reported that due to a typographical error in last month's report of anticipated expenses, the anticipated uncommitted balance was \$2000 lower than it should have been. The estimated uncommitted balance now is \$4785. She expressed concern that our TEF budget is still overcommitted by an estimated \$2298. Shlipak MOVED the treasurer be authorized to transfer not more than \$3000 from LWV-T to LWV-TEF, if necessary, at the end of the fiscal year. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

General consent was given for Sturgis to ask Suzanne Wills to audit the books again this year.

Sturgis raised the question of how to handle expenses in shipping portfolio materials. It was agreed portfolios should be transferred by June 15 when she will close the books. Shipping expenses should be charged to 0.3.a. Board Tools and Training.

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Appointments. Anderson said we did submit Polter's name to Governor Clements for appointment to the board of the Texas Department of Corrections.

ERA. Anderson reported Texans for ERA has a lobbyist and a receptionist and is working hard to keep recission proposals quiet. However they need to raise \$2000. Perrine MOVED we provide \$100 from LWV-T funds. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

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Keever MOVED we have someone urge the convention delegates to participate in a spontaneous donation to ERA. SECONDED AND CARRIED. It was agreed this signifies we are taking a step toward fulfilling our pledge. Appel and Wilbur were later designated to find a local League delegate who would like to promote passing the hat for ERA at Convention.

State Convention. Anderson announced the Leagues of Beaumont and Dallas have both extended invitations for LWV-T Convention in 1981. This will be a decision for the incoming board.

Insurance and Liability. Anderson indicated the Baytown League and Montgomery County State Unit have expressed concern about insurance and liability. After reviewing the section on "Volunteers and Liability" on page 15 of the January, 1979 National Board Report, it was agreed we needed some research and at least a memo to LLs on this. Sturgis suggested that at the May board meeting an ad hoc committee be appointed to study the question during the summer and report back at a later meeting. She volunteered to chair the committee and Clem said she would like to serve on it. It was agreed to defer this question to the incoming board.

APA. Anderson announced that Carol Mark of Waco has agreed to chair our monitoring of the Administrative Procedures Act.

(Albers and SO Director Joann Lovelace arrived.)

4. DEVELOPMENT.

Shlipak reported a contribution of \$2000 to LWV-T from the Texas AFL-CIO. LWV-Austin will receive \$600 according to the sharing formula.

She urged we further promote When You Go to Austin by sending it to all statewide organizations based in Austin as well as to newspapers and television stations. Three state Leagues have ordered Twelve Steps to a Superbly Successful Finance Campaign for their local Leagues.

4. Development, cont'd

Shlipak then reviewed the new national League sharing formula and alternatives for changing our LWV-T sharing formula. We might wish to change our formula to a less generous one if the convention chooses a PMP lower than the recommended \$7.50. It was pointed out that Convention not only sets the PMP, but also votes on the sharing formula. After considerable discussion Keever MOVED that Budget Chair Vanderwater include the possibility of changing the sharing formula in her explanation of funding options. SECONDED. Discussion followed. Keever MOVED the previous question. MOTION CARRIED. MAIN MOTION FAILED. Clem MOVED the state board recommend the sharing formula remain the same. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

5. LEGISLATION.

River Compacts. The LWV-Marshall-Harrison County has asked LWV-T support in opposing passage of the Red River and Caddo Lake compacts in their present form. She suggested the Legislative Committee meet after dinner to discuss the compacts and consider options.

County Ordinance-Making. Albers asked for a decision on whether we support Senator Farabee's COM bill, which is mainly limited to regulating new subdivisions, but also details many restrictions. Albers feels Rep. Benedict's more liberal House bill, which we already support, has very little chance of passage. Clem MOVED we support the Farabee bill, but let the Legislative Committee decide the strategy. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

Property Tax Reform. Work toward passage of ESHB 726 on the floor of the Senate will continue. Though there has been some questioning of the LWV-T position on the bill, I have continued to work primarily toward its passage and secondarily toward getting some trengthening amendments attached. Senator Clower has agreed to present them on the Senate floor—a choice made by several of us who were concerned that presenting them in the Economic Development committee might prove counterproductive.... As you recall passage of inspection/maintenance legislation this session is mandatory if the EPA is to approve the Texas State Implementation Plan by the deadline of June 30, 1979. It will not be approvable without I/M legislation—this is from the "horse's mouth". Hence our priority for passage of the bill over strengthening amendments. I would like to see the improved "comflict of interest" amendment fly but I think the others will actually make little difference in the manner in which the TACB implements the CAAAA of 1977 as the federal act takes precedence over any state legislation or plan.

I am also continuing work on the two-sides-of-one-page flow chart on the Clean Air Act-a request from the LWUS EQ committee. It has been a long and painful process to condense this complex legislation into two pages in fact the regional official with whom I am working on it still feels that we may not be able to do it in that small a space. We do hope to have a tool, though, which can be used by all state and local Leagues in assessing the implementation of their SIPs and further as preparation for responding to an LWUS call to action when (not if) the attack on the CAAA comes in Congress.

As a result of attending the EPA-sponsored I/M conference in Austin in April I am now coordinator for the North Central Texas Regional Task Force for I/M. We have been approved for but have not yet received an EPA grant of \$2000 to accomplish public education efforts in this part of the state during the two year period alloted in CSHB 726 for a piket volunteer I/M project in Houston. Several Leaguers are working on the task force and we planto do TV spots for freee emissions testing in two locations in Dallas and Fort Worth during Clean Air Week (April 30-May 5), plan to establish a speakers bureau, set up shppping center demonstrations on reducing emissions, talk to as many organizations and drivers education classes as possible and do TV spots and Voters Digest types of things to raise community awareness about the advantages of an I/M program.

For next year I see the I/M task force work as our primary effort throughout the state. Also monitoring of the Houston pikot program and monitoring of the TACBs implementation of the SIP will be important. Additional and continuing efforts will have to be made to keep our Congressional delegation aware of our position against gutting the Clean Air Act will require some time and effort. It will probably be a busy air year even without a legislative session:

6. DUPLICATE PRESIDENT'S MAILINGS

Clark informed the board that the LWV-T purchases state and national Duplicate President's Mailings (DPM's) for all state board members. National DPMs are ordered for state unit chairs because they cannot order them and selected materials are sent to each chair. The national League Action Service is ordered for off-board chairs carrying national program items.

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Clark and Brown, delegates to the LWVUS Council '79 reported on Council events. Two issues, U.S. constitutional convention and nuclear energy were vigorously debated. Delegates turned down attempts to reach a position on the U.S. con con, but endorsed the publication of an LWVEF piece on the concept of a balanced federal budget, as a companion piece to Constitutional Amendment by Convention: An Untried Alternative.

