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FIRST PLENARY SESSION

President Clark called the first plenary session of the Eighteenth Biennial Convention of the Lesgue of Women Voters of Texas to order at 1:20 p.m. on Friday, March 27, 1981 at the Red Carpet Inn in Beaumont, Texas.

- 1. Welcoming Addresses. President Clark introduced Lura Burns, president of the LWV-Beaumont, who welcomed us and then introduced Mayor Maury Meyers. Mayor Meyers welcomed League members to Beaumont and presented the key to show the windows (13, 30) and the unique total Beaumont to President Clark.
- 2. Appointments. President Clark announced the following appointments:

Parliamentarian - Charlotte - Travis of San Antonio Timekeeper - Mary Colthorp of Beaumont Tellers - Joan Gordon, Eva Dawson, and Martha Lee Brock of Beaumont Elections Committee - Catherine Perrine of Dallas, Chairperson Credentials Committee - Sarah Gates of Beaumont, Chairperson Courtesy Resolutions Committee - Olivia Meyer of Galveston, Chairperson Barbara Materka of Dallas Margaret Kemp of Pearland

- 3. Credentials Report. Sarah Gates, chairperson of the Credentials Committee; reported the following attendance: 188 delegates, 15 observers, 15 state board members, 1 staff member, and 3 press representatives.
- 4. Adoption of Rules and Procedures. President Clark reviewed the proposed rules and procedures for the convention as they were presented in the workbook.

Clark MOVED the adoption of the proposed rules and procedures. The motion was SECONDED and CARRIED. Clark extended the privilege of the floor to observers with the reminder that only delegates may vote.

5. Adoption of the Order of Business. Clark amended the proposed order of business as presented in the workbook by postponing the nominating committee report and nominations from the floor until after the state bylaws committee report, debate and vote. Clark MOVED that the proposed order of business as amended be adopted. The motion was SECONDED and CARRIED.

- 6. Introductions. President Clark introduced Carol Flatten, the convention chairperson. She also introduced the state board members, field service representatives, and Executive Director Joann Lovelace.
- 7. Roll Call. Secretary Catherine Gordon called the roll of local Leagues Twenty-nine of thirty-five answered the roll call, and two Leagues arrived during the first plenary session for a total of thirty-one Leagues in attendance. Local Leagues attending were: Abilene, Amarillo, Austin, Bay Area, Baytown, Beaumont, Brazos County, Corpus Christi, Dallas, Denton, Edinburg/McAllen, Gainesville, Galveston, Houston, Irving, Lubbock, Marshall/Harrison County, Midland, Orange Area, Pearland, Plano, Richardson, Rockwall County, San Antonio Area, San Marcos, Sherman, Tarrant County, Tyler, Victoria, Waco Area, and Wichita Falls. Leagues not attending were: El Paso, Harlingen, Odessa, and Temple. The provisional League, Montgomery County, attended, as did Pasadena State Unit and Kerrville State Unit. Two members-at-large answered roll call.
- 8. Secretary's Report. President Clark announced that the minutes of the Seventeenth Biennial Convention of the League of Women Voters of Texas had been approved by the state board and were on file. She appointed the state board as a committee to correct and approve the minutes of this Convention.
- 9. Treasurer's Report. Treasurer Ethel Sturgis reported that a balance sheet and budget analysis for the first nine months of the year has been included in a packet that each League president has received. The general operating fund net worth of the LWV-T and the LWV-TEF to the nearest dollar is \$31,102. This figure excludes all restricted funds, local League TEF funds, Action Committee funds, and a one-time gift of \$26,000 to TEF. Sturgis estimated the end of the year operating net worth to be approximately \$19,460, which is above the minimum \$15,000 kept as an ongoing reserve. A copy of the new hand-book for treasurers, Money Matters Made Easier, was in each president's packet.
- 10. Budget Presentation. The last page of the proposed LWV-TEF budget (B10) inadvertently omitted from the workbook was distributed to all delegates. The LWV-T proposed budget for \$57,832 and the LWV-TEF proposed budget for \$62,015 prepared by the budget committee were in the workbook. Budget Chairman Myrtle McMahan presented the following budget highlights: no increase in per member payment, an increase in state fundraising with a reduction in the members-at-large, funding from reserves for a possible special session and an accrual for the next session of the legislature. One new study item has been proposed. McMahan MOVED adoption of the LWV-T proposed budget for June 1, 1981 to May 31, 1982 as printed in the workbook. Jeanette Vanderwater of Houston gave notice of intent to amend the proposed budget as follows:
- 1. Increase A.1. Local League Support to \$28,070 by increasing the per-member payment from \$7.50 to \$8.25.
 - 2. Add U.5. Paid Legislative Lobbyist Accrual \$2,500.
- 11. Development Report. Nancy Price, development chairperson, referred to her report in the workbook which listed donations to LWV-T and LWV-TEF since March 1, 1980 and totaling \$22,393.24. She announced the following additional contributions: Dresser Industries, \$1,000; Texas Bankers, \$2,995; Sigmor Corporation, \$250; Guardian Savings and Loan, \$100; and the Bloom Agency, \$1,871.91.
- 12. Presentation of Fundraising Sharing Policy. Nancy Price, development chairman, MOVED adoption of the sharing policy as proposed and printed in the workbook.

13. Presentation of Proposed Program. Program Vice President Laura Keever reported that twenty Leagues participated in state program planning. She reviewed proposed state program for 1981-83 and an explanation of the same as printed in the workbook. There were twelve items suggested for a new study. One item concerning an amendment to the U. S. Constitution was not recommended by the state board as it was considered not appropriate for adoption at the state level. As no specific item received support from more than two Leagues, the state board did not recommend any specific item for a new study, but did recommend that a new study be determined by the delegates. Keever MOVED the adoption of the proposed program for 1981-83 as it was printed in the workbook, Program, p. 2.

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Keever also explained two recommendations from the state board to amend the details of program positions as found in <u>Program Perspectives 1980-81</u>. She MOVED their adoption as printed in the workbook, Program, p. 2.

- 14. Not Recommended Program. The following notice of intent to present not recommended program items was given:
 - Quality of Mental Health/Mental Retardation Services in Texas by Mary Porter of Richardson
 - Women Under Texas Law by Lucy Polter of Dallas
 - Ramifications of Legislation Defining the Legal Commencement of Life and the Right to Limit Childbearing by Marge Adams of Houston
- Texas Housing Policies by Helen Hunter of Houston
 - Illegal Aliens in Texas by Ann Swendig of Midland
- 15. State Bylaws Committee Report. Bylaws Committee Chairperson Jeanette Davis called delegates' attention to the proposed new wording for Art. IX Council, Sec. 3 "Authorization For Action," a copy of which had been placed on the tables. (Copy attached.) She then reviewed the report of the Bylaws Committee which was printed in the workbook. Action was taken on each recommendation as follows:

Delete from ART. III. Sec. 2. MEMBERSHIP Sec. 2. How Composed and Sec. 3. Types of Membership and substitute ART. III. Sec. 2. Types of Membership as printed in the workbook. Editorial change to bring our bylaws into compliance with the national bylaws. APPROVED by general consent.

An editorial change in ART. IV. OFFICERS Sec. 5 The Treasurer as printed in the workbook was APPROVED by general consent.

Davis MOVED to amend ART. V. Board of Directors Sec. 3. Vacancies as printed in the workbook. The motion was SECONDED and CARRIED.

Davis MOVED to amend ART. VII. FINANCIAL ADMINISTRATION Sec. 2. Local and Provisional League Financial Support (b) as recommended in the workbook.

The motion was SECONDED. Martha Kissinger of Tarrant County MOVED to amend the amendment by striking "shall" in the sentence to be inserted and substituting may. The motion was SECONDED and CARRIED. The main motion then CARRIED.

Davis MOVED to amend ART. VII. Financial Administration Sec. 2. Local and Provisional Financial League Support (c) as presented in the workbook. The motion was SECONDED and CARRIED.

Davis MOVED to amend ART. VII. FINANCIAL ADMINISTRATION Sec. 3. State-wide Fundraising as presented in the workbook. The motion was SECONDED and CARRIED.

Davis MOVED to amend ART. VII. FINANCIAL ADMINISTRATION Sec. 4. The Budget and Budget Committee (a) as printed in the workbook. The motion was SECONDED and CARRIED.

An editorial change in ART. VIII, Convention, Sec. 2. Composition, as printed in workbook was approved by general consent.

Davis MOVED to amend ART. IX COUNCIL Sec. 3 Authorization for Action by proposed new wording to clarify the amendment as proposed in the workbook. The motion was SECONDED. Discussion followed and at 3:15 P.M. a recess was called while a substitute amendment was drafted. Following the recess, Joyce Lockley of Dallas MOVED to substitute the following amendment:

Upon recommendation of the state board or any local League the council may make an addition to the program in the event of an emergency. A local League shall submit any proposed addition to the state board at least eight weeks in advance of the meeting of the council. An addition proposed by a local League or by the state board must be sent to the local League presidents at least one month in advance of council. A 2/3 vote of the members of the council present and voting shall be required to make an addition to the program.

The motion was SECONDED and CARRIED by standing vote. The motion to amend then CARRIED.

Davis MOVED that ART. IX COUNCIL Sec. 4: Quorum be amended as printed in the workbook. The motion was SECONDED. Diane Sheridan of Bay Area MOVED to amend the amendment by striking "are" and inserting is following "...a majority of local Leagues". The motion was SECONDED and CARRIED. The motion to amend then CARRIED.

Davis MOVED to amend ART. X NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS Sec. 4. Election as printed in the workbook. The motion was SECONDED. Joan Lava of Austin MOVED to amend the amendment by striking "except that if" and inserting unless and by inserting then following "... one nominee for each office;". The motion was SECONDED and CARRIED. The motion to amend then CARRIED.

Davis MOVED to smend ART. XI. PROGRAM Sec. 2a. Program as printed in the workbook to make the wording of the article consistent with the national bylaws. Margie Morrill of Corpus Christi MOVED to have the Principles read. The motion FAILED for lack of a second. Barbara Materka of Dallas MOVED the previous question. The motion was SECONDED. The motion to amend FAILED by a counted vote of 65 votes in the affirmative and 90 votes in the negative.

Davis MOVED to amend ART. XI PROGRAM Sec. 3. Program Selection (b) as printed in the workbook. The motion was SECONDED and CARRIED.

Davis MOVED to amend ART. XI. PROGRAM Sec. 3. Program Selection (c) as printed in the workbook. The motion was SECONDED and CARRIED.

Davis MOVED to amend ART. XI. PROGRAM Sec. 3. Program Selection (d) as printed in the workbook. The motion was SECONDED. Lynne Johnson of Houston MOVED to amend the amendment by striking "two-thirds" and inserting majority following "...a not-recommended item requires a". Following discussion, Lois Carpenter of Midland MOVED the previous question. The motion was SECONDED and CARRIED. The motion to amend the amendment then FAILED. The motion to amend the article CARRIED.

Davis MOVED to amend ART. XIV. AMENDMENTS Sec. 1. Amendments as printed in the workbook. The motion was SECONDED and CARRIED.

- 16. Nominating Committee Report. Helen Hunter, chairperson of the Nominating Committee presented the nominations for officers, directors, and Nominating Committee as printed in the workbook. The president called for nominations from the floor. There being none, Helen Hunter MOVED the election of the slate as presented. The motion was SECONDED and CARRIED. (Copy attached.)
- 17. Action Motions. President Clark reviewed the procedure for consideration of legislative or administrative actions as printed under "Proposed Rules and Procedures" in the workbook. She appointed the following Action Motions Committee: Chairman, Laura Keever, Houston; Kay Dillard, Abilene, and Toni Clem, Paris, (MAL). Nancy Bene, Austin, served as consultant.

Announcements were made and the session adjourned at 5:15 P.M.

WORKSHOPS

- 1. Public Relations Workshop. A workshop on public relations entitled "In the Public Eye" was conducted in the inn from 8 P.M. to 10 P.M. by Margaret Keys and Barbara Miller, professional educators.
- 2. Local Presidents Workshop. A breakfast workshop for incoming and outgoing presidents was held from 8:15 A.M. to 10:15 A.M. on Saturday, March 29, 1981.
- 3. State Fair. Ten mini-workshops were held on Saturday, March 28, 1981, from 8:15 A.M. to 10:15 A.M. All topics were presented concurrently in twenty-minute segments allowing delegates/observers to rotate among workshops of their choice. Topics presented were money matters, development, speakers bureau and public relations; voting rights/voters service, units, membership, office management,

political action committees, publications, and lobbying.

SECOND PLENARY SESSION

President Clark called the second plenary session to order at 10:50 A.M. on Saturday, March 28, 1981.

- 1. Credentials Report. Sarah Gates, chairperson of credentials, reported the following present: 183 delegates, 15 state board members, 12 observers, 2 visitors, 12 workers, and 1 staff person.
- 2. President's Report. The president gave a brief address and was applauded by the assembly.
- 3. Not-Recommended Program Vote for Consideration. The following not-recommended program items were moved for consideration:

Mary Porter of Richardson MOVED for consideration a study of the quality of Mental Realth/Mental Retardation Services in Texas. The focus of the study for two years will be to identify and evaluate existing resources, institutions, services, and existing legislation and standards. The motion was SECONDED and CARRIED.

Jane Dunatchik of Beaumont MOVED for consideration an examination of ways at the state level through which the League of Women Voters of Texas could promote more equitable and efficient delivery of quality health care. The motion was SECONDED and CARRIED.

Sue Yates of Houston MOVED for consideration a study of the ramifications of legislation which governs a woman's decision whether to limit childbearing and legislation which seeks to define the legal commencement of life to focus on the possible legal, social, political and economic ramifications of such legislation. The motion was SECONDED but FATLED on a standing vote. Diana Thompson of Houston called for a counted vote. The chair declared the motion CARRIED with 91 votes in the affirmative and 86 votes in the negative.

Rebecca Bergstresser of Dallas MOVED for consideration a study of "Women Under Texas Law: A study of the impact of Texas state laws on women."

The motion was SECONDED and CARRIED.

Helen Hunter of Houston announced that she will postpone her recommendation for a study of Texas housing policies until 1983.

Ann Swendig of Midland announced that she would not propose a study of illegal aliens in Texas.

At 11:30 A.M. the assembly recessed for 15 minutes.

4. Budget Debate. Jeanette Vanderwater of Houston MOVED to amend the budget to increase the per-member payment from \$7.50 to \$9.00, seventy-five cents of which would be directed toward a paid lobbyist. The motion was SECONDED. Diane Sheridan of Bay Area MOVED to amend the motion by striking \$9.00 and inserting \$8.50. The motion was SECONDED and FAILED. Mary Porter of Richardson MOVED the

previous question. The motion was SECONDED and CARRIED. The vote on the main motion FATLED to get the necessary 3/5 vote by a count of 106 votes in the affirmative and 77 votes in the negative. Pearl Winicorn of Dallas requested a recount. There were 110 votes in the affirmative and 79 votes in the negative on the second count. The chair again declared the motion FAILED. Donna Green of Austin MOVED to smend the state budget to raise the per-member payment from \$7.50 to \$8.25. The motion was SECONDED. Following discussion, Galen Westwick of Corpus Christi MOVED the previous question. SECONDED and CARRIED. The chair called for counted vote. The motion CARRIED by 120 votes in the affirmative and 67 votes in the negative.

The assembly recessed for lunch at 12:40 P.M. and reconvened at 2:45 P.M. Lupe Anguiano, president of National Women's Employment and Education Inc., was the luncheon speaker. She described her program which has been highly successful in getting low-income women into the job market.

- 5. Presentation of Action Motions. Six action motions were presented to the Action Motions Committee for their consideration.
- 6. Adoption of Per-member Payment. Myrtle McMahan, chairperson of the Budget Committee, MOVED that the minimum amount of per-member payment for a local League be \$250, as recommended by the Budget Committee. The motion was SECONDED and CARRIED.
- 7. Adoption of the Sharing Policy. Development Director Nancy Price MOVED adoption of the sharing policy recommended by the state board as printed in the workbook. The motion was SECONDED and CARRIED.

The president made some agenda adjustments with no objection from the delegation. She asked for a count of the house before beginning program debate. The chairperson of the Credentials Committee reported 184 delegates, 15 state board members, 12 observers, 5 visitors, 1 staff person, and 1 press representative present.

8. Not-recommended Program Debate. Not-recommended program items were debated in the order of their presentation: Study of the Quality of Mental Health-Mental Retardation Services, Study of Health Care, Study of Legislation which Seeks to Define Conception as the Legal Commencement of Life, and Women under Texas Law.

The convention recessed at 4:20 P.M. and reconvened at 4:30 P.M.

Jill Hays of the Bay Area League MOVED to amend the wording of the notrecommended program study, "Women Under Texas Law", by inserting the words
existing and proposed after the word "of". The motion was SECONDED. Following
much discussion, Ms. Hays withdrew her motion. She then MOVED to substitute the
following wording for the study: Women Under Texas Law: a study of the impact on
women of existing state laws and proposed legislation. The motion was SECONDED
and CARRIED. The proposed study was then debated.

9. Recommended Program Debate. Program Vice President Laura Keever discussed the proposed program for 1981-83 as presented in the workbook. No amendments were proposed to the proposed program. On the state board recommendation that "increased authority and effectiveness for legislators" be dropped from Program Perspectives 1980-81, page 17, IV GOVERNMENT subtitle LEGISLATURE, Helen Hunter from Houston MOVED to retain the position we now have but to improve the wording. The motion was SECONDED and CARRIED.

10. Budget Adjustment Committee. President Clark appointed the following Budget Adjustment Committee: Myrtle McMahan, Chairman; Ethel Sturgis, and Linda Poerner.

Announcements were made by the secretary. The session adjourned at 5:30 P.M.

COUNTERPART PROGRAM WORKSHOPS

On Sunday, March 29, 1981 at 8 A.M. to 9:30 A.M. counterpart workshops on the present priority state action issues of Justice, Water and Wastes, Government, Energy, and Financing Education were held. Each program director will report to the new state board and local Leagues regarding preferred emphases for the coming year.

THIRD PLENARY SESSION

The third plenary session was called to order by President Clark at 9:30 A.M. on Sunday, March 29, 1981.

- 1. Action Motions. Laura Keever reported that the Action Motions Committee recommended the following three action motions for adoption:
- a. The following resolution from Lavora Arizaga, Human Resources director for the state board:

WHEREAS President Reagan has recommended severely reducing funding for the Legal Services Corporation and there have been recommendations in both the Senate and the House for the complete termination of funding for the Legal Services Corporation which would result in de facto abolition of federally funded legal services for the poor;

AND WHEREAS, the League of Women Voters supports action to achieve equal rights for all;

AND WHEREAS, rights without the ability to enforce them are meaningless,

I MOVE THAT this convention send a message to President Reagan and the Texas Congressional delegation of the United States urging continued funding of the Legal Services Corporation at no less than the present level.

