

Galveston May 6, 1918

Dear Ruth:- I intended writing after I came from church last night - but got to reading and then it was soon bed time. It rained all day yesterday and up till nearly church time, I didn't go to church. There was a few there but we had a good meeting. Hatter played yesterday both times Miss Sadie and her mother wept Houston. Arnon has gone to the Army to San Antonio's left - yesterday morning I have an idea he and his wife are separated she didn't say a word about her. Said they stayed with friends Mrs. P. is all broken up about it. - Helen Kahn was at S.S. and church yesterday she doesn't seem but a trifle thinner. She wore a cute little black tam that came down over one ear and low in the back made of thin shadowy stuff. Trimmied with a few tiny pink rose buds. She didn't look bad at all. ~~Miss~~ Hard said she thought she was someone who had something wrong with their hair - before she knew who she was. She came up to me and seemed very glad to see me. Mr. Posther died and was buried

Saturday. I guess you know he was sick the girls
haven't been out since that party when you were
here. I walked home with old Mr. & Mrs. Meyers last
night. They said to remember them to you when
I wrote. Mrs. Quinn always asks about you -
I don't know if I told you but - it rained so hard
last Monday that we called off the missionary meet-
ing so to-day we are going to have the same
study topic instead of ~~something~~ else. Be sure
and let me know if you received the two dollars, it
is risky business you know. Mrs. Seringeour told
yesterday that Dr. Latimore had gone west in Kan-
sas City. Mr. Bagby told me yesterday his sis-
ter had not decided about going yet - but I saw
in the Standard that she expected to enter the
training school in Sept. - Tuesday, it is time for the
Postman so I'll finish this up. You certainly must
have been doing stunts last week you must have
enough to buy two liberty bonds now, I have just
come in from the garden, have been getting the
ground ready to plant out some sweet potato slips
Mr. Hartel lent me a lot this morning, some kind
we had last year, so I want to put them out to night.
Your two letters came this morning, yesterday morning
I received the note. Hilbert hasn't appeared yet,
didn't even phone last week, Hope I'll hear from him
this week. You must have had a great time with your
play. The school here is going to have a play and they
are going to give the proceeds to the Red Cross -
Mama was anxious to get me to go. I don't know
whether I will or not. Mrs. Seringeour asked me to stay
after the meeting yesterday and pay her a visit - so
I did, we stayed about an hour she had her knitting
but said she couldn't knit and talk so I took her
knitting and let her talk - she said Woylin (I guess
that's the way you spell it) had gone to the Navy she said
he was twenty years and seven months and would soon
be called anyway so he would rather enlist - and get
when he wanted to be. She was knitting a helmet
for him, she is awfully lonesome and I think she
is failing fast. Mrs. Chesebrough says Esther
is going to Draughton business college this summer