On the issue of nuclear energy, the Minnesota delegates and others wanted the League's energy position of "no increased reliance on nuclear fission" to be interpreted as meaning no more nuclear energy. Two motions passed which instructed the national board to review the energy position on nuclear energy and to search for funding to conduct a public education program on nuclear issues. Keever commented that as a member of the committee writing the energy position she knew

that "no increased reliance on nuclear fission" meant no increased percentage of nuclear fission in the energy package, not a moratorium on nuclear energy.

8:25 Gehan left.

Brown attended the workshop on Urban Crisis and reported that the focus of the UC program action may be transportation. The LWVUS has selected two members each from thirty five Leagues to receive practical help with transportation projects. Dallas and Houston Leagues were chosen in Texas. State Leagues are not involved.

Sarah Weddington MCed the White House staff briefing on the President's energy proposals and SALT. The President spoke asking the League's support on these issues plus women's issues—particularly recommendations and appointments to federal judgeships.

8. EVALUATION OF LAST YEAR'S GOALS AND PROJECTS

The board members commented favorably on the achievements of last year's goals to assist in strengthening local Leagues and to be a more effective organization. The presidents workshops, press releases, Legislative Day and the first weekend convention were very successful. Convention '79 was the first convention with 100% local League representation. Many Leagues are using the state logo and have improved their VOTERS. A program tool on monitoring national and state program is being developed for Program Outreach. Project Outreach, a one year project to help save a local League was rejected when presented by Brown and Fumi Sugihara to the Brownsville League.

1. INTRODUCTIONS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

President Clark called the meeting to order at 2:35 p.m. May 15. She introduced and welcomed to the board new members Nancy Bene of Austin, Publications Director; Jeannette Davis of Abilene, Citizen Information/Voter Service Director; Brenda Gehan of Houston, Human Resources Director; Catherine Gordon of Waco, Secretary; Carolyn Lanier of Lubbock, Development Director; Nancy Price of San Antonio, VOTER Editor; Martha Sarles of Galveston, Membership-Field Service Director; and Judith Swift of Houston, Human Resources Director; New member Caroline Chamblin of Amarillo, Government Director was attending a professional meeting in Boston. Olive Shapiro of Dallas, Energy Director will arrive tomorrow, as she is receiving an award from the American Institute of Architects in Dallas this evening.

2. BOARD ORIENTATION

State office executive secretary Lovelace explained state office personnel and procedure.

Clark urged every member to become familiar with the State Board Handbook and discussed board member's notebooks and files. She requested that all reports be coded to correspond with the state office's filing system. All board members receive a state and national duplicate president's mailing plus a state office mailing every Friday including pre-board and post-board reports.

Sturgis said she prepares a budget and analysis for every board meeting. She urged all board members to use vouchers for reimbursement and include budget line item number. Board member expenses are line item 0.3.b. and 0.3.c. in the budget. Board members are reimbursed for travel at 10 cents per mile. Telephone calls more than \$6.00 are charged to committee expenses.

Carpenter asked that board members give written reports of motions, names of people and organizations to the secretary.

The vice-presidents were introduced and reported on their core. Brown, Organization Vice-President informed the board that Sarles will chair membership, state units, and members-at-large. Brown will carry the rest of the core. She plans to use advisory boards to lessen the work of the board.

Clem, Public Relations Vice-President, stated that Bene would be carrying Publications, press releases and services to the media. Price will be Texas VOTER editor, and Davis will chair Voter Service/Citizen Information. Activities will depend on personnel available.

Keever, Program Vice-President announced that there are two new Human Resources Directors on board, Brenda Gehan and Judith Swift. Gehan will carry welfare reform, food stamps, medicaid. daycare and children, and employment. Swift will carry housing, education, revenue sharing, and urban crisis.

President Clark called the first plenary session to order at 5:10 p,m.

3. APPOINTED DIRECTORS AND PORTFOLIO ASSIGNMENTS

The following directors were recommended for appointment by President Clark:

Portfolio assignments are as follows: Bene, Publications; Carpenter, Administration of Justice; Chamblin, Government; Davis, Voter Service/Citizen Information; Gehan, Human Resources; Lanier, Development; Perrine, Water; Price, Texas VOTER; Sarles, Membership; Shapiro, Energy; Swift, Human Resources; Wilbur, School Finance and Property Tax Reform; Hunter, Modernizing State Government; Cummins, DC Ratification; Wincorn, International Relations, Trade and United Nations; Titus, Air; Higgins, Land Use; Anderson, Women's Issues and Equal Rights Amendment; and Mary Seiber, Publishing Editor.

President Clark called the morring to order at 213

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Brown MOVED that these appointments and assignments be approved. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

4. PRESIDENT PRO TEMPORE

By common consent, Laura Keever was appointed President Pro Tempore.

5. COUNCIL AND CONVENTION TO THE TOTAL THE STATE OF THE S

Clark announced that Waco Area has bid for Council 1980 and Beaumont and Dallas have bid for Convention 1981. Keever MOVED that Convention be held in Dallas. Carpenter moved to table the motion. SECONDED AND CARRIED. Clark will place calls to Dallas and Beaumont to get comparisons on costs of hotel facilities.

Adjourned 5:30 p.m. for dinner.

Reconvened at 7:40 p.m.

6. DUPLICATE PRESIDENT'S MAILINGS

Clark informed the board that the LWV-T purchases state and national Duplicate President's Mailings (DPM's) for all state board members. National DPMs are ordered for state unit chairs because they cannot order them and selected materials are sent to each chair. The national League Action Service is ordered for off-board chairs carrying national program items.

7. LWVUS COUNCIL 1979

Clark and Brown, delegates to the LWVUS Council '79 reported on Council events. Two issues, U.S. constitutional convention and nuclear energy were vigorously debated. Delegates turned down attempts to reach a position on the U.S. con con, but endorsed the publication of an LWVEF piece on the concept of a balanced federal budget, as a companion piece to Constitutional Amendment by Convention: An Untried Alternative.

On the issue of nuclear energy, the Minnesota delegates and others wanted the League's energy position of "no increased reliance on nuclear fission" to be interpreted as meaning no more nuclear energy. Two motions passed which instructed the national board to review the energy position on nuclear energy and to search for funding to conduct a public education program on nuclear issues. Keever commented that as a member of the committee writing the energy position she knew

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Reconvened at 7:00 p.m.