Keever so MOVED. The motion was SECONDED and CARRIED.

b. The League of Women Voters of Abilene MOVES that the League of Women Voters of Texas communicate to the League of Women Voters of the United States our opposition to the national release of lobbying tools designed for "League use only" (specifically the Political Accountability Rating).

We further MOVE that LWV-T register its objection to the percentage rating of voting records used in the PAR because it can be and often is perceived as support or endorsement of elected officials.

Keever so MOVED. The motion was SECONDED and CARRIED.

1. Action Motions

c. Martha Kissinger of Tarrant County requested that the League of Women Voters of Texas propose adoption at the 1982 national convention of a program item on U. S. Policy on Immigration

Keever so MOVED. The motion was SECONDED and CARRIED.

- 2. Credentials Report. The Credentials Committee reported 184 delegates. 15 state board members, 12 observers, 5 visitors, 10 workers, 1 staff person, and 1 press representative in the house.
- 3. Legislative Report. Legislative Director Nancy Bene reported on the six Action Alerts still to come, the Texas House committee meetings to be held in the next week, and action to be taken on SB 546 (Ogg) to restore voting rights to exfelons. She reminded delegates to communicate with the Legislative Office. Water Director Catherine Perrine presented the reasons for the League's opposition to HJR 33, which would dedicate the state's surplus funds to a special water fund and a special reserve fund. She urged League members to respond promptly to a probable Action Alert when HJR 33 goes to the Senate.
- 4. Program Adoption. Program Vice President Laura Keever called for a vote on the not-recommended program items in the order that they were voted consideration. A two-thirds vote is necessary for adoption.
 - a. Mental Health FAILED by a standing vote.

b. Health Care - FAILED by a standing vote.

c. Ramifications of Legislation Which Governs a Woman's Decision to Limit Childbearing - FAILED on a standing vote. Diane Thompson called for a counted vote. The motion FAILED with 49 votes in the affirmative and 127 votes in the negative.

d. Women Under Texas Law - Motion CARRIED.

Ms. Keever then called for a vote on recommended program as printed in the workbook. Each item I. through IV. was adopted as proposed.

Ms. Keever MOVED adoption of the recommendation from the state board that "all citizens" be struck from "Access for every citizen to a free public education on page 8, II. Human Resources 1. Details of Position in Program Perspectives, and all persons be inserted to make our position conform with the national position. The motion CARRIED,

5. Budget Adoption. Budget Committee Chairperson Myrtle McMahan MOVEO that the following figures be substituted in the proposed LWV-T budget for 1981-83:

Income: A-1 \$28,070 \$60,169 Total

Sub-Total A \$32,270 Expenses: V-3 \$4,837 Sub-Total U \$6,487 Total

The motion was CARRIED.

Ms. McMahan then MOVED the adoption of the proposed LWV-T budget for 1981-83 as amended. The motion was SECONDED and CARRIED. (Copy attached.)

A corrected list of local League support for the 1981-82 budget was distributed.

- 6. Direction to the Board. League delegates/observers were given an opportunity to express to the state board things they wished the League would do. Speakers were requested to present their views in writing to the secretary. The following suggestions were made in writing.
 - a. Joyce Lockley of Dallas: Do not have delegates at a convention vote on word changes in paraphrased positions in brochures provided for public or member consumption.

- b. Pearl Wincorn of Dallas: Encourage local Leagues to update members very soon on clean air issues. Keep pressure on public officials.
- c. Martha Kissinger of Tarrant County: Do away with the Political Accountability Ratings, or, at the least, confine them to internal use.
- d. Meg Titus of Plano: Increase the budget allocation for action on air quality since the Clean Air Act is the national League's top environmental item for the coming year.
- e. Diane Sheridan of Bay Area: 1. Supply local Leagues with an index of local League studies of at least the current year. 2. In an individual memo ask Leagues to select the topics on which they would like to receive copies of League testimony.
- f. Rebecca Bergstresser of Dallas: 1. Rise above conceptual blocks about semicolons and debate issues. 2. Focus its study of Women Under Texas Law on such areas as property rights, employment, probate and estate laws, divorce; family and child support and spouse abuse.

Lucy Polter of Dallas honored President Clark with a bouquet of flowers for her past leadership and pledged our support for the next two years. She also thanked all board members for their service.

7. Directions to National Council. President Clark reported that all local Leagues had been sent a copy of the LWV-Teaneck, New Jersey's request that local Leagues concur with the LWV-Massachusetts' Consensus on Birth Control and Abortion Laws, Spring 1972. The state board did not recommend concurrence. Lynne Johnson of Houston reported that the LWV-Houston had given their support to the proposal. Following much discussion, Kay Irvin of Dallas asked that the LWV-T not be put in the position of having to take action on family planning and abortion issues without a full discussion of the issues by the membership. President Clark called for a show of hands. The majority opposed supporting the proposal. Lynne Johnson of Houston requested that it be noted that approximately one-third of the convention supported the proposal.

Ellen Stone of the Edinburg-McAllen League suggested that the LWV-US be asked to prepare a national comparison of state laws which would show the inequities of state laws and show why the Equal Rights Amendment is so vital and necessary.

Kathleen Kenefick of Brazos County asked that we insist that the LWV-US and the LWV-US Education Fund budget's glossary include the amount of reserves maintained in the operating fund because it is approximately 1.5 million dollars.

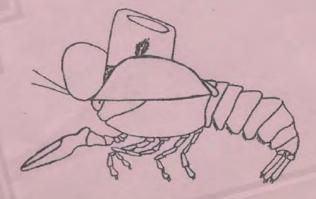

WORKBOOK Eighteenth Convention March, 1981

PREPARING FOR CONVENTION

Whether this is your first or fifteenth convention, you are in for an exhilirating though exhausting time. The better prepared you are for what is to come, the more you can give and the more you will get from your convention experience.

HOMEWORK There is a lot you can do before packing your bags for Beaumont.

- . Study thoroughly this convention workbook which contains background material and proposals for discussion and vote.
- Read up on the proposed state program and find out what your League thinks about it. Remember, delegates go to the convention informed but not instructed. All that, goes on at convention should figure into your vote. Begin early to prepare your case, line up your troops and plan your strategy. (See "How to Lobby" at the end of this section.)
- . Convention decisions on League financial matters are not made lightly. Delegates adopt the LWV-T Budget; then the state board, as trustees of LWV-TEF, adopt the LWV-TEF budget after being guided by convention recommendations. If you want more or different services, how should the income side of the budget be changed? If you want to cut the state budget, what services or activities are you willing to give up.
- . Read carefully the full list of bylaws proposals to see if you and your League want to support or oppose them.

KNOW THE PARLIAMENTARY ROPES Review "Farliamentary Procedures at a Clance" in this workbook and check with the parliamentarian for additional information. Convention business is conducted according to "Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, except in situations covered by the bylaws or convention rules. All motions are written by the maker on forms provided by ushers, and copies are shown on large screens visible to all.

CONVENTION RULES Study the proposed convention rules in this workbook. They set convention procedures not covered by the bylaws. They are adopted by majority vote at the beginning of the convention and may be amended, rescinded, or suspended at any time by a two-thirds vote. (For example, "I move to suspend the rules to allow delegates to speak for more than two minutes on this motion.")

PROGRAM PRESENTATION AND ADOPTION The proposed program will be presented Friday afternoon by a state board member who will explain it briefly and move its adoption. All debate and further action on program will be postponed until the time specified in the Order of Business. Immediately after the Proposed Program is presented, it will be in order for delegates to state their intention to present one or more of the new program issues not selected by the board because of insufficient support, or the single program item specifically not recommended by the board, by stating "I intend to move for consideration the following issue. . ." A brief statement about the issue (no longer than one minute) may be made at this time.

On Saturday morning at the appropriate time in the Order of Business, a delegate who gave "notice of intent" the previous day may then say: "I move for consideration

Preparing for Convention (cont.)

the following (give exact wording). The mover may speak in its behalf for no more than five minutes. The vote for consideration is taken immediately. There is no debate or questions for clarification. If an issue is voted consideration by a majority vote, the issue is before the convention, to be considered on the same basis as the proposed program.

DEBATE Use the microphones. During consideration of all the program before the convention, both discussion and debate are in order. In the early stages a time will be set for discussion, i.e., to give proponents an opportunity to explain the motion under consideration and the reasons it is being proposed and to respond to questions. When it appears that the convention can move along to the debate stage, microphones are usually designated as PRO and CON so that the delegates can hear each point of view presented alternately.

VOTING Most votes are voice votes. If in doubt, the chairman will call for a standing vote. If the chairman is still in doubt, tellers will count the votes. No one may enter or leave the room while a standing counted vote is being taken. Any voting delegate may request a counted vote.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS If there are no nominations from the floor on Friday following the presentation of the Report of the Nominating Committee, voting for officers, members of the board, and the nominating committee will be by voice vote on Sunday morning. If additional nominations are made, voting by ballot will take place in the convention foyer or other designated place on Saturday, March 28, from 8:00 A.M. to 5:30 P.M.

BUDGET, PMP, AND BYLAWS The proposed Order of Business provides for discussion of the proposed budget and PMP on Friday. The proposed PMP, which must be voted on first, is adopted by a 3/5 vote. The action on the budget, which requires a majority vote, will take place on Friday morning.

On Friday, the chairman of the state Bylaws Committee will present the board's recommendations on amendments to the bylaws. Amendments proposed by Leagues and sent to the state office by the deadline but not recommended by the state board may also be offered at this time. All amendments must be adopted by a 2/3 vote.

HOW TO LOBBY FOR STATE PROGRAM ISSUES If you want to get a not- recommended issue on the program, work with other Leagues that share your interest. As you plan your strategy, assess the amount of support you have and consider whether it is sufficient to justify your efforts.

If you want to schedule a caucus on Friday or Saturday, evening, ask the secretary to announce it during the scheduled time. When your caucus meets, get your erguments together, plan your strategy, and select a good spokesman to present your point of view on the convention floor.

State board members will not attend caucuses unless invited.

Admission to the convention shall be limited to persons displaying official badges which must be worn at all meetings of the convention. Voting members and visitors shall sit in areas so designated. Although they may enter the convention hall after the convention has started, they shall not be seated during an address. 3. Only delegates (Art. VIII, Sec. 2, Bylaws) may vote. Delegates must pay the total registration fee; however, such registrations are transferable within the local League provided there is one person present to cast each ballot. One-half of the host League badges will be assigned on a permanent basis, and one-half may be assigned on a rotating basis. 4. Only delegates, and those authorized by the chairman or the convention, may address the assembly. During debate on a motion, no person may speak more than once on that question until all others who wish to speak have done so. After the original presentation, debate shall be limited to two minutes for each speaker. 5. A speaker shall use a microphone and announce to name and League when written in ballformbyen addressing the assembly. 6. Main motions, or amendments of substantial length, must be in writing on forms provided for that purpose. Two copies shall be sent to the projector operators, three copies to the president, secretary, and parliamentarian on the podium and one copy retained. 7. No announcements shall be made which do not relate to the business of the convention or the welfare of the members. All announcements shall be made by the secretary, 8. There shall be no resolutions, except those of a courtesy nature, presented to or adopted by the convention. Action Motions.

Action Motions. program may be made during designated times on the agenda. These ideas will be referred to the Action Motions Committee and presented as part of its report on Sunday morning. The Action Motions Committee shall be appointed by the presiding officer at the first meeting on Friday and shall consider and report on all action proposals submitted to it by members of the convention prior to 5:00 P.M. on Saturday. If the Action motions Committee reports an favorably on any motion it shall be in order for the Committee to explain its reason for disapproving the motion.

The procedure for program adoption shall be: a) The proposed program shall be presented and moved for adoption by a state board member at the first meeting on Friday. No questions for clarification will be entertained and no debate will be allowed at this time. Further action will be postponed until the meeting set in the Order of b) A notice of intent to move for consideration of any item listed in the advance notice of program recommendations shall be given at the first

meeting on Friday afternoon. One minute is allowed for each notice of intent. No questions for clarification and no debate are allowed.

- c. Any item listed in the advance notice of program recommendations but not specifically recommended by the board, may be moved for consideration at the Saturday morning meeting provided that notice of intent shall have been given at the first meeting on Friday afternoon. Presentation of such motions for consideration shall be limited to five minutes and a vote shall be taken immediately thereafter. No questions for clarification will be entertained and there shall be no debate at this time. A majority vote will place a not-recommended item before the convention without a further motion. A delegate may request the state board to give its reasons for not recommending an item. Such a statement shall not exceed three minutes.
- d. Items voted consideration (in the order in which they were presented) and proposed program will be taken up one at a time for debate and possible amendment during the regular order of business on Saturday.
- e. Voting on all program will take place on Sunday morning. The result of each vote will be announced before the next vote is taken. Adoption of a not-recommended item requires a two-thirds vote.
- 11. When a vote is in process the doors to the convention hall shall be closed and no one may enter or leave the hall.

(Convention rules are adopted by majority vote on Friday, but may be altered at any time in the convention by a two-thirds vote. Robert's Rules of Order: Newly Revised will control general conduct of the meetings.)

LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS OF TEXAS LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS OF TEXAS EDUCATION FUND BUDGETS FOR 1981 - 1982

The following budgets represent in dollars and cents the recommended commitment of the League of Women Voters of Texas and the League of Women Voters of Texas Education Fund. YOU WILL NOTE - THE PER-MEMBER PAYMENT HAS NOT CHANGED!

The significant changes are as follows:

INCOME - Ten Leagues have increased their membership and qualify for the "Ten-Five Good Buddy" award, though overall membership has decreased by approximately eighty-one.

Increased state fundraising will be necessary to hold the PMP at \$7.50. More local League assistance in this effort must be given so that these fundraising goals will be met. There will also be a concerted effort to solicit contributions from our own members, especially those who have been inactive because of other commitments, but who continue to support the League with their dues to local Leagues.

Dues for members at large and state unit members have been raised from \$20 to \$25. The Public Subscription Service has also been raised by \$5 to \$20. These increases more accurately reflect the actual direct and indirect costs involved.

EXPENSES - The cost of board meetings has increased due to inflation and the loss of using Rather House in Austin. The board will try to economize as much as possible with three per motel room, carpooling, and by taking advantage of offered hospitality for a mini board meeting. \$1500 has been budgeted for each of three regular meetings, \$700 for the mini meeting, and \$1800 for the combined Council and board meeting. Local Leagues will be encouraged to offer such hospitality and will receive recognition for doing so.

The state board will recommend for delegate approval a reduction in the state fundraising sharing formula from 30% to 20%.

For the first time, we've included an accrual of \$2500 for the next legislative session, and \$1250 for a special legislative session if one is called. This will be funded through reserves. We pondered a paid lobbyist, minimum expense \$5000. This would necessitate an increase in the PMP of 75¢ for two years. Would you be willing to make this kind of increased commitment? This budget does not address this.

The TEF budget provides for one new program study with one Facts & Issues. Money is already available from an Executives For Good Government grant for Voters Service projects.

Although the LWV-Texas and the LWV-TEF budgets are interrelated, only the LWV-Texas budget is adopted by Convention delegates. The LWV-TEF budget will be adopted by the TEF board of trustees at its May meeting.

EXPLANATION

Four board meetings, plus one mini board meeting hosted by a local league are budgeted for. Funds for travel, food, lodging, and child care are included for 18 board members and 1 staff for the board meetings and for the Council, Spring 1982. Funds for the president include travel, visits to the state office, a league phone in her home, and incidentals. The budget and the nominating committees are allowed travel and food for one meeting, hosted by a local league. All costs of development are included here. One-third of all Board and Administrative costs are paid by TEF. Interim Committee expense includes expenses of board members and others invited for special meetings held between board meetings.

DEVELOPMENT

Our development efforts this past year have concentrated on soliciting and servicing current contributors and on developing potential contributors.

The prevailing hilosophy has been to concentrate our efforts on a relatively small number of contributors who make unrestricted contributions of \$200 - \$2000 and restricted contributions or grants.

We have relied primarily upon referrals from local Leagues and state board members. In light of the current economic situation and our needs, we must expand our base of support. The only way we can do this is to expand our pool of potential contributors and then aggressively solicit them. We need to increase the amount of contributions from those already supporting the League and, at the same time, encourage contributions from individuals and corporations in the \$50 - \$200 range. Next year we will also step up our efforts to increase tributes and memorial contributions.

The League can only benefit from broad statewide support. In order to accomplish this we have accelerated our efforts in acquiring the names of potential contributors and we will send more solicitation letters to those who have not been League supporters in the past — individuals plus corporations and foundations.

I firmly believe that we can gain support by using a well-written, direct mail approach, but time and money do restrict just how far we can go with this method. We have been very fortunate to gain the advice and services of a professional letter writer (Prof. Luther Brock of Denton) and have been pleased with the results we have had so far.

SHARING POLICY

In accordance with Art. VII, Sec. 3b of the League of Women Voters of Texas bylaws, the state board of directors is submitting the following sharing policy for approval by a majority vote of convention delegates.

The following sharing and incentive guidelines shall be followed:

- 1. Unrestricted contributions to LWV-Texas or LWV-Texas Education Fund
- [1] a. Former contributions—any local League formerly the recipient of a contribution from a state League funding source is guaranteed the amount previously received plus 20% of the additional money received by the state League. This sharing formula shall continue every year such a contribution is received.
- [2] b. New contributions—a local League will be guaranteed [30%] 20% of contributions from new sources which come from its established area. This sharing formula will continue every year such a contribution is received.
- [3] c. Finder's Fee--local Leagues will be encouraged to locate sources where a large request may be made, based on state League needs rather than on local League needs only. If a local League finds a new contributor for state League funding, that local League will receive an additional 10% of the total contribution for the first year only. Local Leagues will continue sharing in annual contributions after the first year. (see guidelines a and b above.)
- 2. [4] Restricted contributions—occasionally the state League may seek a restricted contribution for a single major project. [If the local League approves this solicitation and the solicitation is successful, 1% of the contribution (but not less than \$100) will be credited to the local League. In addition, the amount of the last regular contribution shall be paid annually until the name of the contributor is regurned to the local League solicitation list.] If the solicitation is the result of a contributor's name submitted by a local League and a grant of \$1000 cr more is received, 1% of the contribution, but not less than \$100, will be paid to the local League. In addition, if this contribution to the state League is in lieu of the regular contribution to the local League will be paid one time only. If the grant is less than \$1000, and the grant is in lieu of the regular contribution to the local League, the amount of the regular contribution to the local League, the amount of the regular contribution to the local League, the amount of the regular contribution only will be paid to the local League.

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To fund our proposed state budget for 1981-82 without a raise in the present \$7.50 PMP, the board must increase its statewide fundralsing efforts both by increasing the number of solicitations and by increasing the state share of such solicitations. We believe this method is the most advantageous for local Leagues as the decrease of 10% is relatively small.

