<sup>1</sup>Nasreddin Hoca is the most popular comic folk character in the Turkish oral tradition. He is often very wise but he is just as often equally foolish. In modern Turkey a hoca is a preacher and religious leader. In pre-Republican times he was also a teacher, education then being the responsibility of the clergy.