20. ADULT CORRECTIONS CONSENSUS QUESTIONS

Clark presented the proposed consensus questions for the Adult Corrections study. Keever MOVED the consensus questions be approved as modified. SECONDED AND CARRIED. Clark said that these questions would not go to local Leagues until after the end of the current session of the Legislature. It may be necessary to rewrite the questions concerning parole. (7-9)

CONSENSUS QUESTIONS FOR ADULT CORRECTIONS

- 1. Would you support or oppose an increase in state funding to TDC for:
 - a) Lowering the ratio of inmates to correctional officers?
- b) Increasing the payscale of correctional officers? Please explain.
- 2. Do you support or oppose expansion of educational opportunities and/or options for TDC inmates? Please explain answer.
- 3. What improvements, if any, would you suggest for health care at TDC?
- 4. Do you think that inmates should be paid for labor? If so, how much?
- 5. How would you decrease crowded conditions at TDC?
 - a) Build more prison units
 - b) Expand parole
 - c) Increase the use of probation for non-violent offenders
 - d) Decriminalize some acts
 - gate on 112 Wil and to have not in its landfull and e) Combinations of several of the above
 - Please explain your answers.
- 6. Do you see a need for new programs or expansion of current programs to assist inmates in making the transition from prison to the free world, i.e., pre-realease, work release, half-way houses, other? Who should fund and administer the transition programs that you support?
- 7. What changes, if any, would you recommend for the Texas Parole system? Please explain your answers.
- 8. Should the Governor have veto power over parole recommendations?
- 9. Do you support or oppose a mandatory supervision time? If so, should there be a time limit? How long?
- 10. Should there be qualifications to be a member of the Board of Pardons and Paroles? If so, what should they be?
- 11. Do you support community based corrections for non-violent offenders? What kind? Who should administer them? How should they be funded?

 - D. Addendum to B. Organization Core Report

Brown MOVED that the 10-5 Solution (membership growth plan) be amended to include the Leagues making minumum support payment. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

22. COUNCIL 1980

Sturgis moved that Council 1980 be held in Waco, Texas. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

23. GOALS AND STRATEGIES

Sturgis MOVED that the following goals be adopted for the coming year:
(1) retain and increase membership and (2) become a more powerful/effective organization. SECONDED AND CARRIED. Some possible strategies for increasing membership suggested were to implement the 10-5% financial incentive plan, to use Project Outreach, create more public service announcements, create new types of membership, write a song about the League that makes the top ten list, hold more workships, have a booth at the state fair, form more coalitions, create more rapport between local Leagues and the state board, create a celebrity spot announcement, have every local League visited by at least one state board member, and increase state board member's leadership skills. Some possible strategies to increase the effectiveness of the League suggested were to double the budget, hold more workshops, have more public service announcements, form more coalitions, have a booth at the state fair, get minority representation on the state board, increase the visibility of the state president, help local Leagues become more visible, create a float on voting to tour the state, create special recognition for contributors of over \$1000 and attack voter apathy.

Adjourned at 9:30 p.m.

The LWV-TEF Annual Meeting was held the morning of May 17, 1979.

Jan Wilbur left at the end of the LWV-TEF meeting. The LWV-T board meeting reconvened May 17, 1979 at 1:15 p.m.

24. CALENDAR PLANNING

The tantative state board calendar for fiscal year 1979-80 was discussed and revised. It will be distributed from the state office.

25. CONVENTION 1981

Perrine MOVED that Convention 1981 be held in Beaumont, Texas with Dallas, Texas as an alternate. The first choice of dates will be April 10-12 and second choice will April 17-19. SECONDED AND CARRIED.

26. LWV-US ENERGY ACTION RECOMMENDATION

The board members voiced objection to a LWV-US Action Alert which asked League members to support a specific tax rate of windfall profits. Shapiro MOVED that our president write a letter to the national board asking them to remain within our position on energy and not support issues on which we have no consensus. SECONDED AND CARRIED. Copies of the letter will also be sent to all state Leagues and to all Leagues in the state.

27. TEXAS ENERGY AND NATURAL RESOURCES ADVISORY COMMISSION

Perrine MOVED that Clark write a letter to Governor Clements recommending that the four citizen members to be appointed to the Texas Energy and Natural

The transfer of files was discussed. Board members vacation schedules and telephone information will be mailed from the state office. Clark has a League phone in her home. The number is (214) 528-1096.

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President's Letter -- from Diana Clark

The new state board met for its first work session May 15-17 at Camp Allen near Navasota. Because there are only seven members with prior state board experience (and five of those are beginning new portfolios) much time was spent on nuts & bolts of board organization.

An important part of every League year is appointment of standing committees. Toni Clem and Martha Sarles will represent the board on the Nominating Committee. Beth Brown will chair the Bylaws Committee to review national bylaws and any proposed changes you submit for your local League. Jeanette Vanderwater of Houston was appointed budget chair for the 1980-81 budget. An ad hoc committee under treasurer Ethel Sturgis will meet before Sept. to look at all implications of local League/local board/personal liability. We will have legal assistance, insurance info. and input from the national office. In the meantime, Leagues are referred to p. 15 of the Jan. '79 Nat'l. Board Report for tips on good record keeping, a necessary component of ALL League activity. Nancy Price, the San Antonio Convention Chair was appointed chair of an ad hoc committee which is to produce written guidelines for future convention/council committees.

Evaluation sheets from this year's convention were reviewed. Aside from a few "glitches," the reports were quite favorable: Sarah Weddington & Ruth Hinerfeld were big hits with everyone. Weekend meetings were quite popular. We will be working on ways to iron out program presentation problems -- the largest source of complaints. The board accepted Waco's offer to hold Council '80; and approved of Beaumont as the site for Convention '81.

The two goals set by the state board last year "to assist in strengthening local Leagues, and to be a more effective organization," together with implementing strategies, were reviewed and evaluated (see June 1978 State Board Report.) Many of these strategies have been implemented -- Swap Shops of good ideas, graphics assistance, how to conduct a successful finance campaign, a membership flyer & slide show, advocacy papers on program legislative priorities, statewide publications ("When You Go To Austin," "Name of the Game," etc.), new ideas

for program presentation and outreach in study areas. The new board reaffirmed the validity of these basic goals and began work on additional strategies. While some specific plans for help with membership retention, growth, and involvement wait to be coordinated with possible national strategies, a pilot project of financial incentive for membership growth was adopted (see Beth Brown's report).

The program department related upcoming study & action issues to calendar planning. Materials and consensus deadlines were established. You will find them in the calendar section of the Directory in this mailing. Plans are afoot also to use the Texas VOTER for more every-member program material. Managing program concerns many Leagues. Regional workshops designed to help are in the works. Definite dates will be announced by late September. Several "How to Enjoy Being a President" workshops are also in the planning stage. Definite dates will be announced.

Enclosed with this mailing is the new issue of the LWV-T Directory. We urge you to have one for every board member. It is being sent now to every LL president, DPM subscriber, and Standing Order subscriber. If you promise not to tell the state office who suggested it, you can probably still order DPM & Standing Orders for your board. At the very least, you can make life easier by Xeroxing selected pages and distributing them to the board members involved

While the new state board spent much of its first meeting on future planning, there may be a few unavoidable gaps here and there. We will have all the holes filled by our next meeting in September. Meanwhile, we pledge our best efforts to be of service and assistance to you, our constituents. All the board members join me in hoping you will call on us. We are available by phone or to visit your League at any time. Please ask. And in the meantime, enjoy being a League leader. The more fun League is, the better the League!