- . an increase in state funding to enable lowering of the ratio of inmates to correctional officers

- . expand community-based juvenile correction facilities and programs to supplement traditional institutions

Additionally, the League of Women Voters supports:

. mandatory reporting to a central state agency of all juvenile contacts with law enforcement agencies and courts

DETAILS OF POSITION (cont.)

- . more comprehensive basic training and mandatory annual inservice training for all law enforcement personnel who deal with juveniles
- . training should include such things as: Texas Family Code, available community resources, crisis intervention, family counseling, ethnic differences, and adolescent psychology
- . automatic court review of a juvenile's record two years after the last official action or final discharge of the case to determine whether the record should be sealed
- . adequate state and local programs and facilities for the supervision, treatment, and protection of status offenders
- . continuing court jurisdiction over status offenders only until such time as other supervision is available
- . programs and institutions for status offenders which are separate from those for juveniles found to have engaged in delinquent conduct

The League of Women Voters of Texas supports a state juvenile agency budget flexible enough to allocate available financial resources to either community or institutional programs and facilities as the need arises

TII. HUMAN RESOURCES

Public School Finance

The League of Women Voters of Texas supports action to achieve a school finance system which provides an equitable distribution of funds and provides equity to the taxpayer. Specifically, the League supports:

- . an increase in the level of state support to Texas public schools, to ensure that all Texas school children receive a high quality education
- . joint state-local financing of public schools the foundation school approach
- . incorporation of a guaranteed tax base yield approach for part of the local enrichment, to mitigate spending disparities resulting from differences in wealth among school districts in Texas
- . some form of state assistance, such as outright allocations, loan guarantees or low-interest loans to districts facing overwhelming capital outlays for essential construction or rebuilding
- . maintaining the statewide local fund assignment at or above the 15% level as the foundation school program level increases to provide greater taxpayer equity
- an increase in equalization aid to provide greater taxpayer equity; equalization aid should be allotted in direct proportion to local tax effort to regard those poor districts willing to tax themselves more heavily
- . strengthening the foundation school program
 - --by substantial increases in teachers' salaries and in the number of classroom-contact personnel, and
 - --by modest increases (above the inflation level) in operations funding and in funding of programs for special categories of students, specifically vocational education, compensatory education, special education, and kindergarten
- . a program for the gifted and talented student jointly funded by state and local monies under the foundation school program
- . a weighted approach to distribution of state school finance money to meet individual student needs; the weighted-program approach is preferred, although the weighted-pupil and the weighted-personnel approaches are acceptable

DETAILS OF POSITIONS (cont.)

The League of Women Voters of Texas opposes

- . reduction of the statewide local fund assignment
- . a limit on local enrichment
- . the voucher system approach
- . any state requirement that local districts use state school finance monies to provide local tax relief

The League of Women Voters of Texas supports action to achieve equal rights for all, combat discrimination and poverty, and to provide equal access to housing, employment, and quality education in Texas. Specifically the League of Women Voters supports:

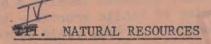
Access for every citizen to free public education which provides equal opportunity for all

Removal of the ceiling on welfare spending from the state constitution

Provision of supportive services for welfare recipients, including health care, child care, family planning, and legal aid

An effective Human Relations Commission for Texas that includes the following features:

- . permanent independent status
- . investigative and legal enforcement powers
- , an adequate budget funded independently of the governor's office
- . equitable representation of racial and ethnic groups
- . an adequately-sized staff trained in human relations work



The League of Women Voters of Texas supports action to achieve measures for the protection, conservation, and development of the state's ground water resources as an integral part of the comprehensive state water plan

The LWV-Texas supports action to achieve conservation and judicious development of land and water resources, the improvement of water and air quality, conservation of energy, and development of public transportation in a manner which assures adequate protection of the environment, improvement of the quality of life, and wise use of our natural resources

Water Planning

Support of water planning and development being the responsibility of the state government

- . all such planning to take into consideration its social, environmental, economic, and land use implications
- development of adequate water supplies to be achieved by ecologically and financially sound means and as a result of a long-range water plan for Texas, and to be accomplished through such measures as conservation, reuse, and increased research into the wise and efficient use of the state's land and water resources
- . use of present water supplies to afford protection for the land and fragile ecosystems

Program 10

DETAILS OF POSITIONS (cont.)

Ground Water Management

Support of measures for the protection, conservation, and development of the state's ground water resources as an integral part of the comprehensive state water plan. Ground water management should achieve the following objectives:

- . maintain ground water quality by preventing harmful contamination of aquifers
 - . assure the long-term productivity of the state's ground water resources and availability of ground water supplies
 - . minimize adverse effects of ground water withdrawals, including land subsidence and reduction of spring flows

Continuing water resources planning should include

- detailed information concerning the hydraulic characteristics and recharge of the state's aquifers; quantities, locations, and trends of ground water withdrawals; measures that could conserve and extend existing supplies; current and projected costs of ground water and alternative surface water supplies; potential conjunctive use of ground water and surface water
 - . management options developed specifically for each area of the state where ground water is a significant resource
 - . full public consideration of ground water management options
 - recommendations of measures to be taken by the state, by political subdivisions of the state, and by the private sector to assure wise management of the state's ground water resources
 - . coordination of state plans for ground water management with relevant policies and programs of the federal government and of other states

Adequate funds should be appropriated for planning and for management of the state's ground water resources.

Air

The League of Women Voters of Texas supports state government action for control of air pollution in Texas, including:

- . power to set and enforce standards stricter than those required by the federal government
- . adequate funding to carry out research, planning, and enforcement
- . legislation allowing local and regional government to set and enforce standards stricter than those of the state
- . encouragement of citizen involvement in the rule-making and enforcement process

Land

The League of Women Voters of Texas supports a comprehensive state land use policy which provides for the orderly development of the state, including:

- . land being used according to its carrying capacity based on a thorough inventory of our land and natural resources
- . growth and development of an area being compatible with the degree of availability of essential natural resources in that area

- the traditional rights of ownership of property being protected, but in conflicts between private interest and public welfare, the public interest being given precedence
- . preservation of agricultural lands and desirable open space, with preferential tax treatment for each
- . preferential tax treatment for maintenance of the built environment
- . establishment of a state land use management agency
- · identification and protection of areas of particular significance (historical, archaeological, aesthetic, recreational) and rare or fragile ecosystems
- . the main thrust of land use planning being carried out at the local level and equitably enforced



The League of Women Voters of Texas supports action to achieve an efficient, effective, and responsive state governmental system through constitutional revision and legislative action.

Financing State Government

The League of Women Voters of Texas supports constitutional and statutory provisions for flexibility within a coordinated finance structure; equitable taxation; and increased accountability, including:

- removal of provisions relating to dedicated funds, ad valorem tax exemptions, dollar amount of debt limitations, and other such specific wording from the constitution and making them statutory
- . reorganization of fiscal responsibilities and offices to eliminate duplication and to strengthen and clarify lines of accountability
- . budget execution to be a joint responsibility of the executive and legislative branches of state government
- . change to a program or performance budget format
- . application of appropriate fiscal management and business practices to conduct state business
- . an equitable system of taxation which assures an adequate revenue, is easily administered, and is consistent with economic and social goals
- . establishment of a state department of taxation to collect state taxes
- appraisal of taxable property at full market value; state supervision to ensure equitable and uniform appraisal and taxing procedures; and mandatory professional training for tex appraisers

Voting Rights

The League of Women Voters of Texas supports every citizen's right to vote The League of Women Voters of Texas supports improved procedures for registration of voters in Texas which include:

- . adequate safeguards against fraud (voter's personal signature on the registration application, as well as the registration care; signature identification at the polls; and accurate and current registration lists periodically revised)
- . no declaration of party affiliation when registering

The League of Women Voters of Texas supports uniformly-enforced election procedures, clearly-stated election laws, and the right to a secret ballot, including:

. revision of election laws to insure enforcement

. recodification of the election laws to eliminate obsolete matter and clarify ambiguous provisions

. supervision of all local elections (held by all governmental units) by a single county election authority responsible to a central state authority

. mandatory uniform training for all election personnel

. automatic restoration of voting rights to felons upon completion of their sentence and/or probationary period

. provision for jointly conducted primaries

Executive

The League of Women Voters of Texas supports measures to increase the effectiveness of the executive department of the state government, including:

. governor limited to two terms, which may or may not be successive

. constitutional provision for the succession to the office of governor if the governor is unable to perform the duties of the office

cabinet-type executive department, with only the governor, lieutenant governor, and attorney general elected, the governor having the power to appoint and remove non-elected officials within reasonable safeguards prescribed by law

. reorganization of state boards and commissions along functional lines by

grouping them in areas of responsibility

Legislature

The League of Women Voters of Texas supports measures to increase the efficiency and responsiveness of the legislature, including:

. annual sessions

. 1 mitation of conference committees to adjustments

. adequate compensation for legiglators

. elimination of salary amounts from the constitution

. increased authority and effectiveness for legislators

Judicial System

The League of Women Voters of Texas supports an effective judicial structure for Texas, which would include:

- . a single system of centrally administered statewide courts with a uniform fiscal policy
- . assignment of judges according to special training and docket needs
- . a full-time judiciary whose members qualify to practice law in Texas
- . integration of Justice of the Peace court functions into courts of record
- . modification of the present appellate judge system to provide for selection by a combination of commission nomination, executive appointment, and non-competitive and non-partisan elections; compulsory retirement; and effective removal procedures

State-Local Relations

The League of Women Voters of Texas supports more flexible structures and adequate powers at the local level; comprehensive regional state planning, including regional planning councils and

- . adequate and realistic powers for cities and counties, enabling performance of services without overlapping costs and taxation
- . greater accountability to and regulation by the state of single-purpose districts
- . flexible governmental structure for counties and municipalities, together with legislative and financial powers adequate to provide local services
- provision for forming special districts, but the formation of new ones to be discouraged and those existing to be made accountable to some level of government
- . state financial and technical assistance to regional councils, and encouragement of coordination between the state government and the regional councils
- . authorization in the constitution for local governments to combine their efforts to meet regional problems and to create regional authorities

Texas Constitutional Revision

The League of Women Voters of Texas supports revision of the Texas Constitution. Principles for a good constitution include:

- . a bill of rights
- . a framework of basic law
- . clear separation of powers with responsibility definitely assigned
- . qualifications for voter eligibility and guarantees of fair elections
- . provisions for justice with a minimum of delay
- . a coordinated finance structure capable of flexibility
- . maximum home rule for municipal and county government with coordination of overlapping functions
- . provisions for support of public education
- . provisions for support of public health and welfare services
- . provisions for amendment and revision
- . basic policies regarding state employee selection, retention, and promotion
- . direct constitutional initiative and referendum with signatures of 10-15% of the citizens who voted in the last gubernatorial election required to call for a constitutional amendment

Initiative and Referendum

The League of Women Voters of Texas supports action to achieve constitutional and statutory initiative and statutory referendum by petition with petition signatures representing statewide distribution equal to 10-15% of those voting in the last gubernatorial election and the following provisions:

- . legal review of a proposal before signatures are gathered
- . signatures gathered by volunteers
- . full disclosure of funding sources and amounts
- . adequate voter education, including public notices

Amplification of Position: In implementing the above position, the following should be considered:

- . The attorney general and secretary of state were most frequently mentioned to review a proposal before signatures are gathered
- . while direct initiative and referendum is preferable, indirect initiative is acceptable
- . types of public information suggested included public hearings, public service announcements, information mailed to every voter, and debates

PROGRAM REPORTS

ADMINISTRATION OF JUSTICE

Activity in this program item the last two years has included study, updating, and action. Study and research on the adult corrections system began in the fall of 1978. It was concluded in the spring and summer of 1979 with publication of a Facts & Issues paper entitled "The Criminal Justice System in Texas: Adult Corrections" and a Leader's Guide to aid local Leagues' resource committees. Consensus on adult corrections resulted in fifteen new positions being added to our now very broad justice agenda.

New information and updates on several justice topics were supplied via the Texas VOTER ("Women in the Justice System," Sept. 1979; and "Juvenile Probation Proposals," Dec. 1980) and in state office mailings and board reports.

When the 66th Legislature ended in 1979, a couple of months after the last LWV-T convention, some success had been achieved on two of our priorities for that session: state aid to victims of crime and funding for the Commission on Jail Standards. We also came very close to achieving statewide juvenile probation-close enough that failure was a bitter disappointment. During the summer and fall of 1980, LWV-T successfully supported a constitutional amendment to change the state's fourteen Courts of Civil Appeals to simply Courts of Appeals, thus making them an intermediate layer of tribunals in both civil and criminal cases.

Now in the 67th Legislature our priorities include statewide standards and funding for juvenile justice programs and facilities, removal of status offenders from judicial control, statewide enforceable jail standards with funding for the Commission on Jail Standards, development of community-based alternatives to prison, and voting rights for ex-felons. In preparation for this, an Advocacy Paper, "Texas Criminal Justice: Toward Justice for All," which further detailed these priorities, was distributed to all legislators early in the session. Additionally we are focusing considerable effort toward defeat of the Governor's bill to permit electronic surveillance. A Texas Focus, "Wiretapping in Texas: An Unjustifiable Intrusion," was published to aid members in this fight.

One project, publication of a folder which would describe for young people what would happen to them should they have contact with the justice system, has been postponed. Other activities have taken priority, but there are also at least two other such folders available in the state, and we are reconsidering the need for it.

Although our list of justice positions is now extremely long, we have hisitated to recommend removing any of the. This is mainly because several items which have benn accomplished are still in danger of being killed or not funded by the legislature.

In preparation for Convention '81 you, the members, need to consider where you wish our justice efforts to be channelled in the next biennium. You have sustained a remarkably high level of interest in AJ for six years! What are you most interested in now? Is there a topic you want more information on? What are we most likely to accomplish?

HUMAN RESOURCES

FAIR HOUSING: In mid-June, the U.S. House of Representatives passed a fair housing bill with a strong, League-supported administrative enforcement mechanism. The U.S. Senate killed the Fair Housing Amendments Act, HR 5200, by refusing to end a week-long filibuster in the final days of the 96th Congress. The Senate also failed to take action on the welfare reform bill and the Youth Act.

LEGAL SERVICES FOR THE POOR: The Legal Services Corporation, established by Congress in 1974, survived, but barely.

Public School Finance

This has been an exciting and very rewarding biennium for the League's Public School Finance (PSF) chairman. Exciting to hear from 33 of 36 local Leagues -a singularly high proportion -- which participated in consensus. Challenging to try to devise consensus questions and to provide enough background to cover the problems and alternatives in public school finance and still be readable for the above-average citizen, a typical League member, who is not steeped in the lingo of school finance. Rewarding to see the dedication and hard work of the state PSF committee matched by that of the local committees. Rewarding, also to have a committee which worked on both the study and the and the statewide PSF Conference almost simultaneously.

Lest you think that consensus questions, Facts & Issues, consensus positions, and statewide conferences arise spontaneously, I'd like to capsule the steps and timeline of the PSF committee.

First meeting of the PSF committee and interested League members in June 1979 the Houston area (attendance approx. 15).

PSF committee meeting in Austin to review existing positions,

Sept. 1979 criteria for good consensus questions, consensus process and timelines; rough out areas of consensus; and to hear Mr. Raymon Bynum, Texas Education Agency, list #1 issues (teachers' salaries) and describe legislative process of passing school finance legislation (it occurs in the waning days of the session! Speaker tells the committee what he wants, Mr. Bynum tells them how to accomplish the Speaker's goals; the full House considers but rarely makes significant changes before passage; Senate is even more controlled; changes occur in the conference committee, sometimes). His view was discouraging for those of us who think the hearings are important. But, fortunately, the truth on effectiveness of citizen input at hearings

Now, lest you, too, feel exhausted after reading this schedule, remember it took place over an 18-month period and it took a dedicated, hard-working committee to make it happen. My thanks to that committee: Jan Albers and Diana Tilley, Austin; Theta Cessac, Pearland; Bees Barolak, Baytown; Bland Burckhardt, El Paso; Phyllis Frederiksen, Kathleen Kenefick, Blanche Brick, Liz Naugle, and Judy Warren, Brazos Co.; Rita Sallans, Mary Remenchik, Jeanette Vanderwater, Houston; Marcy Bateman, Lubbock; Diane Sheridan, Bay Area; and Kay Irvin, Dallas. Thanks as well to the state board and in particular to Diana Clark, Laura Keever, Toni Clem, and Nancy Bene.

The drawback to approving consensus in January and immediately following that by a statewide conference is that it puts us about six months behind by the end of February in getting ready for the legislative session!

For the coming year, we would see the work of this committee to build further the alliances with the professional groups, school board members, and the Texas Education Agency -- alliances helped considerably by the interaction at the PSF Conference. If school finance decisions continue to be made during the budget-making

Public School Finance (cont.)

process, those connections will be essential to the League as we stretch our resources to stay on top of hearings and formulating our input for them.

Prop erty tax reform, too, needs to be kept on the front burner. Gains made so far are <u>not</u> "in the bag." Property tax revolts have had mixed results so far, but certainly public school property taxes are under attack. The property tax burden is becoming increasingly onerous to the public. If we need another source of revenue for public schools, would a sales tax meet our criteria for an equitable system of taxation? It might be time to look at another form of taxation to provide more state funding for the public school system. (Yes, we do mean a state income tax.)

ENERGY

The first three-fourths of the biennium were filled with responding to LWUS calls for action; providing commentary, information, and advice on energy matters for a variety of destinations; and participating in the Nuclear Energy Education Program (NEEP). The last few months have been occupied with monitoring the legislative session and responding appropriately.

The LWV-Texas was active in relation to numerous national bills affecting energy. We opposed the windfall profits tax and the energy mobilization board, but we supported various allocations of the tax after it was passed. We also provided a detailed commentary on the Building Energy Performance Standards and opposed the delay in implementing them. Two Focus Papers, one on energy conservation and one on renewable energy, were produced for members' information and use.

Isabel Miller and a Denton League director (Betty Mitchell) attended the Nuclear Energy Education Program training conference near Washington and submitted a proposal for a statewide grass-roots education program (which did not, alas, get funded). The nuclear documentary directed by LWV-Lubbock is nearing completion.

Through participation in the Solar Advisory Committee of the Texas Energy and Natural Resources Advisory Council, Isabel helped formulate a comprehensive set of recommendations for state action to facilitate the use of solar and wind energy. This was adopted by the council (TENRAC) and has been translated into proposed legislation. It includes recommendations for a considerably expanded solar section in TENRAC, whose information gathering and dissemination would be increased, using expanded regional Energy Extension Service Centers.

Isabel is also a member of the executive board of the Texas Solar Energy Society, which works with consumers directly to promote the use of renewable energy and also often produces the TENRAC solar education programs.

Laura Keever has seen the adoption of the report of the Nuclear Advisory Committee of TENRAC (which she chaired) and its translation into proposed legislation.

