My reply is as follows:

Dallas, Texas, August 11, 1913.

R. L. Slaughter Douglas, Arizona.

Wrote you fully inspectors instructions ten days ago. Take matter up with Dr. Hart there. If you can get four seventy five for entire herd there would advise selling. Impossible reach George. Keep me posted here by wire. Dont think it advisable to drive cattle two days without water."

I am not sure whether you have received my wire or not. I expected to have an answer from you by this time, but for some reason you have failed to answer. Dr. Hart, the Government Inspector, can give you all the information as to points you can ship them. I am in hopes you can sell the cattle there. Owing to the drouth in Kansas, the Kansas City market is being glutted from day to day, hence I seriously doubt whether the cattle would bring what we want on the K. C. market.

R. L. Slaug ter -- 12.

I am wiring Judge Richardson today to ascertain where you are and what you are doing with the cattle. I presume you have gone back to Nacazari to look after the cattle and that is the reason I have been unable to hear from you. I seriously doubt the advisability of driving the cattle two days wihout water, at this season of the year. Of course, if I am really needed, I will come to Douglas, but prefer not to come just at this time. If you ship the cattle, I will meet them in Kansas City. Of course, selling at \$4.75 a hundred will net us more meney than in shipping, I believe.

George is out on the ranch, and it is impossible to get him, hence it is up to you and I to handle the deal. Write me fully here as I shall be here from now on.



Just sold Douglas butchers at ten cents dressed delivered here. Will take about eight days drive to reach here. Have arranged duties. Will meet cattle Purico tomorrow. Hart agrees on this deal. Best I could do. Write me here. (Signed) R. L. Slaughter." In regard to the sale of the cattle, will say that if you intend to hold those cattle there until they butcher them out, it is very poor sale, for the cattle will shrink and you will be at an enormous expense holding them. If they are to be killed and dressed on arrival, it is a fair sale, as I judge they will dress 50% of their present weight. I would like to know if they are to be killed and dressed at once on arrival. This is the only way that you can play even. National Bank to the credit of the Slaughter Cattle Company, except \$4,000.00, which you can place to their credit in the Bank of Douglas. The account of the Slaughter Cattle Company has been in the red with the Mercantile National Bank for some 40 or 50 days, and I am today writing Coney that you have sold the cattle and will remit just as soon as they are delivered. Kindly drop him a line yourself, so that he will be satisfied to carry the over-draft and can explain it to the Bank Examiner, who certainly will examine the bank within the next twenty days or less.

Did you answer Woodward? I told him in my letter, and sent you a copy of the letter I wrote him, to take the matter up with you in regard to the way he had acted on the ranch. I have just had a long talk with Bud Wright in regard to the notes, and he says they are non-negotiable notes and we had no right to pay the other one, that they could not hold the negotiable instrument until Woodward had complied with the contract, that the wording on the note made it non-negotiable and that no Court in the world would hold it as a negotiable instrument, notwith-standing the Cashier of the Bank stated that he had taken this up with the New York bankers and they had instructed him it was negotiable. He says that he will stake his reputation as an attorney that it is a non-negotiable instrument; hence, we are safe on that line and just just as well tell those people when you get the cattle in and get the money, that no more notes will be paid until Woodward complies with his contract. This will hold this money up perhaps for the next two years, for I feel sure it will take at least that length of time for Mr. Woodward to comply with the contract. Of course, we will have to pay the interest eventually on these notes, but it is better to let them run until Mr. Woodward does comply with the contract.

Now, don't put the money you get for these cattle in the Bark, for Woodward might take it in his head through these people to hold this money and give us all kinds of twuble. When you get the money for the cattle, except the amount I instructed to put in the Bank, go over to the First National Bank and get exchange and mail the exchange to the Mercantile National Bank. In other words, be on the safe side; take no chances. They might be allright, but this is the safe side. Of course, this is confidential to you and I feel sure you will treat it so. Of course, keep your own counsel about everything until the cattle are sold, delivered and turned over, and get this draft and send the money on, and then you can talk as you please, but it is my advice not to talk too much in regard to the Woodward matter, because someone will come in and say that we had made certain statements; hence be very cautious about what you say in regard to any of our business affairs. I feel sure you will do this, but I want to warn you and don't want you to feel that I am uneasy that you will do it, nor take any exceptions to what I say.

We are putting over a million dellar Trust Company in Dallas, and it is my desire that you take as much as \$10,000 of this stock. Of course, I realize that you have not the money today, but you will have it soon.