Public School Finance October 17, 1980

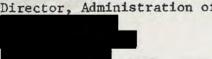

ADULT CORRECTIONS STUDY

- 1. <u>Latest News</u>. A fascinating and informative Facts and Issues publication on adult corrections in Texas had been researched and written by Diana Clark and Lucy Polter. It has been sent to the editor. After editing it goes to the printer—and thence to you! Lucy and Diana are also putting together a Leader's Guide on adult corrections. Besides additional information for your resource committees, it will contain a guide for consensus and a bibliography. Eleven (yes, 11) consensus questions dealing with the Texas Department of Corrections, community—based corrections, and parole were approved during the May state board meeting.
- 2. Schedule. Present plans are to send the F & I, the Leaders Guide, and the consensus questions in a local League presidents mailing on July 13. It is still possible the Legislature may act on proposed parole legislation during the last days of the session. Should that happen, some last-minute revision of the material to be printed, as well as the consensus questions, would be necessary. There could also be some unexpected delay with editing or printing; so if you do not receive these items exactly on schedule, don't panic. If the delay should be more than 2 weeks, I will let you know what is happening. The consensus deadline set last fall remains in effect—Friday, December 14, 1979.
- 3. Suggestions for Getting Started. Line up your resource committee. This is a BIG study, and you'll need help. Plan your calendar. You will really need at least two meetings to cover this material and take consensus. Where possible a general meeting and two unit meetings would be better.

Now, about resources . . .

- a. Review the Admin. of Justice page in the January, 1979 state board report for a list of TDC films and speakers and interview suggestions. That page also tells how to arrange a tour of TDC (at least 6 weeks to 2 months in advance, about 20 people, contact the Public Affairs Office,
- b. For general information, and especially for new chairs and committee members, review the first two LWV-T Facts and Issues on the adult justice system. The Criminal Justice System in Texas: Enforcement and Prosecution, 1975, and The Criminal Justice System in Texas: Courts, Trials, and Sentencing, 1976, and the Leaders Guide materials for them.
- c. An informative article, "Hard Time," on TDC's maximum security prison, the Ellis Unit, appeared in the December, 1978 issue of <u>Texas Monthly</u>. Check also in the January, 1979 issue the "Behind the Lines" editorial.
- d. For summertime book-learnin', search your local library (or shell out \$15) for Criminal Violence, Criminal Justice by Charles E. Silberman, published by Random House.

 Newsweek said this is "one of the most thorough and provocative studies ever made of crime in America."

HR (cont.)

As a way of updating local Leagues on human resource programs here in Texas this year (and educating ourselves) we 'Bobbsey Twins' plan to prepare a series of at least four HR Briefs. One will be sent as a Texas VOTER insert to all state LWV members. Possible topics include Texas Department of Human Resources; Texas Education Agency; Food Stamps in Texas; Public Assistance Programs for Texas Families (AFDC, etc.); Community Development monitoring in Texas; Housing Assistance Available in Texas. Any other suggestions? Anyone out there like to help us?

We expect to send out a survey during the summer to local League HR chairs to help us identify HR needs and interests. In the meantime, though, if you have any particular ideas for projects where the state League can be of help, please let us hear from you.

We also hope to send a report in the fall on the effects of new legislation on HR programs in the state.

On May 23 & 24 I attended a Texas Food Stamp Advisory Committee meeting in Austin as a stand-in for Betty Stevens who has attended previous meetings. The Food Stamp program in Texas is in trouble at the moment because of inadequate funding and

horrendous computer foul-ups. The LWV-T public service TV slide is one of the few ways the public can be informed about the program. It has been estimated that an additional 1.4 million people in Texas are eligible for food stamp benefits. Reaching these people, overcoming the stigma attached to public assistance in Texas, and streamlining the certification process are some of the concerns of the DHR and the advisory committee. The Department faces the additional dilemma of trying to involve new families in the program at a time when it is unable to meet deadlines for the families already enrolled in the program. Local Leagues may wish to become better informed and more involved in their community's food stamp program or plan a meeting this year dealing with the food stamp program. Relative to this: A Food Stamp Conference is planned for August 29-30 in Austin, Details available so far are that it is open to persons from the five-state region; will include speakers from the national and state levels; and is being co-sponsored by the Community Nutrition Institute, Texas Dept. of Human Resources and the LBJ School. More later. Also, there is a good article on food stamps in the May 11 issue of "Texas Observer."

We've gotten good reports on the slide show: "Poverty: A Test for Texans." Keep it in mind when doing your calendar planning.

HUD has launched a million-dollar Women and Credit Project designed to facilitate the entry of women into the housing and credit market. LWVEF has received a grant to participate and local Leagues wishing to become involved should contact Bea Shields at the national LWV office . AIR QUALITY

HB 726 to establish a volunteer pilot program for inspection & maintenance (I/M) of cars in the Houston area has passed. We now need to move on to other automobile pollution problems. Specifically -- fuel switching (using leaded gasoline for unleaded cars, and disconnecting or tampering with auto pollution control devices.) If any of you know newspaper columnists with air quality concerns, or have a summer VOTER, order a copy of the Proposed DOE Rules that would encourage wholesale destruction of auto emission controls from the National Clean Air Coalition, 620 C St., SE, Washington, D.C. 20003. This points out that we may never realize the air quality benefits of the Federal Motor Vehicle Control Program. Use of leaded gas in most cars manufactured after 1975 ruins the catalytic converter, resulting in up to 800% increase in emissions. The primary reason consumers give for fuel switching is the higher price of lead-free gasoline. With a current nationwide average difference of five cents between leaded and unleaded, EPA observes that 10% of the catalyst-equipped cars are illegally misfueled, and that 15% of those motorists admit to misfueling at least twice. Two tankfuls of leaded gas permanently deactivate the catalyst. EPA says a 10% fuel switching rate will result in a 30-70% increase in emissions from newer cars. This increase far exceeds any gains from transportation control measures. In fact, it is certain that the additional transportation control measures and stationary source controls will never yield reductions equivalent to the increase in emissions from wholesale destruction of catalysts. With massive fuel switching, major urban areas simply will not meet ambient air standards by the deadline. Knowing that many devices are disconnected or tampered with (and there is a law against this in Texas) you need to take local public education action NOW.

Also write to Douglas Costle, Administrator, EPA,
and James Schlesinger, Secretary, Dept. of Energy, 1000 Independence Ave., SW,
Washington DC 20545 (Docket #ERA-R-79-17). Urge Mr. Costle to take action against
the rising rate of fuel switching, leading to increased atmospheric oxone and therefore
greater pollution controls necessary for industry (which consumers will be paying for).
Urge Mr. Schlesinger to set a maximum price differential of two cents for each price
level of gasoline. This reflects the A TUAL additional cost of making lead-free gas.