We have worked with the Texas Environmental Coalition, the Sierra Club, and the American Institute of Architects in furthering use of renewable energy and in seeking environmentally safe production of energy.

A great deal of legislation dealing with energy has already been filed. As rapidly as copies of bills become available, they are measured againse LWV positions and tagged. Digests of these analyses come to you in the "Legislative Newsletter" with "support," "oppose," or "no position," and written or verbal commentary is given at the committee hearings in Austin when possible. To date we have seen bills dealing principally with gasohol, solar issues, vanpooling, state building retrofit, and thermal and lighting standards.

WATER AND WASTES

With stories of polluted groundwater, leaking drums, and exploding chemicals reported weekly, 1980 was the year when just about everyone became aware of hazardous waste problems that have been decades in the making. EPA's first major regulations for implementing the 1976 Resource Conservation and Recovery Act were published in May, setting off a flurry of state activity to qualify for delegation of authority to implement these regulations.

With a pass-through grant from the Waste Alert! program, the LWV-Texas Education Fund sponsored a tour that visited the infamous Texas City Wye abandoned waste site, a nearby commercial disposal operation using deepwell injection, and the Gulf Goast Waste Authority's new hazardous waste landfill site. A workshop on siting problems followed the tour. Bobette Higgins was project manager.

The need for more effective public information and public participation programs was the major thrust of LWV-T comments on the State/EPA Agreement (which describes cooperative--chiefly federally funded--programs in water quality management and waste management) and the State Industrial Waste Management Plan. LWV-T comments on EPA's proposed Ground Water Protection Strategy stressed the need to protect all potentially usable Texas ground water (as opposed to the EPA proposal for a classification system allowing some pollution of some aquifers).

Much of my time has been spent in the murky pages of the Texas Department of Water Resources reports on freshwater needs of the bays and estuaries. LWV-T Education Fund has received a pass-through grant for a fact-sheet on this topic from the Office of Coastal Zone Management. I fervently hope that it will be in the publications room at convention. A brief preview: the future for baby shrimp does not look bright.

The Texas Coastal Plan is now undergoing its umpteenth reworking.

Despite the fact that the fall hearings on the draft Coastal Plan were dominated by oil company testimony that the plan should be scrapped, Governor Clements asked for and got another six-month extension to revise the plan. But he has made no commitments as to submission of the revised version.

The Houston and Bay Area Leagues submitted comments on the draft Coastal Plan that stressed the need for such a plan and the shortcomings of the proposed plan. Both of these Leagues have also been active in hazardous waste issues. Houston League members have been the "movers and shakers" in Toxic Task Force activities in southeast Texas. LWV-Houston has also published a report on Texas water districts that sheds a great deal of light and the on this obscure subject. The Odessa League has petitioned EPA for designation of ground water supply areas used by their city as a "sole source" aquifer. San Antonio LWV continues to stress protection of Edwards Aquifer recharge areas. LWV-Marshall has made progress in persuading their city that Caddo Lake is better suited for cypress trees and Spanish moss than for water supply. Orange has had a program on water quality problems in their municipal supply; Sherman continues study of water supply sources; and Plano held a meeting and submitted comments to the Corps of Engineers on Cooper Reservoir, a possible water supply source for their city. Tyler toured its water and waste treatment plants. Please keep me posted on what your League is doing!

AIR QUALITY

The focus of clean air issues has been this past year (and will continue to be during 1981) on the national level. Reauthorization of the Clean Air Act and its 1977 amendments will be of primary importance in this current session of Congress and as a result the LWUS board has selected air quality as one of its three top priority issues this session. I have the privilege (and tough job) of heading the LWUS efforts on this CAAA reauthorization debate now starting on the Hill as a current member of the LWUS Environmental Quality Committee.

One of the strategies which we have developed through our affiliation with the National Clean Air Coalition will be to coordinate public education and lobbying efforts through the selection of a coordinator and an assistant for each state. These coordinators will direct the efforts in persuading both the public and our congressional delegation on the logic and necessity of not only preserving but further strengthening the Clean Air Act to protect the public health and welfare.

Pearl Wincorn (Dallas) and Louise Chandler (Richardson) have agreed to work with LWVUS and the NCAC during the reauthorization and debate on clean air legislation and will be attempting to find a contact person with some access to local media and local leadership in at least a dozen of our major Texas urban areas. These key contacts (many of whom we hope will be League activists) will remain in close touch with our national efforts through Pearl and Louise and will be requested to help with specific action approaches when necessary as well as with distribution of information to the media.

I know you have been reading and hearing about the business and industry efforts to weaken the Clean Air Act in the interest of reducing pollution control costs. Such efforts will concentrate especially on the sections dealing with Prevention of Significant Deterioration (PSD), Inspection and Maintenance of Automabiles (I/M), as well as reconsidering the National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS). The League believes that it and other concerned organizations will be required to make major efforts to inform the public of the health as well as the long term economic advantages of keeping our air clean. We also believe that recent polls show that the public wants clean air and is willing to pay for it.

On the state level this past year we have responded at various public hearings on proposed revisions to our State Implementation Plan (SIP) and on proposed changes to TACB rules and regulations. Other activities relating to clean air have been the formation of Inspection and Maintenance of Automobile Public Education projects funded through EPA grants in Houston, El Paso, and the Dallas/Ft. Worth areas. Although not exclusively League efforts, Leaguers have had leadership roles in these attempts to inform the public of the advantages of I/M as a potential for reducing smog and haze, for increasing fuel efficiency as well as for protecting the public health and welfare. In addition the Texas Environmental Coalition of which LWV-T and several local Leagues are members, will continue to monitor such statewide air problems as the potential for acid rain resulting from increased use of lignite, and the impact of airborne toxics on the industrial Gulf Coast.

Program Reports 7

GOVERNMENT

Much attention has been focused this session on reapportionment and redistricting. Next year, we will quite probably have a special session to finish this task.

Initiative & Referendum As voted by the last convention, a study was completed, with 32 Texas Leagues participating, and consensus reached. We are working with the 67th Legislature to see that the safeguards inherent in our position are attained to assure responsible and responsive initiative and referendum.

Voting Rights Recodification of the election laws, long a goal of the League, has been completed and will be presented to the legislature this session. We will be working with the sponsors and with committees as this vast body of law is reviewed and, hopefully, decided upon by our legislators.

Many bills are being considered to improve voter registration and voting itself, making this process more accessible and more convenient to citizens. As we consider these bills, paramount among our objectives is the protection of everyone's voting rights.

Executive, Legislature, and State-Local Relations are not generating much activity in the legislative session, and though they are not priority items of ours, we continue to monitor carefully these departments and areas, so that we may act according to necessity.

Texas Constitutional Revision remains a stand-by position and we will continue to watch for opportunities to correct deficiencies in our constitutional structure by statuory means.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

Dr. Alan Scott, Professor of Public Relations at UT-Austin, told me once that "PR is like two elephants making love. There's a lot of dust raised and a lot of bellowing, but you don't see any results for two years." The definition is apt for League PR.

The term itself is an umbrella covering literally everything — from press relations to community relations to internal relations. From press releases to publications like Abilene't F&I on the Charter Amendment Election, the state's Focus papers, Advocacy Papers, 50,000 "When You Go To Austin" brochures, Denton's new fund-raising brochure, and the more than 100,000 Voters Guides that were distributed throughout Texas prior to the 1980 elections.

It covers working with the legislature and working with the executive branch. It covers how we work with each other to how we work with other groups.

If we hold a candidates' rally and the house is packed, that's good PR. If one of our members is appointed to a state or local board or commission, that's good PR. If someone gives a good workshop at convention or council, that's good PR. If our press release gets good play in the press, that's good PR.

"Good PR" is a tacit expression tossed about certainly more frequently than "bad PR," possibly because bad PR is generally a sin of omission rather than a sin of commission. It helps me help you if I know what you need (or want). A few of you do let me know and that's how we came up with those two unlettered logo slides you received in the mail in October. (Have you used them? They have a myriad of TV spot possibilities!) That logo is tied in with the campaign to expand the League of Women Voters of Texas image. And building that image helps us all. Remember, the "Speak Up Texas, Register and Vote" campaign was designed not just for this past election year, but as an ongoing Voter Service/ Image campaign. Those materials were intentionally NOT dated. The Barbara Jordan 60-second video spot was intentionally NOT tied to the primary election. And, as a result, many TV stations re-used it in the fall.

We've "come a long way, baby" . . . from zip to radio spots to TV slides to video spots. And we've only just begun testing the possibilities with electronic media. The impact the League of Women Voters has on the present and future of this country is immeasurable, so it is hard to gauge the impact of our PR.

But when voter turnout is high, when voters are informed, when League impact on a bill in the legislature is noted, when our financial development is steady, when candidates are happy to appear at our rallies, and when we are enjoying the work we do. . . then PR is tangent to League objectives. Watch this space. . . .

ORGANIZATION AND, FIELD SERVICE

Presidents' and Program Management Workshops were held during June of 1980 in Midland, Dallas, Houston, and Austin. Seventeen of thirty-eight Leagues were represented. Five Management Workshops were held during September and October in Lubbock, Austin, San Marcos, Baytown, and Denton. Twenty-one Leagues were represented.

The field service network continues to be of vital importance. All six field service representatives attended at least one of the Management Workshops.

The Lamar County League disbanded late in 1980, and as of February 1, 1981, the Brownsville League appears moribund. There is happy news as well. If plans continue to go forward, a new Arlington League will come into existence on June 1, 1981. And the Montgomery County Provisional hopes to seek full League status in the fall of 1981.

Membership recruitment and retention, and finding future leadership remain the major problems confronting every League in Texas.

STATE UNITS AND MEMBERS-AT-LARGE

The difficulty of beginning and sustaining a new local League or state unit is compounded by the same difficulties all volunteer organizations are having. But when there are volunteers interested in observing government operations and supplying voters information the chances of a state unit sustaining growth are good (assuming the leadership is the usual high standard). Problems arise very quickly if the beginning enthusiasm is due to interest in a single issue and care is not taken to build the organization. It is the 'circle' of: Enthusiasm — Organization — Enables Success — Enthusiasm. The organization or management is healthy or the "hard times" (and there is always yin and yang) can be very destrictive, especially in the beginning.

As of January 1981, the LWV-T had four state units. The Round Rock State Unit disbanded in December, 1980, with the 13 members there becoming members-at-large (unorganized). At the end of January 1981 there were:

In addition to the members-at-large organized into state units, there are 40 members-at-large living in 22 cities over the state. Each MAL pays \$20 dues to LWV-T out of which the national PMP is paid. The state board services them with monthly mailings of information and announcements, plus the state and national VOTERs. Too much for some, and not enough for others would describe the reaction of members.

It is anticipated that state units with sustained growth will be planning to take the steps to become Provisional Leagues as did Montgomery County. We see that as the natural order of things.

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

THAT WE, Mrs. Harris Masterson and Ruth Hastings, residents and citizens of Harris County, Texas, and Mrs. Carl L. Voss, a resident and citizen of Dallas County, Texas, under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Texas, do hereby voluntarily associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a private corporation, under the terms and conditions set out as follows:

- I. The name of this corporation shall be the League of Women Voters of Texas.
- II. The purpose for which this corporation is formed is in support of an educational undertaking and specifically to promote policical responsibility through informed and active participation of citizens in government; to render such other services in the interest of education in citizenship as may be possible, and to do every act appropriate or necessary to carry out any of the foregoing objects. The corporation shall not support or oppose any political party or candidate.

Mrs. Harris Masterson Ruth Hastings Mrs. Carl L. Voss ARTICLE I. Name

Sec. 1. The name of this corporation shall be the League of Women Voters of Texas. This state League is an integral part of the League of Women Voters of The United States.

ARTICLE II. Purpose and Policy

Sec. 1. Purpose. The purpose of the League of Women Voters of Texas is to promote political responsibility through informed and active participation of citizens in government and to act on selected governmental issues.

Sec. 2. Political Policy. The League shall not support or oppose any political party or any candidate.

ARTICLE III. Membership

Sec. 1. Eligibility. Any person who subscribes to the purpose and policy of the League shall be eligible for membership.

Sec. 2. <u>How Composed</u>. The League of Women Voters of Texas shall be composed of members of the League of Women Voters of the United States who are a) enrolled in recognized local Leagues within the state; or b) enrolled as members-at-large in the League of Women Voters of Texas.

Sec. 3. Types of Membership.

- a. Voting members shall be those citizens of at least 18 years of age who are enrolled in recognized local Leagues or the state League.
 - b. Associate members shall be all other members who are enrolled in recognized local Leagues or the state League.
- c. Members-at-large shall be members who reside outside the area of, and are not enrolled in, any local League. Such members shall pay annual dues to the League of Women Voters of Texas.
- d. Life membership may be granted to any voting member of the League of Women Voters who attains 50 years as a member of the LWVUS. No further dues will be collected and all privileges will be retained as a voting member

ARTICLE IV. Officers

Sec. 1. Enumeration and Election of Officers. The officers of the League of Women Voters of Texas shall be a president, three vice-presidents, a secretary, and a treasurer.

Sec. 2. The President. The duties of the president shall be: to preside, or to designate someone else to preside, at all meetings of the corporation and the Board of Directors; to sign or endorse checks, drafts, and notes in the absence or disability of the treasurer; to be, ex officio, a member of all committees except the nominating committee; to have such usual powers of supervision and management as may pertain to the office; and to perform such other duties as may be designated by the board.

Sec. 3. The Vice-Presidents. At its first board meeting the new board of directors shall designate one vice-president who, in the event of the absence, disability, resignation, or death of the president, shall possess all the powers and perform all the duties of that office. Should the vice-president so designated be unable to serve in that capacity, the board of directors shall choose one of its other elected members to fill the vacancy. The duties of the vice-presidents shall be those designated by the president and the board.

Sec. 4. The Secretary. The duties of the secretary shall be: to keep minutes of all conventions and councils of the League and of all meetings of the board of directors; to notify all officers and directors of their election; to sign, with the president, all contracts and other instruments when so authorized by the board; and to perform such other functions as may be incident to the office. Sec. 5. The Treasurer. The duties of the treasurer, or the duly-appointed assistant, shall be: to collect and receive all moneys; to be custodian of these moneys and deposit them in a bank or banks designated by the board of directors; to disburse them only upon order of the board; and to present periodic statements to the board at its regular meetings and an annual report to convention or council. The treasurer shall be bonded, and the books of the corporation shall be audited annually.

ARTICLE V. Board of Directors

Sec. 1. Number, Manner of Selection, and Term of Office. The board of directors shall consist of the officer of the League of Women Voters of Texas, seven elected directors, and not more than seven appointed directors. The officers and the elected directors shall be elected by the convention and shall serve for two years beginning June 1 of the year of their election. The elected members shall appoint such additional directors, not exceeding seven, as they deem necessary to carry on the work of the League. The term of office of the appointed directors shall expire concurrently with the term of office of the elected directors.

Sec. 2. Qualifications. No person shall be elected or appointed or shall continue to serve as an officer or director of this corporation unless that person is a voting member enrolled in a local League in the state of Texas, or is a citizen of voting age enrolled as a member-at-large of this state League.

Sec. 3. <u>Vacancies</u>. Any vacancy other than in the office of the president may be filled, until the next convention, by a majority vote of the remaining members

of the board of directors.

Sec. 4. Powers and Duties. The board of directors shall have full charge of the property and business of the corporation with full power and authority to manage and conduct the same, subject to the instructions of the convention. The board shall plan and direct the work necessary to carry out the program on state governemtal matters as adopted by the convention. It shall accept responsibility delegated to it by the board of directors of the League of Women Voters of the United States for the organization and development of local Leagues, for the carrying out of program, and for promotion in the local Leagues of finance programs requisite to further the work of the Leauge as a whole. The board shall create and designate such special committees as it may deem necessary.

Sec. 5. Regular Meetings. There shall be at least three regular meetings of the board of directors annually. The president shall notify each member of the board of directors of all such regular meetings by mailing to each member's last-known post office address, at least two weeks before any such meeting, notice thereof, giving the time and place of the meeting. No action taken at any regular board meeting attended by three-fourths of the members of the board shall be invalidated because of the failure of any member or members of the board to receive any notice properly sent or because of any irregularity in any notice actually received. Sec. 6. Special Meetings. The president may call special meetings of the board of directors, and shall call a special meeting upon written request of five members of the board. Members of the board shall be notified of the time and place of special meetings by telegrams or letters, sent at least six days prior to such meeting, provided, however, that during a convention the president may, or upon the request of five members of the board shall, call a special meeting of the board by handing the members of the board a written notice of the time and place of said meeting.

Sec. 7. Quorum. A majority of the members of the board of directors shall constitute a quorum, and a majority of the members in attendance at any board meeting in the number of a quorum shall decide its action.

ARTICLE VI. Recognition of Local and Provisional Leagues; and State Units. Sec. 1. Local Leagues.

(a) Local Leagues are those Leagues which have been recognized by the League of Women Voters of the United States.

(b) The board of directors shall recommend to the national board that the national board recognize as a local League any group of members of the League of Women Voters of the United States in any community within the state, provided the group meets recognition standards for local Leagues as adopted by the national convention.

(c) In the event of recurring failure of a local League to meet recognition standards, the board of directors shall recommend to the national board that the national board withdraw recognition from the local League. All funds held by a local League from which recognition has been withdrawn shall

be paid to the League of Women Voters of Texas.

Bylaws (cont.)

Sec. 2. Provisional Leagues.

(a) Provisional Leagues are those Leagues which have been so recognized by the League of Women Voters of Texas.

(b) The board of directors has responsibility for the establishment of new local Leagues. For this purpose the board may organize a group of people in a community in which no League exists and shall recognize the group as a provisional League when it meets the recognition standards for provisional Leagues adopted by the national convention.

(c) The board of directors shall withdraw recognition from a provisional League for recurring failure to meet the standards for recognizing a provisional League or for failure to progress toward recognitionass a local League. All funds held by a provisional League from which recognition has been withdrewn shall be paid to the League of Women Voters of Texas.

Sec. 3. State Units.

(a) A state unit is a group, composed of members-at-large, who wish to share League activities in the community under the direction of the state board.

(b) The board of directors of the League of Women Voters of Texas has the responsibility for the establishment of state units. State units may be organized in communities in which no local League exists and where it is not possible at the time to carry on the full program of local League activities.

ARTICLE VII. Firancial Administration.

Sec. 1. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the League of Women Voters of Texas shall commence on the first of June of each year.

Sec. 2. Local and Provisional League Financial Support (Effective June, 1978)

(a) Financial responsibility for the work of the League of Women Voters of

Texas shall be assumed annually by the local Leagues.

(b) Each local League shall support the state League by an annual per member payment, based on membership as of January 1st. The amount of such payment for each year of the biennium shall be determined by a three-fifths vote of those present and voting at convention.

(c) Annual minimum state support payment shall be established for local Leagues, as determined by a three-fifths vote of those present and

voting at convention.

(d) Annual support payments from provisional Leagues shall be determined by the board of directors.

Sec. 3. Statewide Fundraising.

(a) Responsibility for additional support for the League of Women Voters of Texas shall be assumed by the board of directors, through a development committee which shall develop and solicit other sources for funding the state League.

(b) Solicitation and funds raised as a result of solicitation of outside sources in local League areas shall be shared with the respective League under a policy approved by a majority vote at convention.

Sec. 4. The Budget and Budget Committee.

- (a) The board shall submit to the convention or council for adoption a budget for the ensuing fiscal year. This budget shall provide for the support of the state League. A copy of the proposed budget shall be ent to each local League president at least six weeks in advance of convention or council.
- (b) The budget shall be prepared by a committee which shall be appointed for that purpose at least four months in advance of the convention or council. The treasurer shall be ex-officio a member of the budget committee, but shall not be eligible to serve as chairperson.

Bylaws (cont.)

Sec. 5. Distribution of Funds on Dissolution. In the event of a dissolution for any cause of the League of Women Voters of Texas, all monies and securities which may at the time be owned by or under the absolute control of the League of Women Voters of Texas shall be paid to the League of Women Voters of the United States after the board of directors has paid or made provision for the payment of all the liabilities of the League of Women Voters of Texas.

ARTICLE VIII. Convention.

- Sec. 1. Place, Date, Call, and Notification. A convention of the League of Women Voters of Texas shall be held during the odd-numbered years. The time and place of the convention shall be determined by the board of directors. The president shall send a first call for the convention to the presidents of local Leagues not less than four months prior to the opening date of the convention fixed in said call. Thereafter, the board of directors may advance or postpone the opening date of the convention not more than two weeks from the date fixed in the first call. A final call for the convention shall be sent by the president to the presidents of local Leagues at least two months before convention.
- Sec. 2. Composition. The convention shall consist of the delegates chosen by members of the local Leagues, as provided in Sec. 4 of this article; the presidents of the local Leagues or an alternate, in the event the president is unable to attend; and the members of the board of directors of the League of Women Voters of Texas. Sec. 3. Qualifications of Delegates and Voting. Voting members at the convention shall be the delegates, local League presidents, and state board members, all of whom must be members of the League of Women Voters of Texas. Even though attending in more than one capacity, each shall be entitled to only one vote at the convention. Absentee or proxy voting shall not be permitted. The convention shall be the sole judge of whether a delegate is qualified to vote. Sec. 4. Representation. The members of the League of Women Voters of the United States who are organized into recognized local Leagues in the state of Texas shall be entitled to voting representation in the convention as follows: the president of the local League or an alternate, in the event the president is unable to attend; one delegate for the first 15 voting members and one delegate for every 10 additional voting members or major fraction thereof belonging to said local League on January 1st of said year. The record in the state office of paid voting members shall determine the official membership count for this purpose.
- Sec. 5. Authorization for Action. The convention shall consider and authorize for action a program, shall elect officers, directors and the chairperson and two members of the nominating committee, shall adopt a budget for the ensuing year, and shall transact such other business as may be presented.

 Sec. 6. Quorum. A quorum shall consist of a majority of the delegates registred
- at the convention provided that not less than a majority of local Leagues are represented.

ARTICLE IX. Council.

- Sec. 1. Place, Date, Cail, and Notification. A meeting of the council shall be held in the interim year between conventions, approximately twelve months after the preceding convention. The time and place of the meeting shall be determined by the board of directors. A formal call shall be sent by the president to the presidents of the local Leagues at least thirty days before a council meeting. Special meetings may be called in case of extreme emergency.
- Sec. 2. Composition. The council shall be composed of two delegates chosen by the board of cach local League, and the board of directors of the League of Women Voters of Texas.
- Sec. 3. Authorization for Action. The council shall consider program, methods of work, and budget as submitted by the board of directors. The council is authorized to make such modifications in program as shall be necessary to meet altered conditions,

Bylaws (cont.)

provided that notice of proposed modifications of the program shall have been sent to the presidents of the local Leagues at least two months in advance of the meeting of the council, and provided also that a two-thirds vote of the members of the council present and voting shall be required to adopt the modification. The council shall adopt a budget for the ensuing year, and shall transact such other business as shall be presented.

Sec. 4. Quorum. A quorum shall consist of not fewer than ten members other than the board of directors for the transaction of business at a council meeting.

ARTICLE X. Nominations and Elections.

Sec. 1. Nominating Committee. The nominating committee shall consist of five members, two of whom shall be members of the board of directors. The chairperson and two members, who shall not be members of the board of directors, shall be elected by the convention. Nominations for these offices shall be made from the floor. The other members of the committee shall be appointed by the board of directors immediately upon their taking office. Vacancies occurring in the nominating committee by reason of death, resignation, or disqualification shall be filled by the board of directors. The president of the League of Women Voters of Texas shall send the name and address of the chairperson of the nominating committee to the president of each recognized local League. It shall be the duty of the chairperson of the nominating committee to request through the president of each local League suggestions for nominations for the offices to be filled. Sec. 2. Suggestions by Local Leagues. The president of each local League shall request suggestions for nominations for offices to be filled. Any member may send suggestions to the chairperson of the nominating committee. Sec. 3. Report of Nominating Committee and Nominations from the Floor. The report of the nominating committee of its nominations for officers, directors, and the chairperson and two members of the succeeding nominating committee, shall be sent to local Leagues not less than one month before the date of the convention. The report of the nominating committee shall be presented to the convention on the first day of the convention. Immediately following the presentation of this report, nominations may be made from the floor by any member of the convention provided that the consent of the nominee shall have been secured. Sec. 4. Election. The election shall be in the charge of an election committee appointed by the president on the first day of convention. The election shall be by ballot. A majority vote shall constitute an election.

ARTICLE XI. Program.

Sec. 1. Principles. The governmental principles adopted by the national convention, and supported by the League as a whole, constitute the authorization for adoption of program.

Sec. 2. Program. The program of the League of Women Voters of Texas shall consist of: a) action to protect the right to vote of every citizen; and b) those governmental issues chosen for concerted study and action.

Sec. 3. Program Selection. The convention shall select the governmental issues for concerted study and action using the following procedures:

a) Local League boards may make recommendations to the board of directors at least three months prior to the convention.

b) The board of directors shall consider the recommendations and formulate a proposed program which shall be submitted to local League boards at least six weeks before convention.

c) A majority vote shall be required for adoption.

- d) Any recommendations for the program submitted at least three months prior to the convention, but not recommended by the board, may be adopted by the convention provided consideration is ordered by a majority vote and the vote on adoption comes on a following day. Adoption of a not-recommended item requires a two-thirds vote.
- Sec. 4. Member Action. Members may act in the name of the League of Women Voters of Texas only when authorized to do so by the board of directors of the League of Women Voters of Texas. Local Leagues may act only inconformity with, and not contrary to, a position taken by the League of Women Voters of Texas and/or the League of Women Voters of the United States.

ARTICLE XII. National Convention and Council.

- Sec. 1. <u>National Convention</u>. The board of directors, at a meeting before the date on which names of delegates must be sent to the national office, shall elect delegates to the convention in the number alloted the League of Women Voters of Texas under the provision of the bylaws of the League of Women Voters of the United States.
- Sec. 2. National Council. The board of directors shall elect delegates to the meeting of the council of the League of Women Voters of the United States at its meeting immediately preceding such council meeting in the number allowed the League of Women Voters of Texas under the provisions of the bylaws of the League of Women Voters of the United States.

ARTICLE XIII. Parliamentary Authority.

Sec. 1. Parliamentary Authority. The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the corporation in all cases in which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with these bylaws.

ARTICLE XIV. Amendments.

- Sec. 1. Amendments. These bylaws may be amended at any convention by a two-thirds vote using the following procedures:
 - a) Proposals for change shall be submitted by local boards to the board of directors at least three months prior to convention.
 - b) All such proposed amendments, together with the recommendations of the board shall be sent by the board to the presidents of local Leagues at least one month prior to convention.
 - c) The presidents of the local Leagues shall notify the members of their respective Leagues of the proposed amendments. The failure of a local League president to give such notice or failure of any member to receive such notice shall not invalidate the amendments to the bylaws.

LUPE ANGUIANO IS KEYNOTE SPEAKER

Keynote speaker for the 18th State Convention of the League of Women Voters of Texas will be Lupe Anguiano, President of the National Women's Employment and Education, Inc. Anguiano gained national prominence, including a November 30th appearance on "60 Minutes", for her significant achievements in recruiting, training, and locating jobs for women on welfare. She founded NWEE in 1978 as a vehicle to assist those women who are heads-of-households to be self-supporting rather than continuing on the welfare rolls.

Anguiano, who has a master of arts degree in administration and education, is a veteran of more than 15 years experience in employment, education, and government work. Born to a family of migrant farm workers, she first became a nun, then joined Cesar Chavez's campaign to organize farm workers in the early 1960's. She later worked in Washington for the

Department of Health, Education and Welfare. In 1978, the Department of Labor, Women's Bureau, awarded Anguiano a \$150,000 contract for organization of the NWEE low income women's employment program as a national model. Nwee proved successful. In one year, 205 out of 224 participants were placed in jobs or job training programs which led to stable employment.

NWEE now accepts about 70 participants per month for its low income women's employment program. These women include abandoned, widowed and divorced women, and displaced homemakers as well as teenagers who often are pregnant and unmarried.

"IN THE PUBLIC EYE"

The ability to respond effectively in both planned and impromptu public and one-on-one situations involves more than an impressive vocabulary, a collection of jokes and even a course in public speaking. It requires a talent called "thinking on your feet". Two professional communicators in Austin have developed a series of workshops examining that skill. Freeing Women From Welfare

IGNACIO GARCIA

Last summer Jodi Almendariz, 28, was well on her way to lifetime failure. A high school dropout, she had been married four times, never held a decent job, and seemed destined to permanent dependence on welfare. But today, against all odds, Almendariz is happily independent, earning a hefty wage as a heavy-equipment operator for a Texas construction company. The force behind her success: a remarkable group in San Antonio called National Women's Employment and Education, Incorporated, which is literally working wonders in taking female heads of households off welfare.

In its two years of existence, NWEE has placed more than 400 such women in highly skilled jobs, and it has done so at a fraction of the cost of most federal programs with the same goals. Better yet, almost all the NWEE graduates are still working and staying firmly off welfare. No other program comes close to matching this record.

Why? The explanation lies in the neatly dressed, soft-spoken person of Lupe Anguiano, a Mexican-American activist who invented NWEE. "The effect of welfare is to keep women under the poverty level," she says. "It should be to get them off welfare and make them productive citizens." Anguiano's vehemence-and to a certain extent her effectiveness as wellderives from her personal knowledge of what it is to be poor and desperate. Born 51 years ago to a family of migrant farm workers, she grew up watching her parents toil for low pay in

unsanitary conditions. Yet she always preferred hard work to handouts. Even as a child, she says, "I do not remember ever not working."

After graduating from a junior college in Ventura, California, Anguiano became a Roman Catholic nun with a penchant for helping the poor by action rather than prayer. In the late 1950s she participated in numerous movements to assist Chicanos in East Los Angeles, which in turn led to her involvement in a series of legal suits challenging the standard tests used by California schools. Finally, her mother superior took Anguiano aside and asked her to consider whether she had really picked the right vocation. Anguiano decided that she would be more effective as a civic activist on the outside.

In the early 1960s she joined Cesar Chavez's campaign to organize a farm workers' union. After that, she worked in Washington for the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare and there discovered why welfare tends not to help women. "When a woman is divorced or separated," explains Anguiano, "society feels that the children are better off with the mother. So the responsibility for raising the children is that of the mother. The catch is that she then has little or no chance to support the children. For a poor woman the only alternative is welfare, and welfare means always living under the poverty level."

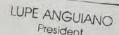
Though Anguiano contributed to HEW's Women's Action Program, she became restive and left the federal bureaucracy in 1973. Her next post took her to San Antonio as director of the Southwest Office for the Spanish Speaking, a branch of the National Council of Catholic Bishops. She soon focused on the problems of thousands of abandoned or widowed women on welfare, many of them Mexican-Americans. To get a better understanding of their plight, she moved into a federally subsidized housing unit and lived with them. She saw just how hard it was to bring up children on \$35-a-week welfare checks and experienced the pinch of hunger when the food money ran out. Appalled, the exbureaucrat soon was organizing the women into talk groups. Almost all of them said they did not want to be on welfare. But,

LUPE ANGUIANO'S ANSWER TO THE WELFARE SYNDROME

"I can't wait to tell the welfare what to do with their check!" an elated 33-year-old Rosemary de Leon shouted the day she got her first really good-paying job: operating a big backhoe tractor in the macho construction industry under the hot Texas sun.

It was a first for the engineering company, and a first for her. This divorced mother of five with a sixth-grade education was finally able to support her family on a living wage.

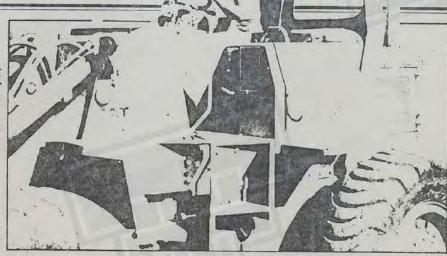
"I was getting a hundred and thirty-five dollars a month from welfare to take care of five kids. How could anybody live on that?"

Now she sometimes makes as much as \$189 a week and has received a high school equivalency diploma. "I feel good about myself," she says. "I feel as though I've really done something. I've got a lot more self-confidence."

How did Rosemary de Leon get off welfare?

She had the good fortune to find Lupe Anguiano and her group, National Women's Employment and Education, Inc. (NWEE) in San Antonio, Texas.

Anguiano has come up with one alternative answer to the self-perpetuating welfare syndrome. NWEE, a nonprofit organization, is doing the unheard of: getting women who are family heads off welfare into jobs, and keeping them there.

Why is she succeeding where so many others failed? Part of the secret seems to be that members of Lupe Anguiano's staff have been there themselves. They have lived on \$135 a month and felt the same frustrations.

NWEE knows that unskilled women with little or no job experience need individual nurturing and encouragement. Most importantly, they need self-confidence—and pride.

In a one-month course, NWEE gives low-income women who are heads of families and displaced homemakers training in job interviewing, employment goals, assertiveness, personal grooming, and budgeting, plus tours of local businesses. The women are then placed in either job-training or required academic courses, or in jobs themselves. But the program doesn't stop there. NWEE's follow-up program includes calling women weekly and arranging

monthly meetings for rapping and feedback sessions. All this understanding and individual attention may explain why NWEE has a 92-percent placement success rate as against the local governmental bureaucracies' 11 to 16 percent.

Word of Anguiano's success is spreading. People in Dallas have asked for help in setting up a similar program, and Rosalynn Carter invited her to a Washington seminar to explain the project's innovations.

"One key is that we've gotten private business involved on the grass-roots level," says Anguiano. "They now call us about openings."

All this has been accomplished on a shoestring budget. NWEE's Low-Income Women's Employment Program costs only \$671 per trainee.

"They said it couldn't be done, but we've done it," says Anguiano, president and founding mother of NWEE. —Nancy Haston Foster TO: LL Presidents, DPM, St.Ord., Members at Large

SUMMARY

CONVENTION '81

Delegates -- 188 of them -- made these decisions:

- -- they adopted a new study, "Women Under Texas Law"
- -- approved present state support positions on existing program with some wording amendments to more carefully describe the members' intent
- -- adopted new bylaws, particularly one allowing a 1 1/2 PMP for household memberships
- -- approved a per-member payment of \$8.25 for the biennium 1981-1983
- -- adopted a budget adjusted to reflect the PMP increase
- -- approved a statewide fundraising sharing formula of 20%

Delegates, observers, and guests also

- -- applauded enthusiastically an inspiring address by Lupe Anguiano, founder of National Women's Employment and Education, Inc. of San Antonio, who shared her experiences of trying and failing to improve the welfare system through governmental action, and as a result, founding a cooperative effort with business to train and employ women recipients of welfare for productive jobs. In the process, despite conventional wisdom, pride and dignity are restored to AFDC mothers relieved of the burden and indignity of welfare.
- -- participated in a workshop run by Margaret Keys and Barbara Miller of Austin, professional educators in the area of how to act when "In the Public Eye."

Program Summary

Program debate was spirited and provocative as delegates to the 18th Biennial Convention narrowed their sights from four items voted consideration: (1) Mental Health, (2) Health Care, (3) Ramifications of Legislation Which Defines the Legal Commencement of Life, and (4) Women Under Texas Law. The fourth choice was the winner with delegates overwhelmingly voting to study "Women Under Texas Law: A study of the impact on women of existing state laws and proposed legislation." While the state board will struggle with defining the initial scope of this study, suggestions for direction included Texas ERA, women and employment, health, property rights, family law, and child care.

No positions were dropped; however, delegates voted to accept the board-recommended change of our Human Resources position relating to education so that our previous wording of "Access for every citizen to free public education. . ." was changed to read "Access for all persons to free public education," which brings this position

in line with our national position. Additionally, the board was directed to redraft our position relating to "increased authority and effectiveness for legislators" to more accurately reflect our position as initially adopted.

Budget

The 1981 League of Women Voters of Texas Convention voted to increase the per-member payment by 75¢ to \$8.25. The \$2,337 generated by this increase in income was then transferred to the expense side of the budget under U-3, Legislative Office, Accrual for Next Legislative Session. The rest of the budget was adopted as presented. The correct Local League Support list follows. (from Myrtle McMahan, Budget Chmn.)

Evaluation Results

137 evaluation sheets were returned. Lupe Anguiano's speech received the highest rating from everyone, with the Cajun party a close second. Program debate was also mentioned favorably.

On the six activities questions receiving ratings from 1 (poor) to 6 (excellent), the Pre-convention Briefing averaged a score of 4.3; "In the Public Eye" workshop sccord 5.2; Presidents' Workshop got a 5.4; "State Fair" received 5.0, Counterpart Program Workshops a 3.9; and business sessions rated a 4.5. In addition, many suggested ways to improve various procedures, all of which will be carefully considered for future statewide meetings.

The Beaumont League was universally praised for their hard work and arrangements. The Orange Area League also contributed workers for all three days for which we are grateful.

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Babysitting was provided and was appreciated.

There were two male delegates and one male observer.

LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS OF TEXAS STATE BOARD AND CONVENTION DELEGATES

The League of Women Voters of Houston proposed the Texas Housing Policies Study because we felt our national housing consensus of adequate supply and equal access did not allow the state and local Leagues to effectively address current state housing programs and state-wide housing problems.

The Houston League strongly recognizes the need for study and action but regret-fully withdraws the Texas Housing Policies Study because of the uncertainty of the future of the state Housing Division due to proposed budget cuts and program changes by the Reagan Administration.