Also talk to your Members of Congress when you see them this summer, urging them not to weaken the Clean Air Act Amendments in the interest of public health. Urge them also to insist that current auto regulations are enforced. Task forces which include League leaders have been established in most Texas urban areas to undertake public education projects on I/M and to alert the public to the reasons not to fuel switch or disconnect. Ask these groups for a superb film "On the Road to Clean Air" which relates the New Jersey I/M program. In addition, EPA Region VI has copies of this 17-minute film to loan. P.S. Nancy Bene and Marilyn Simpson (Nancy is now on the state board) of the Austin League have become experts on trench burners used for disposing of construction-site debris. If contractors in your area use these devices, contact the Austin League, for they have many tips as a result of a recent Texas Air Control Board hearing on how the Administrative Procedure Act and TACB regulations work regarding trench burners.

PUT ON YOUR EARS !!

At the Navasota board meeting the state board determined that attacking the membership problem would be a primary goal for the coming year. Techniques will be sought for gaining members, retaining members, and involving the members we have more effectively.

As part of this attack on the membership problem, state board has adopted a policy to provide local Leagues a positive incentive for membership growth and retention. I have dubbed it the

Ten-Five, Good Buddy

system and the principle is very simple:

FOR EVERY 10% INCREASE IN MEMBERSHIP A LEAGUE ACHIEVES OVER ITS LAST YEAR'S TOTAL, IT WILL RECEIVE A 5% REDUCTION IN ITS PMP TO STATE FOR THE FOLLOWING YEAR.

Thus, a one-hundred-member League which reports a gain of ten or more on Jan. 1, 1980 will receive a reduction of 5% from the \$7.50 per-member assessment the following year. Instead of owing \$825 to state, it will owe \$783.75. This may not be much, but it turns the corner from penalty to reward and it will behoove a League to retain as many members as possible in order to achieve the 10% gain.

The policy applies to all recognized local Leagues including the six that are paying the \$250 minimum assessment. It deals only in 10% increments, so that a 15% gain will result in the 5% reduction, while a 20% gain would result in a 10% reduction. In figuring percentages we will not deal in fractions. 10% of 25 will be seen as 2, not 2.5; 10% of 16 will also be seen as 2, not 1.6; 10% of 43 will be seen as 4, etc.

The policy has been adopted for one year and we will evaluate its effectiveness next summer. A gain in statewide membership will benefit all Leagues since the cost per member decreases as our ranks swell. This new incentive method is designed to actualize that fact at the local League level.

The LWV of New Jersey has already implemented a similar system and we are indebted to them for the idea.

FIELD SERVICE: A reminder -- Please be sure that the members of the new state board and your Field Service Representative receive your monthly bulletin. And remember that the Field Service Rep. should also receive your minutes each month. She wishes to assist you in every way possible and in order to do so, needs to "know the territory."

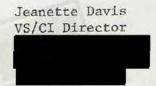

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President's Letter -- from Diana Clark

The new state board met for its first work session May 15-17 at Camp Allen near Navasota. Because there are only seven members with prior state board experience (and five of those are beginning new portfolios) much time was spent on nuts & bolts of board organization.

An important part of every League year is appointment of standing committees. Toni Clem and Martha Sarles will represent the board on the Nominating Committee. Beth Brown will chair the Bylaws Committee to review national bylaws and any proposed changes you submit for your local League. Jeanette Vanderwater of Houston was appointed budget chair for the 1930-81 budget. An ad hoc committee under treasurer Ethel Sturgis will meet before Sept. to look at all implications of local League/local board/ personal liability. We will have legal assistance, insurance info. and input from the national office. In the meantime, Leagues are referred to p. 15 of the Jan. '79 Nat'l. Board Report for tips on good record keeping, a necessary component of ALL League activity. Nancy Price, the San Antonio Convention Chair was appointed chair of an ad hoc committee which is to produce written guidelines for future convention/council committees.

Evaluation sheets from this year's convention were reviewed. Aside from a few "glitches," the reports were quite favorable: Sarah Weddington & Ruth Hinerfeld were big hits with everyone. Weekend meetings were quite popular. We will be working on ways to iron out program presentation problems -- the largest source of complaints. The board accepted Waco's offer to hold Council '80; and approved of Beaumont as the site for Convention '81.

The two goals set by the state board last year "to assist in strengthening local Leagues, and to be a more effective organization," together with implementing strategies, were reviewed and evaluated (see June 1978 State Board Report.) Many of these strategies have been implemented -- Swap Shops of good ideas, graphics assistance, how to conduct a successful finance campaign, a membership flyer & slide show, advocacy papers on program legislative priorities, statewide publications ("When You Go To Austin," "Name of the Game," etc.), new ideas

for program presentation and outreach in study areas. The new board reaffirmed the validity of these basic goals and began work on additional strategies. While some specific plans for help with membership retention, growth, and involvement wait to be coordinated with possible national strategies, a pilot project of financial incentive for membership growth was adopted (see Beth Brown's report).

The program department related upcoming study & action issues to calendar planning. Materials and consensus deadlines were established. You will find them in the calendar section of the Directory in this mailing. Plans are afoot also to use the Texas VOTER for more every-member program material. Managing program concerns many Leagues. Regional workshops designed to help are in the works. Definite dates will be announced by late September. Several "How to Enjoy Being a President" workshops are also in the planning stage. Definite dates will be announced.

It is being sent now to every LL president, DPM subscriber, and Standing Order subscriber. While the new state board spent much of its first meeting on future planning, there may be a few unavoidable gaps here and there. We will have all the holes filled by our next meeting in September. Meanwhile, we pledge our best efforts to be of service and assistance to you, our constituents. All the board members join me in hoping you will call on us. We are available by phone or to visit your League at any time. Please ask. And in the meantime, enjoy being a League leader. The more fun League is, the better the League!

ADULT CORRECTIONS STUDY

- 1. Latest News. A fascinating and informative Facts and Issues publication on adult corrections in Texas had been researched and written by Diana Clark and Lucy Polter. It has been sent to the editor. After editing it goes to the printer—and thence to you! Lucy and Diana are also putting together a Leader's Guide on adult corrections. Besides additional information for your resource committees, it will contain a guide for consensus and a bibliography. Eleven (yes, 11) consensus questions dealing with the Texas Department of Corrections, community-based corrections, and parole were approved during the May state board meeting.
- 2. Schedule. Present plans are to send the F & I, the Leaders Guide, and the consensus questions in a local League presidents mailing on July 13. It is still possible the Legislature may act on proposed parole legislation during the last days of the session. Should that happen, some last-minute revision of the material to be printed, as well as the consensus questions, would be necessary. There could also be some unexpected delay with editing or printing; so if you do not receive these items exactly on schedule, don't panic. If the delay should be more than 2 weeks, I will let you know what is happening. The consensus deadline set last fall remains in effect—Friday, December 14, 1979.
- 3. Suggestions for Getting Started. Line up your resource committee. This is a BIG study, and you'll need help. Plan your calendar. You will really need at least two meetings to cover this material and take consensus. Where possible a general meeting and two unit meetings would be better.