These proposals, at this time, are:

- deletions of Federal #701 planning grants and sharp budget cuts in housing activities, mortgage loan guarantees, and restrictions for tax-exempt home mortgage bonds, which affects housing finance agencies.
- possible consolidation of various related programs into block grants of money to go directly to the states and be administered at state level.

The Housing Division of the Texas Department of Community Affairs operates on a 30% state-funded and 70% federally-funded budget and currently has a 10 member staff. Federal #701 planning grants fund most salaries for staff as they administer Section 8 subsidized housing assistance to communities without public housing authority, manage Farm Home Administration programs and oversee HUD rehabilitation grants and loans. The Division administers 4 different federal housing programs; there are no state supported housing programs. So although cut, federal housing will remain but the question of whether the Housing Division will continue to be able to administer them also remains.

Federal #701 money will be eliminated by June, 1981, and there are no indications that state appropriations will be forth coming to make-up this deficit. New HUD appointees views and sympathies for the poorer states like Texas are, as of yet, unknown.

But beyond budget cuts, the primary reason for our hesitation in recommending a study at this time is the indications given to local officials that the Reagan Administration favors a mechanism for consolidation of various related programs into block grants of money to be dispersed directly to the states and administered at state level. If indeed we see a broader folding-in of housing, community development, economic and urban development as well as job training into a block grant to be given to the state, overwhelming questions will arise: who will be the lead agency in state? what happens to local entitlement and what would be the role of the Housing Division?

Even though the Texas Housing Agency will remain intact, and statewide rental problems grow more acute, perhaps it is premature to adopt a housing study at this time with a partially unknown scope. In the words of Buzz McKethan, Director of the state Housing Division, "It is too early to make decisions about housing programs and the future of the Housing Division. It's still a dice roll."

After this difficult decision are we proposing to wait till 1983 to address these changes? Absolutely not. We will strongly propose Board direction to monitor and inform local Leagues of state housing developments as a 1981-82 action project.

TO: LOCAL TEXAS LEAGUES

FROM: LWV-HOUSTON

This is formal notice that the League of Women Voters of Houston will bring a non-recommended program item before the state convention. The item appears in the LWV-TX DPM, January 1981, as a study to determine what the state legislature's response should be when called upon to ratify a human life amendment.

The state board has stated that the appropriate level of study of this matter is national (DPM, January 1981). It is our view that the issue is one which may also properly be addressed at the state level. We do not assert that it is exclusively a state issue. The constitutional amendment route has two components: action by the United States Congress and action be each state's legislature during ratification. In the absence of a national position, Texas Leagues, if they are to have a voice, can only be heard at the state level.

In response to Houston's request for clarification, Ruth Robbins, Chair, Legislative Action Department responded: "Your call and others from Leagues concerning the human life amendment has prompted a discussion at LWVUS among the Legislative Action, Human Resources, and Management and Training Services Departments...Since you have asked how your League can get involved in this issue, here are your options:" the traditional program making approach leading to national convention '82; reference to national council as an emergency item; and concurrence of your state League with the position of another state. "Then you may take action within your own state if the human life amendment comes before your state legislature for ratification." We read this third option as affirmation of our view. We have chosen, however, to bring the matter to convention in the traditional program making manner. We will also pursue the national council option and invite interested leagues to join us, so that the US Congress may also be lobbied on the subject.

Our study would investigate the possible legal, social, political, economic, and philosophical ramifications such an amendment might have. As examples, we might address these issues:

- a) How can this amendment be reconciled with the principle of separation of church and state?
- b) Would such an amendment prohibit various contraceptive practices currently being used and halt the development of new birth control methods?
- c) What kinds of restrictions would be imposed on scientific research under such an amendment?
- d) All things considered, how and under what agency's jurisdiction would this amendment be enforced?

Aside from the ramifications that may be implicit in such an amendment, there is a fundamental question of the philosophy of constitutional law. Is it appropriate to embody varying moral and ethical issues in our Constitution?

To ensure that the League of Women Voters of Texas will be prepared to take timely, responsible, and effective action on this issue, it is imperative that we begin the proposed study immediately. Vigorous lobbying efforts are currently in progress on both sides of the question. There is a very strong possibility that national and state legislative action will be taken. Let us take action at the state convention to uphold our tradition of providing the voice of humanity and reason in public affairs, unintimidated by the complexities of the issues we must confront!



WOMEN UNDER TEXAS LAW

DID YOU KNOW THAT:

- ***Texas passed an Equal Rights Amendment to the state constitution in 1972?
- ***Enforcement of child support orders under Texas law is limited and ineffective?
- ***Texas has a community property law?
- ***In November, 1980 Texans approved an amendment to the state constitution which allows married couples to agree to separate their community property?
- ***Texas law does not provide for alimony?

You probably knew all these facts. But here is the important question: What does all this mean in every day life or in a court of law to--you? your mother? your daughter? your neighbor? your sister?

The effort to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment to the U.S. Constitution is in trouble. The Texas ERA may face rescission moves. As a candidate, Ronald Reagan said he opposed the ERA because he believed that women's rights should be resolved by state laws. Are Texas women in danger of taking their rights for granted?

We in Texas need concrete, factual information about the legal status of women under state law. We must prepare ourselves to guard the progress we have already made toward equal rights, and we must continue the work that remains to be done.

SUGGESTED OUTLOOK FOR WORK BY THE LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS OF TEXAS



The Dallas League suggests the development of one or more study papers on topics such as the Texas ERA, women and employment, health, property rights, family law, or child care. In preparing these papers, LWV-T should be able to draw on the expertise of League members who are lawyers, scholars and teachers concerned with women's issues.

Also, the Texas League should plan an educational outreach program addressed to League members, women's groups and civic and community organizations.

A decent, safe, sanitary, and affordable housing supply has long been a goal in Texas, but every year low - and moderate - income persons find less affordable housing either to rent or buy across the state.

<u>Funding has always been the major obstacle</u> in planning for low and moderate housing programs in rural and urban Texas. The 66th session of the legislature created the Texas Housing Agency to be effective August, 1979.

"One of its purposes is to finance the acquisition, construction and/or rehabilitation of residential housing to meet the needs of persons and families of low income and of families of moderate income at prices they can afford. The agency may, among other things, issue its bonds (tax-exempt mortgage revenue bonds) to provide funds for such purposes."

Objectives of the Texas Housing Agency include: to increase supply of low - and moderate - housing units with long/short term mortgage financing; to support, encourage, and supplement private industry efforts to provide such units; implement the goals and objectives of the Texas State Housing Plan; and to operate the agency without requiring assistance from the state tax revenue.

Also at state level, the Texas Department of Community Affairs Housing Division has addressed: rural housing finance and development; rehabilitation finance; HUD housing assistance payments program, the statewide housing base, state housing planning, housing and construction codes and other programs.

Both state agencies' programs will provide a ready framework for a Texas Housing Policies Study by LWV-T. The study could include the programs of the state community affairs department and how they serve rural and urban families, relate to federal programs, coordinate with local county and city housing efforts, and facilitate increased housing opportunities.

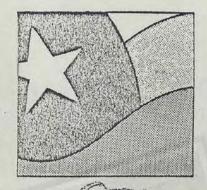
Next could be an <u>evaluation of the Texas Housing Agency</u> and its potential for funding wide-ranging housing development and rehabilitation. How does it compare to other state housing agencies and where in Texas has the THA spent their first issue of \$150,000,000 mortgage bonds?

Other important state issues, because of the scarcity of rental housing, are the current landlord/tenant laws and their adequacy, the alarming numbers of families with children who cannot find rentals, and elderly housing problems.

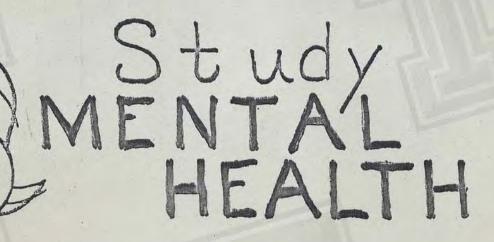
Our present national housing position of equal access and adequate supply does not allow concerned Texas League members to speak to current state programs and statewide problems. We need this research and visibility and we need expanded new housing concensus to be effective for all of Texas.

Whereas: The 1979 Refugee Act eliminated anti-communist bias and increased refugee preference slots to 50,000 per country.

Whereas: 280,000 slots are available for immigrants as preference visas (relatives of citizens or special skills) each year and the US grants each nation equal preference visas. (ie: Iceland gets as many visas as India).

Whereas: The waiting list to enter the US is nearly 1 million. Some people (from Hong Kong) have waited 10 years to enter the US legally.

Whereas: The Carter administration refused to admit Cubans under the 1979 Refugee Act because the law was intended to aid immigrants who were screened and granted visas abroad. (The Cubans were admitted as "entrants" and granted limited funds for resettlement.)

Whereas: Economic and political turmoil is pushing people out of South East Asia, Latin America and the Caribbean towards the US.

Whereas: The Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) is so overtaxed it lost 50,000 records in NY. INS has had no head for 1 year and many jobs authorized by congress are not filled.

Resolved: The LWV/Tarrant County requests the support of all other Texas Leagues in its efforts to have the Board of Directors of The LWV/Texas initiate and support other state Leagues in a study of U.S. Policy on Immigrants and Immigration at the 1982 National Convention.

Under Article VIII, Section 5 of the LWV-Texas Bylaws, the Convention is charged to "consider and authorize for action a program . . . elect officers and directors. . . adopt a budget for the ensuing year, and . . . transact such other business as may be presented."

Article XI sets forth the procedures for program selection. The final date for local League recommendations to reach the state office is December 31, 1980. The state Board of Directors will submit the proposed program to Leagues at least six weeks before the Convention. Forms on which to submit program recommendations have been sent to local League presidents. The deadline for receipt of bylaws changes is December 31, 1980.

The report of the Nominating Committee of its nominations for officers, directors, and the chairman plus two members of the succeeding Nominating Committee, will be sent out at least one month before the date of Convention, according to Article X, Sec. 3 of the LWV-Texas Bylaws.

Local Leagues are entitled to send one delegate for the first 15 voting members and one delegate for every ten additional voting members or major fraction thereof belonging to said League on January 1st of Convention year.



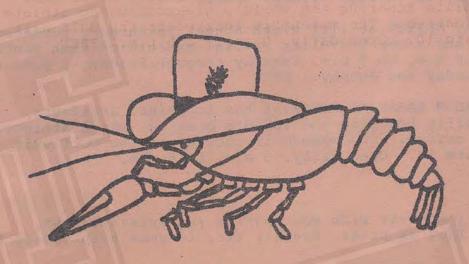

MEMBERSHIP

A special committee of the IRVING League has revised its very successful Member Handbook. The result is a simple, practical publication containing a great deal of information about League in a way that is not intimidating to a new member. Copies available at cost - \$1.50.

Last fall LUBBOCK'S membership coffee featured a clairvoyant complete with robe and beads who answered questions about League before the questions were asked. The result was both informative and entertaining. Don't ask us how it was done; ask LUBBOCK.

For the last two years the AUSTIN league has had very successful fall membership events. Both were scheduled for the rather unconventional (for the league) time of Sunday afternoon. Public officials were invited and especially honored guests included the state league president and other "biggies" such as the mayor. Another unusual touch was the lack of sign-up sheets and explanations of intricate league organization. Eighteen new members were gained at the first one, and results were equally impressive the second year, even in the rain.

VOTERS SERVICE

The SAN ANTONIO League received much valuable television time prior to the November elections owing to a 30-second tape that was shared by all the area television stations. The tape was shown frequently for three reasons: It is thought-provoking, catchy, and well done; stations air a short spot more frequently than longer ones; the stations

were glad to have a well-done tape to help fulfill some of their public service responsibilities. Copies of that tape are available at Convention for those interested.

A film of Bandwagon, the LUBBOCK League's voters service extravaganza, will also be available for viewing in the publications room.

Also on display in the publications room will be the first, second, and third place winners of the BAY AREA "Get Out to Vote" poster contest held among elementary school children.

CITIZEN INFORMATION

Last spring the TEMPLE AREA League sponsored five public forums on the theme Introducing the Community to Itself. The project was funded by a grant from the Texas Committee for the Humanities and Public Policy and the National Endowment for the Humanities. Pamphlets summarizing the program, a pictorial display, and a 12 minute slide-sound presentation may be seen in the publications room.

Galveston: The Island City is a redesigned and updated version of GALVESTON'S five-year old "Know Your Town" booklet. Other leagues may want to use this as a model for similar publications of their own. Available in the publications room at \$1.25 each.

Another publication that might serve as a model is IRVING'S Mental Health Services Available to our Children and Youth. The brochure contains basic information and telephone numbers for mental health services for youth in the community. One copy free to each local League.

Betty Anderson suggested that I direct a memo to the two of you concerning some ideas for working through program in a week-end convention experience based on what had happened this year.

I thought I had better do it before I had forgotten what had happened.

We did not need the long time for program development break which we had scheduled for Saturday afternoon. Would be better to go ahead and schedule that time for program debate and have final program adoption on Sunday morning. Our thinking had been that we needed to have our program adopted before having the break, but the break was not that beneficial.

The above could be handled-two-ways. Could have some program development or really more general discussion of program management in small groups on Saturday. It seems to be worthwhile to share in small groups. Then on Sunday in direction to board there could

be a time for focus for newsly adopted program .

We tried to rely on past rules for models when writing the new reles but with a week-end meeting we need to keep in mind new time-lines. Probably the best idea is to be flexible and leve the rules broad enough so you can work within them and not have to go to the convention floor to change things.

The by-laws about not recommended items could be changed to allow vote and consideration on the same day.

Concerning the Action Motions00I think the basic concept has merit but it needs to be refined.

- 1) The committee should be chaired by a board person but probably should have a non board person serving on it. Betty appointed all board people this year on the theory that it would save controversy but this can be viewed as being rigged.
- 2) This year the motions were put in the convention VOTER. Would recommend not doing that again. That showed how many there were. The committee would have liked to have dropped 2 of the 7 but couldn't risk offending the people proposing the two to to be dropped.

I heard several people on the board say they didn't like the whole ideal of Action motions so you probably need to talk about it. Now that it has been tried you at least have a basis from which to discuss it.

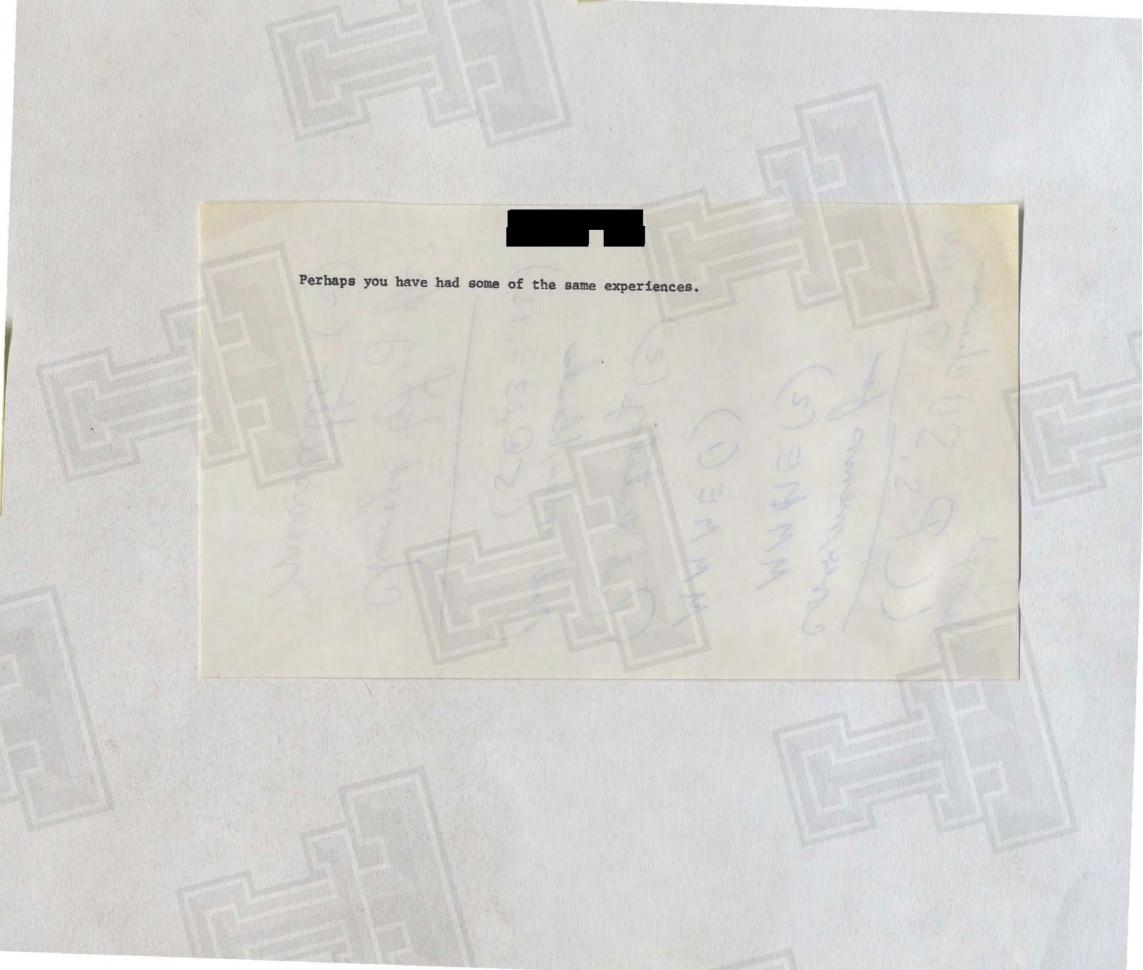

Welcome to Convention '81: This week we are distributing this brief update instead of printing a regular newsletter. Because of the short week for us leaguers, the boost in postal rates and the fact that the legislature has been slow to take up our priority bills, we have decided to go this route. Newsletter #10 will arrive on your doorstep next week as usual.

All the bills that are going to be filed have been. Therefore, the program chairs are in the process of targeting bills for concentrated action at this time. Committee action continues but the log jam and pressure are building. More than 4,000 bills and resolutions have been filed but only 170 have seen any action. Redistricting and money are high on the legislator's list of concerns. Even with the Comptroller's new estimate which adds \$377 million to the game, it still won't be enough to do what the legislators want. Write those letters, keep tuned, and keep sending those press clippings, etc. - it really helps.

Those Leagues with members on the Senate Finance Committee (Jones, Howard, Blake, Brooks, Farabee, Harris, McKnight, Meier, Parker, Santiesteban, Short, Snelson and Traeger) WRITE YOUR SENATOR to encourage him to fund the TENRAC budget at the level suggested by the Legislative Budget Board.

Isabel Miller testified before the House Appropriations Committee earlier this month for "full and adequate budget allotment...for this agency."

The TENRAC budget will be heard before the Senate Finance Committee early in the week of March 30. WRITE YOUR SENATORS NOW!

SB 546 (Ogg) Voting Rights for Ex-Felons - Senator Ogg has tried to suspend the rules twice to bring SB 546 to floor debate and has failed to get the necessary 2/3 of the Senators present to do so. The bill still remains on the Senate intent calendar. We have written letters to all the Senators urging their support.

HB 1335 (Hanna) SUPPORT - Relating to the use of solar energy in new state buildings. 3/24 passed to 3rd reading. Non record vote (members voted by voice vote).

HJR 65 (Tejeda) SUPPORT - Proposes a constitutional amendment to require reapportionment of county commissioners precincts following the publication of a federal census.

HB 393 (Hernandez) SUPPORT

This would provide \$1 per 8 hour work day to TDC inmates for their labor, the funds coming from specified sales contracts on prison-made goods. Prices on such goods would be set as needed in order to carry out this act. The work incentive fund is created for deposit of these monies and solely for payment of inmate wages. As a form of restitution and rehabilitation, 50% of the total earned would be credited to the victim compensation fund. Also, an inmate could choose to contribute any portion of the remaining 50% of his wages to this same fund and that may be considered as a factor justifying parole. This fits our position for inmate compensation from the sale of prison-made goods and surpluses.

Heard by Security and Sanctions 3/11/81 and referred to subcommittee of DeLay (Chairman), Tow and Hernandez. Letters of persuasion needed from local leagues of Pearland and Montgomery County; of thanks and support from San Antonio.

SCR 63 (Brooks) SUPPORT

This is a simple resolution to declare that it is the policy of the Texas Legislature that the state pursue the development of a comprehensive program of community based corrections and that restitution centers be fully realized. The "whereas" clauses point out the large and growing prison population, the kinds of community based programs that could be developed, the fact that such programs are more effective in reducing recidivism and cheaper too, and the importance of saving tax dollars while providing an adequate and humane corrections system. This meshes perfectly with our position calling for a broad range of community based corrections programs. It was heard by the State Affairs Committee Wednesday, March 25.

SB 570 (Mauzy) SUPPORT

This would redefine truant and runaway behavior as conduct indicating a need for services through the children's protective service offices of the DHR rather than as a conduct indicating a need for supervision through juvenile probation departments. Funding would be appropriated separately to prevent an increased caseload for existing abused and neglected children caseworkers. County funds now used for truant and runaways services would follow the child to the child welfare board services unless the services are contracted back to county probation departments offices or boards. Our position calling for continuing court jurisdiction over status offenders only until other supervision is available supports this measure. Referred to Jurisprudence. Heard on Tuesday, 3/24.

CORRECTION - Newsletter #9, page 5

HB 1704 (Jones) to expand the Adult Probation Commission from 9 to 12 members, etc. We goofed. The composition of the commission should read: 4 appointments by the Governor with at least 1 being a judge; 4 by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court with 3 being juvenile district judges and 1 a citizen; and 4 by the presideing judge of the court of Criminal Appeals with 3 being criminal district judges and 1 a citizen.

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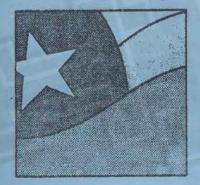
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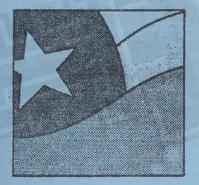

LIGHTENING YOUR LOAD

In reading <u>Ledger-De-Main</u>, you will find several of the responsibilities assigned to you as treasurer that could be handled at least in part by someone else. Specifically:

Membership Records

Although it is true that the member dues must be part of the accounting process handled by the treasurer, there is nothing to prohibit a League from inviting a member other than the treasurer (and other than the membership chairman) to assist in one or more of the following ways:

- -- Keep the Master Membership File
- -- Receive dues initially, record appropriate information, then either forward dues payments to treasurer or deposit dues and send a detailed deposit slip to the treasurer
- -- Send dues notices
- -- Report the January 1 membership count to state and national and report the monthly or quarterly adds/drops/changes as required to state & national
- -- Prepare the Membership Directory and reports on membership for the local board and for the VOTER
- -- Prepare the transfer cards for members who move

Contributions

The responsibility for receiving and recording contributions can be handled by the finance chairman who then can prepare (or prepare and make) the deposits.

THE PMP

Does not apply to state units

The State PMP

The state per-member payment for an <u>established</u> local League is approved by delegates to the biennial state convention. Your League's annual PMP for a given fiscal year will be based on the number of single and household memberships as of January 1 prior to the beginning of that fiscal year. The PMP may be rounded off to the nearest dollar. The <u>Convention Workbook</u> and the <u>LWV-Texas Directory</u> (published each June) both contain a list of PMP obligations.

The state PMP for a provisional League is determined by the state board and provisional Leagues will be advised of their responsibility.

In some years the state board allows payment of up to one-quarter of the PMP with tax-deductible funds through the LWV-Texas Education Fund. Local Leagues will be advised when this option is authorized.

The first quarterly payment is due by June 15, and a payment form should accompany your check. A sample follows this page.

The National PMP

The national per-member payment is determined by national convention delegates and is based on a January 1 membership count.

<u>Full PMP</u> information and forms are sent to local and provisional League presidents each year. Payments may be made annually, semi-annually, or quarterly, and a portion if authorized may be paid with tax-deductible money through LWVEF(US).

It is recommended that you await receipt of the PMP information and forms before making any payment so that the form may accompany your payment - even though this material sometimes arrives in July and shows the first quarterly PMP due by June 30.

It is suggested that the most recent PMP information pages for your League from national be included as an attachment to this section.

THE SHARING FORMULA

Contributions to the LWV-Texas and the Texas Education Fund are shared with local Leagues according to a formula approved at each state convention.

Attached is the current formula, as well as a sample of the FORM FOR NOTIFICATION OF A CONTRIBUTION, which is sent to you by the state League development chairman whenever a contribution to be shared with your League has been received.

If a contribution to the LWV-Texas is to be shared, your League will receive a check from the LWV-T treasurer. If the contribution is to the LWV-TEF, you will receive from the TEF treasurer a STATEMENT advising you that your TEF account has been increased by that amount.

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III. FINANCIAL POLICY (cont.)

Local Leagues' support may be paid in full on June 15 or according to the following schedule:

1. First payment due in the state office June 15.

2. Second payment due in state office September 15. One half of total PMP shall be paid by this date.

3. Third payment due in the state office by December 15. Three fourths shall be paid by this date.

4. Fourth payment due in the state office March 15. Full amount shall be paid by this date.

State services, including president's mailings and field services, may be discontinued to a local League which fails to settle in full its current account, both PMP and outstanding bills, by the end of the state League's fiscal year.

B. STATEWIDE FUNDRAISING (policy approved by 1979 State Convention)

Policy on statewide fundraising covers provisional Leagues and state units, as well as local Leagues.

The state League development committee shall be responsible for developing the solicitation sources for funding the state bugdet. When a prospective source for state funding is within the geographic boundaries of an established local League, prior consent will be sought from that League.

Successful state League solicitation of a source formerly contributing to a local League guarantees the amount of the local League contribution plus 20% of the additional money received by the state League; portions paid to a local League from a state League contribution will be made in the same kind of money received in that contribution.

The following sharing and incentive guidelines shall be followed:

- Former contributions -- any local League formerly the recipient of a contribution from a state League funding source is guaranteed the amount previously received plus 20% of the additional money received by the state League. This sharing formula will continue every year such a contribution is received.
- New contributions -- a local League will be guaranteed 30% of contributions from new sources which come from its established area; this sharing formula will continue every year such a contribution is received.
- 3. Finder's Fee -- local Leagues will be encouraged to locate sources where a large request may be made, based on state League needs rather than on local League needs only. If a local League finds a new contributor for state League funding, that local League will receive an additional 10% of the total contribution for the first year only. Local Leagues will continue sharing in annual contributions after the first year. (See guideline #2)
- 4. Restricted contributions -- occasionally the state League may seek a restricted cash contribution for a major project. If the local League

III. FINANCIAL POLICY (cont.)

In addition, the amount of the last regular contribution shall be paid annually until the name of the contributor is returned to the local League solicitation list.

C. BUDGET

Board members, associate directors, and off-board committee chairs shall monitor expenditures for their portfolios to assure that budget allocations are not exceeded. At each board meeting, the board shall review a budget report, prepared by the treasurer, showing budget allocations and expenditures to date. Any expenditure significantly in excess of a budget allocation and any revision of the budget must be approved by the board.

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Sufficient funds shall be placed in reserve to permit the League of Women Voters of Texas to meet committed operating expenses for a six-month period. A dollar figure for this reserve fund shall be approved by the board of directors at the beginning of each fiscal year. This amount shall be kept in one or more interest-bearing accounts.

A planned withdrawal from the reserve fund may be stated in the budget under "sources of income." In case of emergency, funds may be withdrawn at the discretion of the state board. Withdrawals from the reserve fund shall be restored as soon as possible, preferably during the next fiscal year.

MAKING THE MOST OF YOUR MONEY

It goes without saying that you will want as much of your League's money as possible in interest-bearing accounts.

There are many options, and a review of these in relation to your League's available funds may open up some opportunities for increasing your earned interest. Consider:

NOW checking accounts

Alternatives to passbook savings accounts, such as:
short-term certificates of deposit
money market certificates
"Ready Assets" accounts through brokers
treasury bills

Longer term investments, such as: certificates of deposit money market certificates treasury notes

Call on a League friend knowledgeable about investments for advice.

RESERVE FUNDS

It is recommended that all local Leagues have some kind of back-up fund-a reserve equivalent to about one-fourth of the current budget.

Some Leagues, however, will feel that as their budget increases they will not need as much as one-fourth in reserve, particularly if there are no fixed costs for rent or salaries, and other recurring expenses are minimal. Such Leagues should set a dollar value for a reserve fund, subject to annual review and approval.

HANDLING TAX-DEDUCTIBLE MONEY

Because the Texas state League has its own education fund, you may choose to use it as a depository for tax-deductible contributions in lieu of the national LWV-Education Fund covered in Ledger-De-Main.

Should a contributor to your local League desire that the contribution be tax-deductible, the contribution may be sent to the LWV-Texas Education Fund, where it will be set aside for use by your League. In addition, if the state League receives a contribution to the TEF and a portion is to be shared with your League, that portion will be added to your TEF account.

The LWV-TEF Handbook of Policies and Procedures for Local Leagues provides all the information needed by you and your board. It is desirable that you, as treasurer, have your own copy. IT IS IMPORTANT THAT YOU READ IT. As policies, procedures, or forms change, supplemental or replacement pages will be sent to your League and should be integrated into the handbook.

The treasurer of a local League should handle ALL money matters relating to your education fund account.

When any action is taken by the state TEF treasurer regarding income or expenditures applicable to your account, you will receive a STATEMENT detailing the action. A sample form follows this page.

ABOUT GRANTS

When your League receives a grant for a special project you should be extremely careful about keeping financial records and should <u>insist</u> on receipts for <u>all</u> expenditures.

When the board is preparing a special project budget, the treasurer should be asked to provide information on costs of production, materials, reimbursements, postage for distribution, indirect costs, etc.

Be aware that any costs involved in applying for the grant cannot be charged as grant expenses. Finance or Development is the best place in your budget to charge these costs.

Generally, the local League treasurer will be expected to provide a final financial report to the grantor.

ALL ABOUT SALES AND USE TAXES

All local Leagues in Texas are subject to state sales and use tax laws.

The most recent memo from the state League on this subject follows this page, along with a sample copy of the LOCAL LEAGUE SALES AND USE TAX QUARTERLY REPORT FORM.

These memos and forms are updated periodically, and two copies are sent to each local League president, the second copy marked for the treasurer.

Be sure you have the most current memo and sample form. Each is dated, and the state office or treasurer can give you the date and/or copies of the most recent.

When a League treasurer's term ends, sales/use tax worksheets should be prepared covering the current calendar quarter to enable the new treasurer to prepare the quarterly report without having to research records of the prior fiscal year.

ALL ABOUT SALES AND USE TAXES

LWV-Texas November, 1980 LL Pres. Mailing (2) I. E. Budget

(second copy for local League treasurer)

Sales and use tax laws are written at the state, not federal, level. Texas law states that nonprofit organizations classified by the IRS as 501(c)(4) -- the classification for all local Leagues in Texas -- are not exempt from sales or use taxes on purchases of tangible property.

These are complex regulations. If you have any questions that are unanswered by this material, please contact the state League treasurer.

ABOUT PURCHASES

Sales tax must be paid by all local Leagues on all purchases of tangible property except:

out-of-state purchases

- -- such as LWVUS publications; national DPMs
- -- unless otherwise directed by a vendor

purchases for resale

- -- publications or merchandise you plan to sell -- if a RESALE CERTIFICATE is given to the supplier. The certificate includes a Limited Sales Tax Permit Number. Unincorporated Leagues may use the LWV-Texas number which is 1-74-1106488-8;
 - incorporated Leagues must obtain their own number. A sample certificate is attached.

ABOUT SALES

Sales tax must be collected on all sales except:

- -- sales to out-of-state customers
- -- sales to exempt organizations, provided an EXEMPTION CERTIFICATE is received from the customer. A sample certificate is attached. There is no such thing as a "tax exempt number."
- -- sales purchased for resale, provided a RESALE CERTIFICATE has been received

The sales tax rate is currently 4% for the state, plus whatever local taxes have been approved. For most local Leagues there is a 1% local sales tax; for some, an additional 1/2% MTA (Metropolitan Transit Authority) tax also applies.

Whether or not a League is subject to a city or MTA tax depends on the location of that League's headquarters -- a League office or the home of the president.

THE USE TAX

A use tax must be paid by a League on material purchased out of state or for resale that is used by the organization. "To use" means to provide free to members (as part of dues), to use for committee or board work, to give away, and even to throw away!

Use tax is also payable for purchases within Texas by Leagues in local or MTA taxing districts when a local or MTA tax has not already been paid to supplier. Example: San Antonio is in an MTA taxing district. When the San Antonio League purchases publications from the state League, if billing includes a 5% sales tax (which represents 4% state and 1% local) the San Antonio League owes the 1/2% MTA use tax.

The use tax rate is always the same as the sales tax rate, explained above under "About Sales."

REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

Unincorporated local Leagues must complete a LOCAL LEAGUE SALES AND USE TAX QUARTERLY REPORT form four times each year. This report, together with a check made out to the League of Women Voters of Texas in the amount of tax owed, are to be sent to the state office (see instructions on the sample form attached. Additional forms are available from the state office.)

The state treasurer then files a return form and makes payment for all local Leagues to the state comptroller. Local Leagues with no tax liability in any given quarter need not file a report.

· Incorporated local Leagues must file their own sales and use tax reports directly with the state comptroller.

PRACTICAL EXAMPLES

Items purchased from LWVUS for use or resale

These are purchased without paying taxes. Collect sales tax for items sold. Remit use tax for the balance of items given away, thrown away, or otherwise used by the organization other than for sale. See below regarding items purchased for subscription service.

Items purchased from LWV-T and LWV-TEF for use or resale

A local League may issue a RESALE CERTIFICATE to LWV-T or LWV-TEF in lieu of paying sales tax at the time of purchase. Since this certificate may be submitted on a one-time-only-per-vendor basis, it will be the policy of the state League that sales tax will no longer be billed on purchases made by that League. The responsibility then rests with the local League to insure that appropriate sales and use taxes are remitted.

Items sold at fundraising events (garage sales, bake sales, etc.)

All local Leagues must collect and remit sales tax if tangible property is being sold. Do not collect sales tax for whole pies and cakes.

Newsletters (VOT Rs)

When a local League provides its members with a newsletter as part of membership dues, tax is paid on all materials, etc. purchased for publication of the newsletter. However, sales tax must be added to any subscriptions sold, even though this means tax is paid a second time. The alternative of buying supplies on a separate basis for the few subscriptions sold is impractical for the few cents involved.

Subscription Service -- when included in dues

National League publications - use tax applies. It is recom inded that the local League treasurer apply the use tax on all copies at the time of purchase. If a few are actually sold, double taxation occurs, but splitting out these few is not worth the work involved. Be sure use taxes on these are included in budgeting.

State League publications - state and local sales tax is billed by the state office (unless a RESALE CERTIFICATE is on file, in which case, treat same as national League publications). For some Leagues, MTA use tax applies.

Local League publications - taxes should be paid when printed outside the local League office.

Local newsletter (VOTER) - taxes have already been paid on purchase of materials used to publish a newsletter.

Subscription Service -- when NOT included in dues

Appropriate taxes should be added to the purchase price of the subscription service, and all material purchased to be included in subscription service mailings should be purchased "for resale."

If the local newsletter (VOTER) is included in subscription service, taxes have already been paid on purchase of materials used for the newsletter. Because taxes have already been charged on the sale of the subscription service the state receives the tax twice. However, since the money involved is minimal, it is impractical to purchase such supplies partially with tax for in-house use, and partially without tax for the publication of the newsletter.

INSURANCE AND BONDING

Insurance

A number of Leagues have expressed concern about liability coverage. With the advice of an attorney and conversations with insurance agents, the state League discovered that for the state to carry a blanket policy covering all local Leagues would be prohibitively expensive and might not be the sort of coverage needed. However, local Leagues should recognize that the possibility of lawsuits exists, and your League may wish to look into insurance costs and coverage locally. Certainly you will want to consider one-time coverage if you sponsor a meeting open to the public. You are urged to seek the advice of a friendly local attorney on the issue of liability insurance for your League.

Another area of concern has been identified by Leagues having representatives on certain local boards and commissions. Our best recommendation at this time is that the League representative should inquire of the board or commission what insurance they carry for members' liability. At the same time, the local League should also inquire of an attorney if the League itself could be liable; if so, they should consider insurance if recommended.

The state League also investigated the question of libel or slander — in a Voters Guide, for instance. The answer here is that if League-recommended procedures are followed (registered letters to candidates with return card and careful proofreading of guides), there should be no grounds for libel or slander suits. In addition, public officials and candidates for office have a very difficult time proving slander as a result of a public forum or rally.

To sum up: while the state League would <u>like</u> to be able to offer all local Leagues in Texas the opportunity to be insured against various situations, our best judgment is that it is not feasible. However, we urge each local League to investigate its needs at the local level. To be meticulous in keeping good financial records and in following standard operating procedures in <u>all</u> matters is perhaps the most effective deterrent to legal action against your League.

Leagues also should consider insurance against fire/lightning and malicious mischief, as well as against robbery and theft -- almost mandatory for Leagues with offices.

Bonding

The state League has also investigated the possibility of bonding all local League treasurers and/or presidents. Again, the information needed plus the costs involved make it impractical -- if not impossible -- to issue such a blanket bond. Once more, we suggest that each local League investigate the issue for itself if the amount of funds handled by a League warrants.