Now, about resources . . .

- a. Review the Admin. of Justice page in the January, 1979 state board report for a list of TDC films and speakers and interview suggestions. That page also tells how to arrange a tour of TDC (at least 6 weeks to 2 months in advance, about 20 people, contact the Public Affairs Office,
- b. For general information, and especially for new chairs and committee members, review the first two LWV-T Facts and Issues on the adult justice system. The Criminal Justice System in Texas: Enforcement and Prosecution, 1975, and The Criminal Justice System in Texas: Courts, Trials, and Sentencing, 1976, and the Leaders Guide materials for them.
- c. An informative article, "Hard Time," on TDC's maximum security prison, the Ellis Unit, appeared in the December, 1978 issue of <u>Texas Monthly</u>. Check also in the January, 1979 issue the "Behind the Lines" editorial.
- d. For summertime book-learnin', search your local library (or shell out \$15) for Criminal Violence, Criminal Justice by Charles E. Silberman, published by Random House. Newsweek said this is "one of the most thorough and provocative studies ever made of crime in America."

A. J. LEGISLATION

At some point after the dust settles from the 66th Legislature, I'll see that you're brought up-to-date on justice legislation. Meanwhile, check reports in the LWV-T "Legislative Newsletter." The wrap-up issue will come to the local Leagues in June.

PROJECTS AND PROGRAMS:

Two good monitoring instruments have come to our attention: one for CETA and one for CD. If you're interested in looking into either or both of these programs in your community, these provide concrete steps for doing so. The CD monitoring instrument is particularly helpful.

There's been no word yet from national about the focus of the <u>Urban Crisis</u> study for this coming year. We will let you know as soon as we hear. As a way of updating local Leagues on human resource programs here in Texas this year (and educating ourselves) we 'Bobbsey Twins' plan to prepare a series of at least four HR Briefs. One will be sent as a Texas VOTER insert to all state LWV members. Possible topics include Texas Department of Human Resources; Texas Education Agency; Food Stamps in Texas; Public Assistance Programs for Texas Families (AFDC, etc.); Community Development monitoring in Texas; Housing Assistance Available in Texas. Any other suggestions? Anyone out there like to help us?

We expect to send out a survey during the summer to local League HR chairs to help us identify HR needs and interests. In the meantime, though, if you have any particular ideas for projects where the state League can be of help, please let us hear from you.

We also hope to send a report in the fall on the effects of new legislation on HR programs in the state.

On May 23 & 24 I attended a Texas Food Stamp Advisory Committee meeting in Austin as a stand-in for Betty Stevens who has attended previous meetings. The Food Stamp program in Texas is in trouble at the moment because of inadequate funding and

horrendous computer foul-ups. The LWV-T public service TV slide is one of the few ways the public can be informed about the program. It has been estimated that an additional 1.4 million people in Texas are eligible for food stamp benefits. Reaching these people, overcoming the stigma attached to public assistance in Texas, and streamlining the certification process are some of the concerns of the DHR and the advisory committee. The Department faces the additional dilemma of trying to involve new families in the program at a time when it is unable to meet deadlines for the families already enrolled in the program. Local Leagues may wish to become better informed and more involved in their community's food stamp program or plan a meeting this year dealing with the food stamp program. Relative to this: A Food Stamp Conference is planned for August 29-30 in Austin, Details available so far are that it is open to persons from the five-state region; will include speakers from the national and state levels; and is being co-sponsored by the Community Nutrition Institute, Texas Dept. of Human Resources and the LBJ School. More later. Also, there is a good article on food stamps in the May 11 issue of "Texas Observer."

We've gotten good reports on the slide show: "Poverty: A Test for Texans." Keep it in mind when doing your calendar planning.

HUD has launched a million-dollar Women and Credit Project designed to facilitate the entry of women into the housing and credit market. If any of you know newspaper columnists with air quality concerns, or have a summer VOTER, order a copy of the Proposed DOE Rules that would encourage wholesale destruction of auto emission controls from the National Clean Air Coalition, 620 C St., SE, Washington, D.C. 20003. This points out that we may never realize the air quality benefits of the Federal Motor Vehicle Control Program. Use of leaded gas in most cars manufactured after 1975 ruins the catalytic converter, resulting in up to 800% increase in emissions. The primary reason consumers give for fuel switching is the higher price of lead-free gasoline. With a current nationwide average difference of five cents between leaded and unleaded, EPA observes that 10% of the catalyst-equipped cars are illegally misfueled, and that 15% of those motorists admit to misfueling at least twice. Two tankfuls of leaded gas permanently deactivate the catalyst. EPA says a 10% fuel switching rate will result in a 30-70% increase in emissions from newer cars. This increase far exceeds any gains from transportation control measures. In fact, it is certain that the additional transportation control measures and stationary source controls will never yield reductions equivalent to the increase in emissions from wholesale destruction of catalysts. With massive fuel switching, major urban areas simply will not meet ambient air standards by the deadline. Knowing that many devices are disconnected or tampered with (and there is a law against this in Texas) you need to take local public education action NOW.

Also write to Douglas Costle, Administrator, EPA, 401 M St., SW, Washington 20460; and James Schlesinger, Secretary, Dept. of Energy, 1000 Independence Ave., SW, Washington DC 20545 (Docket #ERA-R-79-17). Urge Mr. Costle to take action against the rising rate of fuel switching, leading to increased atmospheric oxone and therefore greater pollution controls necessary for industry (which consumers will be paying for). Urge Mr. Schlesinger to set a maximum price differential of two cents for each price level of gasoline. This reflects the A TUAL additional cost of making lead-free gas.

Also talk to your Members of Congress when you see them this summer, urging them not to weaken the Clean Air Act Amendments in the interest of public health. Urge them also to insist that current auto regulations are enforced. Task forces which include League leaders have been established in most Texas urban areas to undertake public education projects on I/M and to alert the public to the reasons not to fuel switch or disconnect. Ask these groups for a superb film "On the Road to Clean Air" which relates the New Jersey I/M program. In addition, EPA Region VI has copies of this 17-minute film to loan. Contact Nancy Johnson, EPA, 1201 Elm St., Dallas 75270.

P.S. Nancy Bene and Marilyn Simpson (Nancy is now on the state board) of the Austin League have become experts on trench burners used for disposing of construction-site debris. If contractors in your area use these devices, contact the Austin League, for they have many tips as a result of a recent Texas Air Control Board hearing on how the Administrative Procedure Act and TACB regulations work regarding trench burners.

PUT ON YOUR EARS !!

At the Navasota board meeting the state board determined that attacking the membership problem would be a primary goal for the coming year. Techniques will be sought for gaining members, retaining members, and involving the members we have more effectively.