EMPLOYEE TAXES

Leagues which have employees should obtain the Employer's Tax Guide, Circular E from the nearest Internal Revenue office and also refer to Ledger-De-Main for explanations about required IRS reports. They are:

W-2	Wage and Tax Statement (annual - for each employee)
W-3	Transmittal of Income and Tax Statements (annual)
W-4	Employee's Withholding Allowance Certificate (for each new employee)
Form 941	Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return
Form 940	Employer's Annual Federal Unemployment Tax Return

In addition to fulfilling the federal requirements, Leagues with employees must:

Pay the Unemployment Compessation Fund tax - by filing an Employer's Quarterly Report with the Texas Employment Commission

Leagues with employees must also consider obtaining Workmen's Compensation Insurance. While it is not mandatory, an entity is legally liable if it has not been obtained. The usual legal defenses do not apply in the absence of Workmen's Comp. Legal protection is lost if employees are not covered.

REPORTS FOR THE LEAGUE

For the local board

A treasurer's report should be given to the board at each meeting. This can be short, and even verbal when there has been little activity during the preceding month. However, at least four times a year a budget analysis and balance sheet should be prepared for the board and distributed to each member.

The budget analysis should include the amount budgeted and the actual income and expenditures to date. Optional is an added column showing the amount yet to be raised and the available remaining funds to spend for each line item.

The balance sheet, for Leagues on a <u>cash</u> basis (when accounts are not carried from the prior year nor set aside for the next year*) should show a <u>total</u> of the net worth (capital) at the beginning of the fiscal year, <u>plus</u> income to date, <u>less</u> expenditures to date. It should also show a listing and total of the money in the checking and each savings account, and the two totals should be the same. This figure then becomes the <u>current net worth</u> of your League. For Leagues that operate on an <u>accrual</u> basis (or limited accrual basis), the balance sheet will also include prepaid income and expenses, and accounts payable and receivable.* A local League friend with bookkeeping experience can help a treasurer understand this system.

It is recommended that the balance sheet and budget analysis reports be spaced so that one is always done as of December 31; a balance sheet and budget analysis at the end of each fiscal year is a MUST.

Perhaps the most valuable report to the board is your evaluation of the financial health of your League, and your best guess as to funds that are available over and above the budgeted requirements to the end of the fiscal year. EVERY local League treasurer should learn how to provide this information for the board. It is neither a long, nor a difficult task and should be a part of each board report, beginning six to seven months into your League year. Prior to that time not enough activity has taken place for you to provide a meaningful evaluation.

To determine available uncommitted funds, start with the <u>current</u> net worth, referred to above. Add to it the anticipated income to the end of the fiscal year and subtract the anticipated expenses. The result is the net worth you anticipate at the end of the fiscal year, in other words, the leftover funds. In your report to the board, you should subtract from this figure the recommended required reserve; then the remaining funds are truly uncommitted and thus available over and above budgeted requirements.

In preparing these "guesstimates" you should work carefully from the budget analysis (or from your ledger*). Some line items will be a matter of subtracting the actual incom/expenditures to date from the amount budgeted; other line items will be your own best judgement. For example, when you know all the contributions are in, you would not anticipate more income from that source, even if the amount received to date is below that budgeted. Or when the actual expenses for an activity will, in your opinion, exceed the amount budgeted, you should use your estimate of what the final cost will be.

Reports for the League

CAUTION: Do NOT pay for one activity from another account because you know one account will be underspent and the other overspent. This only leads to inaccurate records and poor budgeting for the future.

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For the Membership

The final balance sheet and budget analysis explained above should be given to all members of your League. Ideally, this should be available for the annual meeting. However, most annual meetings are held prior to the end of a fiscal year, which means you will need to prepare a ten or eleven-month balance sheet and budget analysis for the annual meeting and include the final report with a VOTER mailing at a later date.

For National and State

The Treasurer's annual report to LWVUS is due by May 15, or as soon as your fiscal year ends. Your president will receive forms from national in ample time and should pass them on to you.

Is is recommended the the balance Be sure to send a copy to both state and national and keep one for your files. Please DO get the report in on time or AS SOON AS POSSIBLE if your fiscal year ends after May 15.

You should also ensure that three copies of your budget are sent to the state office and an additional one is sent to your Field Service Representative.

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REPORTS FOR THE INTERNAL REVENUE SERVICE

Each year the IRS stipulates the income level above which a local League is required to file an annual report, Form 990 RETURN OF ORGANIZATION EXEMPT FROM INCOME TAX. If your League is required to file a Form 990, it must do so within four and one-half months after the end of your fiscal year.

Some local Leagues with incomes below the level required for reporting will receive a preaddressed Form 990 from the IRS. If this happens, your League must return the form to the IRS, after completing only the first few entries, as indicated on the form.

Those completing a Form 990 will find there a question reading, "Is this a separate return by a group affiliate?" The answer is "yes" and the "four-digit group exemption number" is 1666. (See "The Numbers Game" for explanation.)

In addition to the requirements for Form 990, Leagues with income from an inrelated trade or business may need to file a Form 990T even if a Form 990 is not required. Again, there is a minimum below which no report is required. If your League's funds are earned in part by VOTER advertisements, sales of non-League material, or other similar activities, you need to determine whether or not your League must file a Form 990T.

A League desiring to change its accounting period (fiscal year) must obtain prior approval of the IRS by filing an APPLICATION FOR CHANGE IN ACCOUNTING PERIOD, Form 1128, even if it is not required to file a Form 990.

The Internal Revenue Service will provide you with publications about completing and filing any of the above reports. In addition, but the LWVUS and LWV-Texas usually issue reminder memos annually covering the highlights. The most recent state memo follows this page and should be replaced when an updated memo is received. It is recommended that the most recent material also be included as an attachment to this page.

It is important that careful and complete financial records are kept, whether or not your League is required to file annual IRS reports, so that in case of an IRS audit your records will be in good condition.

RE: Internal Revenue Service Forms 990 & 990T

This supplements the June 1979 memos from LWVUS relating to "Filing of Internal Revenue Service Form 990" and "Unrelated Business Income/IRS Form 990T," which were reprinted and sent to local League presidents in June, 1980.

1. Local Leagues with a gross income in excess of \$10,000 MU ST file a Form 990 with the Internal Revenue Service to report annual income and expenditures. This form is due on or before the 15th day of the fifth month following the close of your fiscal year. Example: Leagues using the April 1 - March 31 fiscal year should have filed by August 15th.

Normally, Leagues will receive a pre-addressed form. If you are required to file and do not receive a pre-addressed form, it is your responsibility to obtain one from the IRS. If you receive a pre-addressed form and are not required to file, you should submit the form after completing only the heading on page 1.

Be sure to complete ALL line items on the IRS Form 990. Read the instructions carefully for details.

- 2. All local Leagues in Texas are tax exempt (from federal income tax) under the LWV-T Group Exemption Letter #1666. Thus, on the Form 990, answer the question near the top of page 1, Block 3, by checking "yes" to "Is this a separate return filed by a group affiliate?" Fill in the GEN number which is 1666.
- 3. In addition to the above, local Leagues with a gross income from an unrelated trade or business of more than \$1,000 MUST file a Form 990T. "Unrelated business taxable income" means the gross income derived from an unrelated trade or business regularly carried on. Examples: Regular advertising in your local bulletin; weekly "white elephant" sales.

Filing a Form 990T does not necessarily mean that a local League will be required to pay a tax. If "substantially all" of the work (85% or more) is performed without compensation, no tax would be assessed. Examples: Weekly "white elephant" sales if work is done by volunteers would not be taxable; advertising in local bulletins would not be taxable if all work including printing is done by volunteers, but would be taxable if printing is contracted for and/or work is performed by paid staff.

Refer to the "Instructions for Form 990-T" or talk with a local tax consultant/attorney if you have further questions.

The state treasurer will be glad to be of any assistance. PLEASE feel free to write or call.

BALLOT ISSUES AND LOBBY LAWS

Treasurers should be knowledgeable about money matters relating to state lobby laws and state laws pertaining to the support/opposition of ballot issues.

Ballot Issues

Any League electing to support/oppose a ballot issue at any level of government must meet various requirements, including registering with the appropriate authority before any income is received or funds expended.

Leagues can establish a separate organization either on a one-time basis for a specific ballot issue, or as an ongoing General Purpose Political Committee. Both require reports to the Texas secretary of state at specified times in relation to the date of the election; a General Purpose Political Committee, in addition, must file an annual report by January 15, whether or not any funds have been received or disbursed since the last report. Interested Leagues should refer to Texas Election Laws, Chapter 14, and contact the state League VS/CI chairman or treasurer, or the Elections Division of the Secretary of State's office, for additional information, schedules, and forms. Memos on this subject are sent out by the state League periodically; the most recent memos follow this page.

Any League that establishes a <u>General Purpose</u> Political Committee should file with the IRS for an EIN that is separate from the number assigned to the local League.

If your League acts on a ballot issue, your board may wish to appoint a separate treasurer to handle the funds and reports.

Lobby Laws

Lobby laws pertain only to lobbying the Texas legislature. In general, the laws affect local Leagues if:

- -- the League spends more than an amount specified by law on lobbying the legislature
- -- the League reimburses individual members for any expenses

Lobby law specifics are covered in updates from the state League; the most recent is attached.

RE: POLITICAL ACTION COMMITTEE ELECTION LAWS

This memo is an update and expansion of the September 24, 1979 communication you received from Ethel Sturgis.

Article 14 of the Texas Election Code regulates money contributed and money spent for campaigns on ballot issues. This DOES NOT relate to taking action in other ways.

Local Leagues preparing to launch a public campaign supporting or opposing a ballot issue for which they will incur expenses and receive contributions to defer those expenses, MUST file as a Political Action Committee (PAC). Furthermore, they must designate a campaign treasurer prior to receiving any income and incurring any expenses. (See Art. 14.01 §0 for definitions of PACs, and Art. 14.02 for appointment of a campaign treasurer.)

Forms for filing to set up a PAC may be obtained as follows:

Statewide ballot issues -- Secretary of State's office;

Local ballot issues (city, county, school district, etc.) -- contact the entity holding the election (city clerk, county clerk, etc.)

However, according to the Secretary of State's office, local Leagues not intending to spend money may take action without filing as a PAC. The League should incur no expenses in calling a press conference, issuing press releases, writing letters to the editor, appearing on radio or TV talk shows, etc. League members, then, may not be reimbursed for stamps, babysitting, gasoline, etc., nor may League stationery be used.

But should a local League decide to print materials, copy for distribution material supplied by the LWV-Texas Action Committee or other sources, purchase media time, or reimburse members for action expenses, etc., then a PAC <u>must</u> be formed prior to any expenditures.

FUNDING POLITICAL ACTION COMMITTEES

According to the Secretary of State's office, it is legal to provide "seed" money from a local League budget to begin a PAC. However, the amount must be a very small percentage of the total League budget. Additional funds from other sources should be solicited specifically for the PAC account.

It is strongly advised that a separate bank account be opened for the money contributed to a PAC. If this is not done, it might be that the reporting and disclosure provisions of Art. 14 could require that if a PAC is part of an organization's total budget, all monies received and expended in that budget must be reported. However, it is not necessary for the local League treasurer to be the PAC treasurer, as long as someone (perhaps the action chairman) is willing to be officially designated the PAC treasurer and assume record-keeping responsibility.

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CORPORATE CONTRIBUTIONS

In opinion #H-1175 (June 6, 1978) the Attorney General of Texas ruled that Art. 14.06 of the Texas Election Code prohibiting corporate contributions is unconstitutional as it applies to ballot issues. In other words, corporate contributions to a Political Action Committee for ballot issues are legal in Texas. Note that this opinion does not speak to labor organization contributions.

USE OF THE VOTER IN ACTION CAMPAIGNS

League communications/publications such as the VOTER may contain information and updates from action committees and/or action chairmen, according to the Secretary of State's office, as this is considered regular League business and the VOTER a regular League publication.

However, when a VOTER is used as a PR tool by a League and sent to contributors, the press, etc., it is advisable not to include action campaign materials, articles and editorials, as these may be considered political advertising. Should a local League decide to use one or more issues of a VOTER in an action campaign to be sent to non-League members, the cost of this VOTER should be met with PAC funds with the PAC name included.

PAC AND OTHER NAMES ON POLITICAL ADVERTISING

When forming a PAC, a local League will need a name for the committee. For example: "LWV Anytown Political Action Committee," or "LWV Anytown Action Committee." The treasurer is designated at this time also. However, it is NOT necessary to print the treasurer's name on political action material; only the name and address of the committee is required.

RE: The use of the VOTER in action campaigns

Some confusion has resulted from the July 1980 memo regarding Political Action Committees (PACs), specifically the section on the use of the VOTER. I will try to be more lucid!

Regular League business, such as its support of amendments in the upcoming election may and should be included in the VOTER. Also, what action the League it taking, as well as updates on that action. These activities are considered regular League business which needs to be communication to the membership and is not "political advertising."

In Article 14.01, subsection (R) of the Texas Election Code "political advertising" is defined as:

. . . anything in favor of or in opposition to any candidate for public office or office of a political party, or in favor of or in opposition to any political party, or in favor of or in opposition to the success of any public officer, or in favor of or in opposition to any measure submitted to a vote of the people, which is communicated in any of the following forms:

(1) anything published in a newspaper, magazine or journal or broadcast over a radio or television station in consideration of money or other thing of value; or

(2) any handbill, pamphlet, circular, flier, commercial billboard sign, bumper sticker, or similar printed material.

So anything which encourages citizens to vote in accordance with the League's position should not be included in VOTERs sent to contributors, press, public officials, etc. This would include editorials; explanations of why the League supports (or opposes) issues and/or amendments; fliers; etc. Unless, of course, the VOTER has been funded from PAC money.

I do hope this makes it simpler, and if questions remain, please don't hesitate to call or write me at the above address.



LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS OF TEXAS OBBY COUNTY COORS

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Who must register as a lobbyist?

CATEGORY 1 - A person* who spends more than \$200 in a calendar quarter (not including travel, food, or lodging expenses) for communicating directly** with one or more members of the legislative or executive branch to influence legislation.

- * "Person" means an individual, corporation, association, firm, partnership, committee, club, or other organization, or a group of persons who are voluntarily acting in concert.
 - ** "Communicating directly" means contact in person or by telephone, telegraph, or letter.

Under this category of the law local Leagues do not need to register because they do not spend this amount of money to lobby.

CATEGORY 2 - A person who receives compensation or reimbursement from another to communicate directly with a member of the legislative or executive branch to influence legislation.

Under this category of the law if you communicate directly to influence legislation and if you are reimbursed by the League, then you must register within five days after the first direct communication.

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Alice Action is a member of the League City League. Alice sends telegrams in her name to 7 members of the Legislature urging them to support a bill for displaced homemakers. The League City League reimburses Alice. Alice must register as a lobbyist.

Mary Sunshine is the Government Chair of the League City League. Mary writes the official League letter in support of the Sunset Legislation using League stationery and stamps. Mary does not have to register as she is not being reimbursed. The letter is paid for as a part of the League's lobbying budget (and the League is spending less than \$200/quarter for lobbying). Should Mary Sunshine send a telegram she should be sure that it is billed to the League's account. If it is billed to her and requires reimbursement then she must register as a lobbyist.

On Legislative Day a delegation of people from the League City League come to Austin to meet with their legislators over lunch. The League City League pays

for entertaining the legislators with money from the League treasury. The individuals would not have to register. The River City League is also in town. They take their legislators to lunch and pay for entertaining them from their own funds expecting to be reimbursed by the River City League. They must register and report the amount spent. The cost of each Leaguer's meals (other than the lunch) or transportation to and from Austin do not have to be reported. The cost of the individuals' meal with the legislators should be reported.

HOW DO I REGISTER?

If you are required to register as a lobbyist, the act of registration and subsequent filing of reports are your responsibility, not the League's. Copies of the forms may be obtained by writing or calling Kerry McGee, Suite 125, State Capitol, Austin, Texas, 78711. (512) 475 - 2015. Be sure to keep duplicate copies of all paper submitted. There are three forms that are required: the registration form, supplemental registration and activities report form, and termination notice form. Failure to file forms properly is a Class A Misdemeanor. THE PENALITIES ARE A FINE OF UP TO \$2,000, UP TO ONE YEAR IN JAIL, OR BOTH.

Who must register as a lobbyist?

1. Registration form - The Form must be completed, notarized, and filed with the Secretary of State within five days after the first direct communication triggering the requirement.

(Note: Item 3 on the form does not require you to list donations from local League contributors. When filling in Item 6, if you do not have specific bill numbers, you may list major League positions or legislative priorities).

2. Supplemental Registration and Activities Report Form. This report must be notarized and filed with the Secretary of State (1) between the first and the 10th day of each month following a month in which the Legislature is in session (including special sessions) covering the activities during the previous month, or (2) between the first and the 10th day of the month immediately following the last month in a calendar quarter when the Legislature is not in session.

(Note: If you take your legislator out for a tour of the county jail and then take the lawmaker to lunch you will have to report your expenses if you are reimbursed by the League. The same rule applies if you take your legislator to lunch for pre-session interviews. On the other hand, if you invite your legislator to a League dinner and his dinner is paid directly by the League this does not have to be reported. The League would be required to report cost of entertainment if over \$200 in a calendar quarter. If the League has a lobby-ist at the time of the League dinner the amount for entertainment should be reported by the lobbyist. See Sec. 2 b 1 of Article 6252-9c VTCS).

3. Termination Notice Form. When you know that you will no longer be reimbursed by the League for your activities, fill out a termination notice form, have it notarized, and send it in. DO NOT FAIL TO DO SO. Until you have filed a notice of termination you are required to continue to file monthly or quarterly reports even if you have no activity. (REFER TO PENALTIES FOR FAILING TO FILE AS NOTED ABOVE).

THE PROS AND CONS OF INCORPORATING

Any local League desiring to incorporate should contact the Office of the Secretary of State, State of Texas, Austin, TX 78711 to obtain the filing forms and information regarding the requirements for incorporating.

If your local League incorporates, you should also file for an exemption from payment of franchise taxes through the Business Tax Division, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Capitol Station, Austin, TX 78711.

Because of the legal technicalities involved in the process of incorporating, local Leagues are urged to seek legal help.

The question of whether or not to incorporate surfaces periodically in many local Leagues. Any information regarding the pros and cons of incorporating will be sent to local League presidents with a copy enclosed for forwarding to treasurers. Such material should be inserted in this booklet following this page.

CLEANING UP AND KEEPING RECORDS

At the end of each fiscal year you should clean out your files and prepare to start anew, just as you would if you were turning your books over to a new treasurer. Get rid of all the extraneous "stuff" -- but that doesn't mean throw everything away!

TO BE BOXED FOR DISCARDING AFTER FIVE YEARS:

Deposit slips, check stubs, bank statements, and cancelled checks
All journals and ledgers
Vouchers
Sales tax reports
Insurance and bonding contracts
Employee tax reports

You may want to keep handy this last group of materials from the past two years since you may want to refer to it from time to time, but the prior records may be stored, with the date to be discarded shown on each box.

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