As part of this attack on the membership problem, state board has adopted a policy to provide local Leagues a positive incentive for membership growth and retention. I have dubbed it the

Ten-Five, Good Buddy

system and the principle is very simple:

FOR EVERY 10% INCREASE IN MEMBERSHIP A LEAGUE ACHIEVES OVER ITS LAST YEAR'S TOTAL, IT WILL RECEIVE A 5% REDUCTION IN ITS PMP TO STATE FOR THE FOLLOWING YEAR.

Thus, a one-hundred-member League which reports a gain of ten or more on Jan. 1, 1980 will receive a reduction of 5% from the \$7.50 per-member assessment the following year. Instead of owing \$825 to state, it will owe \$783.75. This may not be much, but it turns the corner from penalty to reward and it will behoove a League to retain as many members as possible in order to achieve the 10% gain.

The policy applies to all recognized local Leagues including the six that are paying the \$250 minimum assessment. It deals only in 10% increments, so that a 15% gain will result in the 5% reduction, while a 20% gain would result in a 10% reduction. In figuring percentages we will not deal in fractions. 10% of 25 will be seen as 2, not 2.5; 10% of 16 will also be seen as 2, not 1.6; 10% of 43 will be seen as 4, etc.

The policy has been adopted for one year and we will evaluate its effectiveness next summer. A gain in statewide membership will benefit all Leagues since the cost per member decreases as our ranks swell. This new incentive method is designed to actualize that fact at the local League level.

The LWV of New Jersey has already implemented a similar system and we are indebted to them for the idea.

FIELD SERVICE:

A reminder -- Please be sure that the members of the new state board and your Field Service Representative receive your monthly bulletin. And remember that the Field Service Rep. should also receive your minutes each month. She wishes to assist you in every way possible and in order to do so, needs to "know the territory."

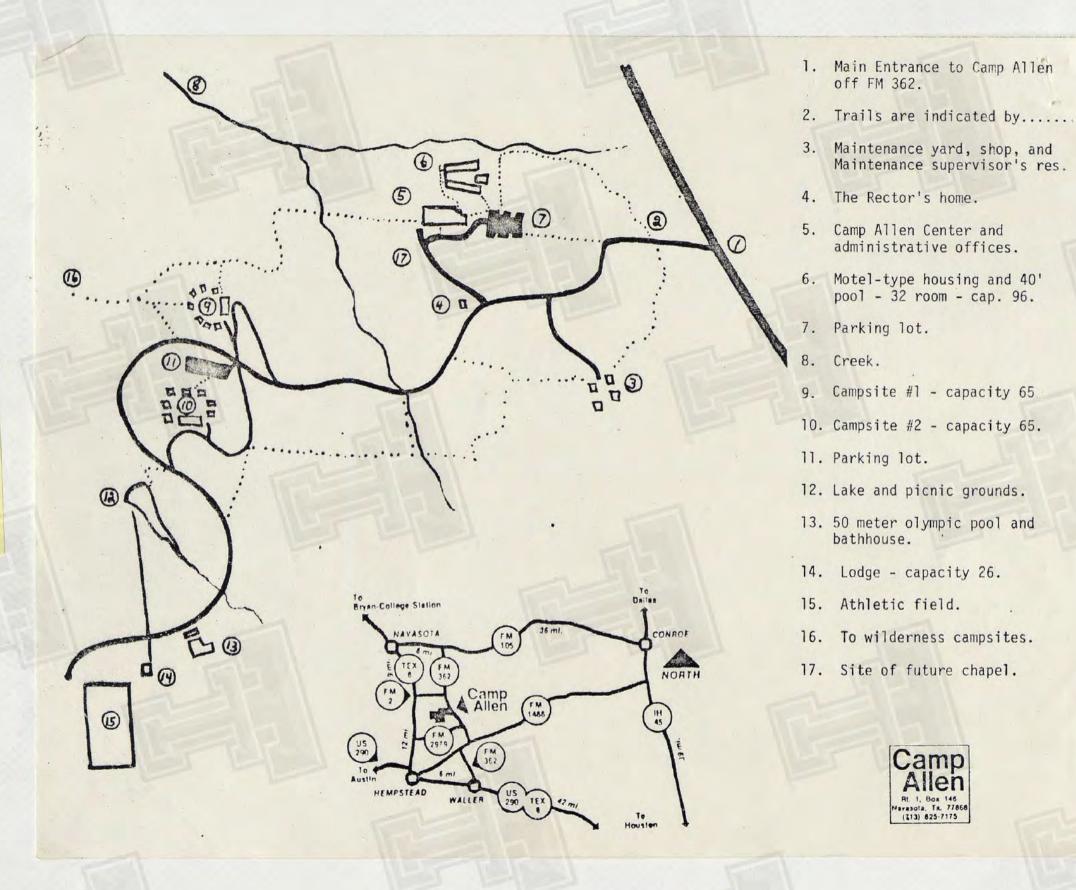

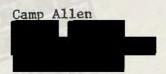

Work toward passage of USHB 726 on the floor of the Senate will continue. Though there has been some questioning of the LWV-T position on the bill, I have continued to work primarily toward its passage and secondarily toward getting some trengthening amendments attached. Senator Clower has agreed to present them on the Senate floor—a choice made by several of us who were concerned that presenting them in the Economic Development committee might prove counterproductive.... As you recall passage of inspection/maintenance legislation this session is mandatory if the EPA is to approve the Texas State Implementation Plan by the deadline of June 30, 1979. It will not be approvable without I/M legislation—this is from the "horse's mouth". Hence our priority for passage of the bill over strengthening amendments. I would like to see the improved "comflict of interest" amendment fly but I think the others will actually make little difference in the manner in which the TACB implements the CAAAAA of 1977 as the federal act takes precedence over any state legislation or plan.

I am also continuing work on the two-sides-of-one-page flow chart on the Clean Air Act-a request from the LWUS EQ committee. It has been a long and painful process to condense this complex legislation into two pages in fact the regional efficial with whom I am working on it still feels that we may not be able to do it in that small a space. We do hope to have a tool, though, which can be used by all state and local Leagues in assessing the implementation of their SIPs and further as preparation for responding to an LWUS call to action when (not if) the attack on the CAAA comes in Congress.

As a result of attending the EPA-sponsored I/M conference in Austin in April I am now coordinator for the North Central Texas Regional Task Force for I/M. We have been approved for but have not yet received an EPA grant of \$2000 to accomplish public education efforts in this part of the state during the two year period alloted in CSHB 726 for a piket volunteer I/M project in Houston. Several Leaguers are working on the task force and we planto do TV spots for frees emissions testing in two locations in Dallas and Fort Worth during Clean Air Week (April 30-May 5), plan to establish a speakers bureau, set up shppping center demonstrations on reducing emissions, talk to as many organizations and drivers education classes as possible and do TV spots and Voters Digest types of things to raise community awareness about the advantages of an I/M program.

For next year I see the I/M task force work as our primary effort throughout the state. Asso monitoring of the Houston piket program and monitoring of the TACBs implementation of the SIP will be important. Additional and continuing efforts will have to be made to keep our Congressional delegation aware of our position against gutting the Clean Air Act will require some time and effort. It will probably be a busy air year even without a legislative session:

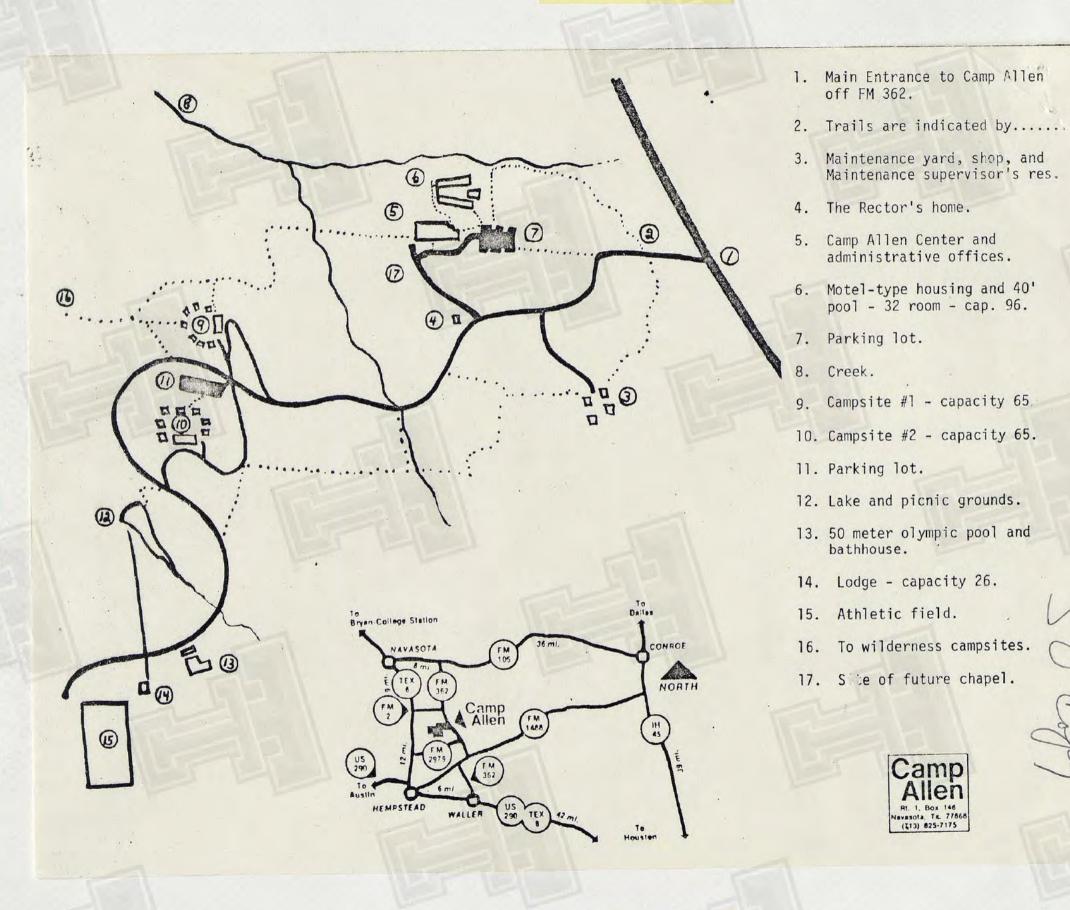

PRE BOARD REPORT

Air Quality

Work toward passage of ESHB 726 on the floor of the Senate will continue. Though there has been some questioning of the LWV-T position on the bill, I have continued to work primarily toward its passage and secondarily toward getting some trengthening amendments attached. Senator Clower has agreed to present them on the Senate floor—a choice made by several of us who were concerned that presenting them in the Economic Development committee might prove counterproductive.... As you recall passage of inspection/maintenance legislation this session is mandatory if the EPA is to approve the Texas State Implementation Plan by the deadline of June 30, 1979. It will not be approvable without I/M legislation—this is from the "horse's mouth". Hence our priority for passage of the bill over strengthening amendments. I would like to see the improved "comflict of interest" amendment fly but I think the others will actually make little difference in the manner in which the TACB implements the CAAAA of 1977 as the federal act takes precedence over any state legislation or plan.

I am also continuing work on the two-sides-of-one-page flow chart on the Clean Air Act-a request from the LWUS EQ committee. It has been a long and painful process to condense this complex legislation into two pages in fact the regional official with whom I am working on it still feels that we may not be able to do it in that small a space. We do hope to have a tool, though, which can be used by all state and local Leagues in assessing the implementation of their SIPs and further as preparation for responding to an LWUS call to action when (not if) the attack on the CAAA comes in Congress.

As a result of attending the EPA-sponsored I/M conference in Austin in April I am now coordinator for the North Central Texas Regional Task Force for I/M. We have been approved for but have not yet received an EPA grant of \$2000 to accomplish public education efforts in this part of the state during the two year period alloted in CSHB 726 for a piket volunteer I/M project in Houston. Several Leaguers are working on the task force and we planto do TV spots for freese emissions testing in two locations in Dallas and Fort Worth during Clean Air Week (April 30-May 5), plan to establish a speakers bureau, set up shppping center demonstrations on reducing emissions, talk to as many organizations and drivers education classes as possible and do TV spots and Voters Digest types of things to raise community awareness about the advantages of an I/M program.

For next year I see the I/M task force work as our primary effort throughout the state. Also monitoring of the Houston piket program and monitoring of the TACBs implementation of the SIP will be important. Additional and continuing efforts will have to be made to keep our Congressional delegation aware of our position against gutting the Clean Air Act will require some time and effort. It will probably be a busy air year even without a legislative session:

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BOBSETTE'S BELATED (PRE) BOARD BILLET DOUX

At a Natural Resources Core (are we spelling that Core or Corps?) meeting at Meg's, I was shillelaghed into doing a pre-board. Missed the deadline because of some heavy legislative action going down; so here:

This report is an overview of my current thinking for Land Use activities during the coming year.

As you know, I've been closely involved in the developing Texas Coastal Management Program, which has had heavy sledding all the way, and looks precarious at this point.

Whether or not the program flies, I propose forming a cadre of coastal leaguers who will in turn develop and implement a full-blown coastal coalition to monitor coastal agancy activities and do an on-going public awareness program for coastal issues. I think the timing for this activity is exactly right; I think leaguers are ready for this, as are other environmental groups down there. And I have far-flung contacts with most of the appropriate organizations, not just the league, which will help.

I think it's important that all N.R. board and off-board chairs help with this effort as much as their busy schedules permit.

Now, unless somebody says cease and desist, I intend to begin by writing local leagues down there and setting up an early September meeting to draw up plans!

ADDENDUM: I have a call in to the OCZM in D.C., to see if they could spring for a grant of \$2000 or \$3000 for travel money and organizational seed money. More later.
